## Warrant for Annual Meeting

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town and State Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Daniels Academy Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, March 8th, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects and any other business that may legally come before said meeting:

1. To choose all Town Officers for ensuing year.

2. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating to same.

3. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for purpose of fixing the Old Milford Road, especially the stretch from Rideout corner to Mr. Kissock's summer residence.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of State Aid Highway or take any action relating thereto. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of the Highways under the law passed at January session of 1905, and to say where such shall be laid out or take any action in regard to same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 for the purpose of building additional State Road, providing the State will grant like amount, and say where same shall be laid out or take any action relating to same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to sell the property acquired from Mr. Hegarty or take any action in regard thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to make any discount on property taxes paid on or before December 1, 1927, or take any action in regard to same.

13. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Week, raise money for same, or take any action in regard to same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to help exterminate the White Pine Blister or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for purpose of purchasing any forest land, choose a forestry committee, or take any action in regard to same.

16. To see if the Town will vote to have a night patrolman, raise and appropriate money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to have the back roads broken out in winter, raise and appropriate money for equipment for same, or take any action relative thereto. 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100 from Mrs. Clara Heselton for perpetual care of the William B. Rockwood lot in Pinegrove Cemetery.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for purpose of taking new valuation as required by law, choose committee for same, or take any action relative thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salaries of the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer or any other Town Officers, or take any action in regard to same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100 for use of clinic, or take any action in regard to same.

## **Brookline Public Library**

#### **REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES**

The past year has been an active one for the trustees of the library. Early in the summer the library was re-organized. New rules and regulations were drawn up and the library put on a sound working basis. The books were re-cataloged and about two hundred volumes discarded as beyond use or repair. During the year one hundred and twenty-one books have been added. Of this number five were gifts. The library subscribes to eleven magazines.

The children's department has been given special attention. Books graded to supplement school work have been added.

The trustees have held monthly meetings throughout the year. It is their aim to serve the public and suggestions are always welcome.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Brookline:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report, which is also the eighth in the series of such reports.

#### Organization of Supervisory Union No. 40

This Union was organized in 1919 by the State Board of Education, at the time supervision in New Hampshire became state-wide. The original four districts make up this union, namely, Amherst, Brookline, Milford and Mont Vernon. The several School Boards of these districts together constitute a joint board. This Board nominates the Superintendent of Schools, who is elected by the State Board of Education, and who serves under a written contract. The Superintendent's salary is fixed by this joint board. The State pays \$2000.00 toward the Superintendent's salary, and any amount paid in excess of this \$2000.00 is apportioned among the districts as the joint board may agree. The present arrangement is for the four districts to pay respectively, 25%, 10%, 60%, and 5%.

#### **Teachers and Instruction**

Teachers in Brookline have been rather more permanent than in many small towns in the state. Last June, however, all three of our teachers declined reelection. This necessitated three new teachers. For the Grammar room at the Daniels Academy Building, Mrs. Dorothy Brown of Gorham, N. H., was chosen. Mrs. Brown is a graduate of Keene Normal School, and has had experience before coming to Brookline. The teachers at the Primary Building are both from Manchester, and both graduates of Keene Normal School in June 1926. Miss Kathryn Morse has the intermediate room, with Grades IV and V, and Miss Barbara Cummings the lower room with Grades I, II and III. Miss Morse also relieves Miss Cummings in some of the third grade work. Enrollment is slightly less than for two or three years past, being especially so in the lower grades. Probabilities are that we have seating capacity for some years ahead, although the grouping of children by grades in order to secure best results, is more or less difficult.

The materials of instruction, especially books and supplies, are now in excellent condition as to quantity and quality. Plans started several years ago to discontinue worn and obsolete material have now been completed without undue expenditures during any one year. Our textbooks are now up to date, and our reading material varied, well graded and interesting.

