THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 1. To vote by Australian ballot for all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

To see whether the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint one highway agent, or the town to elect one or more highway agents.

This vote to be effective March 1946.

Article 2. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to assessors.

Article 3. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,605.00 for town officers salaries, or act thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$750.00 for town officers expenses, or act thereon.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for election and registration expenses, or act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for town hall expenses, or act thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses, or act thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the police department, or act thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for the support of the fire department, or act thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the control of white pine blister rust in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department, thereby receiving the usual state aid.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for the support of the board of health, or act thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment, or act thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,000.00 for town road maintenance, or act thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,200.00 for snow removal, or act thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for street lighting, or act thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to accept town road aid (T.R.A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$746.06, or act thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system, or act thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the town poor, or act thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for old age assistance, or act thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$15.00 for Memorial Day exercises, or act thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to erect a temporary Honor Roll, to be placed on the common, not to exceed \$100.00 and appropriate money for the same, or act thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds, or act thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach, or act thereon.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the cemeteries, or act thereon.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region, or act thereon.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for legal expenses, or act thereon.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$115.00 for interest on temporary loans, or act thereon.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$9,000.00 to purchase snow removal equipment to be housed in the central part of the town and instruct the moderator to appoint a committee of three to work with the selectmen in the purchase of such equipment.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$2,500.00 to provide housing for equipment mentioned in preceding article.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to install a street light near the house of Santo Licari in the center village and raise money therefore, or act thereon.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

Article 35. A. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that portion of the West Swanzey road, so-called, beginning at an iron pin in the present highway fifty feet south of the private driveway of Walter Roehig and running southerly across the proposed new highway to a point where it intersects the old road to Chesterfield.

B. Another section of road beginning at a pin in the road near the barn of Walter Deselle thence southerly and crossing the proposed new highway to where it joins with the old road to Chesterfield.

C. Another section of road beginning at a pin in the road about fifty feet southerly of the driveway to the residence of Nahum Pierce and continuing on said highway to the proposed new highway. The above article is at the request of the state highway department and not to take effect until the proposed new road is finished. These roads are in the east part of the town.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the following roads or any of them.

A. Route 105 as numbered by the State Highway Department extending from a stake driven in the center of said road four hundred feet northerly of the Winchester Town Line, and easterly of Fullam Pond, and thence to the junction of 105 with Route 80.

B. The whole of Route 110 as numbered by the State Highway Department extending from its intersection with Route 105 to Route 106.

C. The whole of Route 106 extending from the Winchester Town Line northerly to its intersection with Route 80.

D. Route 108 extending from its intersection with Route 106 to Route 107.

E. Route 109 extending from its intersection with Route 106 to Route 107.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from F. Arthur Stoddard and Myrtie E. Burnham, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Fred H. Stoddard lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Fred H. Stoddard trust fund.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$333.33 from Nettie D. Snow, to be known as the Nettie D. Snow trust fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and maintenance of the John F. Snow lots No. 141-142 and the Herbert H. Snow lots No. 303 and 304.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to buy the bank shares of the Brattleboro Trust Co., now held by the Trustees of Trust Funds and raise the sum of \$40.00 to pay for same.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having power to maintain the peace of the world.

Article 41. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH 1944

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 14, 1944.

The meeting was called to order at 9.00 o'clock A. M., by the Moderator, Arthur H. Post and the Warrant through Article 1 read by the clerk. The Moderator declared that balloting by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year under Article 1 was in order.

At 10 o'clock the meeting was again called to order by the Moderator and the remainder of the Warrant read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frederick Robinson and supported by Jessie Farrington that the Selectmen serve as Assessors for the ensuing year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Frederick Robinson that the same method of collecting taxes as last year be used for the ensuing year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Mansley which was supported to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. No member of the Budget Committee being present to give a report the attention of the voters was called to the Report of the Budget Committee as given in the Town Report.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frederick Robinson and supported by Jessie Farrington to raise the

sum of \$1,825.00 for Town Officers' Salaries and for extra work assessing as required by the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes B. Chickering and supported by John Redding to raise the sum of \$750.00 for Town Officers' Expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Mansley and supported by Frederick Robinson to raise the sum of \$700.00 for election and registration expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Jessie Farrington which was supported to raise the sum of \$200.00 for Town Hall expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Mansley and supported by Frederick Robinson to raise the sum of \$450.00 for the police department and the additional sum of \$50.00 to provide additional protection due to the war emergency. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham and supported by Robert Mitchell to raise the sum of \$700.00 for the support of the fire department. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Floyd Fuller to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator as carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the support of the board of health. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Lee Bowman to raise the sum of \$750.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post and supported by Roger Spaulding to raise the sum of \$6,500.00 for highway maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd Fuller and supported by John Redding to raise the sum of \$2,200.00 for snow removal. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Jessie Farrington and supported by John Redding to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes B. Chickering and supported by Frederick Robinson to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the town poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Agnes Chickering to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for old age assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frederick Robinson and supported by John Redding to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Jessie Farrington and supported by John Redding to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester Burnham and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Paul Welcome to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Harry E. Winn to raise the sum of \$165.00 for interest on temporary loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Frederick Robinson to raise the sum of \$150.00 for legal expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Jessie Farrington and supported by John Mansley to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Chester Burnham to accept Town Road Aid (T.R.A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$372.48 for same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Floyd M. Fuller to instruct the Selectmen to secure from the State Highway Department plans for a new bridge and approaches to replace the bridge in the West part of the town known as the Colburn bridge, and to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 toward construction of the same. This project to be a Post War Project. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by George W. Goodridge to pass over

