# WARRANT FOR THE ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY SEVENTH ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

(L. S.)

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Northfield, in the  
County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote  
in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Northfield Town House in said Northfield, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation upon the following:

- A. Town Officers' Salaries
- B. Town Officers' Expenses
- C. Election & Registration Expenses
- D. Expenses of Town Hall
- E. Police Department
- F. Fire Department (out of Precinct)
- G. Town Dump
- H. Dump Fire Patrol
- I. Sewer Maintenance
- J. Vital Statistics
- K. Town Roads & Bridges
  - 1. Summer Maintenance
  - 2. Winter Maintenance
  - 3. General Expenses of Highway

- 5. Road Salt

- M. Old Age Assistance
- N. Town Welfare and Relief (including Veterans' Aid)
- O. Memorial Day Expenses
- P. Care of Cemeteries (Town)

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 to the Tilton-Northfield District Nurse Association. A similar request will appear in the Tilton Warrant (by request) .

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to the Franklin Hospital Association. (by request) .

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to the Lakes Region General Hospital, \$200.00 of this sum to apply to the Building Fund. (by request) .

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 to the Lakes Region Mental Health Clinic. (by request) .

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$717.42 for Town Road Aid. The

State will contribute \$4,782.81. The plan is to resume construction on the Fellows Hill Road between Canterbury and Belmont.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Park Cemetery. (by request) .

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,879.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be put in an existent Building Fund savings account for a Community Center. This fund to be contingent on the motion and amendment of the 1962 Town Meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund, \$1,600.00 to apply to the equipment fund and \$400.00 to apply to the Town buildings depreciation fund. The Capital Reserve Fund will become the responsibility of the Trustees of the Trust Funds.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$146.40 for three red phones for the Police Department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$228.00 for the yearly cost of street lights on Route 3-B at Northfield Center.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the purchase and installation of a heavy duty overhead door for the Town Garage.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Tilton 49ers Junior



Drum and Bugle Corps for the purchase of new uniforms. A similar article appears in the Tilton Warrant.

16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to continue the road construction on the Shaker and Knowles Pond Roads. Such sum is to complete this road program.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,132.00 to replace the bridge over the Winnepesaukee River on Route 140 between Tilton and Northfield known as Shaker Bridge. Tilton's share of the cost is \$15,868.00 Northfield's share of the cost to be financed over a two year period. Federal and State Bridge Aid is estimated to be \$110,000.00. A similar article appears in the Tilton Warrant.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen to take any action necessary to enable the Town of Northfield to carry out a planning project by participating in the Federal Urban Planning Assistance Program; and further to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 as the Town's share of the cost of such program; this sum of money to be used in conjunction with Federal and State funds in the approximate amount of \$20,000.00 A similar article appears in the Tilton Warrant.

19. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,085.00 for a new 9 foot snow plow to be financed from the Capital Reserve equipment fund.

20. To see if the Town will appropriate from the Land Damage Award Fund a sum not to exceed \$400.00 to install two chemical toilet units and a suitable building at the Northfield Pines rest area.

21. To see if the Town will appropriate from the Land Damage Award Fund a sum not to exceed \$500.00

to install a baseball back stop and to improve the condition of the athletic field at the Northfield Pines.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to improve the River Road, so called, from the Oak Hill Road to the Joseph Ryan residence known as Fiddlers Choice.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$112.00 for the service and installation of four street lights at Northfield Pond. Service is to start May 1, 1967.

24. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that may be acquired through the Tax Collector's deeds.

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the officers as printed.

27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Polls shall be closed not earlier than six of the clock in the evening. The business meeting will be held at 7:30 of the clock in the evening.

## LAKES REGION MENTAL HEALTH CLINIC PROGRESS REPORT

November 28, 1966

The officers of the Lakes Region Mental Health Clinic are pleased to report that the clinic has very quickly become an effective and valuable part of the Lakes Region community. The clinic started operation in downstairs offices in the Winston Building with one clinical psychologist on July 1st, 1966. As of October 31st, four months later, the clinic is in full operation seeing and helping children, parents and other adults, and serving the local school systems. (The attached statistical report indicates the rapid growth in the patient workload).

The staff has been expanded to include one full-time clinical psychologist, one full-time secretary, one psychiatrist for one half day per week and one psychiatrist for one full day per week. It is expected that a full-time social worker will be hired shortly. To date, no patient has been required to wait over two weeks and it is hoped that this short waiting period can be maintained despite an increasing number of patients.

