THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the eighth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (.20) cents on and after September 1, 1955, on all unpaid 1955 poll taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.

6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano in this Town.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

(a) Edward Payson Kimball Fund of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Edward Payson Kimball lot in Pembroke Street Cemetery.

(b) Walter R. Libbey Fund of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars,

the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Walter R. Libbey lot in Buck Street Cemetery.

(c) Myra Georgi Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Myra Georgi lot in Evergreen Cemetery.

(d) John Marden Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the John Marden lot in Evergreen Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$200.00 (less than 1/100th of one percent of the Town's assessed valuation) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association as the Town's proportionate share in publicizing and promoting all interests in this Region, or act in relation thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to make necessary repairs on the Town Clock Tower and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,950 for that purpose.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred seventy-two (\$472.00) as its proportionate share of the anticipated deficit of the Concord Hospital for the coming fiscal year.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain a tract of land known as the Sanatorium Road from Pembroke Street in an easterly direction to the point where the northeasterly corner of the land of George N. Sanborn adjoins the land belonging to the Pembroke Sanatorium on the southerly side of said Sanatorium Road.

12. (By Selectmen for Planning Committee)

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept in the name of the Town any new streets, or extensions of any streets, provided the new streets or extensions of any present streets meet the following requirements:

(1) The new streets, or extensions of present streets, must be approved by a majority of the Planning Committee.

(2) The new streets, or extensions of present streets, must have a right of way at least 40 feet wide.

(3) The new streets, or extensions of present streets, must have a roadway 18 feet wide, properly graveled to a depth of not less than 12 inches, graded and rolled, and surface treated with asphalt tar.

(4) The new streets, or extensions of streets, must have adequate drainage.

13. (By Selectmen for Planning Committee)

To see if the Town will vote to rescind all articles relating to the location of street lights passed at previous Town Meetings.

14. (By Selectmen for Planning Committee)

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of seven members with duties as set forth in Sections 1 - 15, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire as amended, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and six (6) other citizens appointed by the Selectmen.

15. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, according to the Laws and Regulations of the State of New Hampshire, and form a committee of eleven legal voters, to act as a Budget Committee.

One member shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen, appointed by said Board of Selectmen: one member shall be a member of the School Board, appointed by said School Board.

The nine other members to be appointed by the Moderator, three (3) for two (2) years; three for four

(4) years and three (3) for six (6) years, and thereafter for six (6) year terms. This shall take effect January 1, 1956.

16. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to be set aside and added to the Accumulative Library Fund for building purposes.

17. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Central Street, between Main and Crescent Streets: and to raise and appropriate sufficient funds for that purpose.

18. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed, from Wallace Bean, Inc. to a strip of land 40 feet in width, beginning at Pembroke Street and running northerly approximately 140 feet and southerly approximately 300 feet, as surveyed and laid out by the corporation; said land to be graded and graveled by Wallace Bean, Inc. and thereafter to be used and maintained as a Town Street.

19. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to accept from Marcellous H. Rowe and Perley R. Rowe a strip of land forty (40) feet in width beginning on the southerly side of Pembroke Hill Road adjoining land of Henry Cote and running in a southerly direction along said Cote land and other land of said Marcellous H. Rowe and Perley R. Rowe, approximately seven hundred (700) feet to land of Charles P. Norton. Said acceptance to become effective as a street as rapidly as Marcellous H. Rowe and Perley R. Rowe gravel the said proposed street for a width of eighteen (18) feet and approximately one (1) foot in depth, at their own expense. Said street to be maintained by the Town when

the same has been gravelled and to be known as Rowe Avenue.

20. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

To the Selectmen:

Each year there is a demand for a statement on forest fires for publication in the annual town report. It is believed they serve a good purpose in reminding local citizens of the danger from such fires and how they can help prevent them. The following is offered with the respectful request for publication in your town report.

Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

Carelessness is responsible for 97 percent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property, but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during hazardous periods, high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires — all add up to the CARELESSNESS that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating CARELESSNESS so far as it concerns fire from our daily life. The rules are simple — your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.

2. Be sure that all lighted material — cigars, cigarettes and matches — is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.
3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.
4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that **FOREST FIRE PREVENTION** is **EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS** and our **MOST IMPORTANT** undertaking!

