THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - 2A. To bring your votes for the election of delegates-at-large, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, alternate district delegates to the National Convention of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for president and vice-president of the United States.
3. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee under the authority of the municipal budget act. (This budget may be considered item by item or as a whole but may not be increased more than ten per cent in any item as a whole.)
4. To hear the report of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either Class V or Class VI roads or take any other action relating thereto, raise and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see if the Town will vote for Class V assistance for Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.79. State contribution to be \$4,005.28 under the proposed new law.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.

8. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord fund.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the library.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust Control in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$74.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the upkeep of cemeteries.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for the Elliot Community Hospital in Keene and take any other action relating thereto.

15.* To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the road agents for the three districts to take effect in 1953.

16.* To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Route 63 at the junction of Farrhill Road and Route 63 and maintain same.

17.* To see if the Town will vote to add a penalty to all unpaid poll taxes as of December 1, and the amount of said penalty, if any.

18.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$300.00, said sum of money to be used in dredging channel of Mill Brook, East Westmoreland, thereby protecting abutting property from being continually damaged by high waters.

19.* To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

20.* If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

21.* To see if the Town will vote to increase the Town Officers salaries as follows: Selectmen \$100.00 each; Town Clerk \$25.00 each; Treasurer \$50.00 each.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell all property acquired by the town through tax collectors' deeds to the town, also any other parcels of land that have been acquired by the town, in recent years.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 per year to be paid on the town grader. The balance due on grader note being \$2,000.00.

24.* To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of three in conjunction with the selectmen to work on the advisability of erecting a suitable building for the housing of the fire apparatus, town grader and other town equipment.

25. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1951

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Paul D. King, who read the warrant. The vote was made that Article 1 be open during the entire meeting.

Article 2. The following sums of money were voted to be raised and appropriated for general government.

Article 3. It was voted to accept the town reports.

Article 4. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for winter maintenance of roads.

Article 5. The town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.79 for Class V roads. The State to contribute the sum of \$4,005.28.

Article 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,870.00 for highways and bridges. This sum includes what is required by law.

Article 7. It was voted that the income from the Jotham Lord fund be used for the support of the library.

Article 8. The sum of \$200.00 was voted to be raised and appropriated for the support of the library.

Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the repair of the library, the back wall having settled.

Article 10. It was voted to pass over the article to raise money for Pine Blister Rust.

Article 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$74.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 12. This article caused considerable discussion. It was finally voted that the sum of \$100.00 be raised, appropriated and spent on the cemeteries. It was also voted that the trustees prepare a report to be given at the next town meeting, stating what should be done to bring the cemeteries up to a condition we'll be proud of and give an estimated cost for same. The vote passed that the se-

lectmen withdraw from the general fund a sum equal to the unexpended cemetery monies for the past ten years and use said money on the cemeteries this year.

Article 13. The selectmen were given the authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 14. The question in regard to an appropriation for the Elliot Community Hospital was voted on by ballot. 21 were in favor of passing over the article and 70 were not in favor. The vote was to raise and appropriate the sum of \$570.00 for the hospital.

Article 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 to be used in remodeling the doors between the kitchen and dining room of the town hall so as to expedite the serving of food.

Article 16. The article in regard to the appointment of one Road Agent by the selectmen was passed over.

Article 17. It was voted to use \$200.00 for the repair of the road from Mrs. Etz' to the Dutton place, said \$200.00 to be taken from the gas tax fund.

Article 18. The town voted to accept and maintain the street light in front of the residence of Miss Gerould.

Article 19. The article in regard to a siren on the town hall was passed over.

Article 20. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be used in addition to the \$300.00 carried over from 1950, for improvement on the Aldrich road leading from Route 12 to Dorothy Sawyer's.

Article 21. The town voted to adopt the Municipal Budget Act with a committee of three. John Terry Jr., Curtis Bemis, Lawry Churchill were nominated from the floor and elected by the moderator casting one ballot for them.

Article 22. The article in regard to rebuilding the bridge over Partridge brook was passed over.

Article 23. It was voted to pass over the amount of \$5,250.00 to be raised for the bridge at Kirk Aldrich's. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Aldrich bridge and to borrow a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 to be paid at the rate of \$500.00 per year.

Article 24. This article was passed over. (Budget committee.)

