WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD IN THE COUNTY OF STRAFFORD, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at (10) ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent, and Chief of Fire Department.
- ART. 2. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To see what percentage, if any, the town will vote to discount all taxes paid on or before the first of August next.
- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to establish a Public Library and accept the provisions of Chapter 8, Section 21-26 of the Public Statutes and appropriate a sum of money for the same.
- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to give a prescription permit to any druggist, who is a registered pharmacist doing business in town, to sell liquor for medicinal use under Section 14, Chapter 147 of the Laws of the January session, 1917, approved April 17, 1917.

- ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$250.00) two hundred and fifty dollars to resurface Prospect street, beginning at the residence of William Berube and continuing in a southerly direction on said highway.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$200.00) two hundred dollars to resurface with Tarvia Lithic, the sidewalk starting at the corner of Front and South streets to the corner of South and Third Streets. (By petition).
- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the extension of water main on Broadway Extension and also an additional fire hydrant. (By petition).
- ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to maintain a District Nurse and to raise money for same.
- ART. 11. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER AND FOREST FIRE WARDEN

TO THE PEOPLE OF ROLLINSFORD:

It is our aim to prevent fires by eliminating fire hazards. We solicit the cooperation of every man, woman and child in our task of preventing and fighting fire to the end that the loss from fire may be abolished. With much pleasure I submit this fire report.

The people of Rollinsford are to be congratulated for the fine fire record established by them for 1932. Your loss by fire totals less than three hundred fifty dollars, \$350.00. We may well take pride in the fact that our fire loss is perhaps, everything considered, the lowest in the state. It is the best fire record yet recorded in our town. This wonderful fire record is attributed to many progressive reasons advanced and practiced by the fireminded citizens of Rollinsford.

The elimination of many fire hazards, such as procuring fire permits before kindling fires in the open, burning waste and refuse in incinerators, cleaning of chimney flues and stove funnels, the fire-mindedness of fishermen and hunters while in the fields and woods, have netted profitable results. Yet we still have a few of the smaller hazards to eliminate if we are to benefit from past mistakes, and try for a clean fire record for future years. Placing of hot ashes in a wooden box on a wooden floor by a non-thinking person came very near netting serious consequences, that was and always will be a serious fire hazard. Eliminate it. Lighting candles and placing them near inflammable curtains came verp near having serious after effects. Eliminate it. Smoking in a hay barn came very near costing one party the loss of their buildings.

Eliminate it. Smoking in bed was the cause of one man losing his bed and bed clothing and came very near taking one life. Eliminate it. Lighting matches near gasoline tanks on automobiles is a very serious fire hazard. Eliminate it. Throwing lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes along the roadside is against the law and a great menace to roadside property. Eliminate it. All of the above and many other fire hazards can be eliminated if we will but stop and think. Un-cut hayfields create fire hazards which could and should be eliminated. Have your hayfields cut in season.

Your maintenance of an adequate fire department, fully conscious of its implied duties, ready and willing to respond when summoned must be, and is, generally appreciated. Lovalty and cooperation between neighboring departments, practically eliminating disastrous conflagrations is well worth proper maintainance in fire fighting equipment. Your fire truck and its equipment is in good condition. We have some 3000 feet of servicable hose at the station. 1400 feet is carried on the truck. The truck is also equipped with 6 acid type hand extinguishers and one 40-gallon acid soda type tank fully charged. Your truck is also equipped with one 16-foot roof ladder, one 32-foot extension ladder and one 7-foot chimney ladder. The 32-foot extension ladder being a recent addition. reserve we have one 12-foot roof ladder, one 24-foot extension ladder and one 45-foot extension pole ladder. Your fire department is properly equipped with one possible exception and that exception is firemen's coats. Good warm coats are very much needed by your firemen when fighting fire. In this regard I would recommend that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to purchase the much needed coats. Where are the four hydrants voted and appropriated for at the town meeting of March, 1931? These hydrants properly installed and piped for water privileges would greatly increase fire protection over a large area and also lessen insurance rates upon home owners. Why are they not installed? All sizeable brooks along the roadsides in our rural districts should be suitably dammed, forming a water supply, sufficient for draught by our truck pumper to fight fires within hose reach. The financing of such a project would be small in consideration of results which might be achieved for the protection of rural property. Why not take some prompt and favorable action on the above matter for the farmers' benefit as well as the future maintainance of our town's valuation? Again I suggest and recommend the prone pressure method of resuscitation be taught school children. Why not equip the children with this simple but practical means of saving a life should the occasion ever require their knowledge of resuscitation?

Most fires have a small start and it is the quick response of fire apparatus to the scene of the fire that means dollars and cents to the property owner and the general public. Therefore, do not hesitate to sound an alarm and call your fire department at the earliest possible moment after the fire is discovered. Help yourself and your firemen by saving valuable time at the start by calling your fire department. Your fire department wants to serve you efficiently and if we have your cooperation you will be efficiently served. No fire is too small to be extinguished at its start. No fire hazard is too small to be thoroughly examined and remedied. Your fire department, apparatus and equipment, should be properly maintained so that our service shall meet with your approval.

