## TOWN MEETING — MARCH 12, 1968

March 12, 1968

Weare, N. H.

Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Scott F. Eastman at 9:00 a.m. It was voted to dispense with the reading of the warrant at this time. The School Warrant for the election of School District Officers was read at this time. It was voted to keep the polls open for balloting until 10:00 p.m.

Proceeded to ballot for Town Officers, School District officers and, as this was Presidential Primary, for Presidential Preference, Vice-President, Delegates and Delegates at Large, also Alternates, Republican and Democrat.

*ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.*

*ARTICLE II: To hear and act upon the report of the Committee on Wages and Salaries.*

Walter D. Hodgman, Chairman of the Committee on Wages and Salaries, presented the following report, after reading, to the Moderator.

The Committee has made an extensive study of the salaries and wages of the officers and employees of the Town in accordance with Article No. 27 of the Town Warrant of 1966 and submit the following recommendations and suggestions for consideration.

Selectmen:

Study indicates that most towns pay their Selectmen on an annual salary basis rather than an hourly rate. The Committee recommends that the salary method be adopted here and suggests the following salaries:

1st Selectman	\$800.00
2nd Selectman	700.00
3rd Selectman	600.00

Tax Collector:

Study indicates that a very large percentage of towns in the State are paying their tax collectors at an annual salary rather than a percentage of the tax warrant. The Committee feels that since our tax rate is steadily increasing here in Weare, and realizing that each time our tax rate is increased our Tax Collector's pay is also increased, we should possibly consider changing our method to an annual salary.

Town Clerk:

Study indicates the base salary of this office to be slightly lower in comparison with other towns, but, in consideration of the fact that the Legislature has recently passed a fifty cent increase to Town Clerks for auto permits, the Committee recommends this base salary be increased to \$200.00 per year. This will reflect a \$50.00 per year increase.

Town Treasurer:

Study indicates this salary is slightly low in comparison with other Towns and recommend it be increased to \$500.00 per year. This reflects a \$100.00 per year increase.

Overseer of Poor:

Committee recommends an annual salary for this office in lieu of the present hourly rate method and suggest it be established at \$200.00 per year. This will reflect no appreciable change from the amounts paid in 1966.

Fire Department:

Committee recommends the Fire Chief be paid at the rate of \$2.00 per hour and all firemen be paid at the rate of \$1.75 per hour.

Health Officer:

Study indicates this salary to be in line with other towns; therefore, the Committee recommends no change at this time.

Highway Department:

Study indicates the hourly rates of pay presently being paid our highway department personnel to be in line with other towns; therefore, the Committee recommends no change at this time.

Librarian:

Study indicates this person's pay is in line with other towns having a library such as ours; therefore, the Committee recommends no change at this time.

Trustee of Trust Funds:

Committee recommends the salary of the bookkeeper of these trust funds be increased to \$150.00 per year. This will reflect a \$100.00 per year increase.

Committee suggests that a standard hourly rate of \$1.50 per hour be established for all other people such as Supervisors of Checklist, Ballot Clerks, Moderator, Auditors, etc.

On Motion by Bernard Phelps, Jr., and seconded by George Welch, to adopt the report as read, discussion followed.

It was stated by the Moderator that the effective date of this article would be the current year. An amendment by the Chairman of the Finance Committee that the Tax Collector's Salary be \$2,000.00 a year, plus expenses, was accepted, and the report with the amendment then was voted and accepted.

*ARTICLE III: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.*

The Finance Committee recommended \$27,500.00. Motion by Chester W. French, Jr., and seconded by Bernard Phelps, Jr., to accept as recommended, was voted in the affirmative.

*ARTICLE IV: To make provision for the collection of taxes.*

It was moved and supported that this article be left with the Selectmen. Vote affirmative.

*ARTICLE V: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, said loans to be repayable from taxes from the year 1968, and to issue notes therefor in the name of the Town, at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.*

A motion by Dorothy Leavitt, seconded by Donald Lewis, to accept this article as read was voted in the affirmative.

