WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING AND DIRECT PRIMARY

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilton in the County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to appear at the Town Hall in said Wilton on Tuesday, the eleventh (11th) day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to choose all necessary town officers and to bring in your votes for Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention of the various political parties to nominate party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States, and at 10:30 A. M. to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To hear the reports of the Town Officers, Agents and Committees and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 2. To see if the Town will grant the free use of the town hall for Bent-Burke Post No. 10 American Legion for Memorial Day exercises, and for the Boy Scouts.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the Budget Committee or make any alterations relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a deputy or deputies, under the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 42, Revised Laws of New Hampshire, or take any action relating thereto.
 - 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax

Collector to charge an additional amount of twenty cents on each Poll Tax not paid by September 1st, for use of the Town as provided by statute.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken at the Annual Town Meeting in 1940 relative to printing the Inventory of Taxable Property each year and vote to print the Inventory of Taxable Property once in five years as now provided by Statute or take any action relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken at the Annual Town Meeting in 1940 relative to printing aid given the town poor or take any action relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Road or Street the present private way leading from Highland Street (Route 101) to the residence of Fletcher W. Seagroves or take any action in relation thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to build a new water hole in some suitable place and fence in the present water hole on Abbott Hill and raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to build a new fence or rail or repair the present railing on Whiting Hill Road and repair and repaint the present fence or rail on Crescent Street and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to buy a new sidewalk plow, snow plow and road sander and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to install a new Police Light and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to install a new sewer on Kennedy Avenue and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 234 Session laws of 1951 relating to the Federal Security Act and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the State to extend to the regular employees of the Town of Wilton the basic protection accorded by the Old Age and Survivors Insurance System embodied in said Federal Security Act or take any action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to use the \$600.00 which was raised and appropriated at the 1951 Annual Town Meeting for Social Security but not expended or take any action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey for \$100.00 to Walter F. and Abbie Gardner a part of the Town Dump Land, so-called, on the Intervale Road, adjacent to the present Gardner property, which part shall border on said present Gardner property, shall have a 100 foot frontage and a 100 foot rear boundary on the Souhegan River, or take any action relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 292 of the Session Law of 1949 relative to playing games of Beano.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to use the money raised and appropriated at the 1951 Annual Meeting, but not expended, for a suitable parking space.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance as a part of the Wilton Traffic and Parking Ordinances adopted at the Town Meeting of

- March 8, 1938, to wit: "No parking on the north side of Maple Street from Park Street to its junction with Main Street; any person violating said ordinance shall be liable and subject to a fine of not over One Dollar for the use of the Town of Wilton."
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Town Ordinance or By-Law under the provisions of Chapter 51 Revised Laws and its amendments, to wit: "Fishing in the reservoirs of the Wilton Water Works is hereby forbidden; whoever shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable and subject to a fine of not more than Twenty-five Dollars for the first offense and not more than Fifty Dollars for the second offense."
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the name, Whiting Park, for the plot of land presented to, and accepted by, the Town of Wilton, and is now a well established park, and to instruct the Selectmen or Park Committee to erect a suitable sign thereon.
- 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year, including town officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, town hall maintenance and equipment, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, sewer and water maintenance, town road aid, town maintenance, parks and playgrounds, street lighting, municipal court, fire alarm, town poor, old age assistance, aid to soldiers and their families, Memorial Day, cemeteries, interest, bonds, county taxes, Monadnock Region Association, libraries, bridges, sidewalk construction, temporary notes, long term notes, town dump and maintenance, repairs to Town Hall, new road construction, resurfacing, new equipment, Workmen's Compensation Insurance, 1951 Civil Defense and Social Security.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

In the past year your local forest fire organization did a very fine job of pre-suppression and suppression of forest fires. Our early spring was very dry and with extra high winds and all our fires were during that period. We find that the general public is still very

careless with matches and cigarettes.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we call "I don't care"; he is the person that builds fires anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He is also very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called "I don't know any better," and the best way to describe him is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our pretty and valuable woodland to be destroyed by fire. Even your own home can be burned by them.

It is up to you and you alone to report these characters to your local forest fire warden whenever you see them operating. To have our woodlands green and our mountain streams clear, your cooperation is needed by:

1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting

on clean ground.

2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent it from spreading.