REPORT OF PEMBROKE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Recording all requests received by the Fire Department this year reveals the fact that the organization is being called upon more and more for assistance in activities not before undertaken by the firemen. A perusal of the fire record will bring out this fact. As a result, the expenditures have increased, not because of payroll expenses, but due to the equipment needed. The department is fortunate in having members who donate much of their time for public service and have rendered many services during the past year without expense to the town.

A case in point of added expenses is the resuscitator. Investigation showed that the equipment was not in order when the Department undertook the responsibility for its care this year and over \$100 was necessary for repairs. It will also be noted that the sum of \$800 was allocated for a night operator in the station to care for the redphone system during the night. This new system became necessary when the dial phones were installed.

Lengthy discussions were held between town and fire department officials and taxpayers and as a result, it was deemed advisable to procure the services of a night operator as a precautionary measure. An extension in the radio room of the fire headquarters also enables the operator to take all incoming police calls during the night. A full year's salary will be \$1,300 and is included in this year's budget. Full discussion on the retention of the operator will take place at the Town Meeting.

Our fire losses, despite the many calls, were very low and the people are to be congratulated for their co-operation in fire prevention and also for prompt reporting of fires.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1955

To the School Board of Pembroke:

May I present my eighth annual report of the schools of Pembroke and at the same time thank you for your help and understanding of our mutual problems and the attempt we have made to solve them.

We were most fortunate in our teacher turn-over at the opening of school in September. We really had just one replacement, Mr. Francis X. Larkin for Mr. Thomas E. Tierney, but we did add a new teacher, Mrs. Lorraine Thompson, because of the size of the entering first grade. Mr. Tierney applied for and received an appointment to the Manchester Schools.

When a teaching staff remains nearly constant it speaks well for the School Board as well as the parents and taxpayers in their desire to get instruction of the highest caliber. The children especially are the fortunate ones because the continuity of the program remains unbroken and the learning process for each individual is accelerated. Where the turn-over is large, the children cannot help but suffer vitally and quite often the damage is beyond correction. Yes, the town is very fortunate in having an efficient and understanding teaching staff and your salary schedule has been a great factor in obtaining and holding such a group.

In looking into the future and the opening of school in September 1955, a few figures may help you to understand what is happening in the schools of the country today and which will continue to be our greatest problem for sometime to come — increased enrollments.

We have had 282 children enrolled in the Elementary School so far this year — 44 pupils in Grade 1; 53 in Grade 2; 35 in Grade 3; 27 in Grade 4; 35 in Grade 5; 31 in Grade 6; 29 in Grade 7; and 28 in Grade 8 — Total 282.

Whether you like it, believe it, expect it or not, the children will increase more and more for the next 5 to 10 years. Constant research shows us that more youngsters, age 5 and 6, are attending school in this country than ever before and by 1956 there will be 24,400,000; by 1957 — 25,300,000; by 1958 — 26,000,000 pupils, and this is for the public elementary schools only.

Now, by studying the Census Report of the town, taken last September, we are expecting between 290 and 300 pupils next year and at least 45 of these children will be in Grade 1. This means that in Grades 1, 2, and 3 we must have two teachers for each grade, while there must be at least one teacher in each of Grades 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8.

Up to next fall, we will have used one of the rooms in the addition for the lunch program. When school opens in September we shall have to use this room for one section of the entering class. This means that lunches will have to be served in the auditorium and tables and chairs will have to be set up for that purpose. Let us look further and see how many we can expect to enter Grade 3. We have 53 in Grade 2 this year. There will be approximately 50 when school opens. Are you going to expect one of your teachers to take this Grade three group? Or are you going to ask the Grade 1 teacher to take 45 to 50 pupils? If you divide both Grades 1 and 3 it will mean two new teachers — and where will each grade be housed in this divided state? These questions must be solved before June so that plans may be made for the fall.

The next problem is a perennial one — the tuition problem. There are about 120 pupils at Pembroke Academy for which the district must pay \$270 per pupil or nearly \$33,000. Next year the estimated number of children who will attend the Academy from Pembroke will be very close to 130. The tuition rate has been increased to \$300. Therefore, the total cost for next year will be \$39,000. What alternative have you but to pay it?