*ARTICLE VI: To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.*

Voted to dismiss this article. Affirmative vote.

*ARTICLE VII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges, and to take any other vote in relation thereto.*

Finance Committee recommendation was \$12,000.00 for winter roads and \$12,000.00 for summer roads. After an explanation of needs by the Road Agent, Eldon Townes, Chester W. French, Jr., moved and George Welch seconded that the recommendation be adopted and \$24,000.00 be raised and appropriated under this article. Vote was affirmative.

*ARTICLE VIII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for general expenses of the Highway Department.*

The Finance Committee recommendation was \$10,000.00. After explanation by Eldon J. Townes of what this is used for, Lawrence McManus moved, and Chester W. French, Jr., seconded to adopt the recommendation and raise and appropriate \$10,000.00. Voted in affirmative.

*ARTICLE IX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1976.87 to be used with the sum of \$13,119.15 to be furnished by the State, for Class IV and V Construction, Reconstruction and Betterment Aid.*

Finance Committee recommended this article be accepted as printed in the warrant and that \$1,976.87 be raised and appropriated to be

used in conjunction with \$13,119.15 from the State for Class IV and V roads and that it be used in the South Division. On motion of Robert Goulet and seconded by Mrs. Goulet, it was so voted.

*ARTICLE X: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.*

Finance Committee recommendation was \$1500.00.

After explanation by Chief Gerald Hight, a motion by Robert Black, duly seconded, was made to raise and appropriate \$2500.00 for the Police Department, any balance to be carried over to the next year; discussed, and amended by Wilder Tenney that the amount be \$2,000.00 instead of \$2500.00. The amendment was accepted and \$2,000.00 was voted to be raised and appropriated.

*ARTICLE XI: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.*

Recommendation of Finance Committee was \$4,000.00.

After explanation on needs of the Fire Department, Wilfred Brunette moved, and seconded by Wilder Tenney, that \$5,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the Weare Fire Department. Vote in affirmative.

*ARTICLE XII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.*

Upon recommendation of \$800.00 by the Finance Committee, a motion by Wendell Colburn, seconded by Jack Reade, to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for the care of cemeteries was voted in the affirmative.

*ARTICLE XIII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.*

Finance Committee recommendation was \$400.00. On motion by Bernard Phelps, Jr., and seconded by Gordon A. Russell, Jr., it was voted to raise and appropriate \$400.00. Vote affirmative.

*ARTICLE XIV: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library.*

The sum of \$500.00 was recommended by Finance Committee.

Elsie Purington, Library Trustee suggested that insulation be installed over the library ceiling and requested \$600.00 be raised and appropriated. A motion for \$600.00 by Wilfred Brunette was seconded by Walter Hodgman and the vote to raise and appropriate \$600.00 was affirmative.

*ARTICLE XV: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.*

Upon a motion by Walter D. Hodgman, and supported, it was voted in affirmative to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

*ARTICLE XVI: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program.*

Upon a motion by Gordon Russell, Jr., duly seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program.

*ARTICLE XVII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$318.00 for the support of the Concord Hospital.*

Recommended by the Finance Committee to raise and appropriate \$318.00 for the support of the Concord Hospital. Florence Flanders made the motion for this amount, duly seconded by Robert Goulet, and the vote was affirmative.

*ARTICLE XVIII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for White Pine Blister Control.*

A motion by Bernard Phelps, Jr., duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for White Pine Blister Control was voted in the affirmative.

*ARTICLE XIX: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of an ambulance.*

No recommendation was made by the Finance Committee. After some talk on the subject by Gerald Hight and Leon Taylor, a motion by Mrs. Goulet to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for purchase of an ambulance, seconded by Gordon Russell, Jr., it was voted in the affirmative.

*ARTICLE XX: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Rescue Ambulance.*

No recommendation by Finance Committee. Upon a motion by Mrs. Goulet and seconded, it was discussed and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for support of the Rescue Ambulance.

