# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, 1952, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman, for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collector of Taxes, Trustee of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers and all other necessary officers.
- Article 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current expenses as may accrue.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$938.80 for Class V roads, the state to contribute \$6,258.69.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.
- Article 5. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State

of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes as has been the custom in previous years.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds or bequests as have been left to it during the past year.
- Article 9. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax colletcor's deeds after being advertised.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to complete the so-called North road from the top of High St. to the residence of Frank Mitchell.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,700.00 for new equipment for Highway Department.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,800.00 to clean, prime and paint with two coats bridge over the Connecticut River from Walpole to Westminster, Vt.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 to repair the back walls of the bridge over the Connecticut River from Walpole to Westminster, Vt.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to protect the shade trees of the town.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to replace bridge on East St., North Walpole, N. H.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$600.00 to install furnace, formerly in north end of Town hall, in south end of hall.

Article 17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of \$500.00 to purchase from Hubbard Farms, Inc., 4.84 acres of cultivated land north of the Cemetery Road and East of Route 12 for use as a cemetery. (This excludes barn on the property to be removed by Hubbard Farms before April 1, 1954). By petition.

Article 18. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate to remove or repair brick shop on Turnpike St. owned by the town.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate at least \$400.00 for continuing control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 to improve the road leading from Howland's barn to the Hobbs Place, or better known as the Kidder Place, on Ramsey Hill Road. By petition.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 to preserve and improve the Toney Wolfel Road, so called, in Cold River. By petition.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for support of the Elliot Community Hospital, Keene, N. H.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$417.00 to contribute to the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for the support of the Rockingham Hospital at Bellows Falls, Vt.

Article 25. To see if the town will rescind its vote under Art. 13 of 1951 discontinuing (subject to gates and bars) High street from 50 feet above the bridge at Walpole

Village end to the intersection of roads at upper end of High St. By petition.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to observe formally the 200th anniversary of the founding of the town of Walpole; to provide for a committee to make plans for a summer program at a time they would set; and to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to meet the expenses of such a celebration. By petition.

Article 27. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to remove or repair fountain in center of square owned by the town.

Article 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to remain open until 6 p. m. or later if so voted.

#### REPORT OF TRUSTEES ON TOWN LIBRARY

The past year has been routine without any unusual or radical changes. The librarian, Miss Bellows, at the South end of town and Mrs. Hogan, of North Walpole, occasionally relieved by her sister, Miss Lynch, have continued their work with real cooperation and we believe both libraries are fortunate to have their services. Mr. Hubbard's report will show that we have made slight increases in their salaries.

The library at North Walpole continues to operate in the school building and while its location is not as convenient as we might wish—the increased number and quality of the books available are a real reward for the extra effort involved to obtain them.

In Walpole we have replaced some of the classics with more modern editions having, in particular, better and larger print. We have, also, obtained several excellent books of art reproductions.

The reference material, which we were able to add to our catalogue through the use of State Aid Funds, is being used to good advantage and we commend its further use to you. The Compton World Book Encyclopedia is a superior and excellent source of reference.

In Walpole Village we have been troubled by a lack of respect for the authority of the librarian and for library property. We found it necessary to withhold library privileges from a few offenders, but we are hopeful that in the coming year this lack of cooperation may be corrected. However, the state laws invests the trustees with absolute authority to enforce the rules and regulations of the library and failing voluntary cooperation we shall feel justified to take legal action to maintain the full usefulness of the library and to protect the dignity and authority of the librarian.

The trustees welcome suggestions, either about the function of the library or possible books to be added to the catalogue. At the last meeting it was decided to have a "suggestion box" for any ideas you might like to bring to the attention of the trustees. This box will be found on the shelf of the receiving desk and any proposal placed in it will be considered at the next meeting of the trustees.

