TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newton on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear reports of Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.

6. On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the voters of the Town of Newton will approve a plan to have all property in the Town of Newton reassessed by the New Hampshire State Tax Commission.

7. On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the voters of the Town of Newton will raise

and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to pay for the reassessment of property in the Town of Newton by the New Hampshire State Tax Commission.

8. On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the voters of the Town of Newton will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-five hundred (\$5,500.00) to be used in conjunction with the fund already raised by the Volunteer Fire Co. to complete a program planned to provide tank trucks for the Village, the Junction and the Forestry service.

9. On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to approve the sale of the 1940 Chevrolet Tank Truck at public auction, after the new tank truck program is in effect — the proceeds to be put into a fund for future fire department needs.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the 1955 Chevrolet chassis for Tank Truck No. 5 from the Newton Junction Firemen's Association and sell the old 1948 Chevrolet chassis back to the Newton Junction Firemen's Association for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00).

11. On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to establish a planning board of seven members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the town's development and report to the town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the town's best development. The board shall consist of one Selectman and six other citizens appointed by the Selectmen as provided in Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

12. On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article I, Section 4, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To insert the words, "**and the Building Inspector**" immediately after the word, "Selectmen".

2. To add the following subparagraph,
 - “a. A development is defined as being: the division of a tract of land into two (2) or more building lots.”

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article I, Section 6, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To insert the following, “, gravelled a minimum of six (6) inches, oil or tar surfaced,” immediately after the word, “graded”.
2. To insert the following, “, approved by the Town Road Commissioner,” immediately after the word, “wide”.
3. To add the following subparagraph,
 - “a. The developer shall be required to post a performance bond to cover the guarantee that the proposed road(s) will be built according to all applicable specifications contained herein.”

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article II, Section 1, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. In the first and second sentences, to delete the words, “five hundred (500)” and insert in their places the words, “six hundred (600)”.
2. To transform the second sentence, in its entirety into subparagraph “a.”
3. To add the following subparagraph,
 - “b. In order for any builder to construct a multiple family dwelling with a living area of less than six hundred (600) square feet for each family unit, said builder shall petition the Board of Adjustments for the granting of a variance. The granting of such variance shall be at the discretion of the said Board, but said petition MUST HAVE THE APPROVAL OF THE Building Inspector prior to its granting by the Board of Adjustments.”

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article II, Section 2, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To delete the words, "on footings" immediately after the word, "Foundations".
2. To insert the words, ", but not less than a depth of three (3) feet (unless founded upon bedrock)" immediately after the word, "line".
3. To insert the words, "on footings not less than eighteen (18) inches wide and six (6) inches deep, unless soil conditions are adjudged by the Building Inspector to be such as to demand greater footing areas," immediately after the word, "thick".

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article II, Section 3, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To add the following subparagraphs,
 - "a. All framing material used shall be sound and free from rot and weakening flaws.
 - "b. All framing and supporting members shall be designed and developed to the required strength and rigidity according to the specifications prescribed in the tables located at the end of Section 3, and shall be securely fastened with approved nails or connecting devices.
 - "c. All lally columns and pier supports shall be not less than eight (8) feet apart and shall be supported by footings not less than twenty-four (24) inches long, twenty-four (24) inches wide, and ten (10) inches deep.
 - "d. All framing members at openings shall be doubled and suitably fastened or spiked together and shall be of adequate size and strength.
 - "e. All corners shall be properly braced, unless plywood sheathing of one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) inch or more thickness is used.
 - "f. Approved bridging is required between joists.
 - "g. All exterior wood framework shall be supported on the foundation walls not less than six (6) inches above finish grade."

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article II, Section 4, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To delete the words, "Every building" and insert in their stead the words, "Each family unit".

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article II, Section 6, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To insert the words, "All chimneys" immediately after the title word, "Chimneys".
2. In the second sentence, to delete the word "ground" and insert in its stead the word, "concrete".
3. To add a third sentence as follows: "There shall be a minimum of one (1) inch of air space between framing and any masonry structure such as a chimney."

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article II, Section 8, of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To insert the following two sentences immediately after the first sentence, "The size of a septic tank shall be no less than five hundred (500) gallons capacity. Metal septic tanks are prohibited."