*ARTICLE XXI: To hear the report of the Town Hall Committee and see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the implementation of the Committees' proposals.*

The following report was read with some explanations by Wendell Colburn, chairman of the committee.

The Town Hall, proudly perched, and of sturdy construction on ledge, standing in the Center is not the first town house erected in Weare. The present building was erected in 1837 in conjunction with the Universalists, they in turn agreeing to pay for the second story and to provide their own furniture, etc., thus enabling them to have a church. Much lumber from the first town house was incorporated into the present structure by agreement. The actual cost to the Town was to be kept under \$1,000.00 - and it was.

The Committee appointed by Moderator Scott Eastman "to examine the possibility of restoring the Town Hall" met and voted unanimously that it should be restored.

Thoughts ran generally to restoring the original condition wherever possible, except for the second story. This will call for

- (a) refinishing floors
- (b) Re-painting interior

- (c) probable installation of Ozite carpeting in front hall with small amount just inside the double-door-way to hall entrance
- (d) decided improvement in both restrooms
- (e) removal of portions of the present ceiling and exploring the possibility of restoring the original plaster ceiling

This last, plus the refinishing of the floor would probably be the two major projects as the underpinning is reported in good shape and the building is well roofed. The sheds, the Committee feels, are an integral part of the Town Hall and should be repaired and restored. A drastic cleaning out would be the first order of business and especially upstairs, where some minor repairs are also needed.

Repairing and refinishing the old settees and replacing the seating now used is suggested. It being rather doubtful that many meetings or gatherings would take place in cold weather (there being more convenient places in town) we feel the wood-burning stove should be improved on, or replaced by similar ones reflecting the proper period, if possible.

Weare has a beautiful Town Hall and it should be a proud factor in the lives of our townspeople. We see it unkempt but still proud. We feel it can be a place of beauty where townsfolk could take pride in holding a wedding reception, a reunion or similar affair.

It is not a small project nor do we claim it to be inexpensive. We would do what we could to obtain "helping funds" through the Historical Society, but we look on this as a rare possibility.

If the Town wishes to pursue the suggested objective of the committee and sees fit to raise a sum of money to start, the committee will do its utmost to see that the money is well spent. It is our feeling that we should pursue our goal over a period of years and pay as we go.

Upon a motion by Paula Sawyer, seconded by Walter D. Hodgman, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to initiate the restoration of the Town Hall.

*ARTICLE XXII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately \$85.00 for dues (per capita) to the New Hampshire Municipal Association.*

Upon a motion by H. Talbot Pearson, seconded by Harold Thomson, it was voted affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85.00 for per capita dues to the New Hampshire Municipal Association.

*ARTICLE XXIII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of suitable land for a centrally located Town Dump.*

No recommendation was made by the Finance Committee. Motion to dismiss this article by Walter Hodgman, seconded by Daniel Sawyer, was affirmed by standing vote.

*ARTICLE XXIV: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to cancel present arrangements for the maintenance of the Dump and to re-open bids for the job. (By petition)*

On motion by Bernard Phelps, Jr., and duly supported, that the matter be left with the Selectmen, the vote was negative. On motion by H. Talbot Pearson, duly supported that the article as stated in the warrant be put into effect, the vote was negative. A long discussion ensued and resulted in a motion by Raymond Rogers, duly supported, that this article be dismissed. Vote was affirmative.

*ARTICLE XXV: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Department to inspect all space heaters and to urge that all dwellings or other occupied buildings be equipped with at least one fire extinguisher. (By petition)*

After long discussion, it was moved by Wilfred Brunette and duly supported, that this article be dismissed. Vote was affirmative.

*ARTICLE XXVI: To see if the Town will authorize the Road Agent to blacktop the highway known as Woodbury Road, and to take any necessary action in relation thereto. (By petition)*

Charles Brown moved that this article be dismissed. It was duly supported and the vote was affirmative.