## REPORT OF TOWN AUDITORS

In accordance with Sections 18 and 26 of Chapter 59, Revised Laws of New Hampshire, we have examined the accounts of the Selectmen, Town Treasurers, Town Clerk, Tax Collectors, Road Agents, Trustees of Trust Funds, Treasurer of the Cemetery Committee, and Treasurer of the Library Committee for the year ended December 31, 1951.

Our examinations were made in accordance with the auditing standards as required by the State Tax Commission and included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary or as were possible under the circumstances and in view of the limited time available.

No examination was made of the accounts of the Municipal Court. A financial report was not available and we were informed that a set of accounting records had not been maintained during the year. In view of the limited time available we did not attempt to verify, by reference to any documents that may have been available, the amount of \$165.03 received by the Town Treasurers from the Municipal Court during the year.

The examination of the accounts and records of the Town Clerk disclosed that errors had been made during the year, the ascertained amounts of which are summarized below:

These minor errors, with the exception of the item of \$19.00, were discussed in detail with the town clerk on January 14, 1952, and the overpayment of \$15.00 on Town Order No. 3058 was referred to a selectman at a later date.

It was also observed that the town clerk had:

- (1) Issued two kennel licenses and collected a fee of \$12.00 for each such license. However, six dogs tags had been given out with one of the licenses and three tags with the other. Sections 6 and 9 of Chapter 180 of the Revised Laws apparently require that a separate license shall be issued and a separate fee collected for each dog tag issued.
- (2) Not always collected from the automobile owner the 50c transfer fee required by Section 18 of Chapter 116 of the Motor Vehicle Law, although the Town had been charged with the Clerk's fee of 50c in every instance.

- (3) Charged automobile owners for motor vehicle permits issued between December 1 and March 31 at two-thirds of the annual permit fee, rather than at one-third as provided by Section 21 of Chapter 166 of the Motor Vehicle Law.
- (4) Charged automobile owners, upon the transfer of ownership of a motor vehicle for which they had obtained a permit and the application for a permit for a new car, between December 1 and March 31 at two-thirds of the annual rate for the new permit and credited them with the full amount paid on the original permit. Section 18 of Chapter 116 of the Motor Vehicle Law provides that only one-third of the respective amounts shall be so charged and credited.

Because of the limited time available, we could not ascertain the totals of the various amounts involved. However, these matter were discussed with the Town Clerk on January 14, 1952 and with one of the Selectmen on January 19, 1952. We did not see the report which the Town Clerk sent to the printer, but in view of the existing conditions we are not in a position to report to the town, as provided in Section 26 of Chapter 59 of the Revised Laws, that the accounts of the Town Clerk had been "correctly cast and well vouched."

It is suggested that the Selectmen discontinue the practice of having the Town Treasurer sign blocks of blank checks prior to the preparation and signature by the Selectmen of the Town Orders. It is also recommended that the Tax Collector North of Cold River maintain a separate bank account in which to carry town funds until they are paid to the Town Treasurer at the end of each month.

At the commencement of the examinations the auditors were not aware that they were expected to have the work completed so that the audited financial statements of the various Town Officers could be delivered to the printer not later than January 15, 1952. However, they were so

informed on February 2, 1952, at which time it was explained to them that the date of February 15, 1952 was the absolute limit beyond which no changes could be made in any of the material which had been sent to the printer for the inclusion in the Town Report. As a result, not all of the financial statements which went to the printer had been checked by the auditors. However, by reference to available copies and other data we have satisfied ourselves that the statements so submitted, with the exception of the Report of the Town Clerk, are substantially correct.

