

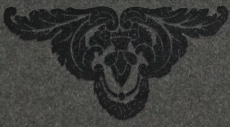

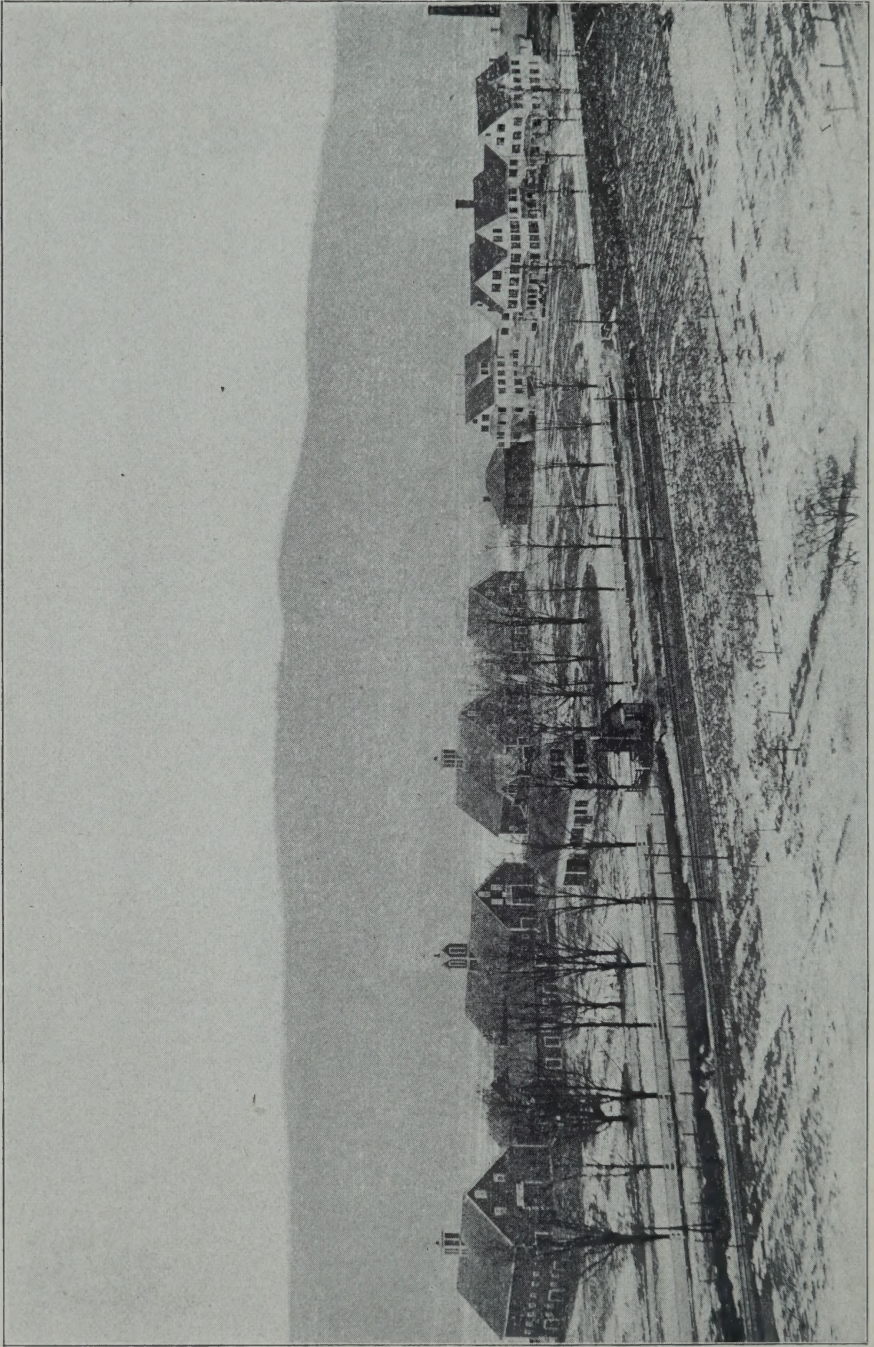

Commissioners' Report

To the Citizens of Grafton County:—

We herewith submit our report of the affairs of the County for the year ending December 31st, 1908, together with the reports of the Sheriff, Solicitor, Clerk of the Court, Jailer, Treasurer and Auditors, and the Superintendent, Physician and Chaplain of the County Farm.

Although we have had some extraordinary expenses the past year we are able to show a gain in assets of \$841 84.

By order of the Supreme Court the County has been obliged to pay a part of the expense of building a steel bridge in the town of Bridgewater, between the towns of Plymouth and Ashland, and for this, including counsel fees, we paid the sum of \$1,411 77.

At the last meeting of the County Convention it was voted to expend the sum of \$300 in transcribing the old Grafton County records in the office of the Secretary of State at Concord. This has been done, but the work is not completed and another appropriation will be necessary to complete the work.

The cost of supporting paupers and Dependent Soldiers off the Farm has been more than last year, and the same is true at the Farm, owing largely to the higher prices of everything we have to buy.

The insane patients were transferred from the Farm to the New Hampshire State Hospital last spring, and the ward formerly occupied by them has been made into a hospital where the patients are under the care of a trained nurse.

The water system has been extended by taking water from springs nearly a mile from the reservoir, which in ordinary seasons will save the necessity of pumping.

