

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Lempster on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To bring in your votes for Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates-at-large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Conventions of the various Political Parties to be held to nominate Party Candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Interest on Debt.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to keep the Common mowed around the Soldiers' Monument at Lempster Street.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for State Aid Construction or Town Road Aid.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver blank inventories at the time they appraise the property for taxation.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to elect one Road Agent instead of three, to take effect in 1941.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and Memorial Day.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Library.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to reinsure the Town Hall and Union Hall.

Article 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to limit the Road Agents to the appropriations.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote

to raise for Old Age Assistance and pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see what sum per hour the Town will pay for labor on the highway.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to receive sealed bids for mowing Town roads, a separate bid to be sent for each district.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in their discretion, to grant right-of-way easements to the New Hampshire Electric Cooperative, Inc., over lands owned by the Town.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of \$200.00 from Fred C. Parker Estate for the care of his lot in East Lempster Cemetery, to be known as the Parker and Stafford Trust Fund.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Fire Company.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Athletic Association.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 for White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase some kind of a snow remover to be used on a truck.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to buy more snow fence.

Article 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Another year has passed and there has not been any brush fires, for which we are very thankful. Two more Deputy Fire Wardens were appointed, Mr. Lucius H. Nichols on the Mountain and the Fire Chief, George Richardson, at East Lempster.

Now, with the Warden and his four deputies, the Fire Company, and the Forest Service Camp, we feel that we are in a very good condition to locate a fire very soon after it starts.

It was said last year that we were facing a very bad fire hazard and I think we are in about the same condition this year. Some green has grown up through the wind fall but it will not amount to much in case of a fire. I still feel as I did last year, that if we are very careful and see to it that everyone else is careful we will not have many fires. We should be on our guard at all times and ask everyone else to be also, and be sure to notify the Warden if there is anyone being careless.

There has been a lot more trees blown down this year than anyone realizes and that adds a little more to the danger. So let each and everyone do their part to prevent a fire for you know what a fire means in a town—higher tax rates—let's try and cooperate to keep our rate as low as possible.

I want to thank the Forest Service Camp for the work they have accomplished in cleaning up brush beside the highway. I think this has done a lot of good not only preventing fires, but also beautifying the roadsides. We certainly hope they do not leave us this summer for we may need their wonderful help.

I also want to thank the Fire Company for their assistance which they are always ready to give. Lempster should be congratulated for having such a band of helpers. I think they have saved several homes that might have been burned by fires that started in the chimney. Not a one has been lost, and here's hoping they continue in their good work.

The \$25.00 that the town raised last year is still in the Treasury. The State did not meet us 50-50, so we did not get any tools, perhaps we will get them this year.

There is a meeting held of the Grafton-Sullivan County Fire Wardens' Association every month somewhere in the two counties. Anyone who is interested is invited to attend and join, membership dues are \$1.00 per year.

With three feet of snow on the ground, and still snowing hard as I am writing this report, I don't think that there will be any forest fires for a few days.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT





SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Lempster:

I am happy to report that I find the teaching at both the Lempster schools of a very high quality. We have certainly been fortunate to retain such able teachers as Mrs. Viola Horton for the upper grades and Miss Claire Sing for the lower grades. Each is specially prepared for the grades taught.

In spite of the very large number of prospective high school pupils for next year, we find ourselves in not too bad financial condition. The state legislature did not appropriate money enough to meet its obligations to the state aided districts in full. The total amount of these "savings" has been placed as a burden on the state aided districts in the form of reduced checks.

Nothing has been done to relieve the smaller districts when they find themselves with an extra large number of high school pupils. Two extra burdens have been placed on the districts, one, to transport or board high school pupils who are not fourteen years old, the other to educate handicapped young people in the district. There seems to be nothing the local school officials can do about these laws.

There has been made a suggestion that a small tax on moving picture tickets would relieve the situation. It seems as though the schools should be supported by some special tax as well as the roads and other activities.

One of the most difficult problems in connection with the Lempster schools is transportation. There was a very large transportation problem in Lempster before the schools were united. In 1929-1930 Lempster paid for teachers \$2,760.00, transportation \$1,426.50, janitors \$111.60, and for fuel \$107.00. This made a total of \$4,405.10. In 1936-1937 the costs were, teachers \$1,800.00, transportation \$1,759.00, janitors \$72.00, and fuel \$73.00, or a total of \$3,704.00. This is \$701.10 less than the costs of the same four items under the older plan.

Since then it has been harder to get full allowance from the state. The difficulty is in getting adjustments for changes that come due to families moving in and out of town. I feel sure that it would be more expensive for the state and for the district to go back to the three schools.

I wish to thank the citizens, school officials and the teachers, for their kindness and cooperation.