Article 25. It was voted to authorize the selectmen to provide an exit from the dining room to the ground, the amount of \$300.00 to be taken from the general fund, having been raised for that purpose some time ago.

There were 200 votes cast under Article 1 for election of town officers.

Town Clerk. Howard Bradford, Annie Shelley and Ruth Churchill each had one vote. Ruth E. Burt had 173 votes and was declared elected.

Selectman for 3 years. Robert Sanborn had 16 votes, George S. Wildey had 17 votes, Benjamin E. Warn had 46 votes. Thomas V. Hatt had 117 votes and was declared elected for three years.

Town Treasurer. Cameron Paine and Marjorie Hudson each had 1 vote. Charles H. Aldrich had 180 votes and was declared elected.

Tax Collector. Howard Bradford and Annie Shelley each had one vote. Ruth E. Burt had 186 votes and was declared elected.

River Road Agent. Thomas Hatt had 1 vote, Charles Messer had 5 votes. Leon McClening had 170 votes and was declared elected.

South Village Road Agent. Charles W. Messer had 177 votes and was declared elected.

East Westmoreland Road Agent. Edwin King had 9 votes, Richard Delano had 18 votes, Charles Messer had 43 votes and was declared elected.

Trustee of Town Library for three years. Elizabeth A. Moore had 184 votes and was declared elected.

Auditors. Howard Smith and Roscoe Perry each had 1 vote. Oscar Billings had 2 votes. Nina E. Christian had 165 votes and was declared elected. Walter E. Dunn had 160 votes and was declared elected.

Trustee of Trust Funds for three years. Roscoe Perry had 1 vote. Maude E. Messer had 173 votes and was declared elected.

Constable. Five persons had one to three votes. Richard D. Rhodes had 171 votes and was declared elected.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber. William S. Starkey had 168 votes and was declared elected.

Howard E. Smith had 165 votes and was declared elected.

Perley O. Thompson had 163 votes and was declared elected.

Fence Viewers. Selden B. Lund had 163 votes and was declared elected. Lawrance A. Leach had 163 votes and was declared elected. Russell H. Wellington had 160 votes and was declared elected.

Briggs Fund Committee. Ruth K. Churchill had 172 votes and was declared elected. Helen Terry had 170 votes and was declared elected.

FOREWORD

REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

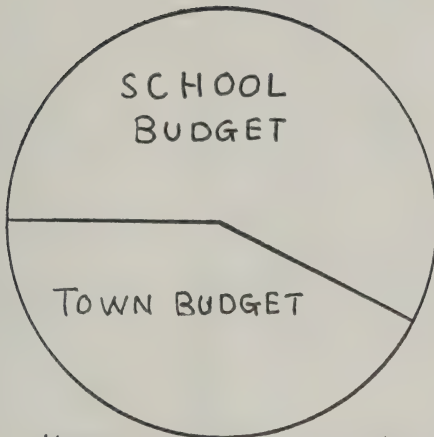
In 1951 the town voted to accept the Municipal Budget Act and elected three members at large to the Budget Committee. In accordance with this act the Selectmen and School Board each elected one of their members respectively to serve on this committee with the members at large, thus making a budget committee of five.

According to the Municipal Budget Act it is the duty of the Budget Committee to draw up a budget each year for the town and a budget for the school district upon forms prescribed by the state and to present these budgets to the town and school district meetings respectively for consideration, and to hold open meetings for the purpose of discussing these budgets before town meeting.

The budgets may be cut by the town or district meetings but they may not be increased by more than ten per cent and no appropriation may legally be voted for any purpose not included in the budget. This rule holds as long as the town retains the Municipal Budget Act, and if the committee fails to function it is the duty of the selectmen to perform the duties of the budget committee.

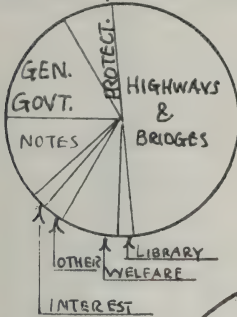

The Budget Committee should not and does not try to interfere with the work of any officer or board, but it tries to work with them as the representative of the public who pays the bill and wants to know where the money goes and why.