The clinic is also providing consultative interviews for the local school union. In effect, this means that school teachers with problem students can consult with clinic personnel and through expert advice gain insight about problems and how to help children involved. If such children are unable to be helped on a classroom level, they have been referred to the clinic itself or The Child Guidance Clinic.

The clinic has been of help to neighboring school systems and communities but has been limited by lack of personnel and by the large number of requests for consultation and services. Hiring an additional social worker will mean that more time can be available outside the Laconia area.



It is a pleasure to be able to report such excellent progress by the clinic and to once again thank all who have supported it.

## FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people — those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres — a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to

dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.

2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
4. Most important — Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

## REPORT OF STUDY COMMITTEE ON SEWERAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM

In Fall 1966, we filed with the Department of Housing and Urban Development an application for an interest-free advance for the preliminary planning of the sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Towns of Tilton and Northfield. This application, endorsed by the New Hampshire Water Pollution Commission, is being processed by the Federal Government and, as soon as the approval has been given, our engineers will start with the planning.

These planning advances are made available out of a revolving fund. The money advanced to communities is paid back when construction starts, but 80% to 90% is refunded to the community, when it receives the Grants.

In November 1966, Congress passed Public Law 80-753, the so-called "Clean Water Restoration Act of 1966", which increases the Federal Grants from 30% to 40% for rivers not classified and to 50% for rivers which are classified. Together with the 40% State Grants the total Grants will amount to about 80% to 90% of the total costs of main sewers and treatment facilities.

Sewer extensions and so-called laterals, these are sewers in side streets, do not qualify for the above Grants. As soon as the Town has a Master Plan worked out, most of these laterals will be eligible for a Grant under the Housing and Urban Development Act amounting to 50% of the construction costs.

As the increased Federal Grants will become valid on July 1, 1967, most communities deferred construction until after July 1, 1967, with the result that the replenishment of the revolving fund for planning advances is being slowed down.

## TILTON-NORTHFIELD CIVIL DEFENSE

The Selectmen  
Tilton and Northfield

Gentlemen:

There is little of importance to report on the activities of Civil Defense in this area during the past year. The federal authorities continued to require endless form completing, all four sets of radiological instruments have been replaced by new equipment, we have participated in several statewide emergency warning systems and of course our own warning device has been tested monthly.

There has been an important change, by federal directive, in the meanings of the signals sounded by the warning system. Commencing March 1st the signals should be interpreted as follows:

Up & Down Wail—

Signifies an attack is being made against this country and everyone should take cover and if possible listen to radio broadcasts.

Steady Wail—

A general alarm used in peacetime. The public should listen to their radios for information on possible hurricanes, tornadoes, etc. All safety personnel (police, fire department personnel, etc.) should stand by to report to their respective stations.

Alternate Hi-Lo Notes—

Local disaster or imminent approach of hurricane to this immediate area. Public should remain in their homes. All safety personnel report to stations.

Last Town Meeting defeated my proposal to construct an "Emergency Operations Building." The main reason apparently being the need to economise on the



town's budget. As your adviser on Civil Defense, I cannot over emphasize the importance and necessity of this building. It is essentially a partly underground cinder block and concrete building measuring approximately 15 ft. by 20 ft. which would house a number of police, firemen and CD workers in the event of an attack against this country resulting in radioactive fallout. Without this degree of fallout protection, our community would necessarily be totally without the services of all safety sources for a period of not less than three days following an attack. It is the writer's firm opinion, that for us as a community to ignore these facts amounts to great irresponsibility in regards to the safety of our country, our community and our families.

Other than the further consideration of the necessary funds to construct such an emergency shelter, I do not feel that it is necessary to raise anything larger than a nominal sum to support the existence of a CD structure in our communities. It is obvious that in the event of a local disaster or other unforeseen emergencies, additional funds could quickly be appropriated directly by our local governments.

## **TILTON - NORTHFIELD RECREATION COUNCIL**

### **1966 Annual Report**

This past year concluded the eleventh year of operation for the T-N Recreation Council. It has been a busy series of events and programmed activities. The State of New Hampshire has appointed "Wink" Tappley director of "The Office of Community Recreation." He keeps in contact with the recreation departments throughout the state. He has assessed the T-N recreation program as outstanding, for a part-time endeavor.

