SUMMARY OF ACTION TAKEN ON ARTICLES IN

1984 TOWN WARRANTS

The meeting was held at Coe-Brown Northwood Academy and opened at 9:05 a.m. by Moderator Robert A. Johnson. Charles B. Johnson moved that we dispense with reading of the entire warrant as it is printed in the Town Report. Helen Fogg seconds, and motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 1 Raymond Caron moves we postpone action on Article 1 until Articles 4, 29 and 31 be disposed of. Hazel Saunders seconds. Motion carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE 2 Alan Thomson moved to indefinitely postpone action on this article as Revenue Sharing Funds cannot be used in this manner by law. Charles Bailey seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 3 Charles Bailey moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Jean Lane seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4 Charles Bailey moves that the Town establish the positions of full-time Police Chief and full-time Police Officer, both positions to become effective as of May 1, 1984, after the positions have been properly advertised and all candidates interviewed and selections made, and to approve the salary of \$10,001.25, as the eight month portion of an annual salary of \$14,859.00, plus benefits, for a full-time Police Chief, and \$8,268.75 as the eight month portion of an annual salary of \$12,285.00, plus benefits, for a full-time Police Officer. Stephanie Buzzell seconds. Raymond Caron asks what Budget Committee thinks the cost would be in 1985. Mr. Thomson predicts \$10,000.00 more. Selectman Chesley asked permission for Mr. Schultress, Assistant Attorney for Rockingham County to speak. Mr. Schultress stated that he was not here to tell us how or what to do with our money but to inform us what a local police officer does. He has charge of all prosecutions and puts in many, many hours in order to prosecute a case. He cited examples currently being done by our chief. He must also know the law. R. Peterson believes we would get more for our money with a full-time chief. Selectman Bailey says that it is impossible for a man to do the job well on a part-time basis. A yes and no ballot was requested and the results were: 59 YES 79 NO motion was defeated.

Moment of interruption -- Senator William Johnson read a resolution of the State Senate honoring an outstanding citizen of our town, GLADYS GARDNER. As she is presently in the hospital, Theresa Herron, Chairman of the Library Trustees, accepted the resolution in her behalf. Let the record show that there was a spontaneous standing ovation in honor of Miss Gardner.

ARTICLE 5 Vincent Bane moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,552.00 for the care and improvement of cemeteries. Donald Post seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6 Alan Thomson moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for Planning Board expenses. Veronica Post seconds. True Chesley amends the article to increase the amount \$300.00 to now read \$1,700.00. Walter Crandall seconds. Amendment passed by voice vote. Now main motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 7 Alan Thomson moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for Board of Adjustment expenses. Charles Johnson seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8 Vincent Bane moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the fee compensation and expenses of the Building Inspector. Donald Post seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9 Herbert Sherman moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,085.00 for Road Maintenance. The \$100,085.00 is comprised of \$29,299.66 of Highway Grant money and the \$70,785.34 of Town money and will be used as follows: Supervisor of Public Works salary, \$5,160.00; Summer Maintenance, \$30,725.00; Winter Maintenance, \$35,000.00; New Construction & Repairs, \$29,200.00; totalling \$100,085.00. The breakdown is: surface Lower Deerfield Road, \$7,150.00; shim Lucas Pond Road, \$9,575.00; shim Bow Lake Road, \$5,550.00; surface Tasker Hill Road, \$3,600.00; build Canterbury Road, \$1,300.00; surface 200 ft. Gulf Road, \$1,500.00; bridge rails, \$200.00; repairs to Bennett Road stone bridge, \$325.00. Charles Johnson seconds. Max Suberi spoke of the bad conditions on West Street. R. Peterson said they had skimped on hot top on Harvey Lake Road so much that last year's work was a waste of money. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10 Donald Post moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,648.00 for General Expenses of Highway Department. George Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 11 Raymond Caron moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Street Lighting. Stephanie Buzzell seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 12 Charles Johnson moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,200.00 for the operation and maintenance of the Northwood Recycling and Reclamation Area. Keith Lidback seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 13 Donald Post moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,445.00 as its share of the capital and operating costs for the incinerator and energy recovery facility as set forth under the Agreement for Formation of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative, and to allow the Selectmen to accept Federal or State, or other grants that may be available to the Town in providing its share in the project. Jean Lane seconds. Donald Post says we contributed to the original bond issue to build the plant and now they allow another town to use the facility on same basis as we without their entry fee. Thinks this is giving them free entry. Mr. Thomson says one of the towns is in Maine so cannot legally join. Raymond Caron suggests that our Selectmen have our representative to the Cooperative report to our town

about the cost to our town of adding these other towns. Mrs. Herron asks about the steam supposedly going to pay for itself. Mr. Thomson says steam generated will never defray all of the costs but that this money is largely going to pay for the original bond issue and will decrease. Mr. Crandall points out the report on Page 108 in the Town Report. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 14 Jean Lane moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,100.00 for the Northwood Rescue Squad and Ambulance. George Stanhope seconds. Marcia Tasker asks why residents are charged if we support it. Richard Corning explains that by vote the Town voted to send bills for transport only, there is absolutely no charge for any medical services. If a person has no insurance for ambulance service and cannot pay, he will not have to. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 15 Charles Johnson moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,624.50 for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council, Inc. Charles Frary seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 16 Donald Post moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$41.00 for Rockingham Child & Family Services. George Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 17 Robert Herron moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the program "A SAFE PLACE". Max Suberi seconds. Grace Mattern spoke in behalf of the motion saying it is in Portsmouth and offers a shelter for battered women and children, transportation and legal assistance. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 18 Thelma Eatough moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for Newmarket Regional Health Center. Donald Post seconds. Max Suberi asks for explanation of their services and Mr. Crandall points to Page 110 of the Town Report for their report. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 19 Vincent Bane moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Donald Post seconds. Abby Rosen spoke on behalf of the article, citing the need for a facility that copes with psychological needs, problems of depression, divorce and emotional problems. This is only facility offering help to Northwood and 35 residents were served in 1983. Only about half of the cost is recovered from the clients. In reply to a query as to whether the State Institution doesn't do this, the reply was that they now only deal with severely disabled mental cases. Budget Committee didn't realize it was being used by residents. Motion to postpone was defeated by show of hands 21 YES 88 NO. Max suberi moved the original article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Seacoast Regional Mental Health. Richard Shaw seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 20 Gordon Smart moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,322.00 for the Northwood Public Libraries. Jean Lane seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 21 Gordon Smart moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,450.00 for Parks and Playgrounds. Donald MacCord seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 22 Veronica Post moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Conservation Commission expenses. Donald Post seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 23 Charles B. Johnson moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for interest on same. Charles Frary seconds. Mr. Behm asks how much we will need to borrow. Mr. Chesley expects \$350,000.00 to \$400,000.00. Mr. Peterson asks what interest rate we had to pay last year. Answer, 6%. It was also explained that the school is on a different fiscal year than the Town, but no one knows when that practice began. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 24 Jean Lane moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. Herbert Sherman seconds. He also requests a show of hands when voting. Mr. Herron then requested a YES and NO ballot. Moderator asked for a show of hands vote to show whether the group would be willing to take a show of hands vote and if that were close, then have a YES and NO ballot. This request resulted in 94 YES 3 NO, so then the motion was adopted by a show of hands 104 YES 0 NO.