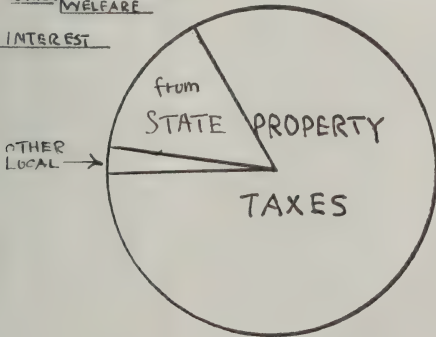
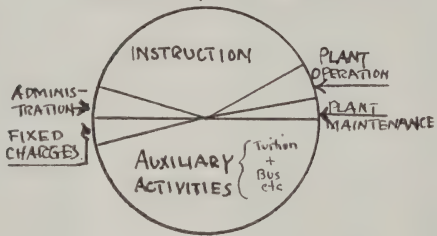


HERE IS WHERE YOUR MONEY GOES

PROPOSED SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the Town of Westmoreland qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the 11th day of March, 1952, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officers, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to have the moderator appoint a committee to administer the school lunch programs in the several schools of the town; said committee to keep such records, arrange for such paid help, and contract for purchase of such materials as is necessary for the proper conduct of the programs.

10. To see if the District will vote to have running water for the East (Union) Schoolhouse, and for this purpose authorize the school board to borrow not to exceed \$2,500 to pay for drilling a well, extending the pipes into the school and installing and purchasing such plumbing and sanitary fixtures as are necessary and required, or to take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the District will vote to have a committee appointed to study the problem of adding sufficient rooms to the South Village school to accommodate all the school children of Westmoreland, said committee to report at the next annual meeting of the District on the needs, probable cost, and other facts pertinent to the building, or take any other action thereon.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of your schools:

Your schools are operating well this year. Three of our teachers returned from last year. The teacher at the East Westmoreland school is Mrs. Minnie Smith, who comes to us after a number of years experience in Henniker and the northern part of the State. The teacher shortage, particularly in the lower grades, continues to become more acute. This is caused by the larger enrollments that are coming in each year, and by the actual decrease in the number of teachers available. During the war years, few new teachers were trained and many older women were called back to teach. Now these older ones are retiring, and there are few replacements. We are fortunate to have four excellent teachers for our schools.

There were fourteen pupils registered in Keene High School this year, two in Brattleboro High School and ten in Walpole High School. There were twelve registered in the eighth grade in Walpole. A few of these pupils have withdrawn from school. Next year there will be thirty-one high school pupils and fourteen eighth graders. The enrollment in the grades will continue to rise for several years, or as far ahead as our pre-school census can be taken.

The present arrangement of grades within the schools is good. To improve it would require one of two changes—either transporting the pupils from school to school so that each teacher had only two grades, or providing a central school to accomplish the same result. Many communities have centralized their schools in order to improve the educational offering, provide better facilities,

etc. Here in Westmoreland there are two plans that might be worked out. One would be to enlarge the present South Village school. The other would be to select a site offering better opportunities for development and expansion, and construct a whole new school. The former would be less expensive, but the latter would be better in the long run. A committee should study this matter carefully in order to present the entire picture to the District.

The teachers of this Union have recommended some improvements in their contractual arrangements that will do much to make teaching more attractive. With so many vacancies available to choose from, the teacher looking for a new position selects the one that offers the best opportunities for service, personal satisfaction and stability. This year three of your teachers are receiving \$2,300 and the fourth \$2,200. These are about \$400 below the average for similar positions in other parts of the state, and two hundred below what many teachers just out of Teachers' College received this year.

There is in the state a committee composed of representatives of the State School Boards' Association; State Teachers' Association and several other groups studying the matter of better working conditions to attract and keep better teachers in New Hampshire. Among some of their recommendations are adequate salary schedules with attractive starting minimums and annual increments, accumulative sick leave over a period of years, retirement benefits, and long-term contracts for experienced persons.

Your schools are in good condition, and except for certain minor repairs that recur each year, do not need too much immediate attention. However, we still have old toilets in two buildings. These have been repaired and are in serviceable condition at present, but they can fail at any time. The water supply at the Depot School is questionable at dry seasons of the year. The East School has to depend on neighbors for water. The time is coming when these neighbors may not want to put up any longer with

children coming in several times a day for water, and it will be difficult to find a source of acceptable water that will be safe to use in the school.

We want to thank the P. T. A. and other community groups who continue to support the schools in many ways. The School Lunch Programs in the three schools do much to improve the health of the pupils and their attitudes toward education.
