

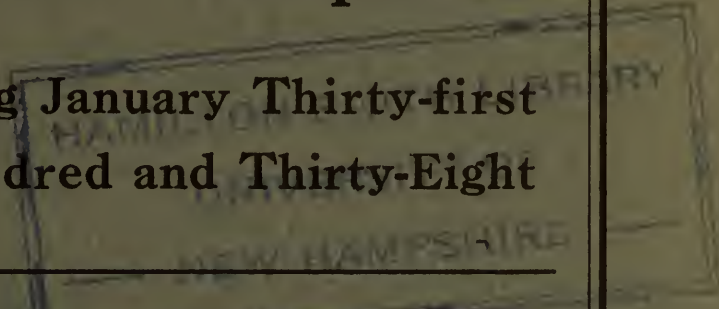

# TOWN MEETING WARRANT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State,  
qualified to vote in town affairs:—*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 8th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable, two Road Agents, and four Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town officers' salaries, for town officers' expenses, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Municipal Court expenses, for the police department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community Center, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for the Littleton Hospital, for the public library, for town poor, for Memorial Day, for band concerts, for water troughs, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars to be paid as Littleton's share of the expense of carrying on an advertising and other beneficial program for the section of the State known as the White Mountain Region which includes Littleton, in co-operation with the State of New Hampshire and other towns in said Region, the same to be paid by the Selectmen to the Treasurer of the White Mountain Region.

Article 4. To see what action the Town will take relative to repairing and protecting the Ammonoosuc River bank easterly of Lafayette Avenue, and to the rear of the dwelling houses thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen of the Town to apply for, accept and use, monies provided by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, for relief, unemployment, or otherwise, and do all things required by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, to obtain the same.

Article 6. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for the expenditure of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 8. To see what action the Town will take relative to creating and completing public projects, for the purpose of

providing employment for its citizens, and paying the cost of the same.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen of the Town to apply for, accept and use, monies provided by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, for public works, relief, unemployment, or otherwise, and do all things required by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, to obtain the same.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to complete the re-construction of the public highway, known as the Littleton-Monroe Road, in co-operation with the State of New Hampshire, and to borrow on the credit of the Town sufficient monies to pay its share of the same, and issue its serial notes for such sum or sums, all in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire and the vote of the Town.

Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the Town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To choose any other necessary Town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## Superintendent's Report

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*To the School Board:*

I am pleased to submit the following report relative to your schools:

The statistics of attendance present an interesting study. The total enrollment in the public schools is the smallest since 1930, while the high school enrollment has been exceeded only in each of the last two years. The enrollment by grades is as follows:

The enrollment in the high school building is 309 this year, in the Kilburn school 210, and in the Apthorp school 173. This smaller enrollment is not indicative of a removal from town of many families although it may be effected slightly by that. A decreased enrollment in the elementary schools is general throughout the state and the nation. The drop has appeared more suddenly here than in many communities. It probably has gone at once to the slightly lower plateau where we may expect the attendance to remain for a few years.

Each year a medical examination is conducted in all of the schools in town. Last year 691 pupils in our public schools were examined. This year 690 pupils were examined. The record of the examination and follow up work shows the value of this project.

Dr. Page has had the assistance of other physicians in town in some phases of the remedial treatment. The report of special work is evidence of Miss Bryant's effort to do everything possible for the improvement of health conditions among school pupils. From the school physician and the community nurse the school receives splendid cooperation at all times. They often help teachers establish the proper contact with the home for the improvement of school work. I can sincerely speak in high praise of their interest and helpfulness in our efforts.

I have for the past two years in the annual report discussed the need of additional room to properly accommodate the departments of the high school. I recommended for your consideration an annex to the Kilburn building to provide a classroom for the seventh grade pupils, to provide additional shop room for the mechanic arts department, and to provide for an assembly room for the Kilburn pupils. For the two years previous to this one the high school building has been overcrowded. This year it is full. The need for additional room in the mechanic arts department to extend the course through the twelfth grade is as great as last year. The number of pupils in this department has not decreased. The work of the department should be extended to include subjects as shop mechanics, automobile mechanics, and possibly metal work. These subjects cannot be offered with our present facilities.