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article II of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To insert an additional section as follows:
"Section 9. Specification Tables." (See Section 3, this Article.)

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To insert the following sentence immediately after the first sentence, "Ordinary repairs, interior decorating or maintenance of buildings and structures may be made without application or notice to the Building Inspector, but such repairs, decorating or maintenance shall not be construed to include any structural changes."

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article VI, Sections 6 and 7 of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To delete the words, "two dollars (\$2.00)" and in their stead insert the words, "five dollars (\$5.00)".

On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town of Newton will vote to amend Article

VI, Section 8 of the BUILDING CODE AND SAFETY ORDINANCE, as follows:

1. To insert the word, "temporary" immediately after the first "of" in the sentence.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

NEWTON, N. H.

MARCH 13, 1963

The meeting was called to order at 8:10 p.m., by the Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer.

Article 1. Results of the balloting on Tuesday, March 12, 1963, for town officers, were read by the Moderator. On a motion by Everett E. Coombs, for the Finance Committee, it was voted that all officers not elected by ballot, be appointed by the Selectmen.

Article 2. On a motion by Mr. Coombs, for the Finance Committee, it was voted to accept the list of Estimated Expenditures for the ensuing year 1963, and to raise and appropriate an amount necessary to cover the same, namely \$40,564.77.

Article 3. On a motion by Mr. Coombs, it was voted to accept the reports of Town Officers as printed in the Town Report.

Article 4. On a motion by Fred H. Cust, the Selectmen were authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. On a motion by Mr. Coombs, the Selectmen were authorized to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the town not used for Public Purposes.

Article 6. "To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$264.77 to receive \$1765.16 for Class V Roads." The Moderator ruled that action was unnecessary

on this article because it has been covered by the action on Article 2.

Article 7. On a motion by Mr. Cust, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500.00 to pay Newton's share of installing signals at Crane's Crossing.

Article 8. On a motion by Selectman Robert E. Fryer, it was voted to remove the existing Red Cross Room and store the contents in an existing room at the rear of the vault.

Article 9. On a motion by Mr. Coombs, it was voted to pay the Tax Collector as full compensation for the collection of property and poll taxes a commission of one per cent of the sum collected. By a show of hands the vote was 42 yes and 17 no.

Article 10. On a motion by Mr. Fryer, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to purchase 100 new chairs for the Town Hall.

Article 11. "To see if the town will vote to authorize the reassessment of all property . . . within the Town of Newton. This reassessment to be conducted by qualified assessors other than the Selectmen and a copy of this reassessment with a description of the property to appear in the Annual Town Report."

Mr. Cust made a motion that this article be accepted as printed and it was seconded by Ellery F. Atwood. Both later rescinded their action.

Mr. Atwood made a motion that this article be considered by those present; the motion was duly seconded and voted affirmatively.

After a general discussion Howard L. Bowen made a motion that this article be accepted as printed. This motion was not carried.

Article 12. "To raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3000.00 for the reassessment of all taxable

property in the Town of Newton.” The Moderator declared that action on this article was not necessary because of the action taken on Article 11.

Article 13. Edward N. Lynn made a motion that the value of property in this town in excess of \$2000.00 be printed in the Town Report. This motion was not carried.

Mr. Bowen made a motion that the Selectmen be authorized to allow the Town Hall to be used for Banquets. Mr. Atwood offered an amendment to this motion adding, “at the discretion of the Selectmen.” This amendment was carried by a show of hands with 35 voting yes and 15 no. The main motion was also carried.

On a motion by Kenneth A. Field, James A. Marden was given an ovation in appreciation of his 24 years on the Board of Selectmen. In acknowledging this tribute, Mr. Marden thanked the people of Newton for their cooperation and confidence.

The Moderator reappointed Elmer C. Bearce for a three year term on the Board of Adjustments as provided for in the Building Code Ordinances.

Mr. Bryer also appointed and/or reappointed members to the Finance Committee, giving it the present membership of: Perry A. Xenakis, Henry C. Finkler, and Gordon A. Cheney, whose terms expire in 1964; Wallace B. Nyberg, Forrest T. Reynolds, Jr., and Ralph M. Bean, whose terms expire in 1965; William D. Cross, Fred H. Cust, and David W. Richards, whose terms expire in 1966.