Perhaps a few statements taken from State and Government research data will bring before you more forcefully the fact that this tuition figure will not be diminished in the slightest and the rate will keep pace. In the next five years there will be over two million more children attending high school in the country and Pembroke will have her share.

Growing out of the tuition problem and just as important, is the housing problem. Some long range planning must be made immediately at both the Elementary School and the Academy if we are to meet this problem adequately. Gone are the days of the horse and buggy. We are now living in an age of nuclear power and the speed of sound. According to all estimates in the country, by 1960 there must be nearly 50,000 more rooms to house the increased enrollments in our schools.

There are other problems which must be solved, but increased enrollments, teachers' salaries, tuition, and housing are the four most important at this time and which carry the greatest cost. They cannot be pushed aside if your children are to be given their rights as American citizens.

This discussion and data presented only emphasizes the fact that in order to get the funds necessary to meet these needed costs, some broad tax base is ab-

solutely necessary. The American people believe in education and education costs money. Therefore, the American people must prepare for it and provide for it — today as well as tomorrow.

May I again thank the School Board, teachers, children and every individual and organization which has helped and believed in the education of the youth of the town.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF PEMBROKE ACADEMY

To the Trustees of Pembroke Academy and the Superintendent of Schools:

This is my seventeenth annual report as Principal of Pembroke Academy. It includes the school's organization and educational activities for the year 1954.

Enrollment and Teaching Staff

School opened Wednesday, September 8, 1954, with an enrollment of 214 students, 104 boys, 110 girls. Since then 8 more students have enrolled making a total of 111 boys, 111 girls, or 222. Up to January 1, 1954, 22 pupils have left school, 11 boys, and 11 girls. Of this number 5 are continuing their education elsewhere.

Our teaching staff has been enlarged and now consists of eleven regular and two part-time teachers.

D. A. R. "Good Citizen"

The members of the Senior Class together with the faculty have selected Gertrude H. Sanschagrín as "D. A. R. Good Citizen" of the class of 1955. Miss Sanschagrín is the sixteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gustave Sanschagrín of 25 Prospect St., Suncook. She has one younger sister.

This contest which emphasizes the traits of Dependability, Service, Leadership, and Patriotism is sponsored by the Buntin Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Miss Sanschagrín, who has excelled in these traits during her four years at Pembroke Academy, has been engaged in a number of extra-curricula activities. In addition to being secretary of her class for the past three years, she has been manager of the girls' basketball team, and has won awards in several of the Austin Prize Speaking contests. She has taken a leading role in the school operetta "Creatures of Impulse" as well as in the Senior play "Judy Pulls the Curtain." Now in her Senior year she is editor of the school newspaper, "The Academy News." During her four years she has served on various dance committees.

Her scholastic attainments have placed her repeatedly near the top of her class. Her major interest is in Business Education in which she hopes to make further progress by enrolling at Plymouth Teachers College after graduation.

Cadet Teachers

Pembroke Academy again made an arrangement with Mount St. Mary for the help of two Cadet teachers during the first semester. Louise O'Neil taught classes in Mathematics under the supervision of Edward Currier, and Henrietta Raymond taught classes in Commerce under the direction of Raymond Tremblay.

Mr. Tremblay's Office Practice Class visited Mount St. Mary in the fall. During the year several of the undergraduates at the Mount have taught classes at the Academy when teachers were absent. We appreciate very much the assistance given in this respect by Sister Mauritia and Sister Vianney.

MUSIC

Under the supervision of Mrs. Mabel Reed, the music program has included a General chorus, a Freshmen chorus and a special girls' double quartet. In May of 1954 the Operetta "Creatures of Impulse" was cast by Mrs. Reed and the chorus — a very successful production — and well received.

A more flexible schedule is needed to accommodate these Music Classes, and an adequate place is needed which will insure freedom from the noise of the shop and gym.

High School — University Day

On Friday, October 22 three Seniors, six Juniors and five Freshmen were selected to visit the University of New Hampshire for the day. They had an opportunity to visit classes in the fields of their interests and to see a University in action for a day. Nearly 3,000 boys

and girls from all over the state participated in this program.

Open House for Parents

On Tuesday, November 10, as a part of the National Education Week Program "Open House" was held at the Academy in order that parents might visit the school and discuss with the teachers the problems of their children.