ARTICLE 25 Jean Lane moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a replacement ambulance and authorize the financing to be as follows: \$30,500.00 from the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund; \$7,000.00 from contributions from donations received by the Rescue Squad; \$10,500.00 from trade-in value of existing ambulance; \$1,000.00 by taxation. George Stanhope seconds. Richard Corning amends this by having contributions changed from \$7,000.00 to \$8,000.00 and deleting the \$1,000.00 by taxation. Charles Bailey seconds. Amendment adopted by unanimous voice vote. Main motion then adopted by voice vote. Helen Johnson asked that it show in the record that a standing ovation of thanks be given to the members of the Rescue Squad for their efforts in raising this money. It was done.

ARTICLE 26 Richard Corning moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Charles Bailey seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 27 Jean Lane moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Highway Safety Capital Reserve Fund (cruiser). Raymond Caron seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

Recess for half-hour lunch period. Moderator first cautions the audience that if they have plans to reconsider an article, to tell him so at an early time so the audience has advance notice of this.

ARTICLE 28 Raymond Caron moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, (town truck). Charles Bailey seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 29 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,343.64 to establish a capital reserve fund for the future construction of a fire station, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$18,343.64 from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to use as a setoff against this budget appropriation. George Stanhope seconds. Mr. Behm asks if the town now owns a suitable piece of land. Answer, No. Now looking for a site. Fire Chief Calef explains that we need two stations in town to keep our good insurance rating of having the majority of homes no more than five miles from a fire station. This new building should be at the Narrows end of town and would have three bays. Present house there is too small and hasn't a strong enough foundation for present heavy truck. John Newman reminds them of the congestion in the Narrows especially at school bus time. Chief Calef also speaks of the hazards of having the station right on Rt. 4. Moderator reminds us that this is just an article to set aside the money, not to build this year. Alan Thomson prefers using tax money for the Capital Reserve Fund to avoid restrictions on how to build the building. Walter Crandall says we cannot use Revenue Sharing Funds to relieve regular tax items. Mr. Post believes we can spend Revenue Sharing Funds on anything the Town spends money on. Max Suberi asks for the consequences of not building a new fire station. Chief Calef replies that the foundation is cracked and the floor dropping. They will have to spend some money to fix the floor this year. John Newman queries if this has been given to a study committee. The answer is that it was studied by last year's Space Needs Committee and this is the result of their recommendation. Mr. William Johnson says, "Let's rally round the Fire Boys." Motion adopted by show of hands 70 YES 14 NO.

ARTICLE 30 Charles Bailey moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Lawrence Tasker, Jr. seconds. Money from the Revenue Sharing Funds has not been allocated to this project this year. Andreas Turner reminded them that the Computer Study Committee's report is on Page 100-105 in the Town Report. Motion adopted by show of hands 80 YES 14 NO.

ARTICLE 31 Vincent Bane moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Lawrence Tasker, Jr. seconds. Walter Crandall says we are now at 66% ratio of assessment to market value. Also, no inside improvements are adjusted until reappraisal. Mr. Stanhope asks if there is no inside appraisal, why have they been to his house twice? Marcia Tasker asks why the inventory blanks don't take care of changes like these? Motion adopted by a show of hands 60 YES 32 NO.

Back to ARTICLE 1 Alan Thomson moved that the Town raise the sum of \$221,320.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and to authorize the withdrawal of \$2,065.00 from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for the Police Department, as a setoff against the budgeted appropriation for the Police Department. Charles Bailey seconds.

True Chesley moved to amend this sum by reducing the \$221,320.00 figure by \$9,130.00, making it \$212,190.00. W. Crandall seconds. The reduction figures are explained as follows: \$2,400.00 deducted from third Selectman's salary; \$700.00 added for cash register for Tax Collector; \$1,500.00 added for updating Trustee of Trust Funds records; \$1,000.00 for increase in legal fees; \$2,265.00 reduction in Police Department; \$2,000.00 reduction in Welfare Assistance; \$1,000.00 reduction in Old Age Assistance; \$315.00 increase in Social Security; \$715.00 reduction in Unemployment Compensation; \$1,200.00 decrease in Insurance and \$3,065.00 reduction in Police Retirement. Amendment passes by unanimous voice vote.

Moderator received notice that Article 4 would be moved to reconsider. Moderator Johnson reminds us that he notified the people that if they wanted to reconsider an article, to give notice in timely fashion. He had given such notice more than once and that now they wait until we are half-way through Article 1 to come with the request for reconsideration. Therefore the Moderator is ruling that this motion to reconsider Article 4 will not be entertained.

Again back to ARTICLE 1 Donald Post amends the article to strike out the original figure of \$2,065.00 and replace it with the figure \$20,065.00 so that the last part of the article would now read, "and to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,065.00 from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for the Police Department as a setoff against the budgeted appropriation for the Police Department". Vincent Bane seconds. Amendment passed by voice vote. Now main motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 32 Jean Lane moves to indefinitely postpone this article. George Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 33 Jean Lane moved that the Town call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Northwood, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire. Charles Bailey seconds. Max Suberi amends the article to read after the word CONVENE, "a joint committee of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preparing legislative proposals to prevent the imposition of huge increases in the cost of our electricity". William Johnson seconds. Mr. Thomson fears the possibility of bankruptcy for Public Service. Keith Lidback cites the soaring costs of Seabrook from original \$900 million to \$9 billion. He feels the governors, legislature and P.U.C. are all guilty. He mentioned the availability of the St. James hydro-electric system. Senator Johnson has talked with Senate President Vesta Roy and Governor Sununu and he believes this amendment would be more productive than a Special Session, so that when the Legislature did meet, they would be able to accomplish something definite. Mrs. Herron believes a Special Session would interfere with the Primary and just turn into a political time. Amendment passed by unanimous voice

vote. Main motion passed by a unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 34 Robert Herron moved to authorize the Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed, by public auction or by advertised sealed bid, or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Veronica Post seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 35 Theresa Herron moved that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in R.S.A. 31:95-6. Charles Bailey seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

Robert Herron moved to reconsider Article 3. Frances Newman seconds. John Newman explained the Neighborhood Watch Program. He cites the fact that our Police Budget has increased 169% from 1978. Bruce Weeks feels this program requires full-time police to answer our calls. Mr. Crandall believes we watch each others places now without need of stickers. Mr. Frary feels the stickers might be a deterrent. The question of liability and insurance was discussed. Chief Shafer feels we don't have the personnel at present to have the program work well. Ann White says that since it is the only thing we are getting for free, why not try it for a year? Motion to reconsider prevailed by a show of hands 51 YES 19 NO. Robert Herron moved that the Town establish a Neighborhood Watch Program and use approximately \$200.00 out of the Police Budget to purchase the necessary materials and to not consider a full-time police department for a minimum of two years, at the end of which time a report on the Neighborhood Watch Program, complete with records of what coverage has been accomplished as far as stickers in place, valuables identification program, main entry route signs and general evaluation shall be submitted by January 1986, for review by the citizens of Northwood. Lawrence Tasker, Jr. seconds. Mr. Chesley suggests rewording the article. Keith Lidback amends the article to delete the phrases following "establish a Neighborhood Watch Program" down to "a minimum of two years". The elected phrases were "and use approximately \$200.00 out of the Police Budget to purchase the necessary materials and to not consider a full-time Police Department". Max Suberi seconds. Charles Frary suggests this program may show us the need of a full-time police officer. Amendment passed by a voice vote. Main motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 36 Charles Johnson moved that the Board of Selectmen be instructed to investigate an appropriate and adequate public address system, along with cost and present their findings at the next Town Meeting, 1985, and that they prepare a warrant article to cover the system and its cost. Jean Lane seconds. Motion adopted by a voice vote.

It was announced that word of Miss Gardner's honor from the Senate was phoned to her at the hospital. She was

thrilled and gave us the good news that she will be home this coming week.

