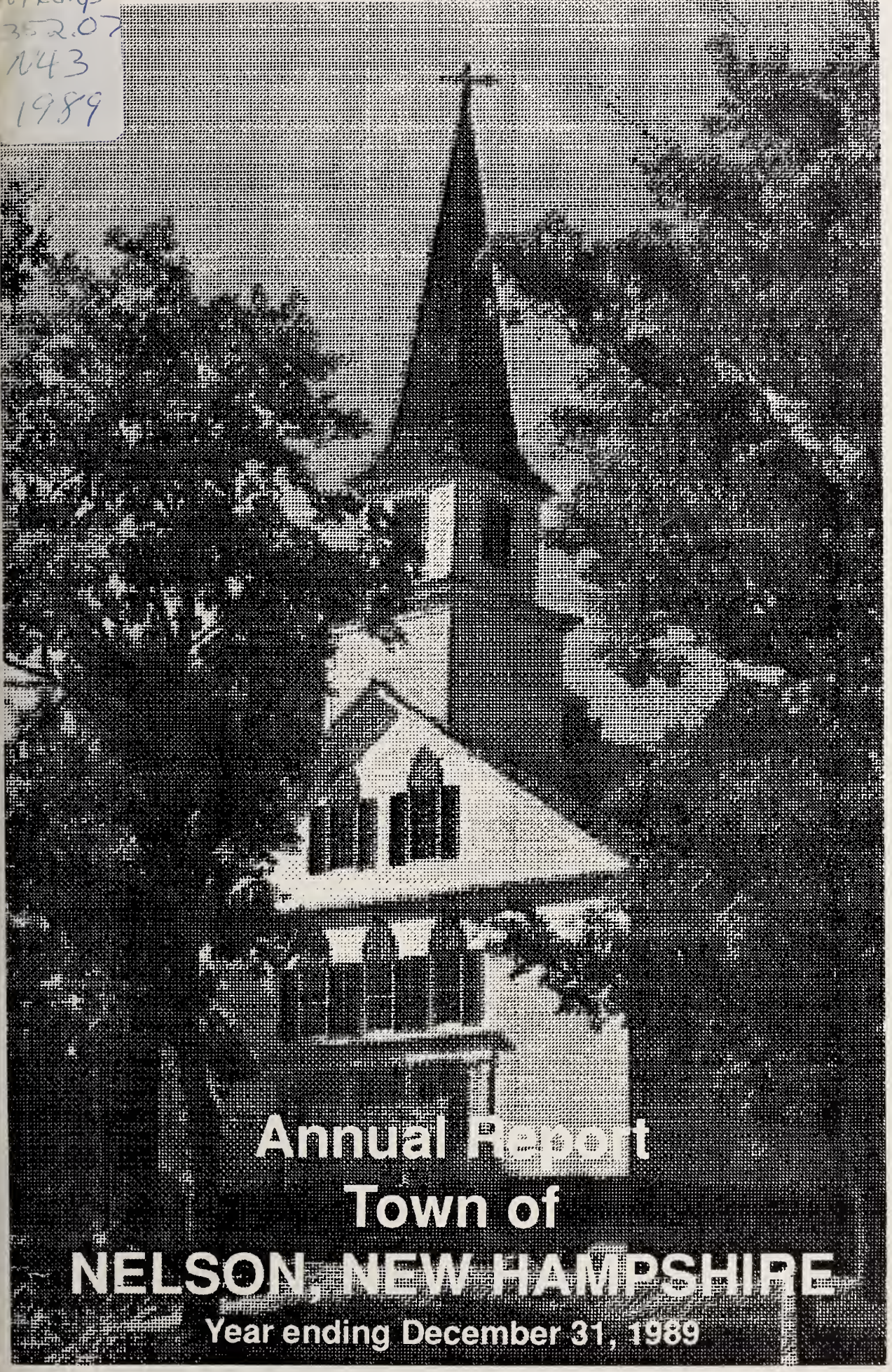

The most dramatic event to occur in Nelson village in many years is pictured on the cover, as the Church is raised to allow the construction of a meeting hall, offices, kitchen and bathrooms in the newly created space under the building. The area thus established allows the formal end of a relationship between the Town and the Church that goes back in time to the earliest days of both, in the 1770's. When the village center moved from the top of Melville Hill (near the cemetery) to its current location, Schoolhouse #1 — the "Old Brick Schoolhouse", where the Town Offices are now located — was jointly constructed by the Town and the Church in 1847. The center school was located on the 1st floor (two of the current Selectmen attended this school a hundred years later), and the Church used the 2nd floor as a meeting hall. Long known as "Concert Hall", this upper level space was maintained by the Church, while the roof was maintained by the Town. As late as the 1940's, Town Meeting, then a daytime event, recessed for lunch, which was provided by the Ladies Aid group from the Church, and all the voters adjourned to eat under the curved ceiling of Concert Hall. The food pass-through from the "kitchen" to the Hall may still be seen between Donna Kidd's office and the Selectmen's meeting room. In 1972 the church deeded its share of the building to the Town, under conditions that Sunday School and certain other activities could continue to be held in the building until such time as different facilities could be provided. This is now the case, and thus the end of an era. Other Towns in New Hampshire, however, continue this relationship. For example, both Rindge and Hancock share a building for Town and Church meetings (on separate floors) to this day.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

The Selectmen this year take special pleasure in noting the superior work of the many people who give unselfishly of their time to the benefit of the Town. Bill Robertson brings credit to Nelson, not only through exemplary service as Tax Collector, but also, until recently, as President of the New Hampshire Tax Collectors Association. John B. Wright has been a splendid Treasurer, moving the approach and strategies of that office into the 20th century. Fire Chief, Rick Lothrop, and his Volunteer Firefighters have clearly done a great job in preventing several homes in Town from sustaining major fire damage. All who have the opportunity to work with Police Chief, Dick Descoteaux, continue to be impressed with the tact and concern that he exhibits. Donna Kidd perseveres, keeping accurate records with unflinching good cheer, while working in the often hectic outer office. Bud French persists in doing an outstanding job as Road Agent; the roads are beginning to show the concern for long-range planning which he has brought to the task. From the Selectmen's point of view, of course, the most important improvement in Town administration has been the addition of Mary Davis as Town Clerk/Town Officers' Assistant. The Selectmen's office itself is now slowly advancing into the 20th century. Soon, with the purchase of a computer, as authorized at last year's Town Meeting, even more efficiency in office procedures will be possible.

Unfortunately, there continues to loom over the Town an ongoing and unresolved problem: the constant and growing pressure of expenses on the tax base. The costs of keeping the Town running have shown only minor increases, balancing the joint effects of inflation and the slow growth of the Nelson community. However, the expenses incurred by both the County and the School have shown sharp increases and this circumstance shows no sign of abating. Given that there is little hope of expanding our tax base by, for example, establishing a commercial zone near the eventual intersection of the old and new Routes 9, this increase in the County and School tax burdens poses a serious threat to the long-term viability of the community. This is, of course, a result of State rather than local initiative.

TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs: YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, at 12:00 noon to act upon the following articles:

POLLS will open at 12:00 noon and close at 8:00 p.m.
BUSINESS MEETING will start at 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$94,820 to defray Town Charges for the year ensuing.
3. To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 33:7, will authorize the Selectmen to incur debt and issue notes in anticipation of the taxes for the year 1990.
4. To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 80:42 I and RSA 80:80 II, will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens for non-payment of taxes and to convey title to properties deeded to the Town by the Tax Collector or otherwise, to any person by either public auction or advertised sealed bid.
5. To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 84:42 I I I and 80:80 I I I will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens for non-payment of taxes and to convey title to properties deeded to the Town by the Tax Collector, as justice may require.
6. To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 31:95b (Cum. Supp.), will authorize the Selectmen, subject to the provisions of RSA 31:95b (Cum. Supp.), to apply for, accept and expend, without further action of the Town, monies from either State, Federal or other governmental units and monies from private sources.
7. To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 41:9-a, will authorize the Selectmen, subject to the provisions of RSA 41:9-a, to set fees for programs and/or facilities previously voted on by the Town. This law does not authorize the setting of "impact fees".
8. To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22nd, 1990 as Earth Day 1990, and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment". (by petition)
9. To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a capital reserve fund, pursuant to RSA Chapter 35, for the future reevaluation of the town, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$6000 towards this purpose, said fund to be held by the Trustees of the Trust Funds until such time as the Town shall authorize reevaluation, or take any other action relating thereto.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7542 for the support of the Town Library.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1800 as the Town's share of the operating costs of the Home Health Care and Community Service.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$517 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000, this sum to be held in the Town Hall/Schoolhouse Capital Reserve Fund for the renovation or remodeling of the Old Schoolhouse or Town Hall, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take whatever actions they deem necessary and appropriate to encourage officials of the United States Post Office to continue the Munsonville Post Office at its previous location or at some other site in the Town of Nelson.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PLANNING & ZONING

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$517 as the Town's share for its membership in the Southwest Region Planning Commission.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH SERVICE & PROTECTION

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 which sum is to be paid to the City of Keene for the use of its Landfill.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$642 as the Town's share for operating costs of the Southwest Solid Waste Management District established under RSA 149-M and \$514 as the Town's share for the operating costs of the Ashuelot Valley Refuse Disposal District established under RSA 53-B.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2675 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that Townspeople will still be charged for individual calls.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new or used vehicle for the Police Department. It being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Police Department.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500 for the purchase of a new or used vehicle for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of \$6500 from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose, the balance of \$10,000 to come from general taxation.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 for the proper expenses of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad.
23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1700 for the purchase of four pager radio units for the Fire Department to replace out-dated units.
24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new equipment for the Fire Department, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Department.
25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000, to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established March 1988 to be devoted to the repair, reconstruction or replacement of the Fire Station. It being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Department.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52,000 for wages in the maintenance of the roads and bridges.
27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55,000 for General Highway expenses—gas, repairs and supplies.
28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive and appropriate the monies from the State Highway Block Grant. These monies to be used to offset summer and winter road maintenance. (Currently, State figures indicate this amount to be \$21,346)
29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Town Equipment Committee.
30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to provide a "shim" or leveling course and/or sealing of asphalt to be applied to Henderson Road, Old Towne Road and around the Mill Pond.
31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000 for the purchase of a new, one-ton 4x4 truck with plow and dump body; said sum to be raised from general taxation, or by taking \$20,000 from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and \$2000 from general taxation, or in such other manner as the Town may vote.
32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6000 to repair and upgrade the Town's loader.
33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500 for three 2-way radios for the Highway Department trucks.

34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for an addition to the Town Barn.

35. To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting.

FOR YOUR PROTECTION

The following regulations concern the protection of natural resources in Nelson. This information was gathered from the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated (RSA's), and the Nelson Zoning Ordinances and Subdivision Regulations. More copies of these guidelines are available in the Town Offices.

WATER AND WETLANDS

A permit from the State is required *prior* to:

- 1) dredging, filling or otherwise altering any pond, stream or wetland.
- 2) construction of a roadway, whether permanent or temporary, if it crosses a stream or wetland. This includes logging roads.
- 3) construction or reconstruction of a dam.

Permit applications are available from the Town Clerk.

No sewage effluent leaching field shall be located within 100 feet of the normal bank of any year-round stream or any pond.

LAND CLEARING AND LANDSCAPING

A "site specific permit" and plans must be filed with the State prior to clearing 100,000 square feet or more (2.33 acres) of land. This includes clearing for building sites, logging and gravel pits. The purpose of this rule is to establish measures to control erosion.

Before *any* timber is cut for sale, the landowner must file an "Intent to Cut". This form is available at the Town Office, and once filled out, is filed with the Selectmen and the State.

Timber slash may not be piled within 25 feet of a property line or a stream nor within 50 feet of a Great Pond, which is defined by law as public waters more than 10 acres in size.

Unless there is snow cover, permits for outdoor burning must be obtained prior to striking the first match. It must be raining between the hours of 9:00 am thru 5:00 pm before a permit can be issued. Those presently authorized to issue such permits are Bob West, Rick Lothrop, Charles Lang and Bud French.

Mining, which includes the removal of topsoil, sand and gravel, is regulated by both the Town and the State. A copy of the applicable State law pertaining to permits and enforcement can be seen in the Town Offices.

CONSTRUCTION

Prior to building a new dwelling, expanding an existing house, or occupying an existing seasonal structure on a year-round basis, the owner must submit an application to the Water Supply and Pollution Control Division of the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services. This application must include either 1) evidence that the existing sewage disposal system meets current State and local standards or 2) a design for a new system which meets those standards.

A building permit is required for any construction or activity which changes the "footprint" of an existing building or creates a new "footprint". This includes placing prefabricated structures on ones land, or moving them from one location to another on that land. These permits are available from the Selectmen, and in applicable cases, the above septic permit is required before

the building permit can be issued.

This past year has seen our pumper truck, K3M1, being rebuilt and put back into service. The vehicle has turned out well and we should get many more years service out of it until the town is prepared financially with the Capital Reserve fund to purchase a new vehicle. With this updated vehicle and the newer rescue vehicle being added last year, the town, for its size, stands in good shape with fire fighting equipment.

We had hoped to have had the new furnace put in the fire station during last year, but activities have moved it out to 1990. By the time you read this, it will have been installed and doing a good job replacing the unit that had been in service for 25 years.