the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Frederick Robinson to raise the sum of \$7,000.00 to pay note due Peterboro Savings Bank, about May 1, and an additional \$126.74, costs of court in the Cox case. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Paul Welcome to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post and supported by Harry E. Winn to discontinue as an open road and leave subject to gates and bars that portion of the Mountain Road so-called, beginning at an iron pin in the present highway five (5) rods southerly of the private entrance to the buildings of John P. Schmidt and to authorize the Selectmen to take such steps as may be necessary to perfect such discontinuance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 35. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Frederick Robinson to accept the sum of \$2,000.00 to create a Trust Fund, the income from same to be used for the purchase of books for the Chesterfield Library. The Trust Fund to be known as "The Etta Hubbard Trust Fund." The books bought from this income to be marked or stamped that they were bought from this fund. Signed Etta L. Hildreth. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 36. Voted on motion made by Jessie Farrington and supported by Chester M. Burnham to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Winfield G. Farr, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Ira D. Farr lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, to be known as the Ira D. Farr

Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frederick Robinson and supported by Harry E. Winn to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Richard P. Farr, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., and used for the perpetual care of the Asa F. Farr lot and to be known as the Asa F. Farr Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 38. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Redding and supported by Chester M. Burnham to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Richard P. Farr, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., and used for the perpetual care of the Richard P. Farr lot, and to be known as the Richard P. Farr Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 39. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frederick Robinson and supported by John Redding to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Wayne Rice, to be known as the Sherman Rice Trust Fund, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Rice lots Nos. 223-224 in the Chesterfield West Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 40. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Robert Mitchell to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Beatrice Chickering, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn., and used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Lillian McQuaide and Lyle B. Chickering burial lot in said cemetery and to be known as the Johnson-McQuade-Chickering Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 41. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Frederick Robinson and supported by John Redding to accept the sum of \$50.00 to be added to the John W. Davis Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Assn.,

and used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Davis-Hutchins lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 42. No other business appearing the Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 11.30 A. M., except for voting under Article 1.

At 1.50 P. M. the meeting was again called to order by the Moderator to take action on a letter received by Mrs. Lee Bowman, chairman of War Bond Sales for Chesterfield, from the State War Finance Committee, commending the Town on their purchases during the recent War Bond Drive and enclosing a certificate. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Frederick Robinson to accept the certificate and have it go on record. Vote declared by the Moderator as carried in the affirmative.

Article 1. A count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

For Town Clerk. Imogene L. Chickering had 145 votes, and Susie Morris had 1 vote. Imogene L. Chickering was declared elected.

For Selectman for 3 years. D. Homer Cray had 137 votes, Jessie Farrington had 1 vote. D. Homer Cray was declared elected.

For Selectman for 1 year. Clifford E. Chickering had 68 votes, Harold E. Randall had 40 votes, Paul E. Welcome had 49 votes. Clifford E. Chickering was declared elected.

For Town Treasurer. Ruth Morris had 143 votes, Wallace Record had 2 votes, Maurice Amidon had 1 vote. Ruth Morris was declared elected.

For Tax Collector. Harry E. Winn had 143 votes, Roger Spaulding had 1 vote. Harry E. Winn was declared elected.

For Spofford Road Agent. Walter J. Post had 142 votes, George Goodridge had 3 votes, Miller Williams had 1 vote, George Joslin had 1 vote. Walter J. Post was declared elected.

For Center Road Agent. Roger C. Spaulding had 134 votes, Frank Hubner had 2 votes, William Avery had 2 votes. Roger C. Spaulding was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Road Agent. Lyle B. Chickering had 28 votes, Henry Plante had 21 votes, Clifford E. Chickering had 19 votes, Clifford Amidon had 3 votes, Paul Welcome had 2 votes, George Goodridge 2 votes, Roger Spaulding 2 votes, Harry Winn 1 vote, Thomas Kearney 1 vote, Chester Burnham 1 vote, Richard Chickering 1 vote. Lyle B. Chickering was declared elected.

For Fireward for three years. Winston Cray had 142 votes and was declared elected.