Meeting adjourned by unanimous voice vote at 3:45 p.m.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements of the Town of Northwood, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1984, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Northwood, New Hampshire at December 31, 1984, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Northwood, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined and combining fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 1984

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are Federal Revenue Sharing, Conservation Commission, and Special Trust Income funds.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust Funds - Trust Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust by the Town.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets)

All governmental funds and expendable trust funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly,

they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue Funds and Expendable Trust Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the Town. Exceptions to this general rule include accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay. All Nonexpendable Trust funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. However, contrary to generally accepted accounting principles, it has not been the practice of the Town to adopt an annual budget for all Special Revenue funds; namely the Special Trust Income Fund.

The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning fund balance to achieve that end. In 1984, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures; and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year. The reserve for encumbrances at December 31 consists of the following:

F. Inventories

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

G. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

Vacation and sick pay is not accrued in the governmental funds using the modified accrual basis of accounting. There is no accrued vacation or sick leave. Each permanent employee must take their annual vacation leave within the calendar year. Sick leave is granted at the rate of seven days per year.

H. Taxes Collected For Others

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the School District and Rockingham County which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town.

I. Property Taxes

The National Council on Governmental Accounting, Interpretation 3, referring to property tax revenue recognition, requires disclosure if property taxes receivable, which are to be collected beyond a period of 60 days subsequent to December 31, 1984, are recognized on the balance sheet and not reserved. In accordance with the practice followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Northwood annually recognizes, without reserve, all tax receivables at the end of the fiscal year. The Town feels this practice of accrual is justified

as it more appropriately matches the liability to the school district entity at December 31, with collections which are intended to finance these payments through June 30 of the following year.

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident taxes, known as overlay. The amount raised in 1984 was \$6,891 and expenditures amounted to \$11,660.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

J. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has transactions between funds, including expenditures, to provide services. The accompanying fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

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REPORT OF THE CEMETERY TRUSTEES

The following report is submitted for the Cemetery Committee.

Mr. Jerry Belmonté, elected to the committee resigned due to leaving Town. Mrs. Thelma Eatough was appointed until March 1985.

During the year, the Cemetery Committee met on an as required basis to conduct the business of the cemeteries.

Pine Grove Cemetery has been much improved over the past several years. The land is now suitable for the purpose intended. A maintenance program will be required to prevent shrubs and trees from encroaching on the cleared area.

The sale of lots in Pine Grove Cemetery is restricted to residents of the Town of Northwood at the time of sale. Prior residents of Northwood requesting to purchase a lot are being refused by the Cemetery Committee. Any such person so refused may make application to the Selectmen for waiver of this policy. Each such request will be evaluated on its own merits by the Selectmen and the decision of the Selectmen will be final. It will be far easier for persons knowing they wish to be buried in the Town to secure a lot while they are in residence.

Pine Grove Cemetery was established to provide for the personal needs of the Northwood Family. The prices of cemetery lots are remarkably reasonable, especially when one considers that they include perpetual care. There have been occasions when lots were purchased to provide burial places for non-resident individuals and families. This action only serves to deprive the Northwood citizen of space and to require early purchase of additional land for cemetery purposes. The following Committee policy has been initiated to prevent future sale or use of lots by unauthorized persons. Cemetery lots will be sold only to individual residents of the Town of Northwood. The number of lots sold to any individual will not exceed apparent need. (i.e. a family of six will not be sold two eight grave lots). Any person so refused has the right to appeal to the Selectmen. The Selectmen will evaluate each case on its own merits and the decision of the Selectmen will be final.

As a matter of information, the Fairview Cemetery is completed. There are no additional lots for sale. The committee is not aware of any plans by anyone to provide additional cemetery space in any other location of the Town. Additionally, we have no lots for sale in any cemetery except Pine Grove.

NORTHWOOD CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1984 REPORT

The Conservation Commission, in an effort to determine how they could best help owners in the management and conservation of their woodlots, sent a questionnaire to all Northwood woodlot owners with holdings of ten acres or more. This resulted in the May 5th Commission-sponsored program, "You, Your Woodlot and Wildlife", with speaker Phil Auger, the County Extension Forester. This was followed by a management demonstration in the Coe-Brown Academy woodlot. Further information and literature was dispatched by the Extension Service to those interested in various woodlot programs.

More shrubs were planted in the Town Parade for Arbor Day and an evergreen which had been winter-killed was replaced in the foundation planting of the Town Hall.

The Wetlands Committee attended four meetings: the Ground-water Management Conference; the Tufts N. England Environmental Program on Wetlands; the Municipal meeting on Septic Systems, Wetlands and Protection; and the seminar on Management of Town Lands: Solutions to Common Problems. Work for plans on assessing Town wetlands continues.

Acid rain conditions in Northwood continue to be checked periodically.

A successful Mountain Day was held on October 6, with over 40 attending. Frank Mitchell, of the Soil Conservation Service, was an on-the-trail speaker. The BOAC (Bettering Our American Communities) of Coe-Brown mapped the trail up Saddleback Mountain and had copies made for future use.

The Commission regularly checks on Town-owned lands and a rotation of members regularly attends the Planning Board Meetings.

The Commission helped the Sportsmen's Club in sponsoring a fishing derby for children. It also sent an FFA student to Youth Conservation Camp and helped with a field day project for elementary schools.

The President of the New Hampshire Conservation Commission sent the Northwood Conservation Commission a letter of commendation for its outstanding activity.

NORTHWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENT
A REPORT TO THE TOWNSPEOPLE

In 1984 for the first time in Northwood's history, your Fire Department and Rescue Squad responded to an average of more than a call a day. Of the 371 calls that the two organizations responded to, 57 of them were motor vehicle accidents. Chimney, grass and brush fires all showed large increases over past years.

We are finding it much harder for personnel to respond to the number of calls we now run. Not many people can afford to leave work to respond everyday and then have to leave their families at all hours of the night for an ambulance or fire call. Last year as Fire Chief I put over 5,000 miles on my personal vehicle while conducting Fire Department business.

We are very grateful to the businesses in town that still allow workers to leave during the day for fire calls. If calls continue to increase dramatically, we must accept the fact that the town may be faced with having to hire two men weekdays between 9 and 5 to man the ambulance and fight fires. This is what the small towns of Gilmanton, Raymond, Gilford and Belmont do now.

We all know the burden of property taxes and what they can do to a family budget. The Fire Department has kept its operating budget trim, rising only 9% in four years. The new fire station will be paid in installments over three years, easing the burden of paying for a new building all at once.

The Fire Department was deeply saddened by the loss of Special Deputy Leon Seward this past year. The new fire station will be named in his honor and a memorial fund has been started in his name. Leon gave many years of his life protecting the homes and lives of Northwood residents. Help us honor him by building the Seward Memorial Station in the Narrows.

We ask you for your continued support at Town Meeting and if any of you feel that you could give a little time for your fellow citizens, please come to our next meeting. We need your support now more than ever.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

NORTHWOOD BOARD OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

ANNUAL REPORT 1984

In 1984 the Northwood Libraries added 750 books to our collection through funds, gifts and appropriations from the Town. Ninety-six hundred items were circulated for use during the year 1984.

In May of 1984, the Northwood Board of Library Trustees accepted with regret the resignation of Christia Glagolev as Librarian. Mrs. Edith Cummings was selected to be the new Librarian.

The Trustees attended a policy-making workshop on "Material Selection, Public Service and Personnel", sponsored by the New Hampshire Library Trustee Association and held in Laconia in October. The workshop was most informative and has resulted in the updating of some of our policies.