We have a fine herd of high grade Holsteins consisting of one hundred and eight cows and heifers and twenty-four calves.

The taxpayers of Grafton County and others interested are invited to visit the institution where they will be cordially received by Mr. and Mrs. Phillips, the Superintendent and Matron.

SELECTMEN OF TOWNS

AND

OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

Your attention is called to the following extracts from the laws of 1903.

CHAPTER 42, SECTION 1

SECTION 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such person the sum or sums paid out for such assistance, the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after the payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration, provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his disease.

CHAPTER 106, SECTION 1, as amended

"SECTION 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support ; provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town."

CHAPTER 110, SECTION 1, last clause

"IX. Any person of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state, and, being taxed for his poll for seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on his poll and estate during that term, and any unmarried woman of the age of twenty-one years who shall have

resided in any town in this state seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on her estate during that term, shall thereby gain a settlement in such town." Also to Chapter 67 of the laws of 1903, Chapter 84 of the Public Statutes; Chapters 1 and 71 of the laws of 1907 relating to paupers, and the following from Chapter 110, Public Statutes, relating to "assistance to persons in quarantine."

SECTION 1. Whenever any person or family is placed in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public against smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other dangerous, infectious or contagious diseases, it shall be the duty of said board to assist such person or family while in quarantine in such manner as in the judgement of the board may be deemed wise or necessary.

SECT. 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part thereof as the board may determine, shall be deemed a legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public health and shall be charged to the account of incidental expenses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the person or persons so quarantined and assisted unless such person or persons are already paupers as defined by the Public Statutes.

HORACE F. HOYT, Etna, N. H.:—Dorchester, Enfield, Canaan, Grafton, Hanover, Lebanon, Lyme, Orford, Orange, Piermont, and present their bills to the commissioners at Lebanon the third Tuesday in April and the third Tuesday in October.

GEO. H. TURNER, Bethlehem, N. H.:—Bethlehem, Bath, Benton, Easton, Franconia, Haverhill, Landaff, Littleton, Lisbon, Lyman, Livermore, Monroe, Warren, and present their bills to the commissioners at Woodsville the third Tuesday in March and the third Tuesday in September.

All applications for aid should be immediately reported to the Commissioners as under the laws of 1903 no bill will be paid for more than ten days' support previous to the proper affidavit being received. Affidavit blanks will be supplied by the Commissioners upon request.

In accordance with Chapter 30, Section 1, Public Statutes, the Superintendent of County Farm shall make up his report to January 1, annually and also Section 2 of said Chapter requires that the Superintendent's report shall contain in addition a list of Paupers actually supported at the farm and the number of weeks each was supported, also a statement of the average cost per week for each Pauper, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1908, one hundred and eleven (111).

The number of weeks board is ascertained by taking the number of days, between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual and dividing that number by seven which gives the number of weeks each individual has been supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the Farm for the year ending December 31, 1908 is \$12,424 27 and the sum divided by the whole number of weeks board furnished, viz., 5811, gives \$2.13 as the price per week.

Physicians' Report

GENTLEMEN:—

I hereby submit my report of the Medical Department of Grafton County Farm.

Since my last report that portion of the buildings which was occupied by insane women, has been entirely remodeled and fitted up for a hospital. This fills a long felt want.

Hitherto the patients have been cared for in their rooms or dormitories surrounded by their fellow inmates and the accompanying noise and excitement. They depended for care upon the attendants. This was only a small and incidental part of the work required of them, therefore the care of the sick was left largely to the other inmates with results which were many times far from satisfactory.

Now the services of Miss Grace Coley from Lebanon, N. H., a graduate nurse, have been secured and the patients are under her supervision and care.

The hospital is well furnished and fitted up with most of the essentials required. The patients have the quiet and retirement so important to produce the best results.

I see no reason why the more important operations in surgery may not be treated here with as good success as in any other Institution in the state.

There have been three births and twenty-two deaths during the year. Those who have died were mostly old and feeble people.

The unusual number of cases remaining undisposed of on the criminal docket is due, either to continuances granted by the Court on motion of the defendants or by reason of the fact that there are civic suits pending between complaining witnesses and the parties indicted, which, under our practice, are ordinarily disposed of before criminal cases involving the same facts are pushed to trial. The cases on docket not included in the foregoing will probably be disposed of at the March term.

There are also pending, on the civil docket of the Southern Judicial District, two actions under the nuisance act, one against Dennis H. and Harry E. Sargent of West Lebanon and one against O. L. Rand of Canaan. Many cases for violation of the liquor laws have been prosecuted and convicted before Justice and Police Courts that are not included in the foregoing list. Circulars have been sent to Selectmen and police officers calling attention to the failure in many localities of enforcing the laws against the sale of tobacco to minors. Especial effort has made to secure an impartial and thorough enforcement of the laws relating to the licensing and collaring of dogs.

Efficient aid has been rendered when requested by the sheriffs and deputies. Prompt attention has been given to all complaints that have come to my attention, followed by prosecution where the facts have warranted. There are several Police Court appeals that are awaiting the action of the Supreme Court on questions of law.

I would recommend that the Legislature make provision for the payment of the actual personal expenses of the Solicitor in addition to the salary, when away from home in the performance of his duties.