On a motion by Horace R. Williams, it was voted to adjourn the meeting at 9:30 p.m.

REPORT OF THE GALE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Two events during the past year will, we believe, prove to be of great significance to the library throughout the future years.

The trustees were honored to accept on April 24th, during the observance of National Library Week, a gift of a contract from the M M Club for the renovation of the storage room into a reading room. The room will be known as the Mary A. S. Hayford Memorial Room, honoring Mrs. Hayford who was the founder of the club and a trustee of the library for many years.

A table and chairs given by her family several years ago as memorial gifts will be placed in the room.

We anticipate that students particularly will appreciate its use when a quiet spot is necessary for study and reference searching. We are greatly indebted to the club.

The formation of a Friends of the Library group this year, also during National Library Week, is a credit to those who have taken the interest of the library to heart. Concerted effort of the several chairmen in different areas of development, with their assistants, has already shown its impact by making townspeople more library-minded.

Special book displays, art displays by students and adults each week, book service to those unable to come to the library, and entertainment for children through film use and story-telling, as well as assistance given the librarian, are the medium through which the results have been achieved. The membership committee is actively engaged in securing enrollments to further insure the success of the group in making the library the cultural center of the town.

We hope the residents will appreciate what is being

done for them and will make it known by increased patronage of the library. Why spend family funds for book purchases when they are obtainable at the library just for coming?

Another feature of National Library Week was Children's Day. Films were shown and awards made to elementary school children for their prize-winning book-jacket drawings. Grade 3 won a special award as a unit for their entries. Refreshments were served daily by the trustees.

"Read — The Fifth Freedom — Enjoy It," the theme for the year, is worthy of deep consideration, for a nation is only as strong as its citizens, and how can we become and remain strong if we fail to qualify ourselves?

The librarian and trustees have continued their attendance at the area meetings of librarians and trustees to obtain benefits of the Shieling funds, available to those who have been selected to participate. The meetings have proved to be most inspiring and beneficial, particularly when one takes into consideration how much more can be obtained from funds spent.

We feel the day is fast approaching when the heating system at the library will have to be changed. Investigations will be made into various types of equipment before a definite decision is made.

Again we say "Thank You" to the Kingston-Newton Garden Club for their continued practice of providing floral arrangements at the library while flowers are in bloom; also to book and magazine donors.

We are indebted to the State Library officials for their interest in, and work for, the small libraries, such as ours, and particularly to Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, Bookmobile librarian in charge of the Exeter branch of the State Library. She is an inspiration to all of us.

Open house is planned for the Memorial Room dedication. We are looking forward to having each and all of you visit with us, witness the improvements and make use

of the benefits available to you. YOUR money helps to buy the books and pay for the services, you know.

POLICE CHIEF'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen
Newton, N. H.

Gentlemen:

The official report of the Police Department indicates a busy year for 1963. The various crimes committed this past year, in town, included numerable breaks. This offence against the law includes stealing, looting and destroying properties. Local police, State Police, and the Sheriffs Department of N. H. have worked diligently and tirelessly for the arrest of these criminals. The retardation of this crime in our town and throughout the State and County would start with prevention. The criminals of today were the children of yesterday. The children of today could be the criminals of tomorrow. Children should be taught at an early age to respect police officials and to consider them as friends, and to know that policemen work hand in hand with the schools and churches to constitute stately future citizens.

The sex maniac and murderer is the most treacherous criminal today. Newspaper reports and news broadcasts familiarize us with the horrors of these crimes. Be extremely cautious. Report any suspicious persons or acts to your local police at once. We would rather spend the time investigating any reports than to face a crime such as these committed in our town on our children. Caution your children not to ride with or talk to strangers. Restrain them after dark.

Parents are careful who they ask to sit with their children. They choose persons with distinctive, essential qualities. Baby-sitters and their parents should, in turn, be as cautious. They should insist strongly on seemingly trivial

details; adequate transportation to and from the sitter's home, telephone or other means to signal for help should be available, parents should know what time to expect the sitter home. A good plan is for the sitter and her parents to list these and other precautions and adopt a customary, habitual routine, when accepting a job of baby-sitting.

Once again, I wish to thank the church groups, Boy Scouts, and other groups who find the time and effort to help provide entertainment and recreation for our young, growing citizens.