A Moving Picture was shown, after which parents visited, and then all adjourned to the gym at 9:00 P.M. for refreshments. About sixty parents and friends availed themselves of this opportunity.

Prize Speaking and Dramatics

The Austin Original Prize Speaking Contest was held Wednesday, April 21, 1954. This contest is open to students in grades 10, 11, and 12. The winners were: Boys — David Yeaton, 1st, Fred Lea, 2nd, Peter Chickering, 3rd. Girls — Noreen Halen, 1st, Sandra Cole, 2nd, and Judith Farnum, 3rd.

Thursday, December 16, 1954 the Austin Memory Prize Speaking Contest was held in the Academy Auditorium. Members of the Freshman Class are allowed to compete in this contest. The winners were: Judith Chase, 1st, Cynthia MacKenzie, 2nd, Sally Little, 3rd, and Fred Lea, 4th. These four represented Pembroke Academy in the State Preliminary Contest at Dover High School on January 15, 1955, and earned sufficient credits to compete in the State Contest at Durham Saturday, February 12.

Mrs. Elizabeth C. Morrill, who has charge of the Prize Speaking and Dramatics, has won an enviable reputation throughout the state for the work with her students in Prize Speaking at the Sectional and State Meetings. She has been much in demand as a judge on these occasions.

Under her supervision the Senior Play "Judy Pulls the Curtain" was held October 21 and 22. And at Christmas time Mrs. Morrill, aided by Miss Richardson, presented a one-act play for the Christmas Program.

Industrial Arts

The Industrial Arts program shows the second largest curriculum enrollment, and the teacher, Mr. Stanley B. Tufts, is new to Pembroke Academy. His plans include new fields as well as new standards of endeavor, and all he needs is more room and equipment.

Physical Education and Athletics

Mr. Redmond C. Carroll has charge of this program for the boys and Mrs. Beverly Massey for the girls. Mr. Carroll coaches the Junior varsity basketball boys, and Mrs. Massey coaches the Varsity girls in basketball. Special attention is given to intramural games and to all phases of physical well-being including posture.

Mr. Nicholas Gardner is coaching the basketball boy's team. Again lacking height and weight his team has given a good account of itself against strong class B competition.

More parents are taking out insurance each year to cover accidents of boys and girls participating in the Physical Education and Sports Program.

In baseball Mr. Currier's boys have done well. Last spring they finished second in the New Hampshire Interscholastic League.

Health Program

Miss Adonia Douillette has been actively engaged with the Health Program at the Academy. Her work includes supervision of vision testing, hearing testing, height and overweight, dental testing and posture. A study of the handicaps of children is followed by visits to the parents for reporting findings.

On December 1 Miss Douillette and Miss Constance Martin, County Nurse, gave the Vollmer Patch Test for T. B. to nearly two hundred students and teachers.

Miss Douillette is handicapped in her work by lack of space. The chief need is for a School Health Unit or sound proof room about 24 ft. x 14 ft., suitably equipped to meet the needs of a modern health program.

Noon Lunch Program

Miss Patricia W. Benoit, a native of Claremont, N. H., and a graduate of Keene Teachers College is in charge of the Home Economics Department this year. Responsibility for the Noon Lunch Program is shared by Mrs. Adine Chase and Mrs. Flossie Robinson. A well-balanced meal is served daily to an average of seventy-five students at a cost of thirty cents per student. At this writing we are about to try using paper carton milk containers, thus saving the time and labor of washing bottles. This program has been practically self-supporting over a period of years.

Miscellaneous

1) Statistics from the current school Register give the following figures for 18 weeks as compared with 1953-54 figures for a twenty-week period;

These figures show a large increase in non-membership figures due to the large number of drop-outs. This will continue as long as many of the ninth graders

are forced to come to school until they reach their sixteenth birthday. They show also that good travelling days thus far have resulted in cutting down tardinesses by 50%.

2) The increase in numbers has taxed our capacity to the limit and on special days when the Music teacher, or the Nurse, or the Dramatics teacher come we are really crowded for room. Eighty freshmen have registered so far this year.

3) The acquisition of a Film Strip Machine and an opaque machine would be welcome by the Science teachers as well as by all of the teachers and students.

4) All Freshmen have taken a Mental Ability test, an Interest Inventory test, and a Personality test this fall. A Reading test will complete this phase of their Guidance program.