*ARTICLE XXVII: To see if the Town will vote to change the location of Mount Dearborn Road at the Farley Place.*

On a motion by Charles Brown and duly supported, a long discussion ensued. It was voted that the location of the road at the Farley place be changed with no expense to the Town. All expense to be borne by the purchaser of the Farley Place. Vote was affirmative.

*ARTICLE XXVIII: To see if the Town will vote to accept as town roads the sections of Old Routes 77 & 114 now lying outside the new right-of-way.*

On motion by H. Talbot Pearson and seconded by George W. Crosby, it was voted to accept the article as printed in the warrant. Affirmative vote.

*ARTICLE XXIX: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.*

It was asked as to why Article 26 of last year's warrant had not been carried out.

On a motion by Wendell Colburn the Moderator appoint a committee of three to work with the School Board on investigating the correction of the accoustics in the Elementary School Gym. The vote was negative.

On a motion by H. Talbot Pearson, seconded by Dorothy Leavitt, that the Selectmen be authorized to sign a license for Army Engineers covering maintenance of access road to Everett Dam the vote was affirmative.

Action on Warrant starting with Article II at 8:10 P.M.

Recessed for voting 9:45 P.M. Closed polls at 10:02 P.M.

Continued with warrant. Business completed 11:05 P.M. Proceeded to count ballots.

Newly elected officers sworn in by Moderator.

## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare School Gymnasium in said Town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges, and take any action in relation thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for general expenses of the Highway Department.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,983.06, to be used with the sum of \$13,220.42 to be furnished by the state, for Class IV and Class V Construction, Reconstruction and Betterment Aid.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.
10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.
11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.
12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library.
13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$265.00 for the support of the Concord Hospital.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the White Pine Blister Control.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the Town Forest.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the Merrimack Valley Regional Association.
19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Civil Defense.
20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the dam at Clement's Shop.
21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Visiting Nurses Home and Health Plan.
22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the restoration of the Town Hall.
23. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Weare Center School Property to the American Legion Post No. 65 or take any other action in relation thereto.
24. To see if the Town will vote to act upon the following ordinances.  
(By petition)
  - A. No Trailers or Mobile Homes, used for dwelling purposes, shall hereafter be constructed, erected, maintained, located or relocated within the Township of Weare, N. H., unless the same shall be located within a duly licensed Trailer or Mobile Home Park.
  - B. Provided however that the Selectmen shall have the right to authorize exceptions to the above after a public hearing relative to such exceptions, and further provided that the Selectmen MUST give substantial weight to the views and wishes expressed by abutters and neighbors at such public hearing.
  - C. This ordinance shall expressly not apply to Travel Trailers, so-called,

not used as permanent living quarters, which may be stored on the premises of the owner in Weare, N. H.

25. To see if the Town will vote to act on an ordinance limiting the number of Trailer Parks in the Town to one (By petition)

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the expenses of the Planning Board.

27. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the road which passes through the yard of the so-called Whitney Place, from the entrance on the Clinton Grove Road to the exit on Route 149.

28. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Highway Employees for the following holidays, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years, also one week paid vacation.

29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to erect an addition to the Weare Center Fire House to house the ambulance.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have an area light installed at the Town Hall by Public Service Co.

31. To see what action the Town will take in regards to opening the South Weare dump.

32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The department handled over 200 cases during 1968. This is a considerable increase over any previous year, and follows the national trend. Breaking and entering, and larceny cases increased greatly. Motor vehicle accidents were less, but violations increased. Vandalism is without doubt the motive of many of the cases of breaking and entering. Buildings are broken into and messed up, but in many instances nothing is taken. Articles taken in larcenies include firearms, tools, sporting equipment, boat accessories, boats, money, radios, television sets, record players, and furniture.

Several camp breaks were discovered in the winter by the owners, but not reported until several months later. Our chances of cleaning up such breaks are much better if reported as soon as discovered.