**Records of the Annual School Meeting of the School District
of the Town of Newton, March 21, 1963**

The meeting was opened at 8:00 p.m. by the Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer.

Article 1. The following officers were elected jointly with the town elections by Australian Ballot. Elected were Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer; Clerk, Mrs. Lorraine Lukas; Treasurer, Otis R. Rowell; School Board Member for Three Years, Gordon A. Cheney; Auditors, Everett O. Kelly and Everett E. Coombs. There were 545 Ballots cast.

Article 2. "To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relative thereto." On motion by Mrs. Ellen Bean for the School Board, the reports were accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Article 3. "To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relative thereto." On motion by Mrs. Bean, this Article was accepted as printed in the Warrant.

Article 4. "To see if the District will vote to construct and equip an addition to the Memorial School, to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of such an addition and authorize the School Board to issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$140,000.00) for the purpose of financing such construction." A Ballot vote was called for by the Moderator, Mr. Bryer, with a favorable result — 159 Yes votes; 42 No votes.

Article 5. On motion by Ellen Bean, "to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Six Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$2,625.00) for first interest payment," be accepted as printed in the School Report. This was passed.

Article 6. It was voted favorably for the District to raise and appropriate Four Hundred Seventy-eight Dollars (\$478.00) to operate the addition to the Memorial School.

Article 7. On motion made by William Moisan, Jr., to transfer the unexpended Two Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$2,300.00) from the School Building Committee, appropriated the previous year was the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for survey purposes, to cover a deficiency incurred during the current school year; such sum to be paid to the District Treasurer prior to June 30, 1963. William Hart made a motion that an additional sum, not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) be raised by the method mentioned in Article 7. Both motions were carried.

Article 8. Ellen Bean made a motion that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Forty Dollars (\$1,140.00) as Newton's share of the cost of a professional survey of secondary school needs be accepted as printed in the Town Report. Wallace Nyberg, for the secondary school committee appointed the previous year, gave a report on the urgent need for such a survey. Plaistow and Kingston had voted in favor of this survey and it was up to Newton and Atkinson to see if they would participate in such a program. The Moderator called for a hand vote. The result: Yes, 93; No, 28.

Article 9. Further business to legally come before the meeting — Wallace Nyberg made a motion that the Study Committee on Secondary Education be extended for one more year to work with the School Board on our high school needs. The Moderator to appoint replacement members to any vacancy. Mrs. Edna Boyd wished to be replaced. The Moderator appointed the same committee as last year with George Baker as her replacement. This motion was passed.

A standing vote of thanks was given to the School Survey Committee. Mrs. Janice Lynn made a motion that future School District meetings be held on a Saturday evening to enable more people to attend. An affirmative vote showed that this was favorable, but would have to be put in the form of an Article in the next Warrant.

It was voted to adjourn at 9:20.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 55 BOARD

New Hampshire School Districts are grouped by state statutes into some 47 Supervisory Unions, ten of which are single or "city" unions. As the name implies, these unions enable the individual Districts to enjoy as a group, supervisory advantages and functions, which they would find difficult or impossible to enjoy as individual Districts.

Our Union, No. 55, is comprised of the towns of Salem, Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton, with present estimated populations of 16000, 3200, 1600, 1500, and 1600 respectively. Union No. 55 has an annual growth rate of approximately 15 per cent and is in the fastest growing area of the state. It is seventh from the top of the 47 unions in the number of teachers employed. (Five cities and one Union have more teachers.) It is fifth out of 47 in the number of pupils enrolled. (Four cities in the state enroll more students than we do.) It is eighth out of 47, in the size of the tax base. (Seven cities have greater real estate valuation than does Union No. 55.)

During the past three years, the growth has been phenomenal in all five towns. The enrollment during this time in Salem has increased over 800 students in grades 1-12, in Plaistow over 60 in grades 1-8, in Hampstead over 80 in grades 1-8, in Atkinson over 80 in grades 1-8 and in Newton over 40 in grades 1-8. The PHAN towns (Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton), all of whom tuition their high school students outside their districts, now have 64, 23, 19 and 38 new high school students respectively, for a total 3-year increase of 144 new students. "In-district" students in the Union have increased 36 per cent, and "out-of-district" tuition students have increased 42 per cent, during the three year period from September 1960 to September 1963.

