STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE—ROCKINGHAM, SS.

To the Inhabitants of Little Boar's Head District, a village district in the Town of North Hampton, organized under provision of Chapter 196, Session Laws of 1905, qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to attend the annual meeting of said District to be held at the residence of Philip N. Hobson, off Chapel Road in said district, on the first Tuesday of September next (the second day of the month), at eight o'clock in the evening (Daylight Saving Time) for the following purposes:

- 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2. To elect a clerk, a board of three commissioners, a treasurer, and an auditor for the ensuing year.
- 3. To hear the reports of the clerk, treasurer, and other officers of said District, and to take such action as you may desire in regard to the same.
- 4. To take such action as you may desire in regard to allowing the same discount on district taxes as is allowed by the Town of North Hampton on town taxes.
- 5. To raise such sum of money as may be needed for extinguishment of fires, hydrant service, sidewalk construction and maintenance, street lighting, police and watchman service, drainage and mosquito prevention, planting and care of shade or ornamental trees, maintenance and care of parks or commons, making and enforcement of zoning regulations, and all other district expenses.
 - 6. To transact such other business as may legally

come before said meeting.

Commissioners' Report

1940-1941

- I. Sidewalks: During the past year there was no severe storm damage to our walks. Maintenance on the plank walk at Bass Beach is increasing, and more of it will have to be renewed next year. The guard rail at Fox Hill Point has been extended east to the end of the breakwater.
- II. Hydrants and Fire Protection: The district now maintains fourteen hydrants at a total cost of \$940 per year.

At a grass fire about July 1st, one of our hose reels did good service in protecting the bath houses, assisting the North Hampton Fire Department.

One 50-foot section of our hose has worn out and been discarded, and two new sections added. We plan to replace two other worn sections this fall.

- III. Domestic Water Rates: With the reversal by the New Hampshire Supreme Court of the Public Service Commission's ruling as to rates of the Hampton Water Works Company, it is believed that water rates will remain substantially as heretofore.
- IV. Drainage and Mosquito Control: We have continued our usual policy of spraying our fresh water swamps in the spring, and regularly spraying our salt water marshes during the summer. Ditches have been cleaned as required.

The State tried without success to open up Little River this spring at the Beach. As a result, the bathing beach has suffered from lack of sand usually washed in from the river delta.

V. Parks and Trees: The new maple trees, mostly on the Sea Road, that had died were all replaced this spring by Isaac Langley Williams without expense to

the District other than for loam used in planting them. Most of these have survived this unusually dry summer.

The District is paying \$50 a year toward maintaining the rock garden east of the Fish Houses. The Garden Club has been paying the balance of about \$25 yearly.

The District had the junipers and shrubs along the Head trimmed this spring.

VI. *Policing:* We have continued the regular watchman service during the winter, and lifeguard service at the bathing beach during July and August.

As part of the lifeguard service, swimming instruction has been offered during the summer to people in the District, between 10.30 and 11.00 A. M. daily.

VII. Street Lights: The District has had eight street lights installed along the parking area behind the bathing beach, with very satisfactory results. These will cost us \$67.50 for three months this summer. It is proposed to ask the Town to take these over at next town meeting. The yearly cost will be \$159 or \$135 for six months.

VIII. Zoning: After our annual District Meeting last September, Philip N. Hobson was re-appointed Zoning Inspector for one year; and Henry E. Perry was appointed to the Zoning Board of Adjustment for a term of five years in place of Edith Stott, whose term expired.

IX. Taxes: The District tax rate for 1941 was \$2.00 per thousand dollars' valuation, the amount actually raised being \$1845.50, of which \$82.25 went for discounts on early payments.