Unoccupied summer homes and camps are an invitation to a certain class of persons. We cannot possibly keep these remote places under observation. Don't leave valuable items in closed up seasonal buildings. Take your guns, radios, power tools, liquor and other valuables with you. Such items are a great temptation to break into such places. We make many checks on closed up camps and houses.

We have many requests to investigate and check out suspicious and undesirable persons. Usually with good information such as car registration numbers, car descriptions, and details of the persons involved, we can find out who the people are and the reason for their presence in these places.

Make it a practice to get car license numbers, make, and year, and color of all cars that seem to cause you any concern. Take good mental notes of people, as to age, size, clothing, hair, and other visible features, that come to your house, or in odd situations that you may come across.

The observations of some person is usually the only evidence we have to work on. Beware of strangers attempting to gain entrance into your house whether as salesmen, or to use the phone, or by other pretext. We can cut down the rate of criminal offenses if we have the full cooperation of the average citizens.

The use of unoccupied houses and camps by groups of young people as places to stage beer parties is a problem. Usually these groups come out of the cities with the idea that such acts are easy to get away with in a small town. We apprehended several of these groups this past year.

Night patrolling of the town is done when deemed necessary. More should be done between the hours of 10 P.M. and 4 A.M. This is very difficult, however, with volunteer officers who all have to work days. Patrol in Weare cost \$425 and consisted of 172 hours, and 1806 miles. The new rate of pay has added to the cost of operation of the department.

William Wheldon, an officer for several years, resigned and is greatly missed. He was readily available and was of great assistance to the department. David St. Clair was appointed to the force and has been a valuable addition. We needed an officer in South Weare.

Our present 2 radios on the State Police frequency cannot be used after July first. This system is to be discontinued and a new system set up.

New equipment on F.M. high frequency, will be needed to replace our present mobile sets. This new system will give us not only contact with State Police Headquarters but also inter town operation when desirable.

This change over will cost about \$1000 to equip the two cars, presently on with the State Police.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Department answered 33 calls for fires during 1968, continuing the good record for the previous two years, well below our average in number. Fire in a temporary camp, probably caused by leaking gas, took the life of a small child. This was the third death from fire in Weare within a year. A large summer residence was struck by lightning and completely burned before being discovered. Another remote unoccupied camp and barn burned for no apparent cause. Several fires involving buildings were definitely of incendiary origin. The locker room fire at the school gym was very efficiently handled by a small crew. The value of having sufficient and proper equipment, as well as trained men was well demonstrated at this fire. Fire loss and damage was kept to a minimum.

The problem of fighting fires in house trailers was again demonstrated. There is no margin of safety from defective heating systems in house trailers. Periodic inspection and servicing is a must. Be certain that doors can be opened easily. In winter, freezing of moisture around them is not uncommon. Find out the cause of any fumes or smoke. Make repairs immediately. Your life may depend on it.

A wet season kept the number and size of brush fires small. Good fire prevention can eliminate most of the grass and brush fires. Get a permit to do any outdoor burning. Don't leave any fire unattended. Keep matches away from children and teach them the dangers of all types of fires.

Fires in 1968 were: Buildings, 13; Chimneys, 4; Brush, 4; Cars, 4; Power lines, 3; Smoke investigation, 1; Gas leak, 1; Overturned gasoline truck, 1. One building and one brush fire were out of town. Defective heating equipment caused a good number of the building fires. Other causes were: Electric blanket, Electric wiring, and undetermined origin.

The Rescue Squad had an active year, answering 32 calls ranging from a newborn baby to heart attacks, broken bones, and assorted accident cases. One man was cut out of a demolished car. Ours is not an ambu-

lance service but any emergency will be taken care of. The new Rescue Truck has been used 25 times since being put into service. The interior arrangement of cabinets, seating and equipment storage was built by the members. Carried are: stretcher, basket litter, first aid kit, Resuscitator, and spare oxygen bottles, 2 Scott air masks, and spare air bottles, splints, generator, and flood lights, electric saw, Hydraulic rescue kit, chain hoist, and chains, hand lights, tools, blankets, and water proof sheets. Two patients may be carried. Our rescue work is much more effective with this excellent piece of equipment.