During the earlier part of the year, the Recreation Depts. of T-N and Franklin, held an indoor winter activities competition. The events ranged from weight lifting, table tennis, and basketball, to and including checkers and chess. The events were held both on the grammar and high school levels. T-N remained champions for the 2nd year in a row, edging Franklin out by a two point lead.

The Babe Ruth ball club brought honors to T-N once again, by winning first place in their league. The boys are setting high standards for themselves, to "live up to," in the future years. We hope they continue to be a first place team, but more important, to continue to have good sportsmanship as their guide.

The swimming program this past year was arranged into two 4 week schedules. The first four weeks were outlined for beginners, intermediates and junior life savers. The latter period continued programs for beginners, advanced beginners, swimmers and senior life savers. All the children and teenagers received certificates, if they satisfactorily completed the requirements for their various grade levels.

The basketball team (grades 9-12), is entered in the Claremont championship league tournament. The boys

have been practicing this year, for the contest coming up in '67.

The weekly program has included bowling for grammar school grade children, basketball for adults on Thursday evenings at the high school, bowling programs for high school students and various indoor activities held at the Tilton Town Hall recreation room. During the "free play" periods at the center, the children and teenagers are taught how to play various games, observing the proper rules and regulations.

Three major activities were cancelled this year, due to budgetary decreases; the programs included the summer playground, ice-skating and ski sessions.

The teen council has also been very active and has contributed to the welfare of the communities and the recreation department. They have run several dances during the year; had movies for grade school children every other Saturday afternoon at the Tilton town hall; started a movie program for teenagers every other week; held an outstanding Halloween party and a most successful Christmas project, distributing toys and clothing to the twin towns' needy, as determined by the District Nurse.

The Recreation Council also ran another Skimobile race, under blizzard conditions, as a separate building fund project. A T.V. raffle was also held toward the end of the year, to try to raise funds for a community recreation hall. We are trying to increase the amount of funds toward this building project, so that we may realize a completed structure a little sooner. Another project which will continue, is to keep the public informed as to "what's going" in the T-N area concerning recreation. These programs are available to the citizens of our communities and we are happy to see more people taking advantage of them.

We would also like to thank all those people and organizations who in one way or another have given their assistance to help make this another successful year. We hope to enlarge the scope of the programs, to offer our citizenry a wider variety of activities, during the whole year.

Grateful appreciation is extended to the American Legion for the use of their hall for these clinics.

A sphygmomanometer and stethoscope were donated to our association, by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Rumph.

We had a need for this equipment and have put it to good use.

November and December were active months for welfare service. Many hours each year are spent investigating family situations, so that some unfortunate child will not be forgotten at Christmas, and that needy families have a holiday dinner.

These remembrances at the holiday season would not be possible, if it were not for the many generous donations by individuals, organizations and churches.

The Elks Club, The Salvation Army, The American Legion and Girl Scouts provided 28 families with food baskets.

The Recreation Department, the Methodist Church, the Congregational Missionary Society and the Episcopal Church provided 49 children with toys and clothing.

With money received from the Emblem Club and individual donations it was possible to purchase for 27 children and three adults, small gifts of clothing, which I wrapped and delivered.

Mrs. Thalia Coulter R.N. substituted two months for the nurse during the year.

I wish to extend my appreciation to all organizations, churches and individuals that have assisted me in any way, so that the work of this association may be carried on to the best interest of all residents in the Tilton and Northfield area.

## **REPORT OF THE WINNISQUAM REGIONAL SCHOOL BOARD AND THE SUPERINTENDENT**

In February of 1966 district meetings held at Tilton-Northfield and Sanbornton approved the formation of the Winnisquam Regional School District. In accordance with the vote in February an organization and first annual meeting was held in April 1966. At this time school board members were elected and other necessary votes were passed to place in effective operation the new school district.

On July 1, 1966 the Winnisquam Regional School District replaced the former Tilton-Northfield and Sanbornton School Districts and assumed all the duties of these former school districts relative to educational matters in Tilton, Northfield and Sanbornton.

The sudden size of the new cooperative school district required the diligent attention of the school board on all aspects of operating the merged school districts. Much time has been devoted to the program of studies, rules of procedure, transportation, proper staffing, and many other small details concerned with building an effective educational system. The Board has discussed each problem as it appeared and attempted to reach a reasonable operating solution.

As the new district matures we anticipate an improvement in our educational offering. A larger enrollment has enabled us to use our teachers more effectively in their strong areas. A woman is now handling girls physical education and Conversational French has been added to the junior high school course of studies. These are beginnings that we expect will be continued to the benefit of our children.