Our Supervisory Union No. 55 Board is comprised of the three School Board Members from each of the member districts. The normal business which comes before this Board consists of establishing and approving the administrative and salary budgets for the Union office and staff. This business is done in the fall of each year, before the individual district budgets are established. The PHAN towns share several educational services, such as Nurse-teacher, Special Education Class, and Music Supervision. These services, and related teaching aids and equipment are also budgeted by the PHAN portion of the Union Board. Each line item in these budgets is debated, and either approved or disapproved by a vote of the Union Board. In budget matters, each Union Board member has one vote. The school board members from your town are your representatives in all Supervisory Union Board business.

Each spring, usually in April, the Union Board holds another regular meeting. At this meeting Union Administrative personnel are elected for the following fiscal year, and their salaries are established.

At the regular board meeting in April 1963, it had become evident to most Board members that something must be done to relieve administrative congestion in the office. As a result, a meeting was held in October of the Board Chairmen from each of the individual districts, the Supervisory Union Board Chairman and the heads of the administrative staff. The key subjects discussed at the meeting by the Chairmen were:

1. Change in Administrative Staff functions.
2. Feasibility of machine accounting, for at least vendor and payroll accounting.
3. Inadequacy of present office housing.

As a result of this meeting, a job analysis was initiated of all administrative functions, present and proposed.

On November 6th, and again on November 12th, the full Union Board met to budget for the 64-65 school year.

Before the meeting temporarily adjourned on the 12th, the Union Board directed the Chairman to appoint a study committee of three Board members to investigate feasibility of:

1. Realignment of administrative staff functions.
2. Acquisition of some basic machine accounting equipment.

Mr. Perri, of Atkinson, Mr. Schmidlin of Salem and Mr. Swasey of Newton were appointed to serve on the study committee. The Board directed that they report back to the full Board in January 1964.

At the November 12th meeting, the Board authorized acquisition of larger administrative quarters. As a result some 2200 sq. ft. of new space will be available for occupancy on July 1st, 1964. This doubles the office space, with a rental increase from \$150 per month to \$265 per month.

On November 25th, the PHAN portion of the Union Board met for a third budget session, involving those items relating to the four PHAN districts.

In January, the study committee reported. Their report was excellent, and well presented by their chairman, Mr. Perri. Their unanimous recommendations were as follows:

1. Installation of a basic IBM system, to alleviate the severe load in the areas of statistics and financial accounting.
2. Establishment of a position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations, and to budget \$8500 for this position. A request to the State Board of Education for approval, should establish state support, to the extent of \$2500 of the \$8500, leaving a net cost to the Union of \$6000.
3. Request a change in title of Teacher Consultant to that of Assistant Superintendent of Instruction.
4. Appoint a committee of the five individual district chairmen, to meet on call of the Superintendent to

interview and select not more than three candidates for the position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations. The candidates selected by the screening committee shall be interviewed and one of them elected, by the full Board, at a date to be set later.

5. Appoint a committee to report recommendations at the regular April meeting on a proposed salary schedule, sick-leave allowances, absence provisions, and any other fringe benefits for Supervisory Union Administrative and office personnel.

These recommendations were adopted by the Union Board except the title change of Teacher Consultant to Assistant Superintendent of Instruction was tabled. The Board stressed that the Teacher Consultant position shall hold the same level of responsibility as that of the new position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations, and further, that it is their intent that this recommendation should be taken from the table at a future meeting upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of Schools. The Union Board Chairman was instructed to appoint a salary study committee. The appointments made by the chairman were: John Wood of Plaistow, Chairman, William Letoile of Hampstead and Mrs. Lucile deBesche of Atkinson.

It is hoped that through the reading of this report, each citizen of all Districts in Union No. 55 will obtain a better understanding of the New Hampshire Schools' supervisory structure, and in particular, the underlying reasons which have necessitated the budgeting action taken during the 20 to 30 hours of effort expended by your Union No. 55 Board. The gains we are striving for, by our actions, can only result in greater efficiency, more service, a better informed public, and the resulting better education for all of our children.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newton:

I am presenting herewith my Eighth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Newton. A report from the Principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the schools. Statistical reports are listed separately.