A new policy on overdue books was put into effect this year. "A fee determined by the Trustees and Librarian will be charged for overdue materials, with a maximum charge for those materials drastically overdue. Fines for lost or damaged materials will be determined by replacement cost plus service charge. The patron is responsible for borrowed materials or equipment that is the property of the Bryant-Chesley Libraries or borrowed through Interlibrary Loan." The regulations for borrowing library materials have also been updated.

New library hours have been put into effect. Chesley Library is now open on Monday evenings and to accommodate the children at the Brookside School, the Bryant Library is open one afternoon a week so they may walk to the library for books and story hours.

A yearly rental contract was signed with Brodart McNaughton Book Co. for new books. These books will arrive ready to circulate, thus allowing the librarian to spend more time on book selection and program planning. Mrs. Cummings has been taking a library techniques course in children's literature in Portsmouth. The Town and School District are sharing expenses for the training.

The libraries have had exceptional care by our custodian, Mr. Johnson. Windows and sills have been repaired. The leak in the Chesley Library basement has been repaired by Bailey & Co. A new lavatory and a new clock were installed at the Chesley Library. The Bryant Library has had window and blind repairs.

Our thanks for a good year and hopes for an even more productive one go to our librarian, her volunteers, the custodian and our townspeople.

REPORT OF THE NORTHWOOD PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board held 14 subdivision hearings during 1984, of which one was rejected and forwarded to the Board of Adjustment for a variance because of the lack of frontage on Route 4 and a Right-of-Way requirement. A special meeting was held regarding one subdivision and the concerns of Town Counsel relative to the rights of the original owners of the subdivided lots.

Article 3:1 - Subdivision Review Procedures #13. was amended in March to read: The Planning Board shall require a subdivider to bring a Class 6 highway up to Class 5 standards in accordance with the State of New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highway design standards of Class 5 highways, before approving the subdivision plans. No building permits will be issued until the Class 6 highway has been upgraded to Class 5 standards.

Also amended in March: Article 3:1, #7.a. It shall be the duty of the Planning Board to allow for lot consolidation or lot line elimination, permitting a person with two or more lots to combine them to create one larger lot, creating one deed, for which a survey plan must be presented to the Board for approval.

REPORT AND MINUTES OF THE NORTHWOOD HIGHWAY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Northwood Highway Advisory Committee met at the Town Hall on October 8, 1984. The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by A. John Lane, Chairman.

The minutes of the April 17, 1984 meeting were reviewed and accepted by the committee.

Markarian, Shaw, Makarewicz and Smith were placed first on the agenda. They presented their common concerns regarding the condition of Old Turnpike Road, summarized as follows:

1. The condition of Old Turnpike Road warrants serious consideration for upgrading by the committee. The road base is poor. Some sections are subject to inadequate drainage. Width and sight distance are poor on some sections. Guard rail is lacking at critical areas.

2. Due to development, traffic is increasing on Old Turnpike Road. Some specific safety measures would be appropriate, including (a) a posted speed limit reduction from 25 mph to 20 mph, (b) the installation of caution signs at blind spots, (c) the installation of a minimum cost, rustic guardrail (i.e. timber and concrete poured in sonatube) at the 1984 wash-out site near the Makarewicz property, (d) roadside drainage improvements in the vicinity of new driveways which are showing early wash-out signs and (e) culvert design improvements in front of the Kane property.

3. Markarian specifically sought a commitment on the part of the town to plow beyond his property, located in Epsom.

4. A more consistent effort should be made to remove debris from the stone culvert. Smith stated he removes what he can, but larger objects require town attention, particularly during high water conditions, to preclude future wash-outs.

Richardson stated that:

1. Old Turnpike Road is slated for some improvement measures before the end of this year. A new culvert had just been installed (10-8-84). A party has been hired to cut brush. Grading will occur now that dry weather has passed.

2. Completely regravelling the entire road is too expensive (an estimated \$20,000 to \$30,000 in materials alone).

3. Guard rail installation is often restricted by limited road width. Snow removal can not occur unless the guard rail can be set back an appropriate distance.

4. Speed limits less than 30 mph can not be enforced and limits less than 25 mph can not be posted.

5. All new driveways on Old Turnpike Road are subject to permit. All permits require appropriate drainage design. If new driveways are in danger of washing out, they were constructed without an appropriate design, as called for on the permit. The property owner is responsible for needed culvert installation.

6. The town will look at the accumulated debris problem at the stone culvert and take appropriate action.

7. The town plow must continue past the Markarian property in order to turn around. Epsom has contacted Northwood about this, due to their access being shut off by the placement of three large boulders. This is a poor method insofar as emergencies, but it is completely within the rights of the property owner who took the action.

8. Old Turnpike Road is recommended for further upgrading in 1985.

Markarian, Shaw, Markarewicz and Smith thanked the committee for the consideration and left the meeting.

Richardson then presented his summary of road work completed this year:

- Rebuilt and surfaced 208' of Gulf Road
- Surfaced section of Lower Deerfield Road, 800'
- Shimmed Lucas Pond Road
- Installed new culvert on Ridge Road
- Shimmed section of Harmony Road (Thomas to Wallman's)
- Rebuilt and surfaced section of Canterbury Road
- Surfaced Tasker Hill Road to town line
- Tarred east end of Old Pittsfield Road, 1,000'
- Graded and raked all gravel roads as required
- Repaired stone walls on Bennett's Bridge

Richardson commented that he has not yet completed the bridge railings or shimmed Bow Lake Road as planned, due to lack of funds.

However, it appears that all essential jobs have been accomplished.

Richardson presented his list of work which ought to be accomplished during 1985:

- Tar Jenness Pond Road
- Tar Old Pittsfield Road
- Tar Upper Bow Street
- Shim Mountain Road
- Shim Bow Lake Road
- Upgrade Old Turnpike Road
- Upgrade Canterbury Road (west end)
- Improve ditches by blasting ledge on Mountain Road
- Improve ditches by blasting ledge on Range Road
- Cut elm trees

Based on last year's recommended three year plan, shimming Pender Hill Road was added to the above list.

No other additions or deletions were suggested for this list.

The next committee meeting was scheduled for Monday, October 22, 1984, at 7:00 P.M. at the town hall.

It was agreed to schedule the public meeting for Monday, November 5, 1984, at 7:00 P.M. at the town hall.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:23 P.M.

REPORT OF THE CABLE TELEVISION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

As of the 1984 Town Meeting, the committee expected that Lakes Cablevision Company, Inc. would succeed in installing the cable system in Northwood by the dates provided in the original franchise, i.e. mid-November 1984. However, the Public Service Company of New Hampshire (PSNH), which had to define the pole work to be paid for by Lakes Cablevision was very slow doing that. When PSNH did deliver their pole work estimates in mid-November, Lakes Cablevision immediately paid them for the required work. Since then, PSNH has been installing taller poles where necessary and otherwise preparing for installation of the television cables. As of mid-January 1985, the pole preparation work was reported by PSNH to be 75% complete. If PSNH completes their work by the first of March 1985, Lakes Cablevision estimates they will have service completed for Northwood within six months from that date.

When the original franchise was signed, it provided for an initial service of only 12 channels as was then provided in Pittsfield. Now, with Pittsfield upgraded to 24 channels, the initial service in Northwood will also be 24 channels.

REPORT OF THE LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

The Directors of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative are please to report that the incinerator/energy recovery plant located on the University of New Hampshire campus is operating on a continuous twenty-four hour, seven day a week schedule.

