## TOWN MEETING WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sugar Hill, in the County of Grafton, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Meetinghouse, Sugar Hill, N.H., Tuesday the seventh day of March, 1972, A.D., at seven-thirty (7:30) P.M. to act on the following subjects:

**Article 1.** To choose a Town Clerk, a Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Auditor, an Overseer of Public Welfare, a Library Trustee for a term of three years, a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, a member of the Board of Adjustment for a term of five years and three persons for a term of one year each to act as appointing authority to appoint temporary members of the Board of Adjustment in case of disqualification, resignation, death, or absence of any permanent member or members.

**Article 2.** To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and make appropriations of the same as set forth in the following budget:

**Article 3.** To see if the Town will vote to purchase and equip a Police Cruiser and raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the same.

**Article 4.** To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new Highway Sander with funds from the unexpended balance of the 1971 equipment appropriation and to authorize the transfer of any subsequent unexpended balance to the Reserve Fund. The Sander to cost approximately \$500.00.

**Article 5.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Sugar Hill Fire Department.

**Article 6.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for new roofing on the Meetinghouse.

**Article 7.** To see if the Town will vote to change the Equipment Reserve Fund to an Equipment and Building Reserve Fund and raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the same.

**Article 8.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

**Article 9.** To see if the Town will vote to direct a discount of one per cent (1%) to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a period of three (3) weeks from the date of the tax bill.

**Article 10.** To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as a public way the road leading from the Landaff Road (or Dyke Road) to the Overlook property so called.

**Article 11.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply the Highway Subsidy money to be received in 1972 to maintenance of highways.

**Article 12.** To see if the town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint such committees as seem necessary.

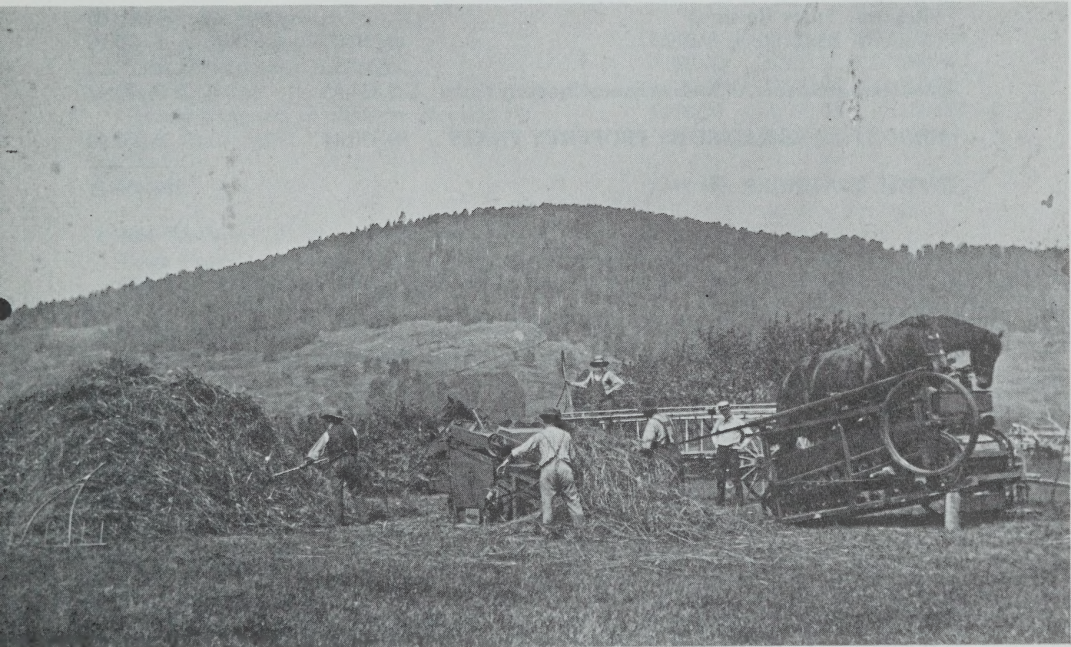
**Article 13.** To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

**Article 14.** Shall the provisions of chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town.

**Article 15.** To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## FROM THE SELECTMEN'S POINT OF VIEW

There is an ancient story about a famous mule trainer who performed miracles with hundreds of recalcitrant mules. Someone once asked him how he managed so consistently to turn stubborn mules into cooperative animals. He replied, "Oh, it's easy. I just tell them what I want, and they do it." The questioner allowed as how he had never had any good results from any conversation with a mule and asked if the trainer would please demonstrate his methods. The trainer said he would. He walked up to the fence, picked up a six foot length of 2x4, went to the nearest un-trained mule, took a mighty swing and hit the mule right between the eyes. The questioner said, "I thought you said you talked to them." "Ayuh, I do," said the trainer, "but first you have to get their attention."