Personnel

Peter Kageleiry, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, is the new Supervising Principal of the Newton Schools. Mr. Kageleiry taught in Dover, N. H. and Salem, N. H. He was head teacher of the Mary Foss School in Salem at the time of his election.

Six teachers joined the Newton School system this current year. They were: Gerald Fink, grades 7 and 8, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with teaching experience in Milford, N. H.; Mrs. Mildred Kern, grade 6, a graduate of Keene Teachers College with teaching experience in Warren, N. H. and school districts in Indiana and Illinois; Elaine Babish, grade 5, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College; Judith Poole, grade 3, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College; Mary Stratton, grade 2, a graduate of Keene Teachers College; Mrs. Dorothy Sainsbury, grade 1, three years of teaching experience in Tennessee.

All teachers have continued membership in all local, state and national professional organizations.

The salary question continues to be a problem. Teachers' salaries make up the largest part of the budget. This is true, however, in any school district budget. It is also true that the teachers play the most important role in the education of your children. To hire and maintain qualified teachers you must pay the prevailing wage and should adopt a schedule. If you do not, the education of your children will not be up to standard for you will get the poorer teachers applying in this area and not hold the better ones.

We have used a salary guide comparable to the other towns in PHAN which has helped the beginning teachers. However, our more experienced teachers have not been placed on their proper position. Fortunately six out of ten teachers are on schedule, one is only \$100. off schedule. Recommendations are being made to handle the increases for the experienced teachers in some instances on a graduate basis.

If the beginning salary is raised the amount of the raise should be reflected in each teacher's salary.

Curriculum

The Principal's report lists some of the work being done in this area. I might add that we have initiated a program to help pupils with speech problems. The speech therapy was supported this year through public donations. It is recommended that the School District absorb this expense.

More Newton pupils have been attending the Special Education Class in Atkinson. Next year the class will be held in Plaistow. One child is attending the Trainable Class in Exeter. It is commendable that the School District accepts this responsibility and realizes that all children should have an opportunity to learn.

The Modern Math program will be expanded to grade 5 next year. We already have the program in grades 1-4.

Our class sizes are becoming more normal. When we can maintain classes in the 25-30 category then we can expect much better results. For the first time we have two first and two second grades. It will be interesting to note next year the achievement results of these two grades.

We still do not provide a full curriculum for the seventh and eighth graders in the area of home economics and industrial arts. Perhaps this will be corrected when a probable cooperative is authorized.

The School District continues to take advantage of funds provided by the Federal Government under the Na-

tional Defense Education Act for special projects in mathematics and science.

Housing

We have built an addition to the Memorial School. All ten classrooms are being used. Next year we will need at least one additional room and we will probably use the Village School for this purpose and may have one vacant classroom which will be used the following year. It is hoped that the Rowe's Corner School will not be used again.

For 1966-67 additional rooms will be needed for elementary housing. If our present grade 3 becomes too large we may need additional space sooner than this.

As is now well known, a Planning Committee of 24 individuals from 8 towns including 3 members from Newton have been working for several months on a cooperative school study. They have made an exhaustive study of various plans to solve the secondary school problem.

My only comment is that I feel you should join a cooperative. Haverhill will eventually cut off tuition pupils and Sanborn will not be able to take all pupils who are eligible. You must protect the education of your secondary students. Your final decision should reflect what is best for Newton.

Credit should be given to our custodians for the work that they do to keep our buildings well maintained.

Support Quality Education

What is quality education?

When we speak of quality education we mean **qualified teachers** in uncrowded classrooms, with the books, supplies and equipment they need to do a good job.

We mean **supervisory and special help** for teachers in these days of changing and expanding knowledge, so that they will continue to grow in their teaching skills and keep up-to-date in their knowledge of subject matter.

We mean a **curriculum** which is constantly being improved.

We mean **guidance services** that help parents and children to find what is suited to the child's needs and abilities, so that he may progress toward a useful, satisfying life.

We mean **administrators** who are competent and up-to-date in their knowledge and who are leaders.

We mean **maintenance** which assures cleanliness and safety which protects your investment.

We mean **informed citizens** who understand the importance of good education to their children, their community and their country.

Warning to Parents

Do you know that school dropouts have twice as high a rate of unemployment as high school graduates?