This past year has seen some extensive work done in dealing with the addition at the church. Due to the construction requirements and the NFPA Code requirements, a sprinkler system had to be installed. This is a first for the town and it required some good cooperation with the church to make it happen effectively. One benefit that the town will have, even though it is hard to see, is that there is a tank holding 6000-7000 gallons of water now located next to the church. It will provide the water for the sprinkler system if ever needed. But, it can also be used as a water supply for any fires in the center of town. The design allows us to hook our trucks up to it and pump water within a reasonable distance. This is definitely an added benefit for the fire protection in the center of town.

I'd like to thank all those who helped us with the fire at the store. It was great having everyone that could, pitch-in and help with the effort. It feels good to have that added support. As most of you are aware, with the quick actions of our fire department, the outstanding support of a mutual aid system that provided additional equipment and manpower, we were able to take a potentially bad situation and contain it to only a portion of the building. Even the mail received only minor damage. Some of the town's young people put in some special effort in dealing with the icy conditions. Let's hope that the store can be rebuilt and put back into business.

Again, as in previous years, I encourage interested persons to come and join the department. We are always in the need for new members. In this day and age, it is difficult to be a volunteer, but this benefits both you and the town. Your insurance rates are kept lower by having an active fire department.

I'd again, like to thank all the active members for their continued effort and support, remember, to report a fire or other emergency,

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and State forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in Allenstown, Alton, Chesterfield, Concord areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

FIRE PERMITS

Please help your town forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27B), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, *without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.*"

The permitted time to burn is before 9 am or after 5 pm. If it is necessary to burn during the day for commercial purposes, a special permit is required from the state Forest Ranger. It is also possible to burn during the day if it is raining, however, a written permit is still required. Written permission is required if an individual wishes to burn on the land belonging to someone else.

If individuals wish to burn in an incinerator, a seasonal permit may be issued, the allowed times for burning are still before 9am and after 5pm.

There is no charge for permits at this time in the Town of Nelson.

REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

LOOKING FORWARD TO THE 90'S

The following discussions detail the philosophy behind the highway department articles in the warrant. The best voter is an informed voter. Please talk to me and express your personal views on these subjects. The road department exists to serve the community. Feedback, (both positive and negative) is important to me.

In last year's warrant (Article 33) it was voted that a committee be set up to evaluate the town barn for expansion. Terry Quigley, Selectman, Frank Ball, road equipment committee, Peter Smith, Mike Blandschun, Rob Germeroth and Alex Black volunteered. Mike Tarr and myself sat in on the meeting. The result of this committee was to add on a structure between the Town Maintenance Barn and the Equipment Storage Barn. This two story addition would be set up like a split level, with the 1st floor being level with the Maintenance Barn for ease and convenience. The structure will contain office space, a bathroom and a mechanical room. It is hazardous (and illegal) to have a furnace in the same room where flammable fluids are used/and or stored as is now the case.

Research and discussion of a new one ton 4x4 with 3 yard dump and 9' plow continues. This vehicle would be used for light duty tasks which unnecessarily put wear and tear on our expensive to maintain heavy equipment. Currently, we are plodding along with the 1952 M37 Army Truck. I'm sure most of you can think of examples of why it is best to use the right piece of equipment for the right job. Times change. Efficient use of equipment saves labor and maintenance costs, two of the largest portions of the highway department budget. Sometimes you have to spend a little money up front to control costs and improve efficiency in the long run. Any reduction of wear and tear on the heavy equipment helps increase it's life. Increasing the life stretches out the frequency of large capital expenditures for their replacement. You don't mow your lawn with a combine, and you don't stir your coffee with a blender. Would you routinely use a \$100,000 tool when a more maneuverable \$20,000 tool would be more appropriate?

The 1978 Clark Loader is having some outside maintenance done to it. At the same time they are giving it a thorough evaluation as to its overall condition. This will give the town a handle on replacement cost, so we can start to plan for it's replacement.

The paving projects for the coming year are \$10,000, an increase from last year. This paving would be preparation for a sealing project in 1991.

Two-way radios have many advantages. When a piece of equipment breaks down, you can instantly alert each other and explain what is needed and where you're stuck. When one driver checks the answering machine and someone has notified us of a problem, the other driver can be alerted to respond. We typically operate only one man to a truck. For safety's sake, radio contact is priceless.

Work is in progress on evaluating the box culvert leaving Granite Lake. Discussions are in progress with the N.H.D.O.T. and the N.H. Water Resource Department to determine an acceptable, effective solution to this situation.

The used state truck which we acquired this year has been a great investment and time saver carrying the sander bought from the Town of Jaffrey. It has cut the time required to sand the roads of Nelson and allows us time to start a second pass.

Please exercise caution and discretion during severe storms. Manpower and equipment limitations preclude our ability to be everywhere at once. Your updates are welcome. We check the answering machine frequently during storms. If you find a road condition that needs attention, please leave a message on the machine, don't assume we already know about it. After you've left a message please be patient, there may be a worse problem somewhere else!

The workings of the Highway Barn continue with great thanks for the help of Mike Tarr and Frank Ball.

Remember that there is winter sand available at the Town Barn for the private driveway usage of Nelson residents. Thank you for your support in '89 and looking forward to serving you in '90.

1989 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 33:7, will authorize the Selectmen to incur debt and issue notes in anticipation of the taxes for the year 1989. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 80:42 I and RSA 80:80 I I, will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens for non-payment of taxes and to convey title to properties deeded to the Town by the Tax Collector or otherwise, to any person by either public auction or advertised sealed bid. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 84:42 I I I and 80:80 I I I will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens for non-payment of taxes and to convey title to properties deeded to the Town by the Tax Collector, as justice may require. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 31:95b (Cum. Supp.), will authorize the Selectmen, subject to the provisions of RSA 31:95b (Cum. Supp.), to apply for, accept and expend, without further action of the Town, monies from either State, Federal or other governmental units and monies from private sources. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,813 for the support of the Town Library. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 as the Town's share of the operating costs of the Home Health Care and Community Service. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$416.10 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000, this sum to be held in the Town Hall/Schoolhouse Capital Reserve Fund for the renovation or remodeling of the Old Schoolhouse or Town Hall, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to cover the labor cost of a Town Officers' Assistant.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Article 11 Discussion:

Q: Is this a secretarial position?

A: (Ethan Tolman, Selectman) This is the result of a study by a committee. The individual would assist all Town Officers in a secretarial/ clerical capacity. Ethan elaborated on the amount of paperwork required for each office and the need for a person to keep minutes of meeting.

Q: Is there a job description?

A: Ethan Tolman, selectman, stated that there is a job description.

Q: (Mr. Black) How many hours will this person work per week?