3. Never burn in dry, windy weather.

4. In all cases a written permit is required from your local town fire warden.

5. Be sure that your matches, cigarettes and pipe

ashes are out before discarding.

It is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

The Uncollected accounts of the Tax Collector and Water Department have been verified by sending individual notices to each debtor, this being the usual accepted practice.

It is our hope that the Water Department will insist

on more prompt payment of water bills.

Our Tax Collector, Mr. John S. Davis, has done an exceptionally fine job in collecting taxes. At the end of 1951 there were no unpaid 1950 taxes. We think this is somewhat of a record in the collection of taxes, and Mr. Davis is to be commended for his unending effort and personal expense involved in obtaining such good results.

We believe that Wilton is fortunate to have such a fine corps of officers. Each of them appear to know their duties and are willing and anxious to perform to the best of their ability.

We recommend that the Selectmen be authorized to engage the necessary assistance to set up an improved set of office records.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to the town officers for their cooperation with us during the progress of the audit and especially to Mrs. Elizabeth French for her very kind and helpful assistance with the detail.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Wilton, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 5th day of March, 1952, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951, and as provided in the Budget, to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.
- 9. If the foregoing article is adopted to see if the school district will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into

effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

10. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance beween the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The School Board's Budget for 1952-53 calls for an appropriation of \$91,828.53, an increase of \$1,930.15 over that of 1951-52. The largest single increase is for transportation, which amounts to \$2,570. Wilton has been very fortunate in obtaining transportation at an annual cost of \$28.04 per pupil. This may be compared with the State Average for 1950-51, of \$45.01 per pupil. The figure of \$6,300 for three buses transporting 133 pupils does not seem unreasonable since the per pupil cost will be \$47.51 per pupil or an increase of \$2.50 per pupil over the 1950-51 State Average.

Our budget also provides for reorganizing our insurance program in such a way that we eliminate an unwieldy, expensive plan of twenty-three policies, so that we will have one or two master policies, covering our property for \$235,000 instead of \$150,000. Our insurance will be written for five years thus saving approximately one year's premium every five years.

We propose to continue a program of re-painting and alterations, eventually arriving at the point where the maintenance of our plant will be more or less a constant item, with no large outlays in any one year.

The budget provides for the following alterations

and improvements for 1952-53:

(a) Repaint the fifth grade room.

(b) Repaint Room E (the old lab. room). (Neither has been touched in the past five years).

(c) Install fluorescent lights in Rooms E and F.

(d) Install a snow rail on the North side of the building as a safety factor protecting the sidewalk approach to the new building.

e) Re-surfacing the parking area. Over the years this area has been washed out and it now re-

quires a new road-bed.

(f) Construct a shelter over, and lay a cement slab to the boiler room door of the new building.

(g) Purchase one set of folding bleachers for the auditorium.

We wish to thank the American Legion Bent-Burke Post No. 10 for the set of bleachers that they recently gave the School District. It has provided much needed seating space and it is hoped that through the efforts of the School District, and interested groups that we may eventually completely equip our gymnasium with these bleachers.

The new elementary school building has provided us with the space we have needed for many years. This has enabled us to move approximately 126 pupils out of the old building, thereby eliminating the very bad crowding conditions that previously existed there.

The Wilton School District is very fortunate to have the services of Mr. Paire. It is through his guidance that the standards of the school have continued to improve over the past years. The School Board wishes to thank him for his ceaseless efforts. Also our thanks to the faculty for their fine cooperation during the past year. Their many, many extra hours spent to help improve the school program are certainly appreciated.

Your School Board desires to express its appreciation for the excellent assistance that it has received from the citizenry and the fine manner in which its

program has been supported.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Wilton:

I respectfully submit my fifth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Instruction:

I am pleased to report that high standards of instruction are being maintained in your school under the capable direction of Mr. Kenneth Sargent, Principal of Wilton High School and Miss Florence Rideout, Principal of the Elementary School, efficiently assisted by the teaching staff. Methods of instruction are being kept up to date with emphasis upon the individual learning abilities of each child. Mrs. Lillian Cullinan has been employed to carry on the role of a helping teacher replacing Mrs. Grace Stickney, who retired at the close of the school year in June. Most of her time has been devoted to assisting in the first grade, where we were faced with a large enrollment this fall.