The day-to-day operation is carried out under the supervision of the Cooperative's Administrator, under the general supervisory control of the three-member Operations Committee from the Joint Board of Directors. The plant personnel, in addition to the Administrator, includes two mechanics, a truck driver, two daily shifts of 12 hours each involving 8 persons, plus daily clean-up crew. This organization operates the incinerator system, maintains records, and coordinates with the University's Power Plant staff to monitor the boiler and steam production elements of the plant. The Cooperative's organization also handles the collection of refuse from the transfer stations of five communities, and handles the ash removal and its transfer to the landfill site.

During 1984 modifications were made to plant piping which has increased steam production and revenue. Preventive maintenance during the year included replacing the refractory in the three lower chambers and it is anticipated that the upper chambers will be done in 1985.

The latest word received from the University Concerning Cogeneration is that UNH will quite likely purchase and maintain the turbine and generator which will provide the Cooperative with a market for excess steam during the warmer months.

The operations committee welcomes Norman LeClerc of Somersworth as a member and wishes to say Thank you to Robert Low of Northwood for his years of assistance on the Committee.

The Directors of the Coperative wish to express their deep appreciation for the assistance given their efforts by the University's staff as well as the officers and personnel of the co-operating towns. Every effort will be continued to keep the residents of the region informed of the progress in the collection, processing and disposal of the waste which is being handled at the plant.

REPORT ON NORTHWOOD PARTICIPATION IN THE LAMPREY REGIONAL
SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

Of special note for 1984 was the fact that actual costs to the Town of Northwood very closely matched the budgetary estimates of the Cooperative's staff and the Joint Board of Directors. The maturing of the historical data base and the estimating process that this reflects is apparent also in the overall figures for estimated versus actual steam sales and estimated versus actual tons of waste from all member towns. While these conclusions are based upon figures for the first 11 months of the year and final audit for the total year may change the expected situation slightly, it appears that the maturing of the data base and estimating process will have terminated the past history of significant annual deficits.

Because of the maturing discussed above, the Town of Northwood can have confidence in the Lamprey budget estimates for 1985 which reflect an expected growth of 3.4% in the tonnage delivered to Lamprey from Northwood. In dollar terms, the total estimates for Northwood for 1985 are \$21,386 based on tonnage and \$2,997 for hauling.

All but one of the other member towns is expected to have some increase in their tonnage of waste delivered to Lamprey in 1985. The only member of the Cooperative experiencing an actual tonnage for 1984 (and having an estimated tonnage for 1985) lower than previously expected is the City of Somersworth which joined the Cooperative late by paying an initial amount corresponding to the capital investment it would have made had it been a member from the beginning.

Notable investments approved by the Joint Board of Directors in 1984 were a specially designed boiler cleaning machine expected to pay for itself in less than a year through increased steam sales and a new side dump bucket for the tipping floor loader which will preclude an expensive shutdown in case of failure of the original aging unit (to be retained as a spare). No decisions were possible relative to the previously discussed electricity cogeneration idea because the University of New Hampshire is still studying their options. Only when they make decisions will Lamprey be in a position to decide whether and how it could profitably participate.

NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center is requesting that the Town of Northwood raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 from the 1985 general town revenue in continuation of its support for the services of the Health Center. The Health Center will use these funds for our Senior Citizen Transportation Service, providing transportation to the elderly and handicapped.

The Senior Citizen Transportation Service has enabled seniors to remain independent, self-sufficient and active through the provision of transportation to needed services, including medical, shopping and recreational trips. It is the goal of this service to eliminate barriers which frequently obstruct elderly and handicapped individuals from maintaining self-sufficiency.

In 1984, over 542 rides were provided to Northwood senior citizens. The Newmarket Regional Health Center now has five vans of which three are equipped with hydraulic lifts to accommodate individuals confined to wheelchairs. This service is available to Northwood residents.

Each dollar appropriated by Northwood has enabled the Newmarket Regional Health Center to provide these services to your town. We would appreciate your continued support and would be more than happy to provide any additional information which you may need.

The Newmarket Regional Health Center also operates a medical program providing primary health and social services. Maude Guerin, M. D., Obstetrician/Gynecologist, directs the Health Center's Prenatal Program, providing prenatal, delivery and post-partum care. The Health Center provides nutritional counseling, social services, and health education for expectant mothers. These services are available to Northwood residents, and in 1984, over 87 medical office visits were made by Northwood residents.

RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC.

ANNUAL REPORT - 1984

The Board of Directors of the Rural District Health Council has voted to hold the per-capita tax for its member towns of Barrington, Strafford, Milton, New Durham, Middleton, Farmington, Northwood, Nottingham and Deerfield to \$3.25. Even though the budget is up a little over 12%, the agency has added funding from the United Way of Strafford County, State Council on Aging, State Bureau of Maternal and Child Health, billing process, generous donations and memorial contributions.

The agency is a certified home health agency and provides skilled nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, medical social services, home health aides and has a comprehensive Hospice program, certified by Blue Cross-Blue Shield and GE insurance.

The staff has made 5,604 visits in the Care of the Sick program and 74 skilled nursing visits and 767 home health aide hours in the Hospice program.

With the DRG'S (Diagnostic Related Groupings) being implemented in the hospitals, home care has seen an increase with a change in the type of referrals made. More Hi-Tech nursing is being done in the home. The agency has a 24 hour answering service with a nurse available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and home visits made as indicated.

The agency also provides an elderly maintenance health program. There are 211 patients enrolled in this program which includes health counseling of medications, monitoring blood pressure, weight checks, diet teaching for weight loss and blood testing of diabetes. 521 visits have been provided. This year the council administered 131 influenza shots to the elderly and found this to be a great success and will be implemented as an ongoing service in this program.

The agency also provides a Child Health program with 746 children enrolled from the ages of 0-6 years. This program includes physical examinations, immunizations, growth and development, counseling with referrals made to other community and state agencies for direct services as needed. The agency also works closely with the school nurses and provides immunization for school children. There have been 1,035 children seen at clinic with 556 home visits made. The program also offers a Dental Clinic twice a year for children 3-6 years of age.

A bequest to the Council may be made to further the general purpose of the Rural District Health Council. In lieu of flowers, a memorial donation may be made in memory of a loved one. All gifts to the agency are income tax deductible. The Board of Directors and staff want to thank the families of the following for naming memorial contributions in their names: Sonia DiPrizio,

1984 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

MARCH 10, 1984

The meeting was called to order at 9:05 a.m. at the Northwood Elementary School, by Moderator Robert Johnson. Mr. Johnson read the School Warrant, and stated that we would take up Articles 1 through 4, and then skip to Article 9, and then back to the regular order, as these are money articles.

ARTICLE 1 To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Bunny Behm moved that we accept all reports. Seconded by Mrs. E. Cummings. Passed by a verbal vote. Article - Adopted.

ARTICLE 2 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to receive and expend during the current 1983-84 fiscal year, the sum of four thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$4,254.00) in unanticipated Federal School Lunch reimbursements for the purpose of purchasing kitchen equipment and providing a portion of operating expenses. (Supplemental Article - recommended by the Budget Committee). Mrs. Terry Herron moved that we accept this article. Seconded by Ronnie Post. PASSED by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 3 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to receive and expend, during the current 1983-84 school year, unanticipated special education tuition in the amount of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00). (Supplemental article - not recommended by the Budget Committee). Don Post moved to postpone this article. Seconded by Robert Herron. Jean Johnson asked for an explanation. Mrs. Behm stated that the School Board "goofed", but it was needed money, otherwise they would be going over their budget. After much discussion, a vote was taken on Don Post's motion to postpone this article. A vote by show of hands YES - 13, NO - 40. His motion was defeated. Jean Johnson moved that we accept Article 3 as written. This was seconded by Charles Johnson. A verbal vote was taken and the article was passed.