Instruction in subjects of the first year in High School is not being given this year, as all of the pupils eligible to take this work preferred to attend High School out of town. This, of course, relieves the work in Grades VI, VII, and VIII.

Pupils attending other schools are: Pepperell High School: Bertha and Winifred Hall; Keene High School: Barbara Smith; Nashua High School: Walter Corey, David Fessenden, Elmer Corey, Nason Fessenden, Dorothea Fessenden; Tilton School: Harold Brown.

#### Teachers' Institute

Each year in the early fall Dr. Ernest W. Butterfield, Commissioner of Education in New Hampshire, conducts a series of institutes for teachers in the smaller towns throughout the state. This year Brookline was very fortunate to have an institute held at the Daniels Academy Building on October 11, 1926. Dr. Butterfield was present for a short time but the program was in charge of Miss Phila A. Griffin, who represents the State Board of Education as Agent for Elementary Schools. In addition to Miss Griffin, speakers on the program were former Deputy Commissioner George H. Whitcher, Superintendent Leonard Morrison of Whitefield, and Superintendent H. Lawton Chase of Peterboro. Some of the subjects considered were spelling, health and hygiene, assignment of lesson units, methods of testing, discovering and remedying defects in school work. The program continued throughout the day with an intermission at noon, during which the Parent-Teachers Association served dinner. Forty-two teachers, superintendents, School Board members and others interested were present at this meeting, which was one of the series of fifteen held throughout the state.

#### Medical Inspection

Pupils and teachers have had the opportunity now for several years, to have a medical inspection in the fall without charge. Such an inspection is now required as a part of the New Hampshire school work. Tt has been a very great surprise to school officials, including nurse, examining physician, and State Board of Education, that in Brookline a considerable number of requests to be excused from this examination have been presented. A study of this situation by the Superintendent and the State School Nurse, who represents the State Board of Education, has brought us to the conclusion that there is no well grounded reason for exemption. Parents are, therefore, strongly urged not to grant these requests of their children to be excused. In case any parent does not understand the object or procedure of this examination, the school nurse will be only too glad to call upon the parents and explain the whole matter. Parents also are urged to be present when their children are examined.

#### Buildings and Grounds

In the School Warrant for the last school meeting, there was an article "to see if the District will vote to move all of the schools into the Daniels Academy Building, provided the town will vote to make the necessary alterations in said building." This matter was quite thoroughly discussed, and when put to a vote, the

sentiment against combining the schools was very positive. In view of this vote, which may be called a decision in the matter, it would seem wise to consider at once plans to further permanently improve the Primary building. Accordingly, a study of future needs has been made with the assistance of Deputy Commissioner James M. Pringle, of the State Board of Education who came to Brookline and looked over the whole This service was rendered without cost to situation. the School District. The important things to be done are to provide more storage space for fuel, to improve the sanitary surroundings of hte toilet rooms, and to arrange the size and location of the same to better advantage; also to construct a suitable approach for the delivery of fuel. Incidently, a storage space for unused furnishings, etc., is needed. To accomplish these things the best way seems to be to rebuild entirely the present woodshed and toilets, and put in a suitable wall on the east side. A proposal for financing this project will be presented at the School District meeting.

#### Transportation

For the first time the longest and largest route of the town is being served by automobile, which is a decided time-saver to the pupils and driver. Road conditions have been favorable thus far and should so continue now that the town has a snowplow. Mr. Ira Lund has charge of the route, replacing Mr. Clark Barnaby, who has rendered excellent service for several years. Mr. Barnaby retains the south route, which is now quite small.

#### Styles Fund

The original amount of this fund was \$183.56. Of this total \$95.00 has been expended for wiring the Primary building for electric lights. Each of the two rooms now has four room-lights on a wall switch, a separate chain pull light for the teacher's desk, and a wall outlet suitable for use should we later have a projection apparatus for showing educational pictures. The electric lights have been very useful during the past winter and will continue indefinitely to supply a long-felt want.