The neat appearance of the homes, streets and industrial plants in our town testify to the efforts of our town officials and the general public for sanitation. Having been actively employed in many fire departments throughout New Hampshire for the past 28 years, I feel that I am speaking from a knowledge acquired from experience when I say, not boastfully, that your fire department ap-

paratus and equipment, together with the moral of your firemen, are second to none. Which may be accounted for in various ways.

- 1. You believe in your fire department and support same both financially and actively.
- 2. Your fire department is not a political organization and impartially serves all the people irrespective of their political faith.
- Your cooperation in the elimination of fire hazards and maintainance of department preparedness interests both firemen and public for better results.
- 4. Results achieved from year to year in the reduction of fire losses must influence public respect and appreciation of your fire department's ability.

I venture to believe that I know what is wanted by a large number of our townspeople from their fire department. Community cooperation is desirable and that can be secured best by an aroused and sustained public opinion. No doubt we can all think of a lot of improvements, none of which entail the expenditure of large sums of money, but which depend upon community action, with very moderate expenditure.

After taking the ten per-cent cut in our fire department appropriation for 1932 it is very gratifying to know that we were able to keep within our budget of \$765.00, and in doing this, efficiency has not been impaired in any great degree, detrimental to preparedness or protection. We want to be as economical as possible without lessening your fire protection. Our town, in common with all other towns in the state, must cut the tax rate and economize. We, as firemen, are only to willing to do our bit for the taxpayer's benefit.

We have had several alarms for grass and brush fires in 1932, and it is with great pleasure that we report no loss from any of these calls. There are a few residents who still persist in kindling fires to burn grass, brush, rubbish, etc., without the required permit from the fire warden. Any of these fires so kindled are contrary to the laws of this state and it will be just too bad for any person causing damage to result from any of these unlawful fires. Take a little friendly advice and obtain a fire permit from your Fire Warden.

In conclusion, let all townspeople cooperate with their fire department for better future results, so that our fire department service may be as good or better than ever before. Also, please except the heartfelt thanks and appreciation of your firemen for the many acts of kindness and faithful cooperation received from Rollinsford citizens in the past.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Somersworth, N. H., Feb. 1, 1933

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF ROLLINSFORD:

I have the honor to submit my fifth annual report. I am happy to say that only one change in teachers has occurred since the last report. Mr. Guy Crockette, who had been Principal of the Franklin School for four years, was released from his contract in July to accept a position in Durham, affording him a larger salary and an opportunity to take courses at the University of New Hampshire. Mrs. Agnes Earl Webber of Eliot, Maine, was elected to succeed Mr. Crockette. Mrs. Webber had held similar positions in Maine and attended the summer session of Plymouth Normal School before taking up her duties in Salmon Falls.

The school nurse was absent during the fall term and her work was done by Mrs. Van de Meulebroecke. At this writing Miss Cherry Bleakney has again taken charge. Free milk is being distributed through the efforts of Mrs. Nutter and other interested ladies. This deserves your continued support. A dental clinic is just being started, the pupils going to Dr. Chapman in Dover. This is also being financed by solicited money and with no expense to the school district. We have been surrounded on all sides by epidemics but so far we have escaped with only scattered cases of mildly contagious diseases. Our school rooms are as sanitary as the old buildings and floors permit and we are careful of the drinking water, having bubblers in every school and having the water carried, where necessary, in covered containers.

At the graduation exercises last June the Good Citizenship Medal, awarded by the New Hampshire Sons of the American Revolution, was presented to Denis J. E. Hamel and the five dollars in gold, given by the American Legion for high school scholarship, went to Paul Chapman. The George Washington Bicentennial Celebration was combined with the graduation exercises and it was an enjoyable affair, all schools taking part. It should be long remembered by the participants. Much credit is due the teachers and especially to the music teacher, Miss Helen Lesiuk, upon whose shoulders rested a great deal of responsibility.

More pupils than ever before are attending high school and academies and this demands a larger outlay. In America schools are coming under severe scrutiny everywhere because so much money is expended in order to maintain our policy of sending all our pupils through eight years of an elementary school and on to four years of high school at public expense. We are the only nation with so extensive an educational program, but as President Hoover recently remarked—"There is no safety for our republic without the education of our youth. That is the first charge upon all citizens and local governments."

The cost per pupil of the elementary schools has remained about the same. It is higher in Rollinsford than in some other districts of equal valuation because of our smaller enrollment. The total is about 112 pupils or 18½ pupils per teacher. There were 246 school districts operating in New Hampshire during 1931-32 and fifty-eight had a higher per capita cost than Rollinsford. I know of no way of materially reducing this cost except by consolidation and apparently the school district prefers its present system, even if it does cost a little more. We carry no fads or frills. Our schools fulfill the requirements of the law and no more.

The Pearyard School had a new floor laid during the summer and the teacher and pupils refinished the seats and desks. New curtains will be needed in this school this year. As last year, I hesitate to make any recommendations which will demand money. The Franklin School building still needs much work done on the inside, new floors should be laid and there is still one room equipped with old fashioned, non-adjustable desks. Curtains are needed at every window and three rooms need new paint. I realize that all this cannot be done in one year, but that the most imperative needs must be met first.

We, teachers, nurse and superintendent, know that Rollinsford wants good schools and will support our efforts toward that end. We cannot stand still and must not go backward and there is only one other way to go.
