REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equaling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS OF DEERFIELD, NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the School Board of Deerfield:

It is with pleasure that I present to you my second annual report of your school organization and educational activities. Such recommendations as are herein suggested are made because of the increasing scarcity of teachers, the continued growth of pupil enrollment, and the steady rise in the costs of books, supplies, equipment, labor, transportation, tuitions, and fuel.

May I express my thanks and appreciation to the School Board, Selectmen, Janitors, Teachers, Pupils and all other individuals and organizations that have helped in any way to improve the educational conditions in the schools of Deerfield.

After the close of the school year last June, Mr. Amadon resigned to accept a position in the schools of Milton, New Hampshire. Mr. Sherman A. Lovering of Manchester and Keene was elected to take his place. Mrs. Nancy T. Stevens with nearly 20 years experience as a teacher in New Hampshire and Massachusetts, was elected as the Art teacher for your schools. In my opinion, the School Board is fortunate in being able to find an experienced instructor that is able to open another channel of learning to the children of the town in their search for a full and better life. The State Department of Education required this year for the first time that the school census should be made of all the boys and girls of the town from the age of one day to 15 years inclusive. The principal reason was the forecast of the children of the state for future educational purposes. In studying Table II, it is interesting to note that (1) from 1947 to 1960, with the peak enrollment in 1958, there is a gain of nearly 10 million children in the schools of the country—24,500,000 to 34,200,000; (2) peak enrollments begin in Grade 1 in 1954 and 1955 and continue for each succeeding year until 1960 when the peak comes in Grades 6, 7, and 8; (3) the relative growth in Grade 1 is higher during the 10-year period than the high school growth; (4) the peak of the elementary school enrollment is reached in 1957 while that of the Grand Total comes in 1958 and the high school in 1960; (5) the high school growth holds quite steady from 1947 to nearly 1958 and even in one or two years is retarded. However, there is no question of the great increase in the growth of the schools in the next ten years and taxpayers must face that fact and provide accordingly. Costs of instruction, current costs, building needs, total costs, and costs within the schools themselves brought about by curriculum changes, methods of teaching, equipment needs, and general school trends must be studied very carefully in budget building.

Achievement tests have again been administered to all the children of your schools together with mental ability tests. Data is in the files which is proving very valuable to the teachers in their study of individuals and remedial work. This work should be continued. Over a period of years it should prove valuable in guiding boys and girls in the work they are more fitted for and in future work in education, trade, business, or life.

Tuition is probably one of the most important items in the school budget this year and every year. The tuition rates for the past three years for high schools have increased from \$123.69 in 1946-47 and \$138.89 in 1947-48 to \$158.74 in 1948-49. And all indications are that the tuition for 1949-50 will be above \$170.00. This must be placed in the budget and arrangements must be made to place it there.

Deerfield is situated like many other towns in the state in that it must raise and appropriate money for its schools.

Included in this appropriation is transportation. The laws are written so that out of about 90 pupils, about 80 of them must be transported. With increasing costs of nearly every article in the lives of the people, the costs of transportation are no exception and if the town expects to fulfill the obligations imposed upon it by the General Court of the state, then the taxpayer must see that the children reach school in adequate vehicles. If you should study the costs of transportation conditions as compared with private ownership and public ownership of buses you will find that after the initial cost of the vehicle, it would be cheaper to buy your own buses. However, until the citizens of the town feel that this can be done, our youngsters must be transported and we must pay the costs regardless of the increase each year.

Books and supplies must be purchased for school use. If a study is made of these items it will be found that the important factor tied up with them are material—paper and wood—labor, and distributing costs. It has always been the lot of the consumer to pay the greater cost of any of these similar items and with this cost passed along from the manufacturer to the jobber to the consumer, the bill falls upon the taxpayer.

The National Education Association in its latest campaign drive for better education for the youth of the United States, sets forth three purposes for the movement. And all three are closely bound up with the teachers of the country. One is to raise certification standards; the second is to meet the critical shortage of elementary teachers; and the third is to improve the preservice education of these teachers. We lost our best teachers or potential teachers during the war—any arguments to the contrary and we have been trying to get them back into the fold ever since. In some districts this is being done through better salaries, more and better equipment, and better working conditions including housing. Your school board believes this condition and should be commended in its efforts to look into the future and prepare for every emergency possible. Your teachers are your most

important personnel except the children themselves and whatever can be done to make them competent and happy will surely reflect upon the growth and development of your children.

In order that the citizens of the town may draw their own comparisons, I have been able to place before you in the next Table the salaries of teachers of towns of similar or equal valuation as published by the State Department of Education for salaries during 1948-49.

I should fail as the executive officer of the School Board if I did not bring to the attention of all the taxpayers in the

State and district of Deerfield the fact that it is possible for the school district to lose the greater part of the State Aid for schools. During the past two years Deerfield has received approximately \$5000 in state aid each year. With this increase in the aid it has helped greatly, especially during the period of rising costs. However, in 1947 Deerfield received about half that amount because of the formula in force at that time and the raising of but a fractional part of the money needed. I call all voters of the town to rally behind the new State Aid Education Bill calling for over two million dollars to replace the money voted at the last legislature and from which all cities and towns of the state were able to help the education problem as a state wide improvement. This is vital to every person concerned not only as a member of the school, but also as a parent, taxpayer, and citizen of the state. If you allow this to lapse and be influenced not to demand its passage you who pay the bills must realign your school budget for 1949-50 and this means an increase in the tax rate.

In discussing the above items and problems connected with the budget which must be met by the men and women who pay the bills, I am trying to place before you in a frank and earnest manner the most important factors which not only confront the town, but every town in the state and nation. Education is the greatest problem in the United States today and the only people who can solve it are you and I and many more American citizens like us. I most urgently evoke your study and help in this most important problem.

Again may I express my appreciation for your confidence in my endeavors to make the Schools of Deerfield a living factor for a better life in the community.