The present number of pupils in our eighth grades indicates a high school enrollment next year slightly larger than this year. The decreased number in other elementary grades, however, makes our high school membership during the next five years or ten years problematical. It is probable that the economic situation in town does not warrant increased taxation or additional indebtedness for the building extension which would improve our school offering but which is not immediately mandatory.

During the past few years our high school courses in mathematics have been extended through the four years. They include general mathematics in grade nine, algebra in grade ten, geometry in grade eleven, and advanced algebra and solid geometry or trigonometry in grade twelve. A course in general mathematics for seniors who have not had any mathematics above grade eight, and who have had the Mechanic Arts in previous high school grades, has been offered for the past two years.

The science offering now extends through the four years of the senior high school. Physiography is offered in grade nine, biology in grade ten, chemistry in grade eleven, and physics in grade twelve. The chemistry department is fairly well equipped and has ample room for its work. The physics laboratory is too small and has insufficient shelf or closet room to house its equipment properly. The biology classes are held in this same room and the physiography classes must meet in a room which has no equipment space. The physics laboratory should be enlarged to include the present type-writing room in order to provide satisfactory space for the science classes. This would necessitate using the one large room (formerly called the library) now available for a study hall, for the commercial department. Such an arrangement would make difficult the grouping of pupils during study periods, without impairing the efficiency of classroom instruction, with our present space in the high school building. This need of the science classes presents another argument for additional rooms for the use of the high school.

The entire outline for English instruction in grades seven to twelve has been rewritten by a committee from the Educational Council of the State Teachers' Association working in cooperation with the State Board of Education and with English teachers from the schools of the state. This outline is being quite generally used in our English classes this year. Special attention is being given to spelling and handwriting in all the elementary grades. A committee is now at work on a bulletin for safety education. This bulletin will be published within a year and will be a helpful outline for teachers in all grades. Bulletins on health and the effects of alcohol, tobacco, and narcotics have previously been published. The subject matter of these bulletins is an important part of our instruction, closely correlated with the unit studies in all grades.

Some organized work in physical education has been begun this year with the girls under the direction of Miss Tewksbury. Group games such as volley ball, basketball, soccer ball, soft ball, relays, etc. leading up to organized games have comprised the program to date. Other parts of the program include folk dancing, and individual games such as skiing, skating, bowling, hiking, ballroom dancing, bicycling and riding. The Girls' Athletic Association has been organized to promote interest in physical activities outside of school—a point being given for every hour of outside activity—pupils winning emblems for their participation in healthful physical exercise or sport. Seventy-five senior and junior high school girls have profited from this instruction to date. Improved coordination and poise, good sportsmanship, appreciation of group play, and wiser use of leisure are expected outcomes.

Mr. Stonier has been devoting about eight periods a week to an informal program in physical education with the boys. Special attention has been given to the boys in junior and senior high school who are not members of the athletic squads. Drills, simple games, exercises and relays are used as foundation work, leading to organized games. An intramural program in basketball is planned to follow the season's scheduled games. Recreation, enjoyment, physical development, and fair competition in group play are ideals sought.

The so-called extra curricular activities have become an important part of our school program. To evaluate them in comparison with the classroom subjects of the curricula is a difficult problem—one on which interested persons may have widely differing opinions. To give them proper place, and time for the highest development of our pupils is a definite challenge.

Play supervision by the teachers and music instruction by the teachers under the direction of the music supervisor are the most pronounced instances of extra curricular work in the

elementary schools. In the high school our program is extensive. Some definite instruction in physical education with health and safety as incidental learning is given. The school has athletic teams in competition with other schools in football, basketball, baseball and winter sports. Definite instruction in vocal and instrumental music is offered, with choral groups representing the school at the State Interscholastic Music Festival and with the orchestra combining with other high school orchestras in public productions. School assemblies and dramatic productions afford some training in the field of public speaking.

But few changes have occurred in our teaching staff during the past year. Miss Kendrick, Miss Henry, and Miss Langley resigned in June. Miss Alice Hanson, a Colby College graduate with several years of successful experience in Winchendon, Mass., and Mount Vernon, N. Y., was selected to teach English in the senior high school. Miss Caroline Tewksbury, a Keene Normal School graduate, with five years of successful experience in Bethlehem, was chosen to teach mathematics, history, and physical education. Miss Beatrice Judkins, a graduate of the 1937 class at Keene, was selected to teach home economics and biology. Miss Barbara Willey, a graduate of the three year elementary course at Plymouth Normal School was selected for the vacancy in the Apthorp school. These teachers are doing excellent work in their respective positions.