Conclusion

This year will conclude my eighteenth year at Pembroke Academy and my thirtieth consecutive year in New Hampshire — twenty-five of them as a Headmaster or Principal. In addition I have taught two years in Springfield, Vermont, one year in Barre, Vermont, and two years in the Berkshires in Western Massachusetts. In July I shall retire to my new home in Exeter, N. H. There I hope to take a long rest before continuing in part time work in the Educational field.

I have worked hard and faithfully for what I believed was right and good for the Academy, and I have enjoyed my task tremendously. In the meantime I have seen my family grow up and take their places in the world, and now I would like to settle down myself, and work at a little slower pace.

For many years I have had the cooperation of some wonderful friends among the teachers, the Trustees and the parents and friends of the school, and these

contacts have broadened my outlook and made my position an enviable one. All my life I shall treasure the memory of these associations with great satisfaction and pleasure.

Finally I want to express my heartfelt thanks and deep appreciation to the Trustees, to Superintendent Watson and Superintendent Doe, and to the teachers of Pembroke Academy for their devoted interest and cooperation throughout the year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

For the Year Ending December 31, 1954

Administration

Several main extensions were completed during the year excepting the 6" line up High Street. All connections for this extension, including necessary gates at Pine, Simpson Avenue and High Street have been completed. It was expected this job would continue during the winter but due to weather conditions this project had to be terminated. Work will be resumed as soon as weather conditions permit.

Collections have been extra good as is shown by the fact that there were no outstanding accounts on Dec. 31, 1954. All hydrants in the system have been painted, pressures recorded, and are in good condition.

Land Damage — Sale of Land

The State of New Hampshire Highway Department is reconstructing the Daniel Webster Highway, U. S. 3, adjacent to land owned by the Pembroke Water Works where the new pumping station and wells are located.

This construction necessitated the acquisition of approximately 65 feet of Pembroke Water Works land for the entire distance of Water Works property on the easterly side of the highway.

Included in this project is also the construction of a new bridge and appurtenances thereto. The State also was desirous of constructing a temporary road through the property near the Pembroke Well House to be used as a detour during construction of the bridge.

After conferences with representatives of the State and Pembroke Selectmen an agreement was reached whereby the Town was to issue a deed for the land in question. After being approved by the Board of Water

Commissioners an agreement was signed by the Chairman. The terms of this agreement is a matter of record.

The State has awarded and paid the sum of \$2,000.00 for, and in consideration of, the above grant. Due to the fact this land in question was a part of property originally purchased for the Pumping Station and Well purposes, it was deemed advisable to pay off an extra \$2,000.00 note dated December, 1954, this being a part of money borrowed for the completion of No. 3 Well.

Source of Supply — Wells

The new well designated as Well No. 3 was completed and put into operation last spring and has operated very efficiently.

While it was designed to deliver 700 g.p.m. it actually has a delivery capacity of 730 g.p.m. which equals 1,051,200 g.p.d. (gallons per day). It can be operated in conjunction with Well No. 2 if and when the necessity arrives.

Statistics of Pumping Record for 1954

Total gallons pumped during year 206,671,800 gals.

Daily Average 566,498 gals.

Per Capita (estimated population served
3900) 145 gals.

This per capita is not excessive for an unmetered system.

Analysis of Well Production

Capacity of Well No. 3 730 g.p.m. = 1,051,200 g.p.d.

Capacity of Well No. 2 400 g.p.d. = 575,000 g.p.d.

Total capacity 1,626,200 g.p.d.

This shows that the total capacity is nearly 3 times the present consumption and should take care of any needs for some time to come.

Main Street — Bridge Job

At the last town meeting it was decided to make major repairs to the Main Street Bridge. The 10" C.I. main under the bridge, including approaches was in very poor condition. Trouble has been experienced on both sides of the bridge, probably due to vibration, caused by traffic. The old line was made up with rigid joints which in turn would not stand the continuous vibration.

A new 10" cement lined C.I. main with plain ends and dresser couplings was installed. This type of coupling allows for greater flexibility in the joints as well as contraction and expansion due to climatic conditions. Under the bridge, pipe is held in place by hangers suspended from an 18" I Beam that runs parallel with the bridge.

It is felt that this type of construction will last for years to come.