An addition should be built onto The Center Fire Station to properly house the Rescue Truck and a Tank Truck able to carry 1200-1500 gallons of water. A tanker such as this would help to make up for our man power shortage. Our truck No. 4 purchased in 1949 is 20 years old. We should be thinking of replacing it soon as it is extremely difficult to obtain repair parts for vehicles of this age. It also takes two years to get delivery of a fire truck after placing an order.

Our Red Phone operators answered over 300 calls during 1968: Fires 33, Rescue Squad 32, Police 105, Burning Permits 14, Information 36, Power Failures 9, Civil Defense, and many others. These operators also are the Phone and Radio Dispatchers for the Fire and Police Radio systems.

In any emergency dial the Red Phone, 2333, and stay on the phone. Give necessary information and correct location of the emergency by section of the town, road name, and other details to get us to the right place with the right equipment. Many people in Weare are not placed by name.

Equipment added during the year included: Auxiliary Suction Inlet on No. 1 truck, 2 Scott Air Masks with 2 spare air bottles, 100 ft. of 2½ in. hose, 200 ft. of 1½ in. hose, 2 pr. boots, handlights, etc.

The pump on Truck No. 4 was overhauled, a new pump drive was put on Truck No. 2. Other minor repairs were made to the trucks.

The Ladies Auxiliary held their annual "Strawberry Festival", and "Christmas Party", which were greatly enjoyed. The kitchen floor was replaced by The Auxiliary. Their assistance to the department is greatly appreciated.

Monthly meetings were held, also several drills. We gave several demonstrations of our tank truck and portable tank water relay operation. It is difficult to get men out for drills, and practice, which is much needed. Not many are available during the day in all small towns. Our only alternative is to call in other fire departments, not for more equipment but for the additional man power.

The cost of operation of the department increased with the new rates of pay set up at town meeting.

We appreciate the assistance and cooperation received during the year. Be fire conscious and practice fire prevention in the home and in the out of doors. Let us make Weare a fire safe town.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result - escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
2. To NEVER discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn -
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for ALL debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on GRASS by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
  - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire BEFORE you light the match.
4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

## WEARE LIBRARY

During 1968 and up to this writing the library is being re-arranged and the book collection weeded and up-dated. Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, State consultant for this district, is assisting the librarian in this work.

Many scientific books are so old that information contained in them is of no value to the students doing research. These books are being replaced with the latest editions in these areas.

The library is being arranged so that one half will be strictly for children and young adults, the other half for adults and study. One area in the adult section is a definitely improved reference collection. With State Aid, many valuable reference books have been added to this section.

The Trustees have been very active. At monthly meetings policies for the operation of the library have been written and a copy is always available at the library. They have had the ceiling capped with six inches of insulation. Through the efforts of Mrs. Leavitt, the F.F.A. boys under the direction of Mr. Kuhn, were the ones who poured the insulation. The work was done efficiently and certainly at a great saving. This assistance was greatly appreciated.

Aluminum combination windows for the north side of the library are being installed and should save on heat. These are needed all around but the north side was most urgent.

The number of school children is increasing every year. They should have the opportunity of using the library properly - not rushed in and out without adequate time to select books. They should learn the proper way to have their books charged out and to use the library. The number of children and commotion makes it impossible in such a short time as is now available. The library still has the same hours for school children as it did when the school first started.

The Trustees and the librarian are working hard to make the library an improved service and with the help of the town this will be accomplished.

## TOWN HALL RESTORATION COMMITTEE

Due to the near impossibility of hiring personnel for small jobs and the early set-in of winter weather, the \$500 raised at the 1968 Town Meeting remained unspent and on Jan. 1, 1969 was applied to the General Fund, by law. We will attempt to recover the \$500 at the 1969 meeting and change the wording to read "to be carried over from year to year." If the committee had known the procedure in 1968, we would have added these words to the motion.