During the past year new floors have been laid in two rooms at the Kilburn building and new furniture has been placed in these rooms. Three rooms in the high school and two rooms in the Apthorp school have had weather strips on the windows. The floors at the Apthorp school and some in the high school building have been refinished. Four rooms in the Kilburn building have been painted. Minor repairs have been made in all of the buildings.

At the Kilburn building the roof should be shingled next summer and the stairs should have new treads. The boiler in this building should be recovered. A new fence should be built one side of the Apthorp grounds. Two rooms at Apthorp should have new pupil desks. Improvements in the boys' and girls' locker rooms in the high school building should be made. Wardrobe space or steel lockers should be provided in the large study hall for pupils' clothes. Motion picture equipment would be a decided help in high school instruction.

The budget proposed for the next school year differs only slightly from that of the present year. It is presented with no plan for alterations in the school buildings. In last year's report besides the proposal for an addition to the Kilburn building, I suggested for your consideration alterations in the Apthorp building to provide a school auditorium. It is possible to make such alterations without taking any of the rooms now in use, at a cost of less than \$2,000.00. This room would be about 69' by 30' and would accommodate 200 persons or more. If this improvement were made \$2,000.00 should be added to the budget.

Your approval of the budget suggests an appropriation of \$64,000.00 for all school purposes. This amount is \$1,000.00 less than was raised last year. Last June the school year closed with a deficit of approximately \$1,100.00. This year that will be reduced to about \$200.00. The budget proposed is \$67,099.00. The receipts from all sources other than taxation are usually about \$3,000.00. An appropriation of \$64,000.00 should enable you to nearly balance the accounts in June 1939. If additional expenditures are planned a larger appropriation should be made at the district meeting.

The expenditures this year will be the lowest in ten years with one exception. The budget for next year is about the same as the actual expenditures for this year will be and slightly less than the expenditures of last year. The current cost of public education in Littleton per thousand dollars of

equalized valuation last year was \$9.49. Of the 241 school districts in the state the median cost was \$11.74. The per pupil cost in the elementary schools of Littleton was \$73.34 while the median for the state was \$77.16. The per pupil cost in your high school was \$95.71 while the median for the state was \$101.74. By all of these measurements the cost of operating your schools has been less than that in a majority of the school districts in the state.

The bonds are now reduced to \$64,000.00. The present year will close with a very small deficit. The school property has been maintained in good condition. Some new equipment to improve the efficiency of instruction has been added each year. In all of my efforts to improve your schools with a reasonable expenditure your advice has been helpful and sound. I keenly appreciate your loyal support.

## Headmaster's Report

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Dear Mr. Jordan:

My second annual report is herewith submitted:

During this school year the total membership of the school has been 243 pupils. Nineteen pupils have withdrawn as compared to 35 last year. Your study of these withdrawals over a period of years has been helpful in understanding present cases we have to face. The problem caused by the return of large numbers of post graduates is less apparent with only 3 in school now, 6 having been enrolled and 3 withdrawn when employment was secured. Pupils are also leaving school occasionally before graduation with a definite occupation attained.

Each year brings new forces which determine subject selection in the elective system. During the past year Commercial Geography has been replaced by Physical Geography. General Mathematics has been added for all Freshmen who plan to take Algebra, and elective to others. This is a valuable addition since it will bring a more highly selective group into Algebra and will give a four year study of mathematics where now only a three year offering is available. It will also bring the advanced mathematics course into the senior year where it will be fresher in the minds of those going to advanced schools.

Only two are now studying fourth year Latin. A marked apathy toward this subject has been noticed among the colleges. However, the election of Latin among the under classmen has not suffered a noticeable decline. There is some correlation between the study of Latin and the selection of Ge-

ometry and Advanced Mathematics. The increase in commercial or utility subjects, Physical Geography, Biology, and Chemistry has been coincident with the move away from the traditional academic subjects.

Good citizenship cannot adequately be taught through precept but the social studies—Sociology, Economics, and History—are playing their part in training for an improved citizenry, a function that publicly sustained schools in a democracy should fulfill.