In the next few years we expect to have common programs of studies in both our Tilton-Northfield and Sanbornton Elementary Schools. This will be gradual so as

not to upset the progress of the children in the present programs.

The cost of this cooperative as with others that have been formed in the State has caused an initial substantial increase in operating cost. It is anticipated that after two years these costs will level when the full growth of the new Regional District has been realized.

The Winnisquam Regional School District early in its formation received petitions from the Belmont and Canterbury School Districts requesting a study to annex these school districts to our district. Many meetings have been held dealing with the consideration of these requests. At this time there have been no firm conclusions reached on the merits of this plan. It is hoped that this study can be completed soon and the results presented for your consideration.

The evaluation of Tilton-Northfield High School which was started last year will be finished this spring. At this time the self analysis will be completed and a visiting committee will make a three day visit, then issue a written report. Their recommendations will be studied for their use in the improvement of our school system.

The major renovations and improvements to our schools this past year include:

Painting the middle and top corridors in the Junior High School.

Painting three classrooms, the remedial room and corridor of the Sanborn School.

Painting teachers and nurses room at Sanborn School.

Painted 62 storage cabinets at Sanborn School.

Clearing of the playground drains at the Union and Sanborn Schools.

New floor in Union School.

Business Machines for Business Education Classes.

Tape Recorder

Overhead Projector

Reading Machines

In addition to the above many items of maintenance were completed by the custodians and service repairmen.

*Article 5* — Motion moved by Albert Brooks and duly seconded: That the School District authorize the School Board to request the Municipal Division of the State Tax Commission to audit the accounts of the District as of June 30, 1966. Voted in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

*Article 6* — Moved by Mrs. Ross Roberts that the School District vote to authorize the School District to convey to the Winnisquam Regional School District, by Quitclaim Deed, the present Channing Sanborn, Union

and Junior-Senior High School, together with the contents thereof, and all land owned by the District.

Voted in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

*Article 7* — Moved by Mr. Charles Dwinal and duly seconded: That the District vote to direct the Treasurer to pay over to the Treasurer of the Winnisquam Regional School District any cash balance in his hands, or money due the District as of July 1, 1966, or thereafter, less any outstanding bills or debts, any sum so transferred to be used as a credit against the Regional School District assessment to be raised by the pre-existing Tilton-Northfield School District to defray its share of the cost of operation of the Regional District during the first year of operation. Voted in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

*Article 8* — Moved by Mrs. Frank Yudickey and duly seconded: That the District vote to authorize the School Board to make disposition of all School records. A vote in the affirmative was declared by the Moderator.

*Article 9* — Discussion and information on the Regional Meeting to be held at the Tilton-Northfield High School on April 14, 1966.

Meeting adjourned at 9:00 P.M.

**RECORD OF ORGANIZATION MEETING  
OF  
WINNISQUAM REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT**

Pursuant to the warrant, the meeting was convened at the gymnasium of the Tilton-Northfield High School in the Town of Tilton in said District on the 14th day of April, 1966, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

The meeting was called to order by William M. Lawrence of Tilton, Chairman of the cooperative school district planning board, who acted as temporary chairman as provided by law.

The invocation was given by Rev. David Picciano. The temporary chairman read the warrant, the affidavit of posting, and the affidavit of publication.

Under Article 1, the temporary chairman asked for nominations for the office of moderator. On a motion by Walter Gibbs, seconded by Alexander MacGregor, Mr. Brackett Hill was nominated for Moderator.

A motion by Stanley Skeats, seconded by Alfred Nicholson, that nominations for moderator close was voted.

A motion that Norman Wiggin, a member of the planning committee, cast one ballot for Brackett Hill to be moderator was made by Walter Gibbs, seconded by Raymond McReel and voted.

On a motion by Robert Alley, seconded by Arthur Abbott, Elizabeth Cotsibas was nominated for clerk pro-tem.

A motion by Stanley Skeats, seconded by Alexander MacGregor, that nominations for clerk pro-tem be closed was voted.

A motion that Robert Alley, a member of the planning committee, cast one ballot for Elizabeth Cotsibas



to be clerk pro-tem was made by Walter Gibbs, seconded by Alfred Nicholson and voted.

Mr. Brackett Hill took the oath of office for moderator and Mrs. Elizabeth Cotsibas took the oath of office for clerk pro-tem administered by Walter Gibbs.