From the remainder of the fund, amounting to \$88.56, a set of Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia, consisting of 10 volumes, and a current History newspaper subscription for three years has been purchased for \$60.00. Pupils find this set of books extremely interesting and valuable in their work. It has proved to be a very wise use of the fund. The unexpended balance of \$28.56 will be used before the end of this school year for something directly instructional in its nature. The way in which this fund has been used has been with the entire approval of Mrs. and Miss Styles.

#### Attendance

Pupils who do not attend school regularly are very likely to do poor school work and be retarded in their grades so much that they may reach their sixteenth birthday before they have completed even the elementary school. A further reason, however, and one which cannot be overlooked by school officials, is the law in regard to attendance which specifies "Every child between eight and sixteen years of age shall attend the public school to which he is assigned or an approved private school during all the time the public schools are in session, unless he is more than fourteen years old and has completed the studies prescribed for the elementary school, or has been excused from attending on the ground that his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance or make it undesirable. Every person having the custody of a child shall cause the child to attend such a school during all the time the public schools are in session." In order that this law may be observed, truant officers are necessary. An efficient truant officer is one who follows up all cases of non-attendance promptly. It is not a disgrace to have

the truant officer call upon the parent, but it should be decidedly embarrassing for the parent not to be able to give a suitable excuse. Under the law it is the welfare of the child alone and not that of other members of the family which is considered in the matter of attendance. Of course, emergencies arise, but in most cases information can be sent to the teacher on the day of absence or tardiness. It is a common practice in most schools for School Boards to require teachers to secure written excuses. This should not be considered a hardship by parents, rather a way to assist in maintaining high standards in the schools.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Brookline, New Hampshire:

The following is a report of health work in the Brookline schools, it being the eighth year of this work:

The usual medical inspection was carried on in the early fall of this school year. A tabulated account of all defects may be seen in Dr. Dearborn's report, with the exception of the eye and ear examination, which, due to the amount of work in other nursing activities, remains undone.

The responsibility of unvaccinated pupils has been assumed by the health officer. A list of unvaccinated pupils was given to Mr. Dunbar upon the completion of the school examinations.

An epidemic of whooping cough and chicken pox has been prevalent in the schools during the fall, but in every circumstance with such diseases we are at loss in regard to the prevention of such unless we have full cooperation of parents with teachers and others concerned.

This year there still remained a large number of parents opposed to the physical examination of their children. We hope to have removed all possible causes for any opposition and will regard parents' wishes so far as we are able in order that next year we may experience better co-operation of parents, nurse, and doctors.

Questions from parents and others interested in school work are very welcome, and I am glad to assist in bringing about any necessary health correction.

#### CHILDREN'S HEALTH CONFERENCE

The New Hampshire State Board of Health, Division of Child Hygiene, co-operating with the South Brookline Social Club—a branch of the Federated Woman's Club—conducted a conference for babies and children of pre-school age on July 14, 1926. Through the courtesy of the Frank E. Kilduff Post 74 the conference was held in the Legion rooms.

Sixty children were weighed, measured and examined by Dr. George Hazard of Hollis, N. H. and Dr. Franklin Rogers, child specialist of Manchester, N. H.

The conference was under the direction of Mrs. Mary Davis, assisted by Miss Mary Hurley, R. N. of the State Board Nursing staff.

The following is a synopsis of the examinations:

The creating of the Division of Hygiene was necessitated by the passing of the Federal Sheppard-Towner Law and the acceptance of the provisions by the Act of our State Legislature. New Hampshire co-operating with the Federal Government receives from the Government \$12,988.31. The State of New Hampshire furnishes \$7,988.31. Our clinics are made possible from these funds.

We must remember the body once built is a permanent affair and cannot be altered or changed like a house. How important therefore, for parents to have uppermost in mind what is best for the child's health and development that the child should grow up to be a healthy and vigorous adult. The right things and the right way of doing them at the right time not only means a healthy child, but efficiency at school.