Do you know that early marriage seems to be related to the high dropout rate for women?

Do you know that frequent absences and truancies lead to early dropouts?

Encourage your children to stay in high school and keep regular attendance.

Appreciations

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, Principal, teachers and pupils for their help during the year.

I also thank the Parent-Teachers Association and all civic organizations, parents and friends of the children for their support and interest in the activities of the pupils.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

I herewith submit my annual report to the Superintendent of Schools, School Board and the Town of Newton:

The opening of school was postponed to September 9th due to construction at the Memorial School. On that day the following number of students enrolled.

Grade 1 — 37	Grade 5 — 26
Grade 2 — 50	Grade 6 — 30
Grade 3 — 36	Grade 7 — 23
Grade 4 — 33	Grade 8 — 29

This total of 264 represents an increase of 19 students in the school population over the previous year's total of 245. The additional classroom space provided by the two platoon system, now in effect at the Memorial School, has made it possible to lessen the size of classes thus enabling us to meet more closely the needs of the children. Undoubtedly conditions will improve considerably when all classes are housed under one roof, some time in January.

The Newton Parent-Teachers Association regularly meets on the first Thursday of each month. Sponsoring of a scholarship program and the contribution of a substantial sum of money to the Speech Therapy Program in addition to the annual class gift of fifty dollars are some of the projects undertaken this year. Our delegates to the State Convention were pleasantly surprised when they were awarded a pewter "Paul Revere" bowl in recognition of the tripling of our P.T.A. membership. Next year, in the event that our membership increases, and is the highest percentage-wise, the bowl remains permanently in Newton. The P.T.A. also deserves much commendation for its support of all school programs.

Robert Morse, school spelling champion, was our entrant in the 1963 State Championship Spelling Bee held at

Exeter, for Rockingham County. More than thirty contestants who had been selected "best spellers" at their respective schools were on hand to compete for the state title.

Throughout the year planned educational field trips were taken to the State Legislature, Home of the N. H. Historical Society, Peabody Museum, Benson's Animal Farm and other places to serve as culminating activities in correlation with our various areas of study.

Pupil participation in the purchasing of Savings Stamps is splendid. Not only is the program serving its primary purpose of selling stamps to as many pupils as possible, but it is also helping to promote the concept of thrift and systematic saving.

The testing program carried on in our schools is as follows:

1. Reading Readiness Test — Grade 1
2. Otis Mental Ability Tests — Grades 2, 4, 6
3. Stanford Achievement Tests — Grades 3, 8
4. Individualized testing for problem cases
5. Basic Reading Tests

These tests provide teachers with background material for use in connection with improvement of instruction, pupil guidance and the evaluation of progress.

Newton shared in the national observance of American Education Week by having "Open House" on Wednesday, November 13th. Many parents availed themselves of this opportunity to observe classes in operation, to become better acquainted with the physical structure of our buildings and to meet the teachers.

Grades 6, 7 and 8 of the Memorial School are departmentalized because teachers are assigned to teach in the area in which they have specialized. Evaluation of this program indicates that it has been successful in many ways. It has also been well received by the students.

The evaluation program, conducted by the teachers over a period of two years, was completed in June. As a

result of the findings changes were made in the science program and a revision made in our report cards which makes it possible for better understanding between the school and parents. A study of our mathematics and reading program is now in effect. If necessary, changes or additions will soon be forthcoming in those areas also.

To supplement our reading program in the area of Phonics, the Phono-Visual system has been added at the first and second grade levels. The phonics system advocated by modern educators and the whole-word meaning method which has been used for the past many years. The combined program can be adapted to the abilities and needs of both fast and slow learners.

Mr. Evan Williams, vocal music supervisor, has presented a fine program of music at the various grade levels. His main emphasis this year has been on the development of musical skill and appreciation. It is the goal of the music program to help each child develop his ability so as to be able to enjoy and understand good music by actively participating in it. His 6, 7, 8 Chorus presented a fine Christmas Program for the December meeting of the P.T.A. During the spring the chorus shared in a combined Spring Festival of Music at Woodbury High School in Salem.