Moderator Brackett Hill assumed the duties of the moderator in the conduct of the meeting at this time.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 2. It was moved by Norman Wiggin and seconded by Robert Alley that the Winnisquam Regional School District raise and appropriate one thousand fifty-five dollars (\$1,055.00) for the salaries of seven school board members at one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) each and five dollars (\$5.00) for the salary of the moderator. On a motion by Walter Gibbs and seconded by William Lawrence it was moved that Article 2 be amended to read ten dollars (\$10.00) for the salary of the moderator. The amendment was voted. The main motion, previously moved and seconded, was adopted as amended on a *viva voce* vote.

A motion by Walter Gibbs, seconded by William Lawrence, that Article 8 be discussed previous to Article 3 was voted.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 8. It was moved by William Lawrence and seconded by Walter Gibbs that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, amended by Chapters 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,065.25 to defray the district's share of the cost thereof. The motion was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

The meeting returned to Article 3. It was moved by Walter Gibbs and seconded by Arthur Abbott that the pre-arranged system of balloting be approved for this meeting, and that the polls shall remain open for the entire meeting and until all articles have been acted upon. The motion was voted.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 4. It was moved by William Lawrence and seconded by Charles Dwinal that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred fifty-five thousand nine hundred forty-one dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$655,941.78) for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen of each of the towns of Tilton, Northfield and Sanbornton the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the three towns in accordance with the formula provided in the articles of agreement. On a motion by Shirley Geoffrion and seconded by Joan Walsh it was moved to amend the budget to include fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000.00) for a pre-school program for children one year younger than first grade. Discussion ensued. On a motion by Alfred Nicholson and seconded by Lester Rutherford it was moved to amend the amendment to commit to a study committee for further study the kindergarten project, this committee to report back one year from today, and that this committee shall be appointed by the Moderator. Discussion ensued. The amendment to the amendment was voted by a show of hands. Yes — 98. No — 85. On a motion by Doris Thompson and seconded by Charles Dwinal it was moved that the first amendment be tabled. The motion



was voted. The main motion, previously moved and seconded, was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 5. It was moved by Walter Gibbs and seconded by Stanley Skeats that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 195:4:III relative to having the town supervisors of the checklist in Tilton, Northfield and Sanbornton serve this school district as supervisors, with duties as prescribed in said Paragraph III and as otherwise provided by law. The motion was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 6. It was moved by Arthur Abbott and seconded by Charles Powers that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate. The motion was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 7. It was moved by Alfred Nicholson and seconded by William Lawrence that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States. The motion was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 9. It was moved by William Lawrence and seconded by Walter Gibbs that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to exclude from the plan services in any class or

classes of positions filled by popular election. The motion was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 10. It was moved by Phyllis Yudickey and seconded by Alexander MacGregor that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis. The motion was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

The meeting proceeded to take up Article 11. It was moved by Robert Marshall and seconded by Walter Gibbs that the Winnisquam Regional School District vote to authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to have the district designate the Superintendent of Schools as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan. The motion was adopted on a *viva voce* vote.

Under Article 12 certificates of appreciation for faithful service as members of the Tilton-Northfield School Board were presented to Dr. Archie Grevior and William Lawrence.

At the conclusion of the balloting, the polls were closed at 10:30 P.M. The Moderator announced the results of the election as follows:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Tilton-Northfield School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, which was made by this Division. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

*Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)*

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1965 and June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$30,332.75 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966.

*Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)*

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.



*Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibit C & D)*

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$4,469.44, less a revenue deficit of \$4,361.01, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$108.43.

*Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)*

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

*Statement of School Lunch Account: (Exhibit F)*

A statement of the School Lunch Account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit F.

*Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit G)*

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Towns of Tilton and Northfield is included in Exhibit G. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1966, the School District had received from each Town its proportionate share of the 1965-66 School Tax, the total of which amounted to \$354,822.31.

*Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)*

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

*Current Surplus:*

It is noted that the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$7,036.23 to \$368.98, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, as shown herewith:

*Recommendations:*

“33:12 Register. The treasurer of every municipal corporation shall keep a register, in such form as may be prescribed by the state tax commission, which shall state the denomination, number and date of every bond or note issued by the municipality, the time when and the place where the principal thereof and interest, if any, thereon are payable and such other information as the state tax commission may prescribe. The state tax commission shall inspect the register provided for herein whenever it shall make any audit of the accounts of a municipal corporation.”

*Conclusion:*

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.