The following circled and underlined paragraphs are the last three paragraphs of our 1970 report to the people.

Which brings us to our largest present problem of how to finance all of this without confiscatory tax rates. The growth of our tax base has not begun to keep up with our expanding costs which are skyrocketing, due in part to inflation and due in part to increasing demands for services. The increases in our 1971 town budget coupled with the large increase in the school budget will bring another sizeable increase in our tax rate which, quite frankly, we do not feel we can afford. Some of our people who are on fixed and limited incomes are going to be hurt by this tax burden. Not that we aren't all hurt by increasing taxes, but some are hurt more than others, for a real-estate tax, unfortunately, has no relation to ability to pay.

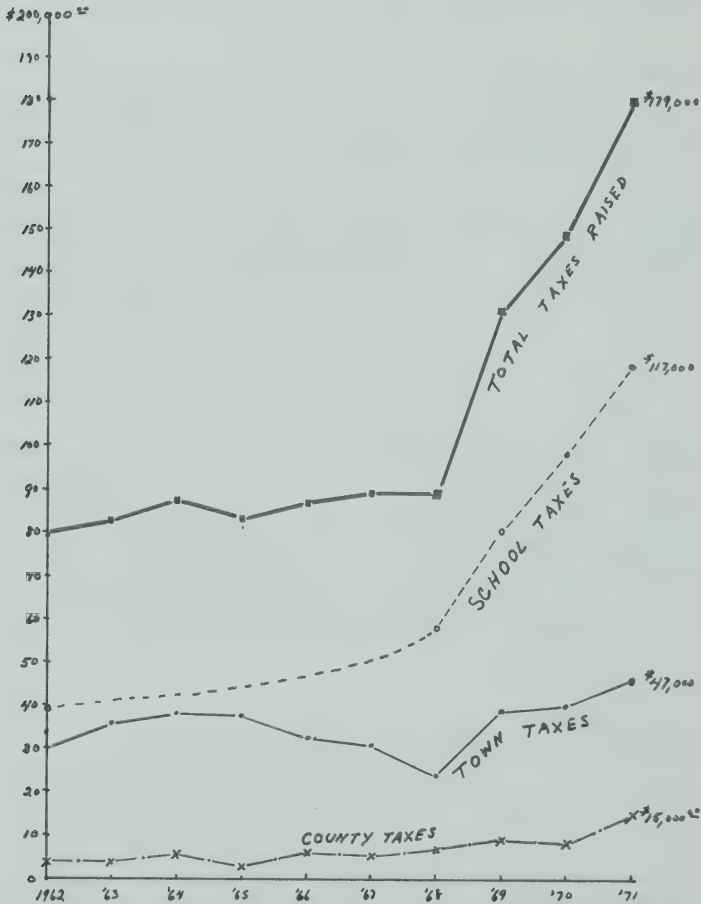
What is the answer to all of this? We don't know. But we think that in order to solve even some of these pressing problems we need more people involved and far less apathy on the part of our citizens. To be perfectly blunt about it, we feel that the average citizen becomes concerned with town problems only three times a year: at the annual town meeting for a couple of hours, for an hour after he receives his tax bill, and for another hour when he finds the money to pay it. We base this assumption on the fact that these are the only times we ever hear from the average citizen.

Obviously it is too much to expect that we are going to solve all of our town problems at one two-hour session at the annual town meeting. It is also obvious that it is too much to expect that any part-time, three-man board of selectmen is going to solve all of these problems for us. It is going to take a concerted effort on the part of all of us to solve these problems. Which brings us back to the point of beginning — "Is anybody listening? Does anybody care?"

We don't think you were listening to us last year, but since the reappraisal of property in 1971 it is possible that some of you are listening now.

Before someone accuses us of calling our citizenry mules, let us hasten to say that we are merely trying, with a little humor (?), to alert people to the seriousness of our situation.