A: (Ethan Tolman) That has not been established yet. The Selectmen expect there will be extra hours in the beginning because of the learning curve during the first year, then during the second and third years it should decrease. They also expect an increase in work load and hours during the fourth year.

Q: Salary vs. hourly wage? How much?

A: (Ethan Tolman) Plan to keep the salary down as much as possible

Q: Will the person eliminate the need of the existing secretarial position?

A: (Ethan Tolman) At this point in time, the selectmen do not see that position being eliminated.

Q: Why do you need another bookkeeper?

A: (Ethan Tolman) The Town will decide that.

Q: Could we have more details about the job requirements?

A: Ethan Tolman read the job description to the townspeople.

Q: What is the pay range?

A: (Ethan Tolman) No figure has been established, suggested a figure of \$7.50/hour.

Q: Who is responsible for deciding what jobs the Assistant will do and for whom?

A: (Ethan Tolman) People who are Town Officers or chairpeople on Town committees would go directly to the Assistant, not through the Selectmen.

Q: What are the minimum requirements of the job?

A: (Ethan Tolman) No formal minimum requirements – it should be left to the Selectmen and various chairpeople to interview the candidate(s).

John Wright, Chairman of the Committee that studied the clerical needs of the

Town, elaborated at this time on how the committee arrived at their recommendation. Members of the committee discussed clerical needs with Town Selectmen and officers, and selectmen from other towns. John reminded the group that the Town has recently faced some lawsuits, some of which might not have occurred if records were better. Article 11 was adopted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500 for the purchase of office machinery.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Discussion:

Q:What kind of machines?

A:(Ethan Tolman) Recommended by committee – small computer compatible with our map and appraisal people. Also, may be able to eventually eliminate some outside printing requirements.

Q:Is the amount of money enough?

A:(John Wright, Committee Chairman) Price is a rough guess. IBM computer \$2200. Printer \$800. Typewriter \$500. Includes Software. Ethan suggested a municipal discount.

Article 12 was adopted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$574 as the Town's share for the Southwest Region Planning Commission. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350 as the Town's share of the operating costs of a summer day camp sponsored by the Cheshire County YMCA.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It was passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 which sum is to be paid to the City of Keene for the use of its Landfill. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$637.99 as the Town's share for operating cost of the Southwest Solid Waste Management District established under RSA 149-M and \$1,112.76 as the Town's share for the operating costs of the Ashuelot Valley Refuse Disposal District established under RSA 53-B.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Discussion:

Q:What is the current status – where is the money going?

A:(Ethan) Agrees with concern, but discussed it prior to the meeting and found we are bound to the Keene Landfill and required by law to make plans to replace the Keene Landfill.

Q:What are we getting for the money?

A:(Ethan) The right to use Keene Landfill and its replacement.

Q:Have the selectmen looked into having a town representative at the meetings?

A:No—they have not had many meetings.

Q:Could conservation committee get involved?

Q:By Moderator to Selectmen – who makes the appointment?

A:Selectmen – will confirm.

After the discussion, Article 16 was adopted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that Townspeople will still be charged for individual calls. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 18; To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new or used vehicle for the Police Department. It being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Police Department. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the proper expenses of the Police Department. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 for the proper expenses of the Fire Department and Rescue Department. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new equipment for the Fire Department, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Department. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Statement: The figure is double last year and relates to Article 24 - rebuild pumper truck to carry us for 10 years. Article 21 was adopted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established March 1988 to be devoted to the repair, reconstruction or replacement of the Fire Station. It being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Department. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to replace the existing furnace at the Fire Station. It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

The meeting was interrupted by a fire at one of the cottages next to the Granite Lake Store. We had a first-hand view of how quickly our fire people respond. During the interruption, John Bradshaw suggested that the selectmen also consider fixing the furnace in the Town Hall.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 to rebuild the pumper truck K3M1 by withdrawing \$27,000 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for equipment and to raise \$3,000 in taxes for the same purpose.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 231:43, will vote to discontinue and throw up the unnamed Town road, without an assessment of damages, of approximately 495 feet, running from Route 9 to the State Highway leading from said Route 9 to the Nelson Village so that the entire right, title and interest to said Town road will revert to the underlying property owners.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read.

Statement: (John Bunce, Chairman of Bypass Committee) Present access is inferior and with added traffic from the East, would worsen. Town suggested improvements by discontinuing and throw up the road and engineers concurred.

Amendment: (Ethan Tolman) Amend to add: "Said change to occur at or after state improves."

Discussion:

Q: Can we get in writing to prevent an increase in price for the land?

A: The selectmen would make no move until guaranteed improvement and necessary related items.

Q: (Clyde Hutchins) Why do we need it - won't need to get up there with new road in.

A: No reply.

The amended article was adopted. It passed by voice vote. The article now reads:

"Said change to occur at or after the State improves the intersection at the Rt 9/Nelson Road to the satisfaction of the Road Agent, Selectmen and Bypass Committee."

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,000 for wages in the maintenance of the roads and bridges.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,000 for General Highway expenses - gas, repairs and supplies.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive and appropriate the monies from the State Highway Block Grant. These monies to be used to offset summer and winter road maintenance.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read.

An amendment was suggested by Ethan Tolman:

"To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and further, to authorize the Selectmen to make prorata reductions in the amount if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any

other action relating thereto."

The article, as amended above, was adopted. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. It being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read.

Discussion:

Q: Is there a specific plan for money?

A: (Ethan) No - same as has been done in the past - will probably go toward a new loader.

It was suggested that the article be amended to prevent the selectmen from being able to spend the money on something else.

An amendment was suggested by Bill Riley to add: "for purpose of purchase of road equipment."

Statement: (Ethan) Other capital reserve accounts do have to be specific, but does not think an amendment is needed in this case.

The Article was adopted as read with no amendment. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500 to provide a "shim" or leveling course of asphalt to be applied to Melville Hill and Henderson Road.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read.

Discussion:

Q: (John Wright) Why is this necessary?

A: (Kelly French for Bud French, Road Agent) Part of a long term plan to improve roads.

The Article was adopted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,800, said sum to be taken from the equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of the State truck now at the Town Barn.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read.

Statement: (Frank Ball) I went to Concord with Bud French to look at trucks (30) and picked the best one. It is in excellent shape, and is a 1981.

Discussion:

Q: Why do we need a new truck?

A: (Ethan Tolman for Bud French) This would replace the 1953 Army Ambulance. This truck would serve as a summer work truck to haul brush, and in winter to sand and plow.

The article was adopted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500 for the purchase of a used five yard sander, said sum to be taken from the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read.

Statement: (Frank Ball) I looked at it with Bud French. It is in good condition - "excess" equipment from Jaffrey.