In our opinion, and subject to the foregoing explanations, the financial statements of the Town Officers present fairly the results of the operations for the year ended December 31, 1951.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the town of Walpole qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district on the 11th day of March 1952, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose two members of the school board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers and agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the District will authorize the school board to enter into a contract with the school district of Rockingham, Vermont; for the payment of high school tuition.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700 as a deficiency appropriation to cover added expenses of operating the schools this current year.
- 11. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the purchase and acquisition of a parcel of land adjoining the present site of the Grade Schools in North Walpole.
- 12. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to defray the expenses of consulting an architect, approved by the State Board of Education, on plans for a school in North Walpole.
- 13. To tranact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

There continues to be a continual change in our school population. Last September we enrolled, in the Village School, twenty-four more pupils than the previous September. Since then twelve pupils have enrolled. During the same period twenty-two pupils have left. Two of these may return. This movement is not in any one grade, but is spread over the twelve. In North Walpole we had 139 pupils in September. Six have come in since then and fourteen have left so that the present enrollment is 131.

We expect over forty-two pupils in the first grade in the Village next year; forty in 1953 and forty-four in 1954. As these large groups go up through the grades the school will begin to be overcrowded. What will come after that is difficult to foresee. If building conditions improve there may be more new houses built.

We have several new teachers this year. Mr. John Barry is taking the North Walpole Junior High classes taught last year by Miss Marshall, who resigned to get married. Mr. Barry is a graduate of the University of Vermont, and spent several months in the Marine Corps during the war. We lost three of our experienced teachers last year with the resignation of Mrs. Galloway, Miss Weeks, and Mr. Lord. Mr. Howard Richardson of Marlboro is taking the classes taught by Mrs. Galloway. He is a veteran and a graduate of the state University. He taught last year in Maine. Miss Weeks' coaching and teaching assignment was taken by Miss Louise Bradley, who resigned in January because of ill health. Miss Ruth Carr of Swampscott is completing the year in this position.

Mr. Eldridge Wallace is the agriculture teacher this year. He is a graduate of the University of Maine, is a veteran, and has taught in Maine.

Mr. McCool resigned in June to enter business. The commercial department is directed by Miss Norma Hunt, a Boston University graduate and a native of Lexington, Massachusetts.

We have had two cadet teachers in the Elementary grades this year. Miss Barbara Roy in the first semester and Miss Mary Fitzgerald in the second. These young ladies are seniors in K. T. C., and while learning to be teachers by observing and doing, are rendering our teachers a service by being able to assist them with their large classes.

This spring our school nurse, Miss Frances Edgett, retires after nearly a quarter century of service caring for the health of our children. She will be missed greatly in our program.

Your committee on the North Walpole building program has had several meetings during the year and is asking for funds to carry out some definite recommendations. Building conditions are such that actual construction would be difficult at this time, but it is hoped that plans will be ready when the proper time arrives.

# REPORT OF PRINCIPAL NORTH WALPOLE SCHOOLS

Mr. Theron B. Thompson, Superintendent of Schools, Walpole, New Hampshire.

I submit herewith my report as principal of the North Walpole Schools:

The registration shows a decrease of eleven pupils from the registration figures of last year. I attribute this decrease to the fact that a small per cent of the population in the village is what might be termed as a "floating" population. The average per cent of attendance for the school for the twenty week period is 96.02%.: To date we have only 28 tardy marks for the whole school which is a notable decrease over past years.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

Standardized Tests in Reading and in Arithmetic were given in the Intermediate Grades last Spring for purposes of determining the achievement of the pupils in

these two most important subjects, as well as suggesting the areas that would require reteaching.

Social Studies now in its third year as a subject in our school curriculum has proven to be, not only one of the most popular subjects, but also one of the most important in our program. I base my conclusion on the fact that there has been a remarkable improvement in the Social Education of the pupils as shown by the Stanford Achievement Test in Social Studies given last year.

This year the new type report card, as worked out by a committee of teachers from the School Union, is being used. The card is not as yet in its final form. Suggestions as to changes that could be made to further improve the method of reporting pupil progress, are welcomed from teachers, parents, and other interested townspeople. Formal acceptance of the new type card will not be made probably until next school year.