On page 12 of the 1970 report we showed you a comparison of the tax rates for the years 1962 through 1970. The following is a chart showing a comparison of amounts raised by taxes in the ten year period from 1962 through 1971. The amounts shown for school taxes from 1962 to 1968 are approximations as no accurate figures can be obtained due to the former split school districts.



Comparison of Taxes Raised from 1962 thru 1971

You will note that the amount of money raised by taxes at our town meetings has been quite stable. In the ten year period the amount for town purposes has increased by some **36%**. In the same period the amount raised by school taxes has increased by about **192%** and the amount raised by county taxes has increased by approximately **200%**. If you really want to scare yourself, try projecting this chart into the next ten years.

From 1970 to 1971 there was a 20% increase in the total amount of money raised by taxes. In other words, if we had not had a reappraisal, **everyones'** taxes would have increased by 20%. Even so, a comparison of our increases with some of our neighboring towns shows that we are a lot better off than we might be.

We realize that many people are blaming the reappraisal for their higher taxes and in some cases this is true, but before you shout about it too loudly you should add 20% to your 1970 tax bill and see just how much it really did change in tax dollars from the amount it would have been without the reappraisal.

Take a few minutes to do some simple arithmetic. Multiply your 1970 valuation by 2.41; now compare the result with your 1971 valuation. If your 1971 valuation is **less** than the result, then any increase in your taxes was due to increased spending. If your 1971 valuation is **more** than the result, then **some** of your increased taxes was due to the increased valuation.

It is useless to single out our valuations as the only cause for tax increases when it is so obvious that it is usually **increases in spending that increase our taxes.**

On the bright side, the necessary improvements of the Meetinghouse have been going well. We wish to thank Bill and Reta Presby for donating the plans for the new septic system, which has been installed. The painting will be finished in 1972. We are using the new chairs and tables. As presented, our 1972 budget is 25% lower than that of 1971. This good news is due to increased revenue and some decreases in spending requests. We have to say, however, that we do not feel that this decrease will offset the increases in the school and county budgets. It will help, though.

If our representatives in the General Court are going to continue to impose manditory programs with costly, strict standards on our municipalities and our school districts, then it seems to us that they are also going to have to find some different methods of financing these changes other than the present form of property taxes.

Please don't heap the entire blame for rising taxes on your town and school officials, for they have been aware of the sharply rising costs for some years now and have been struggling to do something about it even though they have met with little success. Remember that they have to administer the laws of the General Court, like them or not, and that they are also spending only the money that **we** voted for.

If we must find a scapegoat we would do well to listen to the words of wisdom imparted by a favorite cartoon character of ours, "Pogo," who said, "**We have met the enemy and they is us.**"