The article was adopted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will establish a committee to evaluate the feasibility and cost of adding to the Town Barn space for the furnace and office, outside of the existing shop area (where said facilities now are) said committee to make their recommendation to the Selectmen prior to the 1990 Town Meeting.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 34: To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting.

It was moved and seconded that we adjourn. It passed by voice vote.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Nelson Town Hall in said District on the 9 day of March, 1990, at 7:00 O'Clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1: To see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Five Thousand (\$605,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of constructing an addition to, renovation of the Munsonville School and related costs, in accordance with plans and specifications on file with the Office of the Superintendent of Schools in Keene, New Hampshire, and to raise the sum of up to Five Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$550,000.00) Dollars by the issuance of bonds or notes of the District, pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 33, the terms and conditions of said bonds and notes to be determined by the school board, and by transfer of such monies that may be available from the Capital Reserve Fund established in March of 1972 for this purpose. And, further, to specifically appropriate and authorize the District to expend any funds that may be acquired as a result of the issuance of bonds or notes including premiums or interest on the funds, for any purpose directly related to the building addition and renovation within the purpose of this vote, or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 2: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 3: To choose agents and committee members in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further authorization by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1990-1991 fiscal school year provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. 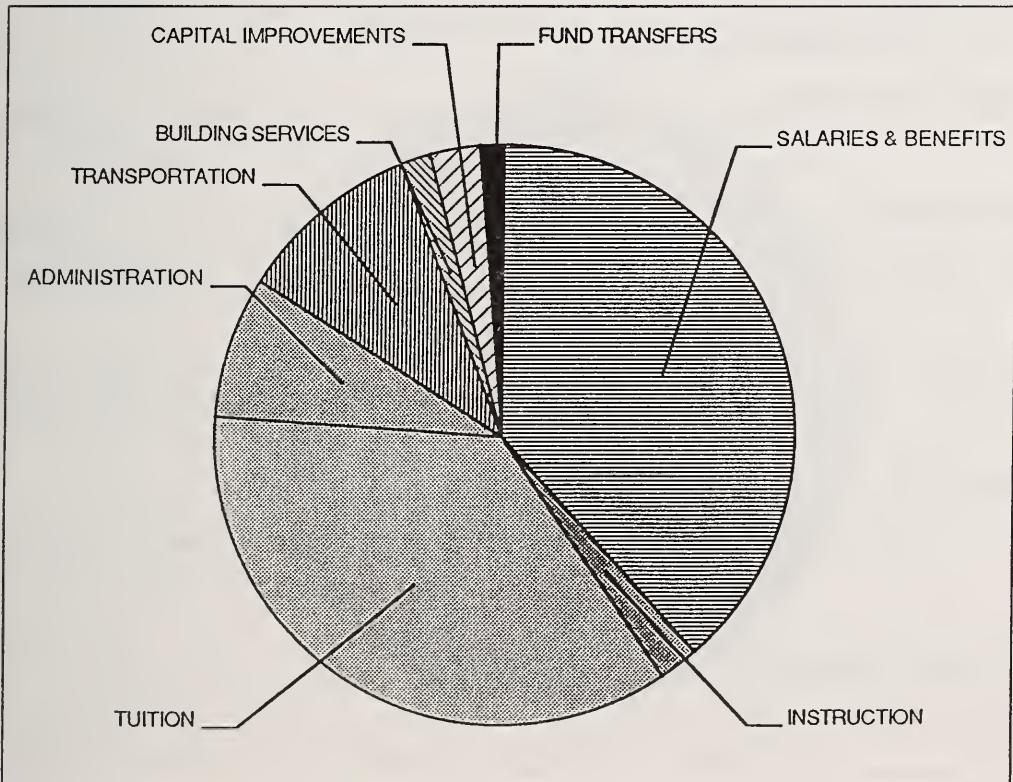

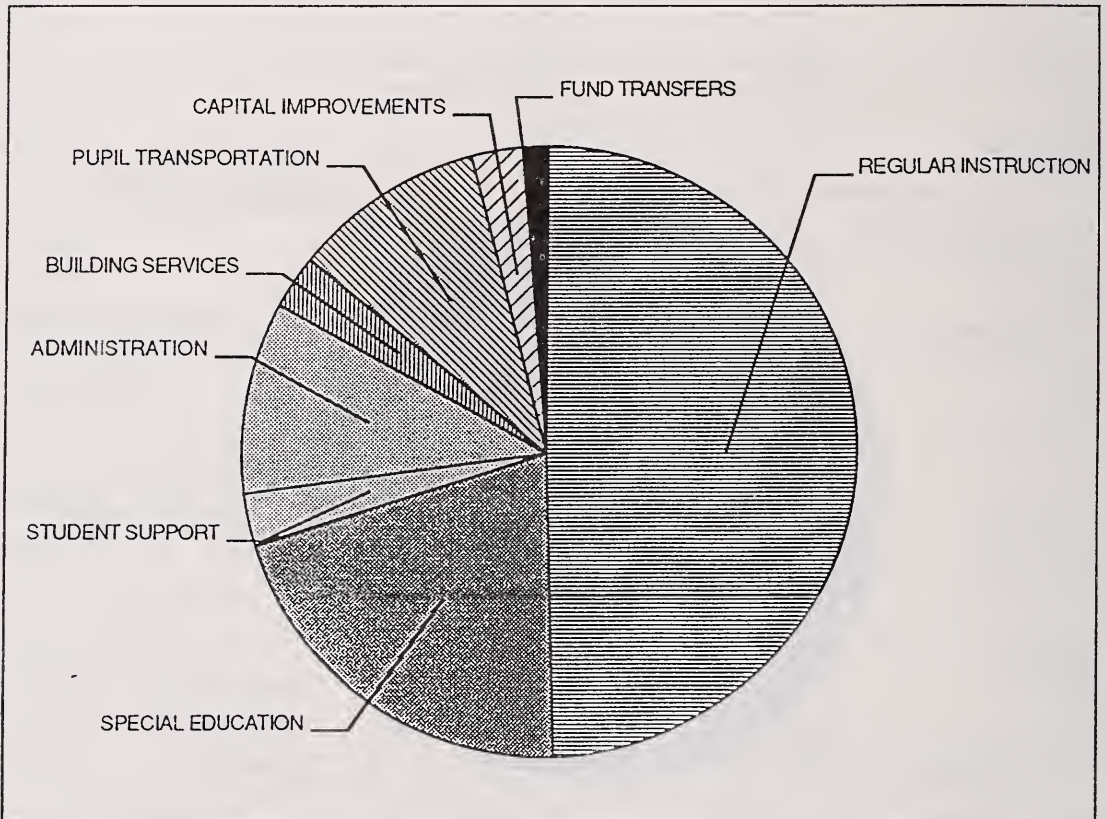

ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 10, 1989

The checklist was handed over to the Clerk, and signed by the Clerk and the Supervisors of the Checklist.

