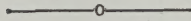

Town Meeting Warrant

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wentworth, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Wentworth, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for winter maintenance of town highways, (snow removal and sanding).
5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Construction of the Class 2 road known as North Dorchester Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$693.00, or will vote to accept State Aid Construction or Class 5 road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$430.27.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the library.

8. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new chassis for the fire engine, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the fire engine.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$46.26 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth—Lake Sunapee Region said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the white pine blister rust control.

13. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

14. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid before July 1st.

15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to care and improvement of the Foster Cemetery and raise and appropriate money to pay for same.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes if necessary.

17. To see if the Town will vote to make by-laws for licensing, regulating or restraining dogs as they shall deem expedient.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

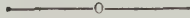

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Wentworth School District:

I hereby submit my tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. The statistical tables of the year 1938—1939 follow this report.

Since the last report of this series the entire teaching staff of the district has been changed. Norman Mason, a graduate of the Keene Teachers College and holding the Bachelor's degree from Boston University is in charge of the village grammar room. Mr. Mason is an experienced teacher of sound scholarship and is handling a large school in a masterful manner. His prestige among the pupils is of high order and his discipline is excellent. Pauline Webb is in charge of the primary room and she is successfully fulfilling a hard assignment with a heavy enrollment. Her organization and motivation show successful results. Carole Lavoie of Pike is teacher at the Atwell Hill School and is doing excellent work. Your Board closed the Foster School on January 5 and is transporting those 4 children to the village. Hazel Thompson was the teacher. It was with deep regret that your Board closed this school after many years of service in the south part of the town. It started the year with 7 scholars rather against its best judgment and that of the Supt. of Schools, but when 3 left town there was only one reasonable course to take and that was to transport the remaining 4 pupils to the village, which was done starting January 8th of this year. Neither from a financial nor an

educational viewpoint can a school of 4 enrollment be very successfully maintained.

The Kaustine tanks at the village were suspected of being nearly worn out. Later developments proved out that they were and perhaps would not have lasted through the present winter. A septic tank was installed during the summer and two more stools were added which were very much needed. The installation was financed out of surplus funds and no additional appropriation was needed. The Board expects to paint the village and Atwell Hill schools this summer.

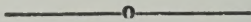