The restoration of the Town Hall is a major project if it is to be done properly. It is a tired looking hall inside. The committee has established a tentative sequence of projects, the first of which is a heating system. We are of the opinion a cement block building near the new chimney should be erected to house a furnace. This building will have to be faced with clapboards of either wood or aluminum so as not to detract from the original architecture of the Town Hall.

The ambulance has been moved from the sheds so perhaps we can proceed to improve them to an extent. We think and talk lots of things, many of which are probably in a hopeful manner and we are sure many of the townspeople do the same. One thing in particular is the so-called tractor shed. We would like to see it somewhere else. It was once part of the original sheds which were built in an "L" shape. It would not be, in our opinion, imperative that we rebuild the part running toward the front of the hall to retain the proper atmosphere the sheds tend to lend to the complex.

Suggested order of repair after the heating system were tentatively placed in this order: ceiling, including new wiring and lighting, walls, floors, and rest rooms. There are two methods to accomplish the goal, which we are sure all the townspeople would like to see. The goal is to make our Town Hall a place we can show off with pride, and feel proud ourselves when attending our meetings and social affairs. One method is to raise a little at a time, or second, a major project financed over a period of years.

The committee welcomes creative suggestions and the members wish the local people to feel free to communicate with them. As their chairman I would commend them for interest and foresight.

## RECORD OF SCHOOL MEETING March 7, 1968

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Scott F. Eastman at 8:07 P.M. The warrant was read by the moderator.

ARTICLE I – It was moved by Charles Brown, Jr. and duly seconded that the salaries of the Truant Officer and other agents and officers of the district be accepted as printed in the budget. The motion carried.

ARTICLE II – Lyhl Perrigo reported for the Regional Study Committee that no action on a regional plan has been taken since the second plan proposed was voted down.

Harry Greer reported for the Area Study Committee. Weare was asked to withdraw since it was participating in a regional study and by law could not take part in two studies at the same time. Therefore, figures for Weare's part in an Area school are not available. In reply to the question, "Has the School Board made any plans to resume talks with Goffstown concerning an Area school after votes of other towns are in?", Mr. Perrigo explained that the Committees were appointed for three years and after voting was completed in the other towns, talks could be resumed.

ARTICLE III – Howard Ineson moved and it was duly seconded that the School District have the same auditors as the Town. The motion carried.

ARTICLE IV – It was moved by Wallace E. Richmond and duly seconded that the district vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States. The motion carried.

ARTICLE V – Hubert C. Carter asked if the School Board could justify the increases in the budget. Lyhl Perrigo replied that increases largely reflect the decrease in foundation aid because of the re-valuation of

property within the town, and the increases in salaries of school district personnel.

The motion was made by Joseph Brown seconded by Robert Munro that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$254,371.28 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

A request for information from the finance committee was made. Raymond Rogers reported that the Finance Committee recommended a cut of \$20,000.00.

Leslie Knox moved that the motion be amended to read \$234,000.00 instead of \$254,371.28. This was seconded by Chester Rhodenizer, Jr. and Talbot Pearson. The amendment was not accepted by Mr. Brown and Mr. Munro. There was much discussion chiefly regarding teacher's salaries and the manner in which raises are determined. The vote on the amendment was by ballot. The results were Yes-90, No-40. Total vote 130. The amendment passed. Voting proceeded on the motion as amended. The vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$234,000. for the support of schools, etc. (see original motion) passed.

ARTICLE VII – Ruby Sargent moved and it was duly seconded that the School District Meeting be moved back to the Town Hall. The motion was lost.

Hubert C. Carter moved and it was duly seconded that the Building Committee be congratulated for its efforts on the new addition to the Elementary School. The motion passed.

## SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report relative to the schools of Weare.

The Weare School District compares with nearly every school district in New Hampshire in the areas of increased pupil enrollments and of upward spiralling costs of education.