The Health Program under the direction of Mrs. Gwendolyn A. Banks, R.N., continues to provide vision and hearing tests, color perception in Grade 5 and the tuberculosis Patch tests in Grades 5, 8 were also administered. Annual health examinations were given by Dr. Harris of Plaistow with the capable assistance of Mrs. Banks in Grades 1, 4 and 8. Upon the requests of teachers she planned and presented many audio-visual programs and classroom discussions on safety, hygiene, nutrition, vision, hearing and posture. The addition of a part-time school nurse, Mrs. Wanda Scholl, R.N., has proven to be very helpful. Visiting days for our nurses in Newton are Tuesdays and Thursdays in the forenoon.

Graduation Exercises for the class of 1963 were held in the Town Hall in June. The theme of the program,

“American Culture,” was appropriately developed with essays and songs. The Good Citizenship Medal presented by the Sons of the American Revolution was awarded to Marilyn Ingalls. Of the twenty-nine graduates three are enrolled at Amesbury High, one at Brewster Academy, one at Haverhill Trade, one at Pentucket Regional and twenty-three at Sanborn Seminary. Class Day, financed in part by the Newton P.T.A., was held at Canobie Lake followed by a dinner in Amesbury.

I wish to thank the Superintendent, Teacher Consultant, Teachers, School Board, Parent-Teachers Association and the Civic Organizations for their cooperation in making our work successful.

REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASS

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Boards of Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as teacher of the PHAN Special Class.

The Special Class is located for the second year in Atkinson Academy where we have a light, well ventilated room conducive to good physical health.

At present there are 13 pupils in the class whose September ages ranged from 7 to 15. There are 6 girls and 7 boys in the class with 2 girls and 3 boys in the 7 to 11 age group and 4 girls and 4 boys in the 12 to 15 age range. We have 2 pupils from Plaistow, 1 from Hampstead, 5 from Atkinson, and 5 from Newton. This year the pupils from Plaistow, Hampstead and Newton are transported directly from their homes to the Academy and returned to their homes, which is a more satisfactory arrangement than being left at the various schools.

This year's class presents a vast difference in mental development and ability as well as age, making it necessary to have 6 reading groups and 5 arithmetic groups so less time can be devoted to social studies and science than previous years. In these areas our emphasis is on preparation for daily living.

Handwriting lessons are held almost every day to develop this necessary communication skill and to help those with poor motor control.

We do not have an opportunity to take advantage of educational television programs this year because of conflict in programs with the available television set. We hope to have a set of our own next year to again use this medium of modern education which is so beneficial to the retarded,

who often grasp more by seeing and hearing at the same time.

Our health lessons of necessity emphasize personal hygiene and the care of our bodies.

Mr. Williams, our music supervisor, spends one-half hour with us every other week and two of our older girls are members of the seventh and eighth grade chorus.

Each day we spend time on our arts and crafts program, developing skills which may contribute to the ability to earn a living. New craft projects this year have been the use of plaster of Paris in the making of plaques which are painted and presented as gifts to the parents. Oval and round baskets were made of natural reed. We made styrofoam of our own and molded star, bell and ball shapes which were decorated with glitter and sequins for our Christmas tree and later to adorn the trees at home.

It is the task of the special class teacher to build confidence in the pupils — some of whom have spent several years in regular classes and known nothing but failure. Work has to be simple enough at first to give confidence in ability and then work to develop the individual as far as possible at his own pace. The special class is not a remedial class; it is not designed to force growth in academic skills, but to enable the retarded child to get enough out of the usual academic skills to lead a happy and effective life. A child has to learn his own limitations and assets in order to avoid continual frustration. He needs the opportunity to grow in emotional areas besides developing academic and motor skills and vocational training.

The special class teacher, with the help of test results, diagnoses the need of each child and deals with the individual accordingly.

Special class teachers in New Hampshire are required to complete a minimum of 12 units of study beyond a Bachelor's Degree dealing specifically with the mentally retarded and the work of the special class teacher. The courses I took this summer gave me an opportunity to meet

other special class teachers and discuss our mutual problems. Our special class, in spite of the vast age range, compares favorably with the others in the state.

I hope to develop a more extensive manual training and home economics program, especially for the older pupils, when facilities are available.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the entire staff of Atkinson Academy for their splendid cooperation and understanding these two years in Atkinson and many thanks to the Union staff for their continued guidance and support.