The polls were opened for persons wishing to vote for the officers listed by non-partisan ballot, as required by law, by the pro-tem Moderator, Beth Williams, at the Nelson Town Hall at 3:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by the Moderator, Ethan Tolman. He announced that the polls would be open until at least 8:00 p.m. or until the close of the meeting, giving at least five hours of open polls.

The Moderator, Ethan Tolman, asked that it be moved to waive reading of the warrant in the interest of saving time. It was so moved and seconded. The Moderator also explained that due to the content of the warrant and number of people present at the meeting, he would be more formal than usual with the rules. He explained that he would recognize first those speakers who had not yet spoken to a particular article and then any additional speakers. It is noted that the Town Hall was overflowing, there being about 225 people present.

Present at the meeting were Charles Larracy, Superintendent of the Schools; David Hill, Assistant Superintendent of Business; Mark Genovisi, Assistant Superintendent of Schools for the Towns; Barry Brensinger and Harry Vogt of Lavallee/Brensinger Professional Architects; and Greg Mikalides of Appledore Engineering.

Article 1: "To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto." Rick Church moved to accept the article as printed in the annual report. It was seconded and passed without discussion.

Article 2: "To choose agents and committee members in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant." It was moved and seconded to address this article at the end of the meeting. Rick Church explained that we will be needing to pick people for the Facilities Committee and would like to do that at the end. So passed.

At this time people were encouraged to move forward as there were many people still in the hallway. The room was so full as to have people sitting in the aisles and the tables on the stage were moved to accommodate people to sit on the stage. The tables at which the School Board were moved to clear the fire exit in the back. As it was, not everyone could fit into the main room.

At this time, Dave Upton moved to take up Article 10. Seconded. Dave explained that this was the most important article and deserves to be taken up before the others. Discussion followed as to the order of the articles. A move was also made to go to Article 9. There was a call for a vote to take up Article 10. The Moderator called for a show of hands. The vote was passed in favor of moving to Article 10.

Article 10: "To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate and/or withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund, established in March, 1972, for the construction of buildings and land acquisitions for the Nelson School District, for the purpose of paying architects, civil engineers and others to prepare the final working drawings and bid specifications for the construction of a new elementary school on the Fuller site of optimum educational quality, cost effectiveness and minimum tax impact."

Rick Church moved that the District raise and appropriate, and/or withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund, the sum of \$90,100 for the purpose of paying architects, civil engineers and others to prepare the final working drawings and bid specifications for the construction of a new elementary school on the Fuller site. Seconded. A written vote was called for. Rick put up the charts to explain the revised figures and to iterate that this had all been previously presented at informational meetings. Discussion followed for about an hour. Concerns were expressed that we need a reduced floor plan before we vote. Also expressed was that the site be actually chosen before we vote. Support was also offered by many in favor of the Article. Also discussed were roads, state standards, the total process, trust in our officials, total costs and further delays. A written vote was taken. The Article was voted down with 119 voting "no" and 76 voting "yes".

At this time the Moderator closed the polls for voting. The time was 9 p.m.

Article 3: "To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency (pursuant to R.S.A. 198:20-b)." It was moved to accept Article 3 as printed in the warrant. Seconded and passed.

Article 4: "To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further authorization by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other government unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1989-1990 fiscal school year provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board shall hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money (pursuant to R.S.A. 198:20-b)." It was moved and seconded to accept Article 4 as printed in the warrant. Passed.

Article 5: "To see if the District will authorize the school board to transfer all or any portion of its unencumbered surplus funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1989, to the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at its annual meeting held on March 3, 1972, under Article 8, for the purpose of construction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes." It was moved and seconded to adopt the Article as printed in the warrant. The question was asked as to whether a vote by the Town is required to spend this money. Rick Church said yes. Call for a vote. So passed.

Article 6: "To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District." Rick Church moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$468,024 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Seconded. There was some discussion on the increases and what needs to be done in the future. Passed.

Article 7: "To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,234 to send Munsonville School students to a conservation camp. or to take any other action in relation thereto." It was moved to adopt the Article as read and seconded. It was stated that if they lived in a conservation camp they would not have to go to one. No further discussion. Passed.

Article 8: "To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established at the March, 1972, District Meeting for the purpose of construction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, or take any other action in relation thereto." Rick Church moved to accept the article as read. There was some discussion. In particular, it was stated that this figure is not included in the \$468,024 operating budget and that as inherent in the Capital Reserve Fund, a vote is required to spend the money. Mike Blaudschun moved to lower the amount to \$25,000. Seconded. The amendment passed. A standing vote was called for. The Article passed with 76 in favor of the amended Article and 67 opposed.

Article 9: "To see if the District will vote to accept, as a gift to the District, a deed to a certain parcel of land located in the Town of Nelson and described as approximately six and one half acres of land on the Center Pond Road, or to take and other action in relation thereto." It was moved to accept the Article as read. Seconded. A motion was made to make the acceptance of this gift contingent upon a bond passing for a new school. Upon discussion it was clarified that it is inherent in the terms of the gift. The motion was withdrawn. After some further discussion, the vote was called. Passed almost unanimously.

Article 11: "To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate and/or withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund, established in March, 1972, for the construction of buildings and land acquisitions for the Nelson School District, to pay for site evaluations for alternative construction sites and preliminary plans for a site, or to take any other action in relation thereto." Karen Tolman moved that the District raise and/or withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$25,500 for the purpose of paying for site evaluations of the Fuller site and alternative sites and preliminary plans for a site. Seconded. It was moved to make the figure \$15,000. Seconded. Rick stated that this will not allow enough to research the Bosworth site. Discussion followed on what it would buy. It will pay mostly for continued site studies on the Munsonville School and scaling down floor plans on both the Fuller and Munsonville sites. Voted on the amendment. Passed. Voted on the Article. Passed.

Article 12: "To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,000 to pay for the cost to rent a portable classroom for one year and also to pay related expenses, or to take any other action in relation thereto." It was moved to accept the Article as read. Seconded. Discussion followed as to need and cost. On a call for the vote, the Article passed.

Article 13: "To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate and/or withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund, established in March, 1972, for the construction of buildings and land acquisitions for the Nelson School District, for the purpose of paying architects, civil engineers and others to prepare final working drawings and bid specifications for the construction of a new elementary school or for the addition and/or renovations to the Munsonville School, or to take any other action in relation thereto." Rick Church moved that the School District consider Article 13 at a recessed session of this meeting to be held on June 2, 1989 at 7:00 p.m. in the Nelson Town Hall. Frank Upton stated that the correct word is "adjourned". Rick amended his motion to "adjourned to June 2". Seconded. Passed.


Article 2 was taken up at this time.