ARTICLE 4 To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for a contingency fund as provided by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-b. Bunny Behm moved that we accept this article as read. A verbal vote was taken and the article was passed.

ARTICLE 9 To see if the School District will appropriate the sum of approximately four hundred and thirty six dollars and thirty-two cents (\$436.32) for payment of child benefit services provided by the Dover and Concord School Districts to students who are residents of this School District, and who attend St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Dover, N. H. and/or Bishop Brady High School in Concord, N. H., and further authorize the School Board to apply for any grant from the State as provided under RSA 198:21 in accordance with the guidelines published by the Department of Education.

At this time, Moderator Johnson introduced Coe-Brown Academy's Basketball Coach Walter Damon, who introduced each player.

Moderator Johnson stated that Tom Conway's Elementary School Basketball team, as well as Coe-Brown Academy, both had winning basketball teams and both teams were playing their "final game" today. "Good Luck".

Richard Lilly made a motion that we recess this meeting by noon time today, and reconvene at 7:30 p.m. next Wednesday, March 14, 1984. This was seconded by Bunny Behm. A vote by show of hands YES - 42 NO - 9, Motion passed. Ronnie Post asked that we consider changing the school meetings, in the future, so as not to interfere with the Coe-Brown Academy games. No action was taken on this.

ARTICLE 9 Tom Madson moved that we accept this article, and Don Post seconded. True Chesley questioned the legality as to the way this article was presented, and stated it should be included under Article 5. Tom Madson asked to amend the article to read: "To see if School District will vote to participate in the Child Benefit Services provided by the Dover and Concord School Districts to students who are residents of this school district and who attend St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Dover, N. H. and/or Bishop Brady High School in Concord, N. H., and further authorize the school board to apply for any grant from the State as provided under RSA 198:22, in accordance with guidelines published by the Department of Education. This was seconded by R. Lilly. A show of hands vote was taken on the amendment YES - 24, NO - 26. Moderator Johnson felt that this vote was very close, so a YES - NO ballot was taken. 64 votes were cast YES - 32 NO - 32 a tie. Motion does not prevail. The Moderator does not have to vote. Moderator Johnson recognized Alan Thomson, Chairman of the Budget Committee, who stated the new changes by the legislature of the powers of the Budget Committee that occurred this year, as a result of a judicial decision that was made in Coos County; should be resolved the Collective Bargaining Laws of N. H. & Municipal Budget Committee Law, that the Budget Committee no longer has the power to make any changes in negotiated settlement items. These items include the following: 1. TEACHERS SALARIES - 1000 (subline 1102), 2. Health Insurance - 1000 (subline 2110), 3. FICA - Social Security - 1000 (subline 2300), 4. Athletics - 1400 (subline 1102), 5. School Nurse Salary - 2000 (subline 1103), 6. Teaching Tuition - 2200 (subline 2210), 7. Life Insurance - 2900 (subline 2110).

ARTICLE 5 To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the school, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of this district. Bunny Behm moved that we raise a total of \$1,242,419.00 (this includes the \$12,000.00 from Article 3). Seconded by R. Lilly. Phyllis Thomson asked if this includes Life Insurance? and Richard Lilly explained that it's part of the negotiation. Terry Herron made a motion that the School Board go back to negotiations with the teachers. Seconded by Robert Herron. A recess was called while Mrs. Herron prepared her budget cuts. Mrs. Herron re-stated her amendment to re-negotiate and made a motion that a total of \$61,000.00 be removed from the budget as follows: Line 1102 Teachers salaries - \$42,000.00, (Special Ed. and Reg.), Line 1000-2110 Health Insurance - \$7,000.00, Line 1000-2300 FICA - \$2,000.00, 7% of \$42,000.00, Line 1103 Tuition -

\$8,000.00, Line 2200-2210 Teachers Tuition - \$1,000.00, Line 2900-2100 Life Insurance - \$1,000.00, Total of \$61,000.00 to be subtracted from \$1,242,419.00 to make the new total to be raised \$1,181,419.00. After much discussion, Moderator Johnson called for a vote on Mrs. Herron's amendment by ballot vote. YES - 27, NO - 38, total of 65 votes cast. Amendment does not prevail. Mrs. Ronnie Post made a motion that we take up each item, Line by Line. This was seconded by Mr. Herron. Moderator Johnson called for a show of hands, YES - 11, NO - 35, motion does not pass. Moderator Johnson called for a vote on the main motion to \$1,242,419.00. A vote by show of hands, YES - 37, NO - 12. The main motion passed.

This meeting was recessed until 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 14, 1984.

ARTICLE 6 To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1983-1984 fiscal year. Said sum of money will be deposited in a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with the provisions of RSA 35 for the purpose of financing capital improvements as well as all or part of the cost of new construction for the School District. Mrs. Behm so moved, seconded by Richard Lilly. A verbal vote was taken and the Article passed.

ARTICLE 7 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to negotiate a long term tuition contract with Coe-Brown Northwood Academy for Northwood students in grades 9 thru 12. Mr. Robert Herron moved that we indefinitely postpone this article. Seconded by Don Post. John Lane asked for an explanation from the School Board. Richard Lilly stated that over the years 97% of our students have gone and are going to Coe-Brown Academy, and a contract would be more binding, we would be guaranteed that our children would have a high school to go to. Jean Johnson stated that Pinkerton Academy has contracts with other towns with no apparent problems. Doug Briggs asked if Coe-Brown Acad. had requested a contract? and the School Board replied, "yes". Ann White asked if we could send our youngsters to another high school if they so desired? The School Board replied, "under certain circumstances or for Trade schools, they would be able to go." Lois DeTrude (a Coe-Brown Acad. Trustee) spoke on the many changes Coe-Brown Academy has made in recent years, and spoke, also, on the new building program that the Academy is about to undertake. Lee Mason and Gordon Smart both spoke about the many changes and improvement in the educational programs at Coe-Brown Academy. Mr. Smart, also, mentioned that other towns in the area, are interested in a contract with the Academy, and if this should happen, then Coe-Brown Academy could tell Northwood to send their high school students elsewhere, and then we could be in a real bind.

Moderator Johnson called for a show of hands on Mr. Herron's motion "to indefinitely postpone this article". YES - 5, NO - 44. Motion did not pass. John Lane moved the motion as was read, and seconded by Charles Johnson. Tom Madson amended the article to include "The body of this contract to be presented and voted on at the 1985 School District meeting". Doug Briggs asked for a committee of 7

including the School Board. John Lane asked to have the word "Negotiated" deleted and insert, "discuss and work out a long term proposal tuition contract". Tom Madson stated that there would be a Public hearing in October and at the January Budget Committee meeting. After much discussion, Moderator Johnson called for a vote on the amended article, "The School District hereby authorizes the School Board to appoint a committee of 7 persons, to include the School Board, from within the School District to discuss and work out a proposed contract between the School District and Coe-Brown Academy for Northwood students in grades 9 through 12. The body of the contract to be presented and voted upon at the 1985 School District Meeting". A vote by show of hands. YES - 31, NO - 29. Motion prevails and accepted.

ARTICLE 8 To see if the voters of Northwood will direct the Moderator to appoint a committee of five to investigate the experience of the Town of Deerfield, and any other towns, with a four day school week, and to make a publicized report, by January 1985, and to place an article in the 1985 school warrant to consider its adoption for the 1985-86 school year; so that it may have full discussion at the school meetings in 1985. (By Petition). So moved by Ronnie Post and seconded by Mr. Lane. Vote by show of hands, NO - 40, YES - 17. Motion did not pass.