The inflationary trend of the nations economy has been reflected locally in the purchase of textbooks, supplies and equipment and in the cost of nearly every item related to education including teachers' salaries, custodial costs, transportation and tuition.

Weare is faced with a growing school population which, in spite of our recent excellent elementary school addition, is taxing our facilities.

The table above indicates that there appears to be a trend of large entering classes which if it continues will require additional classroom space in the near future.

In the Weare Central School more than 40 grade one students are anticipated for September 1969 necessitating an additional teacher, while at the Weare High School 38 freshmen will replace 18 graduating seniors.

The number of teachers for 1968-69 and needed for 1969-70 as shown in the following table:

A deserving tribute was paid to Mrs. Reita Davis who retired as a teacher in June 1968 after 24 years of dedicated service to the boys and girls of Weare. In some instances her service spanned two generations.

A fire in the gymnasium locker rooms caused extensive fire and water damage to the locker rooms and the main floor of the gymnasium. Nearly three-fourths of the floor of the gymnasium was replaced and the entire basement area received major renovations and painting.

The voters of Weare elected a nine member school board to assure that the Weare schools are adequately staffed and are reasonably supplied with textbooks, materials and equipment that relate to the educational effort. The school board with Chairman Lyhl Perrigo, has made every effort to insure an economically as well as educationally sound school system. Simultaneously the entire school board and particularly Mr. Perrigo has untiringly and diligently sought a long range plan acceptable as a solution to the towns educational pattern to effect a relationship with some other town or towns in a coordinated educational effort.

Significant deletions in a realistic budget submitted by nine elected and highly respected members of the community whose every intent is an honest and workable budget without frills will either deny a reasonable education to the boys and girls of Weare or effect a deficit or both. It has been my experience in Weare that the voters when fully informed, have never denied the boys and girls the education that they not only deserve but which they must possess to successfully enjoy life in the twenty-first century in which they will live.

Paul Kilmister resigned his position of Consultant, Administrative Services, N. H. State Department of Education to assume the duties of Assistant Superintendent of Schools for N. H. Supervisory Union No. 19 comprised of Weare, Bow, Dunbarton, Goffstown and Weare. Mr. Kilmister brings to the educational effort of the Supervisory Union No. 19 a rich background in education as well as an outstanding background from many years of experience at various educational levels including teacher, principal, teacher consultant and state education department consultant.

I wish to commend the members of the Weare School Board for their dedicated service in endeavoring to provide Weare with an outstanding educational system that concerns itself with the full development of the individual boy and girl. I wish further to extend my appreciation for the support and cooperation extended to me by the school board, our new Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Paul Kilmister, the principals, teachers, pupils and citizens of Weare as well as the loyal support of the Supervisory Union No. 19 office staff.

The P.T.A. in cooperation with the School Health Service conducted a preventive program which consisted of cleaning the childrens' teeth, plus an application of topical flouride. Dental Health education and a referral program was incorporated with this service. One hundred and four children received this treatment.

All cafeteria workers received routine physical examinations.

Menstrual Hygiene Education Program for fifth and sixth grade girls was presented. A film was presented and appropriate literature was given all students.

A Crest Dental Education Program was given in the first six grades.

Pre School Registration was held in May with 39 children attending. Miss Patricia Linahan, a State Dental Hygienist was present at this time. All pre school children received a dental health evaluation and recommendations were made.

The School Health Services have had complete cooperation from all community agencies.

New Hampshire Sight Conservation, New Hampshire Bureau of Public Dental Health, New Hampshire Child Guidance, New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, New Hampshire Crippled Children's Association, the local P.T.A., and all supporting agencies.

Optimal health is essential for maximum utilization of educational opportunities, therefore, the health status of the child bears a direct relationship to the quality of his educational achievement.

The school health service attempts to be a stabilizing influence between the home, the school, and the community, and is ever contributing to the improvement of health and education of students.

We wish to express our thanks to the Superintendent, Parents, Teachers, and School Board for their cooperation.