The teachers from grades two, four, five, and six have just completed a course in Audio-Visual Aids given at Walpole and Bellows Falls under the auspices of the University of New Hampshire. The teachers from grades five and six also attended Summer School at Keene Teachers College. I wish to congratulate these teachers upon their professional advancement and I again wish to state that teachers who attend summer school or take extension courses should in some way be recompensed by the school district.

The teachers of North Walpole attended 100% the annual two day State Convention held at Manchester, New Hampshire, last fall.

#### ORGANIZATION

The School Safety Patrol is under the direction of William Harty in the Eighth Grade and of Paul McGuirk in the Seventh Grade. I suggest that either the School District or some other interested organization purchase police belts for the boys and girls who have to do patrol duty. I further recommend that our boys and girls be in-

structed either by our local police or state police on how to best direct traffic when they are on duty. This would tend to keep in their minds the responsibilities they have, as well as to be mindful of the many dangers present to pedestrians.

"Movies," concerned with the different subjects taught in the grades, are shown on the average of once a week. I recommend that the school purchase a "Film-Strip Projector" to be used in connection with Social Studies in the various grades.

The boys who played touch-football this fall, along with their coach, Mr. John Barry, are to be congratulated on going through the season undefeated. Such a feat is a rare accomplishment and speaks well for their coach. The boys' basketball team entered the "Junior High Tournament" again last spring and came off with consolation honors. Our cheer leaders according to many who viewed the tournament were voted the best.

The year book, "Hilltop News," under the guidance of Miss Marshall, was edited in June. It was judged by critics to be one of the best ever put out by the seventh and eighth grades. The training and experience gained in publishing such a booklet can not be measured. Our present Junior High promises to equal, if not to surpass, the current edition.

An exhibit of school work and of "Hobbies" was held during the past year. The poor attendance, especially in the upper grades, was rather discouraging to both teachers and pupils. Unless greater interest is shown in this phase of our school program, the exhibit will be omitted in another year.

Assembly programs are held twice a month with the seventh and eighth grades alternating in putting them on. The pupils of both grades are given an opportunity to organize and conduct a program of some kind, thereby gaining valuable experience and developing in them the qualities of leadership, fair play, and respect for the thoughts of others.

I wish to thank the townspeople who contributed so generously toward our "Turkey Raffle." Through their generosity the school will be able to continue its "Movie" program.

The school has contributed nearly 100% to the following worthy causes: "Junior Red Cross," N. H. Tubercular Fund," and "The March of Dimes."

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Superintendent, School Board, Parents, Teachers and Pupils for their cooperation in making the school year the success that it was.

#### GRADUATES

There were nineteen graduates in the class of June 1951. Of this group one entered the University of New Hampshire, one Keene Teachers College, one Williams College, two Northampton Commercial College, one the Fisher School of Boston, one the Chamberlain School of Design in Boston, one Becker Business College in Worcester, and one the Nurses School in Brattleboro. Six are working, and four are at home.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS

Walpole is an approved New Hampshire High School. Our graduates are admitted to the better colleges of the country on the same basis as students from much larger schools. Many of our graduates are honor students in the

colleges they attend. An average of 85% is necessary for recommendation to college. The passing grade is 70%. It should be of interest that one of last year's graduates qualified for a full scholarship at both Dartmouth and Williams.

#### LIBRARY

There is need of many good books in the fields of biography, travel, sports, science, and classical literature. Books of this caliber are earnestly solicited from the people of Walpole, who would like to see their personal libraries put to wider use.

#### NOON LUNCH

The School Lunch program has been operating since before Thanksgiving under the able direction of Mrs. Ruth Jeffrey and Mrs. Rachel Martin. This is a type A lunch, and it will continue until the close of school in June. This year Mrs. Jeffrey, a graduate in Home Economics, is planning the menus. The Walpole School has a Federally Aided program, with no assistance from other organizations. The approximate number of students served each day is 270. Seasonal decoration of the lunch room is being sponsored by the elementary grades.

#### EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The Student Council is active, with a membership made up of two students from each of the six High School home rooms. The Council has sponsored the purchase of records for the communication system, and presents a full-length movie before each vacation. Several of the established policies of the school are the result of Student Council recommendations to the faculty.

The Walpole School is represented by two varsity basketball teams, for boys and girls, and two junior varsity teams. There are also Junior High teams. Last year Walpole was the recipient of the Class C Runner-up Trophy in Basketball at the tournament in Claremont. This year's record allows the most conservative to expect Walpole to receive a tournament bid once more.

Walpole was the winner in the Annual One-Act Play Contest between Charlestown, Vilas and Walpole High Schools.

The school is represented at the Annual F. F. A. Convention in Kansas City, and also at the New England Music Festival in Boston. Walpole was host to the Southeastern New Hampshire Music Festival, an affair which brought together over one thousand people in the Hubbard Gymnasium.

#### PARENT-TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

The Parent-Teachers Association meets the first Monday of each month at 8:00 p. m. in the Hubbard Gymnasium. This association has an average attendance of over eighty, with a membership of over 150. The programs are well planned, and represent a real contribution to the program of the school. Last year Mr. Dahl of the Boston Herald was presented free to the school children, with the general public paying admission. This year several programs of cultural interest are planned for the students of the school.

#### AGRICULTURE

The Annual School Fair was held in September, sponsored by the Future Farmers and Future Homemakers. The parade, community exhibits, and Harvest Dance were the highlights of the affair.

The activities of the Future Farmers this year have been quite varied. The chapter operated the school orchard and starting garden plants as self-supporting projects.

The Chapter was awarded the highest national award in the National Chapter contest. This placed the Chapter in the top thirty-eight chapters in the country on the basis of accomplishments in 1950-1951.

Two boys went to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City.

Teams were entered in the judging events at the state contests. Edward Jennison placed first in Milk Judging, and will represent New Hampshire at Springfield next fall. The Dairy Judging team placed third.

On the state level the Chapter won the State Farm Safety contest. Charles Dalzell won the State Rural Electrification contest, and Thomas Kiniry won the State Farm Mechanics award. Each award is \$100.

Wesley Staples represented New Hampshire at Springfield in Poultry Judging.

The Chapter sold cider at school functions and to students from the apples from the school orchard.

There are at present 29 boys enrolled in Agriculture, which is a large proportion of our enrollment in the upper grades. This enrollment, together with the Junior High School shop classes severely taxes the available facilities. This is not a situation which may be remedied without considerable financial outlay, or a narrowing of the present Junior High curriculum.

The Walpole FFA Chapter was represented by an extensive vegetable display at the Cheshire Fair.

#### COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

The purpose of the Walpole High School Commercial Department is to train typists, bookkeepers, and stenographers. In bookkeeping, shorthand, and advanced typewriting, the students are preparing to use their skills in the business world. However, first-year typewriting students are expected to master two levels—the personal or social use level and the incidental business use level. All students will be able to type themes, manuscripts, and personal correspondence. The introduction to business typewriting enables students to determine whether or not they are interested in pursuing the advanced business typewriting course. Under assets, this department lists 12 typewriters in good condition, 2 adding machines, 1 Speed-O-Print Duplicator and excellent books for each student. There are 25 first-year typewriting students, 12

advanced typists, 6 shorthand students, and 5 bookkeeping students. (The decrease in enrollment in shorthand and bookkeeping below that of last year is due to the fact that only the advanced courses are being offered this year. Only those students with a definite vocational aim would be taking the courses.

#### NEEDS

The main need of the Walpole School is in the area of improved library facilities. It will be impossible to provide the enrichment which is necessary for continuing intellectual growth, until our library becomes a matter of genuine concern for every public-spirited citizen.

I would like to thank the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, teachers, parents, pupils, and citizens of Walpole for their continuing cooperation and unselfish assistance.