Ethan moved to have the volunteers pick the 3-5 members among themselves. More discussion and more suggestions. An agreement was finally made that Bonnie Riley would take the names of all interested parties and meet in one week to pick among themselves who would be the new members. The meeting was then adjourned at 11 p.m. until June 2, 1989.



**TOWN OF NELSON
RECONVENED ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING**

June 2, 1989

Present at the meeting were representatives of N.H. School Administrative Unit 29: H. Charles Larracey, Superintendent of Schools; Mark Genovest, Assistant Superintendent for Towns; and Gwen Mitchell, Director of Special Education.

At 7:11 p.m., in the Nelson Town Hall, Moderator Ethan Tolman called the meeting to order. His opening remarks consisted of three announcements which originated with the school district's legal counsel, Douglas Hatfield:

1. Once action has been taken pursuant to a vote of the district, no reconsideration is possible or legal. This prohibits reconsideration of Warrant Articles 6, 11 and 12, as action on each of these has been taken.
2. The preference ballot to be presented in connection with Article 14 is non-binding.
3. The possibility of the gift of land from Mr. Guida cannot be considered at this meeting, but could be considered at the proposed meeting on September 29, 1989. Attorney Hatfield feels that attempting to consider the Guida gift now could raise problems with the future proposed Bond Council. The moderator will not, therefore, entertain any such motion. A properly-constituted motion dealing with this matter will be on the September 29th warrant. Furthermore, the moderator will offer, under Article 14, a motion which will, while non-binding, clearly indicate the sentiment of this meeting in support of such gifts.

Rick Church was recognized and he read the first article scheduled for consideration at this meeting:

ARTICLE 13: "I move the District withdraw the sum of \$10,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund established in March, 1972, for the construction of buildings and land acquisitions for the Nelson School District, for the purpose of paying architects, civil engineers and others to prepare final working drawings and bid specifications for the construction of a new elementary school or for the addition and/or renovation of the Munsonville School." The motion was seconded.

Dave Upton moved to amend the article to read as follows:

ARTICLE 13: "That the sum of \$10,000 be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund, established in March, 1972, for the construction of buildings and land acquisitions for the Nelson School District, for the purpose of paying architects, civil engineers and others to prepare preliminary plans for the construction of a new elementary school and/or for the addition and/or renovations to the Munsonville School." The motion was seconded. What followed was a presentation by Mr. Upton and other members of the Facilities Committee, as well as related discussion.

Mr. Upton gave a brief history of the reconstituted Facilities Committee. Their goals include hopes of actively involving the community in the decision-making process and ending up with the support of at least two-thirds of that community for a final solution. He then asked and was granted permission to distribute the "Cost and Site Preference Ballot". While the ballot was being distributed, Ethan explained that, while this ballot is non-binding, it will influence the ultimate decision. It is complex and should be studied as the evening progresses; it is to be turned in when Article 14 is under consideration.

Mr. Upton was recognized again and he explained the process by which the various cost scenarios were developed. He then relinquished the floor to Bonnie Riley of the Education Committee for her perspective. She spoke of the Federal and local regulations which will determine certain aspects of any planned building or renovation project, and how meeting those regulations is addressed by the different scenarios. The matter of the school population forecast was raised. Mrs. Riley acknowledged that that was one of the toughest things with which they had to deal. The student population numbers they were using were based on actual census figures with no projections as to new families with school-age children moving to Nelson. For each additional 20 students, another classroom would be needed. Rick Lothrop was asked to comment further on the census matter. He said that, on the average, the school was gaining 2 students a year. Concerns were raised about the need for the students to have access to a library, how potential State aid would affect the cost figures, how the price per square foot for renovations was reached, and whether or not reliable figures for the potential improvements to Center Pond Road would be available by the time of the September meeting.

One resident asked that school principal Virginia Falk address the question of what the children and staff of the school feel they need. An objection was raised on the grounds that Mrs. Falk is not a Nelson resident. The moderator called for a voice vote as to whether or not Mrs. Falk should be allowed to speak. The results of the voice vote being unclear, a standing vote was called for. The moderator designated Hope Lothrop and Susan Peery as ballot clerks of that vote. It was suggested that Ginny be allowed to leave the room while this vote occurred, which she did. As the ballot clerks were moving forward, a written ballot was called for. A written ballot was then conducted, subject to the checklist. The "yes" votes won, and Mrs. Falk was allowed to make her brief, but informative comments.

Dave Upton stated that the Facilities Committee had no further information to present. The question was called. The Upton amendment to Article 13 was passed with no dissenting votes. The question on the motion was then called and passed. Article 13 shall be adopted as amended.

ARTICLE 14: "To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting."

At this time, the so-called preference or advisory ballot was discussed. Clarification was given as to how to fill it out in a way that would be clear to those analyzing it. The voters brought their ballots forward, subject to the checklist.

Ethan then offered the promised motion pertaining to gifts of land:

"It is hereby resolved by the Nelson School District Meeting of June 2 to formally express thanks and appreciation for the offer of gifts of land for school district purposes to both Mr. Henry Fuller (action on such gift taken at the previous meeting in March) and Mr. Alexander Guida (action on such gift to be taken at the meeting on September 29), and further that the school board is hereby instructed to communicate such appreciation of the school district in writing to both parties."

The motion was seconded. Ethan made a call for unanimity. A question arose as to whether or not the town's vote on this would be binding. Ethan iterated that it would not be -- that it is intended as a neutral expression of thanks from the town. The call for unanimity was repeated. As there were no objections, the vote was ruled unanimous and so confirmed by the moderator.

Dave Upton moved that the Nelson School District unanimously confirm the present members of the Nelson School Facilities Committee as the proper members of this committee to serve until the next annual meeting of the Nelson School District in March, 1990. The motion was seconded and the vote was unanimous. Mr. Upton then moved that the district express its thanks and special recognition to Phil Geraci for his donation of many hours and materials to prepare the visual representations of the cost plans studied by the Facilities Committee. A round of applause seconded and passed this motion.

Rick Church was then recognized in order to make a report to the district regarding an ongoing situation which could mean a serious financial hardship for Nelson. His remarks pertained to a child in Nelson judged to be in need of residential treatment. The treatment, as presently being carried out is very costly and must be paid by the Nelson School District. Nelson's special education teachers could provide comparable treatment for roughly 40 to 46% of what it is presently costing. Lawsuits and counter suits have been mounted, pitting Nelson against the State. If we win, some of the contingency funds allocated in the current budget will be spared. If we lose, it will cost the town an additional \$12,000. Legal fees are being incurred in the process and a prompt resolution is being sought.