There has always been a lag between the modes of life and corresponding changes in education. Labor restrictions relative to youth under eighteen years of age, labor union attitudes, and the reluctance of industry to accept and train immature minors increase the school burden of utility vocational education. In response to this challenge the high school and the junior high have already changed the offering. In addition to this adaptability within this group has been emphasized because experience has shown that the life of many industries is less than the average span of human life and technical progress often revolutionizes the occupations within an industry. The development of tact is also stressed because more idleness and change of employment ensues from lack of tact than from downright inefficiency. As soon as an increase of enrollment warrants a fourth year of Mechanic Arts should be added to the program of studies since the educational program is sold to the proposition of educating all the pupils of school age, and curriculum changes must be made to conform.

Mr. Stonier has developed an undefeated football team this year and the other branches of athletics are well represented with strong teams. There have been class games in football and basketball and junior varsity games to give the second and third place candidates an opportunity to play.

In recognition of the splendid record of the football team the Littleton Rotary Club under the direction of Merton White and Herbert Downing gave the football squad a banquet and a football program which the boys will long remember with profit.

The girls now can take gym work and participate in class games. Miss Caroline Tewksbury, who joined the teaching staff this year, has charge of this work. A girls' athletic association has been formed under her direction which permits winter sports and other outdoor exercises to count on a point system for awards.

Mr. Glazier has rendered valuable service in assisting athletics by initiating the monthly dues and securing the advertising for the Carnival program. In addition he directs the census work and has financial management of The Record.

Under the direction of Mrs. Hogan and Miss Corey the annual Stunt Night program was presented, while Miss Heald and Miss Kendrick each coached a one act play, the proceeds of these performances being applied on the athletic debt.

Miss Ellen Corey is directing a public speaking contest for the pupils of the junior high and the freshmen English classes.

The winter sports teams under the direction of Mr. Welch, assisted by Miss Heald, successfully defended the Littleton Carnival trophy last year. This year the teams have competed at Lancaster and Woodsville and placed first in both events. Mr. Welch also directs the rifle club. The long record of good sense and safety in the use of firearms by young people who have had the training of this club is a high compliment to Mr. Welch's training.

The Commercial Department under the direction of Miss Cate has cooperated with local service organizations in sup-

plying dittoed and mimeographed materials. The department has done a large amount of such work for use in the various school subjects and activities.

Miss Alice Hanson who came to Littleton High this year, coached the senior play "Campus Quarantine." Miss Hanson also directs the literary preparation of the "Record" and is doing an excellent work supervising the school notes column in the Courier.

The Home Economics Department has had a continuous growth under Mrs. Hogan. There are a total of 150 girls enrolled in the Home Economics classes. This number includes the junior high groups from the Parochial and Apthorp schools. In the high school sections 30 girls are enrolled in Freshmen Clothing, 20 in the Foods class, 15 in the Home, Its Care and Management, and 10 in the Family, and Its Members. From December to April approximately 80 cups of soup and cocoa are served daily to high school and Kilburn pupils. Preparation, serving, and care of accounts is a project of the sophomore Foods class. The girls cooperate in school activities by repairing athletic uniforms, making carnival numerals and costumes for school plays and operettas. Last spring a "banquet" was served to the combined orchestras of the North Country schools—over 100 young people.

The orchestra under Mr. Wentworth's direction continues to afford musical training to a large number of pupils. The orchestra has played at assemblies, the senior play, baccalaureate, and graduation while smaller groups furnish entertainment at public functions.

Mrs. Cushing has 124 pupils enrolled in the chorus groups. About 60 of these will go to Nashua to the May Festival. They have furnished programs at two public functions this year. The school concert in April permits all members to

take part while most of them appear at the baccalaureate, class day and graduation exercises.

Every community is challenged to provide opportunities of employment for its young people. It is gratifying to place many of the high school graduates in local industries, offices, and stores and to supply pupils with part time and temporary employment.

The N. Y. A. quota for Littleton has been six pupils. These pupils have been able to earn a maximum of \$6.00 each month by assisting the teachers and janitors.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent, school board, teachers, pupils and citizens for their support and valued advice in the solution of administrative problems.
