To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Middleton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March, 1952, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for salaries of school district officials and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and accept for use for school purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from state, federal, or other sources.
- 10. To see if the district will choose by vote one of two proposals submitted by the school board:
 - 1. To teach grades one to four at the Ridge School and grades five to eight in Farmington.

- 2. To teach all eight grades in Farmington.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Middleton:

During the school year 1950-51 Mrs. Blanche Wentworth was the teacher at the Ridge School. Mrs. Wentworth resigned at the end of the year to accept another position. Mrs. Ruth Anderson, R.N., served most efficiently as school nurse.

The school opened with 16 pupils in four grades. Before the end of the year 10 additional pupils had enrolled for a total of 26. Twelve elementary pupils in grades 5 and 6 were enrolled at the Union school, and 10 pupils in grades 7 and 8 were enrolled at Rochester, making a total of 48 elementary pupils for the year.

The expense of transporting elementary pupils out of town makes the cost per pupil somewhat higher than the state average.

Mrs. Ruth Anderson, R.N., resigned as school nurse as of December 31, 1951, because of ill health. Mrs. Anderson has rendered an invaluable service to the pupils of the Ridge School during the past few years, and we regret the necessity of her leaving.

Middleton has assumed a heavy tax burden in order to provide its children with an education. Unfortunately the new system of state aid decreased the amount received from the state from \$4,387.49 to \$2,273.81. The same amount will be received in 1952-1953.

The active interest and cooperation of the School Board, teacher, pupils, and citizens is sincerely appreciated.