Judi Lang moved that there be a special meeting of the Nelson School District on September 29, 1989, to hear a progress report from the Facilities Committee. The motion was seconded and passed. Judi then extended sincere thanks, on behalf of the school board, to two retiring members of the Facilities Committee, Barbara Suplee and Nancy Stretch. A round of applause followed.

Ethan asked if there was further discussion. A couple of people expressed concern and dismay that there had been no real discussion prior to the casting of the preference ballots. A motion for adjournment was made, seconded and passed. Thus the meeting ended at 9:35 p.m.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The 1989-1990 school year has been a challenging year, but one of substantial progress as well. Our long-term space needs are unresolved; special education costs continue to rise; our principal of six years resigned as did our most experienced school board member; and we and our partners in School Administrative Unit 29 have questioned the effectiveness and cost of administrative services. For all of these difficulties, I believe this has been a year of progress and growth for our school community.

At the March district meeting last year, the community turned down the school board's and Facilities Committee's proposed solution to our school space problem, but gave strong support for further work on the issue. The district authorized the installation of a portable classroom and raised money for further work on a more permanent solution. Seventeen new people joined the Facilities Committee. The portable classroom was installed in time for the opening of school and has eliminated the sometimes chaotic atmosphere that had arisen from the use of our hall-entryway/library/kitchen as a classroom. The Facilities Committee has hired a new architect and produced a design that will be offered to voters at this year's district meeting, March 9th. The new plan is on the existing Munsonville School site. The estimated costs for the project have been substantially reduced from last March's levels by scaling back the plan, and, particularly, by sharp attention and imaginative work by the committee in reducing site costs. In short, we will be presenting a very good proposal to the district at approximately half the figure estimated at this time last year. And we understand this is a particularly good year to get competitive building bids!

Mr. Alexander Guida, Jr., the Chairman of the Guida-Seibert Dairy Company, has made an expansion on the Munsonville School site possible by the generous gift of a five-acre parcel of land which abuts the school on the north and east. This land allows the building of an adequate septic system. This Guida gift also allows substantial expansion of the playground area away from Route 9. The school board and the community are very appreciative of Mr. Guida's gift.

Ronda Geisler, our new principal, comes to the Munsonville School with two Master's degrees and many years of teaching experience. Last summer, the school board sought wide input from the community and appointed Louise Patek to take Karen Tolman's seat on the board until the March meeting; Louise and Ronda have filled in ably.

Nelson's special education situation got statewide attention when an article about one of our special needs children appeared in the Manchester Union Leader. The school board has worked all year on this case, both in terms of finding a program that can effectively address the child's needs and one that will keep the cost to the district "reasonable". We believe we have found such a program. The costs to the Nelson School District are well above those we budgeted for this situation. We will be eligible for some \$31,000 in state aid next year to help pay for this program. The board has also had a meeting in Concord with the State Commissioner of Education, Dr. John MacDonald, to ask for help from his "special fund" for this year.

This has also been a year of heavy involvement by the Nelson School Board in the operation of School Administrative Unit 29. Administrative costs have been rising and the staff at SAU 29 has experienced alot of turnover due to its high workload. Studies indicate that Keene would be better off financially if it dropped out of SAU 29. If Keene makes this choice, the costs of providing administrative services to the remaining five towns will rise sharply. As chairman of the SAU 29 Board, I appointed a Unit Effectiveness Study Committee to study this problem. At stake is not only the increased cost of administrative services, but the continuity between the curriculum of Munsonville School and Keene Junior High School.

The cost effective solution seems to be the formation of a five-town cooperative school district within SAU 29 composed of Nelson, Harrisville, Marlborough, Chesterfield, and Westmoreland. Another alternative would be two cooperatives: Nelson-Harrisville-Marlborough; Chesterfield-Westmoreland. The cost savings would come from the administrative simplification of managing fewer school districts. In the current structure, SAU 29 has six operating school districts and seven school boards. This would result in staff reductions at SAU 29 and estimated savings of between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

The inclusion of Nelson in a cooperative would mean major changes in the way we control our school. A single cooperative school board would replace our local one. Our Nelson School District Meeting would be replaced by a single cooperative district meeting. It would be this new school district and school board that would make decisions regarding the schools in all of the five towns. Many questions remain to be answered about how this would affect us on a detail level such as, "would each town choose its own representatives?" and "how would local people be involved in the selection of new staff?", etc.

The intent of the above report on the SAU 29 situation is intended as a report to the citizens of the Nelson School District and as a means of beginning a discussion in our community of this important 1990 issue.

The year 1989 for the Nelson School District has been one of setbacks, hard work and gains. Above all, your school board wishes to call attention to the quality of the teaching staff in the Munsonville School and the many hours of hard, thoughtful work put in by the Facilities Committee. Both are worthy of the town's thanks and praise.

I continue to enjoy my experiences with the Nelson School District and can say, without reservation, that your school board members and school staff are genuinely concerned for the welfare of your children. Future success will largely depend on the results of deliberations at the district meeting.

**MUNSONVILLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL
PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

School enrollment as of December first was forty-seven. Expected enrollment was higher. Two families moved out of state and one family placed their child in private school. The district presently has three children in private schools and three children enrolled in the home-school program.

The fourth, fifth and sixth graders hold classes in the portable classroom. They come to the main building for integrated science and social studies, for lunch, and to use the washroom.

The central room is presently being used for Chapter I, special education, lunch room, library, principal's desk, office computer, student records, circle time, and gym classes in inclement weather.

Staff members returning to the Munsonville School this year include: Jane Ander, Readiness/grade one; Judith Sargent, grades two and three; Judith Fink, grades four, five and six; Christine LeClair, guidance and counselling; Sandra Wiggin, nurse; Pamela Tolman, art; Gordon Peery, music; and Shelly Boucher, tutor. New staff members this year include: Ronda Geisler, principal/special education; Janet Walter, Chapter I; Diana Warhall, physical education; Marcia Zurick-Thompson, speech and language therapist; Adrienne Spector, school psychologist; and Judy Kott, secretary. Johanna Russell is the new special education coordinator for the towns in the SAU 29 Unit.

The students have been and will be participating in community-centered events. A dinner prepared by the students was served prior to the Thanksgiving holiday. The children collected canned goods for the needy, pet food for the Humane Society, and money for blankets. These were delivered prior to the Christmas break.

The sixth graders are participating in the Boston Museum of Science's Science-by-Mail program. They attended an all-day workshop on energy at Keene State College in January. Both fifth and sixth graders will be going to the Stone Environmental Camp in May. Fourth graders will have spent a day learning about New Hampshire resources at the Farm and Forest Festival in Manchester. Monadnock Music has presented one of three scheduled programs on specialized instruments for the students. Gordon Peery has enhanced the music program with guest musicians several times this year.

We are very proud to be able to provide these extra services to the children. I appreciate the kindness and support that has been offered to me since I joined this school community.