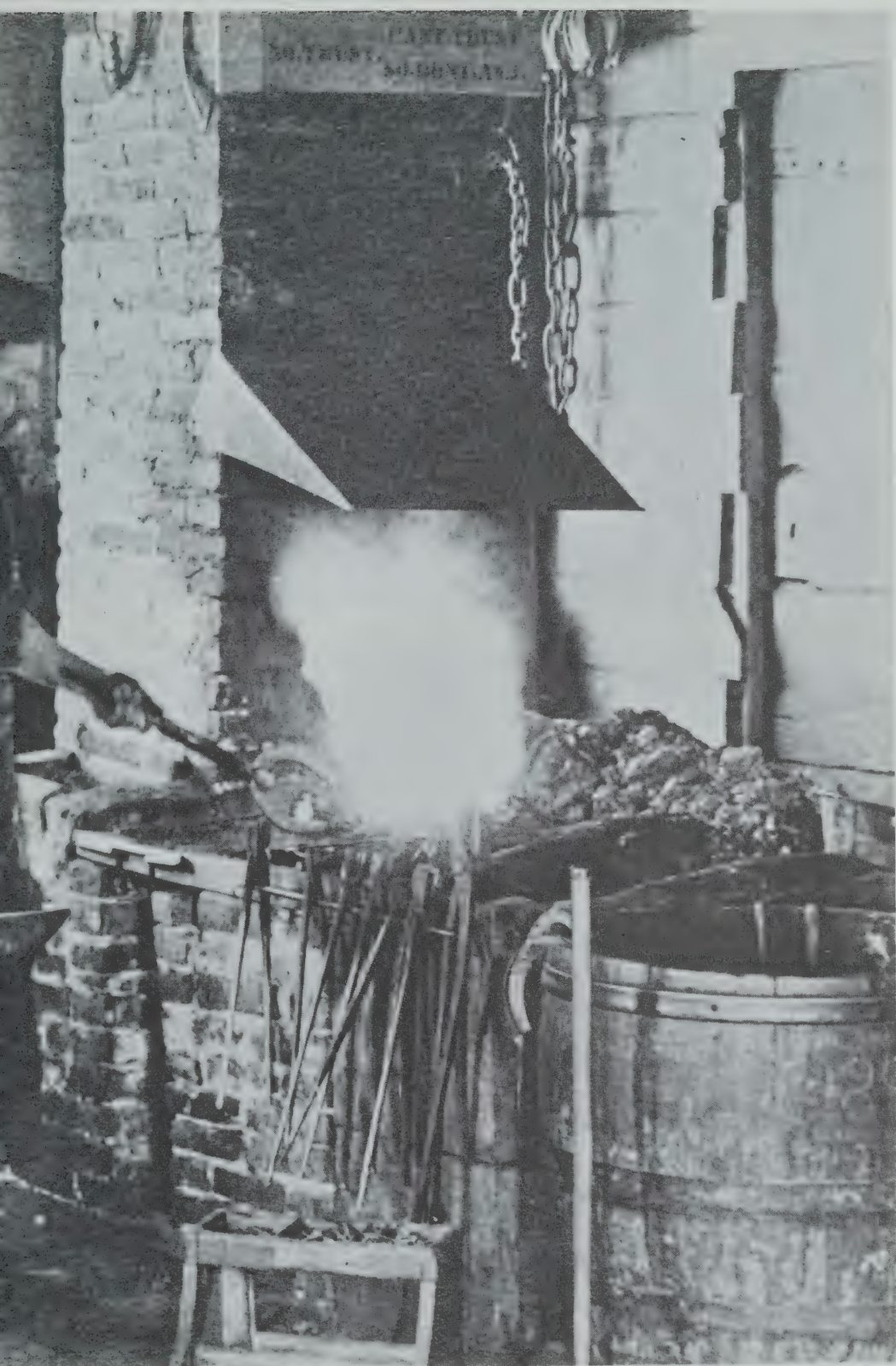

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RICHARDSON MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Loretta Brown, librarian for several years who had done so much to get our library "on its feet" felt she could no longer continue and her resignation was accepted with regret May first.

Lucy Oakes did an admirable job of pinch hitting until Marion Sullivan took charge, in September. Mrs. Sullivan, who has recently moved to Sugar Hill, had previously taken a college course in library work and has completed the course on Book Selection offered at Plymouth State College this fall.

With the help of the State District Consultant, Ralph Riley, the New Hampshire books, fiction and non-fiction were catalogued and placed together for the convenience of patrons.

Memorial gifts were made by Mrs. James honoring Cornelia A. Gibbs and by Dr. and Mrs. Clark honoring Edwin MacEwan. Others were given by Mrs. Aubrey Reid, Mrs. Robert Loker, Mrs. Gilbert Oakes. Magazines were donated by the Littleton Garden Club and Mr. and Mrs. Ernst Glaessel.

Our rug in the reading room was cleaned, no charge, by a former resident, Clinton Underhill.

A criticism this fall which we considered unjust, never-the-less awakened us to the fact that the old New Hampshire habit of "making do", perhaps should be put aside for a time, so:

1. A much needed parking lot was provided diagonally across the street, through the courtesy of Mr. and Mrs. Ernst Glaessel who loaned the land. The town officials graded it.
2. The bushes, which were overgrown, were trimmed and cut so the building is much more in evidence.
3. Needed electrical work was done, new fuse box, outlets, etc.
4. The chemical toilet, only a bit ahead of a "Chic Sales" must go! A fund for this project has been started, thanks to Mary Win Foss, Bill Baker and the Sugar Hill Improvement Association who sponsored the program East Africa Revisited by Dora and Bill Mann.
5. Running water in the building is desirable, and a long range goal, but problems concerning it seem insurmountable at present.

Books borrowed from the Bookmobile: 532 fiction, 418 non-fiction, 938 juvenile, 6 recordings for a total of 1894.

Although total attendance was down from 1970, the circulation of adult fiction increased and magazine circulation almost doubled. The library would like more children to take advantage of its facilities as few children visit which has accounted for the drop in attendance.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

### LEST WE FORGET — IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand - a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them **dead out** when leaving.
4. **Most important** - instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year - 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.