The Guidance Program initiated last year, provides each child with a folder in which a record of his achievement test results, difficulties, etc. are kept. These records reveal the mental and physical growth of each child and direct the teaching activities in the path which will be most profitable to the child.

A complete testing program is given to all pupils in grades one through eight. In grade one each child receives a Metropolitan Reading Readiness Test which measures the maturity of the individual and reveals to the teacher the probable groupings necessary to carry on efficient instruction. They also are given the S. R. A. Primary Mental Abilities Test which indicates the innate ability of the child to succeed in school work. These tests are given also to grades three, six and eight. All grades are given a Metropolitan Achievement Test in May. An analysis of the results of these tests reveals to the teachers the strengths and weaknesses of indi-

viduals and also of the educational program. Throughout the year standardized tests in reading are given as the pupils complete various phases of the reading program. Of particular importance are the weekly Reader Tests given in October, January and May. These measure the growth in reading ability in these periods. All results are recorded on a Cumulative Record Card which accompanies the pupil as he moves from grade to grade.

Comparable tests are given to pupils in Grades nine through twelve, with special emphasis being placed on

aptitude testing for Guidance purposes.

We are continuing the use of audio-visual aids to stimulate learning and broaden the experiences of our pupils. This program has been coordinated by Mr. James Trefry, who is acting as Director of Audio-Visual Education, assisted by the Projector Club, comprised of pupils in the school who operate and maintain the equipment.

Music Education:

Miss Ethelyn Edwards, supervisor of music in our school, has introduced a musical flute to all pupils in grades four through six. This instrument has been an excellent devise for interesting pupils in music.

Through the cooperation of interested citizens,

every grade room now has a piano.

Our programs have continued to demostrate the high quality of instruction that our pupils are receiving in this area of learning.

Health Supervision:

The new nurse's quarters in the Elementary Building have provided us with very adequate facilities to carry on the nursing services in our school.

A dental unit has recently been installed and it is hoped that we can add this service for our young people.

A Telebinocular eye-testing device has been given to the school by the newly formed Lions Club. This piece of equipment will permit us to carefully screen our pupils for sight difficulties in a manner that is much more accurate and thorough than the Snellon Chart method. Thus we shall be able to determine early in the school life of a child sight handicaps that tend to hamper the learning of the individual.

For details of the nursing services provided by Mrs.

Edna Gilbert, I refer you to her report.

Physical Education:

We are carrying on the same type of program as in the past under the supervision of Mr. Ira Stickney and Miss Ruth Lange. This program fills our needs and provides our children with group game experiences, folk dancing, individual skill tests and interscholastic athletics that tend to develop the various aspects of physical growth. Throughout our program, from grades one through twelve, emphasis is placed upon good sportsmanship, with a realization that the game is a means to an end and not an end in itself.

School Lunch Program:

With the opening of school this fall our school lunch program moved into its new quarters, the School Cafeteria. This program is being carried on under the very capable and efficient management of Mrs. Marjorie Robbins, and presently assisted by Mrs. Harold Kennedy and Mrs. Veronica Robbins.

We are serving on an average, 200 pupils per day. Despite the fact that government surplus foods have been curtailed and the cost of food has increased sharply, we have been able to maintain our prices at 20c per day, for pupils in grades one through six, and 25c per day for pupils in grades seven through twelve.

The Wilton P. T. A. and many interested citizens have assisted us in adequately equipping our kitchen for this program. We are deeply grateful for this help.

New Elementary School unit:

This report would not be complete without making

some mention of the excellent facilities that have been made available to us by the construction of the new elementary school building. It is indeed one of the finest buildings of its size in the State. Many thanks are extended to the Wilton School Trust, the many citizens who contributed personally in terms of money and effort, and the taxpayers of Wilton who saw the need for this building. This new unit will be completely paid for on August 21, 1957. I refer you to our Schedule of Indebtedness.

State Aid:

The new state aid formula approved by the last session of the Legislature made it possible for Wilton to receive \$732.77. This formula is based upon two factors: (a) Cost of a foundation program (b) Adjusted Valuation (ability of the district to pay, based on a \$17.00 per \$1000 of adjusted valuation). The difference between these two factors determines the amount for which a district is eligible.

This figure may change from year to year since the adjusted valuation will vary as will the "average daily membership." Thus, more districts may become eligible, thereby reducing the amount a single district may receive.