ARTICLE 10 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the district, such advances, grant-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or here after be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State agencies and/or other sources in accordance with the provisions of RSA 198:20-b. So moved by Don Post and seconded by Mr. Lilly. A verbal vote was taken and the article was accepted.

ARTICLE 11 To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. No action on this article.

ARTICLE 12 To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. Bob Herron moved that the next district meeting be held on the 1st Saturday in March. Seconded by Helen Johnson. A vote by show of hands YES - 8, NO - 37. Motion did not pass. The School Board mentioned an evening meeting for next year, and that was accepted by the people present. Mrs. Behm introduced our new School Board member, Richard Shaw, and then presented Tom Madson with a plaque which read: "Given in recognition and appreciation for the many years of dedicated public service in the pursuit of quality education for all the children of Northwood." Mr. Madson "thanked the Townspeople for their support, when needed, and their non-support when needed."

The meeting was adjourned at 9:35 p.m.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Northwood qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Northwood Elementary School in said district on the 4th day of March 1985, at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
2. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to receive and expend during the current fiscal year, the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in unanticipated Federal School Lunch reimbursements for the purpose of renovating the kitchen floor at the Northwood Elementary School. (Supplemental Article - recommended by the Budget Committee.)
3. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the original 1984-85 appropriation a sum of fifty-two thousand six hundred eleven dollars (\$52,611) to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1985, in order to meet unanticipated obligations caused by mandated Special Education tuition expenditures. (Deficit appropriation - recommended by the Budget Committee.)
4. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1984-85 fiscal year. Said sum of money will be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with the provisions of RSA:35 for the purpose of financing capital improvements as well as all or part of the cost of new construction for the School District.
5. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a contingency fund as provided by N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-b.
6. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three thousand two hundred dollars (\$3,200) for the purpose of reimbursing the Advent Christian Church on half the cost of renovating the upstairs floor of the Brookside School.
7. To see if the School District wishes to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the purpose of constructing a recreational field on the lower field, known as the Old Fairgrounds, located immediately behind the Northwood Elementary School for the mutual benefit and use of the School District and Community. It is the intent of this article to authorize the School Board to conduct whatever excavation, grading, feeding and other site improvements as deemed necessary to construct the field referenced above. (By petition)

8. To see if the School District wishes to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the purpose of constructing a recreational field on the lower field, known as the Old Fairgrounds, located immediately behind the Northwood Elementary School for the mutual benefit and use of the School District and Community. It is the intent of this article to authorize the School Board to conduct whatever excavation, grading, feeding and other site improvements as deemed necessary to construct the field referenced above, and furthermore, to direct the School Board to apply for, accept and expend off-setting revenue in the amount of five thousand (\$5,000) in Federal Land and Water Conservation Funds for the Recreational Field Project cited in Article 7 above. (Failure to receive approval for the five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in Federal Funds referred to above, will render this article null and void.)
9. To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.
10. To hear the report of the Coe-Brown Tuition Contract Committee and to see whether the voters of the District will vote to accept the contract recommended by said committee.
11. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to make application for and receive and expend, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State agencies; private agencies and/or other sources in accordance with the provisions of RSA 198:20-b.
12. To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
13. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

PROPOSED

Contract Between the
Northwood School District
and
Coe-Brown Northwood Academy

Contract made this _____th day of _____ 1985, by and between the Northwood School District, located in the County of Rockingham and the State of New Hampshire, and Coe-Brown Northwood Academy located in the County of Rockingham and the State of New Hampshire.

WITNESSETH: That

Whereas, said Northwood School District does not maintain a high school and is desirous of having its pupils in grades nine through twelve who seek a high school education attend Coe-Brown Northwood Academy located in the town of Northwood and has authorized its school board to make a contract for such high school education; and

WHEREAS, said Coe-Brown Northwood Academy has been approved as a comprehensive public academy by the Department of Education of the State of New Hampshire and, through its Board of Trustees, is willing to receive said pupils and afford them the complete course of instructional services now given in its high school.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED: That

Pupil Assignment Policy

The Northwood School District will send and Coe-Brown Northwood Academy will accept all of the pupils who are mutually agreed as qualified to attend grades 9 through 12 to said Academy. The District agrees that it will not pay tuition for any pupil in grades 9 through 12 to attend any other high school or academy during the term of said contract, except for handicapped and exceptional pupils requiring special schools or special facilities, pupils who desire special vocational training not offered at said Academy, pupils ordered by the State Board of Education to attend another school pursuant to RSA 193:3, and pupils from the District presently enrolled in a high school other than the Academy who will be permitted if they so elect, to complete their education at that high school. It is the Academy's intention to continue providing schooling for handicapped and exceptional pupils not requiring special schools or special facilities.

It is specifically agreed that from time to time by mutual agreement between the Academy and the School Board of the District, the School Board may assign any pupil or pupils to another high school, public or private, and the District may in such cases pay tuition for such pupils to attend such schools. Coe-Brown Northwood Academy will not charge tuition if pupils by mutual agreement, attend other schools.

AND IT FURTHER AGREED: That

Tuition Formula and Schedule of Payments

On or before December 30th of each year, the Treasurer of said Academy shall supply to the Northwood School Board a written estimate of the tuition charges for each pupil for the full succeeding school year based on projected operating costs. The projected operating costs shall not include costs of transportation, capital outlay nor repayment of principal and interest on debt. The District agrees to pay to the Academy such estimated tuition during the following school year in the following installments:

October 15	40% of the estimated tuition
February 15	40% of the estimated tuition
June 30	Remaining tuition due, based on per diem enrollment

School Board Representation on Education Committee

One Northwood School Board member shall participate as a voting member on the Coe-Brown Northwood Academy Education Committee for the purpose of curriculum coordination and other education concerns.

Scheduled Meetings

Regularly scheduled meetings between the Coe-Brown Academy Board of Trustees and the Northwood School Board shall be held at least two times per year.

Academy Requirements

The Academy agrees that during the term of this contract, it will provide a course of studies for grades 9-12 and such facilities and equipment so that at all times during the term of this contract the Academy (1) qualifies as a comprehensive high school according to the New Hampshire Statute (RSA 194:23.a) and (2) is working toward approval by the New England Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

Provisions of Special Education

The Academy will cooperate with the School District to continue to provide appropriate special education programming.

Dispute Resolution

In the event of any dispute arising out of the provisions of this contract between the parties, an arbitrator shall be appointed by mutual consent of both parties. The decision of the arbitrator shall be final.

Term of Contract/Option for Renewal/Approval

The term of this contract shall begin on 1 July 1985 and end on 30 June 1990 with option to renew for another five years.

This contract subject to the approval of the 1985 Northwood Annual School District meeting.

In addition there are 12 students attending Coe-Brown Academy's EMR program; 1-Great Bay Center; 1-Child Development Center of Strafford; 1-Concord Vocational High School; 1-Birchwood School in Derry; 1-Chamberlain School; 1-George B. White School and Strafford Learning Center Programs: TIP; 1-ASE; 1-PEP Barrington and 1 TAC III.

During the past year we have seen continuing discussion concerning the present state and future of public education. The deluge of national reports, newspaper articles, discussion programs and major state reform proposals concerning education have occupied a prominent position in the media. During this period of time we have continued a process of refining goals and objectives for the Northwood School District, conducting an ongoing curriculum review focusing on the areas of social studies, math, gifted and talented computer education, and evaluation of present planning and teaching techniques.

The continued progress of the Summer Institute program for a second year under the supervision of Assistant Superintendent Worthley has been an especially gratifying development. I fully expect the Summer Institute-85 program will involve an in-depth evaluation project conducted in conjunction with the Department of Education, University of New Hampshire at Durham. Mr. Worthley and I strongly believe School Administrative Unit #44 may be in the vanguard of a movement in public education to re-introduce thinking skills. As Edward DeBono cites in his article entitled, CRITICAL THINKING IS NOT ENOUGH published in the September, 1984 issue of EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP, "More and more schools in Canada, the United Kingdom, Eire, Australia and New Zealand are teaching thinking." School Administrative Unit #44 is one of the first School Administrative Units in the State to provide such experiences for its students. It is extremely important we continue our commitment to this program. Perhaps the most important gift we can bestow on our children is the ability to think.

As I have stated in previous reports, it is generally agreed effective schools must usually have five factors associated with them; building leadership, instructional leadership, a pleasing school climate, implied expectations of students and an effective monitoring system. We have continued to work closely with the principal and faculty to continue these characteristics and to improve and enhance professional growth activities. We have strongly encouraged principals and teachers to enroll in college courses, attend conferences and join state, regional and national professional organizations such as the New England Reading Association and the Principals Center at Harvard University.

A review of the Science Research Associates achievement test results convey a continuation of student growth in such areas as math, language arts and reading. In fact, Northwood has consistently been one of the leading districts in the Unit on the basis of Science Research Associates achievement results. We will continue to focus on the development of a variety of effective program evaluation procedures.

Article 10 of the Warrant addresses the report of the Coe-Brown Contract Committee. The members of the Committee and the Board of Trustees have devoted many hours to the preparation of the report. I urge you to give the strongest possible consideration to the Committee's presentation. I sincerely believe a long term relationship with the Academy is in the best interests of the District.

One of the major areas of public discussion is the issue of how we finance our schools. As many of you are aware, the Legislature is in session this year and one of the major pieces of legislation to be debated this session deals with the consolidation and reform of four current State Financial Aid programs for school districts known as the Augenblick Plan. This Plan provides for the consolidation of the current Foundation Aid, Sweepstakes, Direct Special Education and Business Profits Tax support programs. In addition to the consolidation of these four Financial Aid programs, the Augenblick Plan proposes an equitable method of distributing State funds to school districts. However, in order to fully implement the Augenblick Plan, the State must provide an additional 14 million dollars. If the Legislature passes the Augenblick Plan and the necessary 14 million dollar appropriation, the Northwood School District would receive over and above its current State revenue of \$47,306, the additional sum of \$95,554. I believe the implication for property tax relief is obvious. I strongly encourage all citizens to contact their Legislators and urge the adoption of these measures.

The School Administrative Unit Staff has continued to provide support and assistance in such areas as business management, special education coordination and supervision, negotiations, curriculum improvement and staff development programs.

Once again, we wish to express our appreciation to the members of the school board, principal, teachers, pupils and citizens for the cooperation exhibited during the past year. We look forward to a long and productive relationship in which our mutual goals will continue to be the best possible education for our young people.

In the areas of curriculum we have focused in on a complete review of our Social Studies program. The staff hopes to develop a program that is more relevant to students than the programs we have had in the past. One of the areas that is receiving national attention is the area of Problem Solving. It is the hope of our faculty to challenge students through creative thinking. This process will allow children to use their higher thinking skills in Problem Solving areas.

We are continuing to integrate Computer Education into the system. One of the drawbacks in the program is being able to train the staff in this area. We will have 10 computers at the middle of this year. We hope through club activities to reach a larger number of the student population with this program. There are many more exciting programs that teachers are working on.

Project T.A.L.K., a program based on language experience, is being piloted at our school by Mrs. Connie Ziko, our Speech Clinician.

Many teachers are actively involved in the U.N.H. writing program which we have found to be very successful. Students are writing more and they are enjoying the experience.

The elementary teachers have been working hard on a new Science curriculum for grades K-5. The program is now in operation and students are becoming more knowledgeable in the area of Science.

Our present re-alignment of the school into teams has been very satisfactory. This allows teachers in grades K-5 to work together with a Team Leader. The Leader for this group is Miss Nancy Osborne.

Our Middle School Team, consisting of Grades 6-7-8, work under the leadership of Ms. Rosemary Zurawel.

In the area of Special Education we have found that over the past year our population is growing. It has been the position of the Northwood School District to try to in-house as many of our students as we can. The number of students transferring in from other districts has put a tremendous load on our staff. This is an area which we are not alone in since there seems to be a trend on the national level toward an identification of more students who have learning problems.

Our Special Education Co-ordinator, Mrs. Anne Grabowski, has worked hard to keep this program working smoothly.

In the area of extra-curricular activities we have continued to provide our students with a wide variety of activities which includes athletics, music, drama and many other club activities. The success of these programs has always been very satisfying to me. I believe that in a small community the school must serve many purposes. Students who are provided opportunities to be involved in different activities do not find themselves getting into trouble.

As I finish my 16th year in Northwood, I am pleased and proud to be a part of the Northwood School system. Northwood is fortunate to have quality teachers and staff members. They are the foundation of the school, and I am proud of them. No school can run without the services of support personnel such as the secretarial, custodial and cafeteria workers. Their work is often unheralded but it is vital to the efficiency of the school as a whole. I am also appreciative of the support shown by the citizens of Northwood who have always supported quality education in the community.

A special thanks to the S.A.U. 44 staff headed by Superintendent of Schools, Barry Clough; Assistant Superintendents Leon Worthley and Gene Roddy and Special Education Consultant, Paul Campelia. Finally, I wish to commend the dedication and leadership of the Northwood School Committee. They have carried out

their duties responsibly, courageously, and always with the welfare of the students in mind. I look forward to continuing to work with them and with the people of Northwood on behalf of our school.

1983 - 1984

The Health Program for the year 1983-1984 began with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. This includes vision and hearing screening, ht. and wt., overall cleanliness, teeth, tonsils. Each student in grades 7 and 8 had their B/P checked. Those students in grades 5-8 were checked for possible Scoliosis.

DENTAL PROGRAM - This program is sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Health. Mrs. Linda Sawyer from Epsom again was the participating Hygienist for the cleaning and fluoride Clinic. There were 140 students who took advantage of the services provided. Several community groups also donated financial assistance to this worthwhile program, including the Harvey Lake Women's Club and Saddleback Mountain Lions Club.

IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM - Through the generosity of the Rural District Health Council, students are able to receive free immunizations. This is a very beneficial program and I would like to express my gratitude for this generous program. This year a total of 43 various immunizations were given through the RDHC or School Clinic.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES - Most childhood diseases are now eliminated through an ongoing school monitored immunization program. We did see approximately 40 cases of Chicken Pox and Head Lice continues to make an appearance as well. I would like to thank all parents for their cooperation.

HEALTH EDUCATION - Weekly visits were made to grades 1-5. Appropriate health related lessons and activities were carried out. The Family Living and Human Sexuality curriculum is enthusiastically received by students and parents. As part of V. D. and Substance Abuse education for the Jr. High students, lectures, film-strips, guest speakers and discussion periods were planned and carried out. The Sixth grade students completed the Red Cross Basic First Aid Course.

Continuing Education - Conference - Boston Mass. General Hospital - Pediatric Cancer.

I would like to express my thanks to the Superintendent, School Board Members, Teachers and Parents for their cooperation and support during this past year.

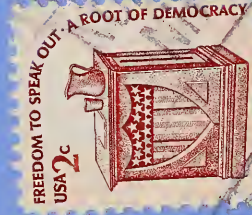