Conclusion:

I wish to express my appreciation to the Wilton School Board, parents, and friends of our school for their fine cooperation and assistance which has been extended to me and the teaching staff the past year. I especially want to thank the Wilton P. T. A. and the Bent-Burke Post No. 10, for their support and interest in our school system and the type of education we are offering.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Introduction

The most important change in our school during the past year has been the enlargement of our facilities through the expansion of the elementary school plant. This single factor has resulted in many educational improvements in our high school. Several changes in our school staff should also be noted.

Changes in Staff

We have been quite fortunate in being able to procure the services of Mrs. Helene Greene to replace Miss Jennie Esty who left teaching to become the wife of Reverend Thomas Elliott of Block Island. Mrs. Greene has brought to us her years of sound teaching experience.

Miss Cecile Richard was added to our staff to replace Mrs. Aileen Varnum who left us for the profession of homemaking. Miss Richard has a fine language background and considerable "know-how" in the field of drama.

Miss Mildred Brouillet was replaced by Miss Ruth Lange in the commercial department, and also as coach of basketball.

Mr. Clinton Stevens turned his talents toward industry at the close of the past year, and Mr. George Mailman has taken over the shop department. For other teaching assignments you are referred to that section of the School Report.

Improved Plant Facilities

The increased space available to us in the High School has allowed practices heretofore impossible and brought about marked improvements.

Homerooms: Each grade has a homeroom now which can be called its own, with no homerooms located in the basement. Teachers of these homerooms have practically all classes in their own rooms and

thus are able to point with pride to general homeroom appearance. In most cases teachers also act as homeroom class advisors.

Study Periods: A definite improvement in the level of education has been made by elimination of all study periods from academic classrooms. In the past, this has been an annoying and difficult teaching environment for both students and instructors.

Library: Through the use of increased space, a real school library was born — one that is rapidly being expanded to be of maximum value to students. Through the cooperation of Mrs. Richard French, many of the excellent facilities of the Gregg Free Library have been made available to us. From time to time, books from that source have been placed on special reserve for pupil usage. The biggest boost to the library has been provided by the Wilton P. T. A. which donated the sum of one hundred dollars for the purchase of books. About fifty books, mostly fiction, have been purchased with this money. The library has provided us, for the first time, with suitable display space for the trophy awards won by our school. A thing like this can play an important role in fostering school pride.

Music Department: The Music Department, under the able direction of Miss Ethelyn Edwards has been enhanced through the provision of space for a music room and office. It is hoped that sound-proofing of the music room will make orchestral practicing less disturbing to adjacent classes than at present.

Audio-Visual Department: Audio-visual material of the entire school system has been centrally located in a separate room under the supervision of Mr. James Trefry. Our file of film strips assembled there, numbering approximately three hundred, has been carefully catalogued as has all equipment.

Conclusions

In addition to these outstanding improvements

brought about by our expanded facilities there are numerous lesser aids to our educational program. Living in school has certainly been more comfortable and

less strained this year.

Especially, I wish to sincerely thank the citizens of Wilton for their part in helping to improve our school through the improvement of the plant. Suggestions and assistance and understanding from the School Board and Mr. Paire have been greatly appreciated by us of the teaching staff. Striving together in this fashion to attain our mutual goals, we can strengthen and facilitate that growth which is synonymous with education.

Contagious Diseases:

The present policy of the State Board of Health is to exclude only the actively ill from schools. Family contacts are allowed to attend.

Nurse's Activities:

New Equipment for Nurse's New Office

1. A dental unit is waiting installation. We hope to make good use of it in the spring. Dr. Dwyer has promised a technician to do cleanings for primary and grammar pupils and fluorine series for grades one and two. Routine fluorine treatment for older pupils is due January 1953.

2. A new 4-drawer filing cabinet has been installed. I am setting up a new system of filing by family rather

than grades.

3. Telebinocular device presented to the Wilton School District by Wilton's newly organized Lions Club, to be used in vision testing of school children. This method may take a little longer per individual child, but results will be more comprehensive. The

Telebinocular set-up is portable, requires only table and chair space, removes the only inconvenience in the new office which is lack of twenty feet, required to do vision tests by Snellen method.

There are few towns or cities in New Hampshire with a comparable school Health Unit. Thank you.