For Fireward for two years. Walter J. Post had 20 votes, Wallace Record had 3 votes, George Joslin had 2 votes, Arthur Post 2 votes, William Gallagher 2 votes, Floyd Fuller 2 votes, and John Mansley, Richard Chickering, Bill Pierce, Nelson Ball and John Ball 1 vote. Walter J. Post was declared elected.

For Fireward for one year. Clarence K. Lewis had 12 votes, Clifford Amidon 6 votes, Frank Morrison 3 votes, Henry Plante 3 votes, Chester Burnham 3 votes, Lyle Chickering 2 votes, Fred Stoddard 2 votes, Harry E. Winn 2 votes, and Edward Ogilvie, George Plante, Roger Spaulding, Charles Maynard and Paul Welcome each had 1 vote. Clarence K. Lewis was declared elected.

For Auditors. Harold E. Randall had 115 votes, Edward L. For the eleven months ending December 31, 1944 the Central library had a total circulation of 4,469 volumes. Despite the short year we again have an increase of 724 books loaned.

West Chesterfield reports 1,071 books loaned during the year. This is an increase of 61 volumes.

Spofford loaned 675 books. Of these 423 were adult fiction, 51 adult non-fiction and 201 juveniles.

The total circulation in the three libraries showed an increase of 707 books. Again we find these figures prove the libraries are needed in our community.

The circulation at the main library was divided as follows:

The books added to the collection were in the following groups. Adults purchased 113, gifts 32, total 145. Of this number 46 were non-fiction. Juveniles purchased 81, gifts 5, total 86. Of these 15 were non-fiction. Total of all additional books this year, 231.

The patrons register shows 21 new names in 1944.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

In July 1944 some excitement was caused by a large amount of scum upon the water of Spofford Lake. Mr. Evan C. White, Health Officer of Keene, N. H., generously contributed his time and knowledge to help take water samples and send them to Concord, N. H., for analysis, which proved to be pollen from certain trees around the shore of the Lake.

At a later date two men came from Concord, N. H., and took several more samples from the Lake and all came back marked no criticism.

A sample of water was taken from the Pump at the Town Hall in Chesterfield, N. H., and sent to Concord for analysis and came back as follows: Although bacterially satisfactory at time of collection, this sample showed grossly excessive chloride (35.9) with increased hardness this indicative of sink drainage or seepage from a salt refuse deposited near the source. Not to be regarded as satisfactory.

To be regarded as dangerous when conditions indicate a privy or cess-pool as being the probable origin.

As no privy or cess-pool is located nearby it does not seem the use of the water would be dangerous.

No complaints about the sanitary conditions of the beaches at the Lake were received therefore they must have been satisfactory.

Eighteen Milk licenses were issued for the sale of Milk and Cream, seven of which were issued to buy and sell Milk and Cream at two dollars each as follows: Paul Penning, Henry Chickering, William Manch, Harry Nosek, Clifford Tuttle, Byron Davis, and John Redding.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I herein submit my second annual report as superintendent of Schools.

The problems that confront the American system in general have become much more acute since my last report. The teacher shortage, the scarcity of materials, and the lack of home supervision for pupils due to the total war effort are sample issues. Despite these shortages our school district has been able to provide the facilities and personnel necessary for good schools.

The maintenance of a modern school plant is an investment of increasing significance. The new challenge of "Education for World Understanding" implies many new responsibilities. The peace and happiness of the post-war world will depend on the democratic ideals of those who govern it. Universal education, with cooperative purposes which are acceptable to all nations, is the means of this objective. This new and broader concept of education implies that our schools in general must be strengthened if we are to win and maintain the peace.

The school plants at Spofford, Chesterfield and West Chesterfield, provide very well for the health, safety and welfare of the pupils. Several additional facilities might be provided when conditions permit. Careful maintenance is now the most significant factor in upholding standards.

During the last summer vacation the schools were completely cleaned and refinished. The furniture was resurfaced and the playground equipment painted.

New textbooks have been provided for all pupils in the district for the study of Spelling and Arithmetic. Many revisions have been made in the Reading and Social Science Program. Further revision is desirable and will probably be completed as soon as the supplies are available.

The Parent and Teacher Association has a constructive program and stimulates the cooperation between the home and school.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

**SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING OF THE TOWN OF
CHESTERFIELD, N. H.**

Town Hall, March 14, 1944

The meeting was called to order at 2.05 p. m. by the Moderator, H. E. Randall, and the warrant was read by the Clerk.

The articles of the warrant were disposed of as follows:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Mrs. Jessie Farrington nominated Walter J. Post. Mr. Post declined the nomination, so she nominated Mr. Frederick C. Robinson. A motion was made, supported and carried that C. M. Burnham be nominated, and that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for C. M. Burnham. The Clerk performed his duty and the Moderator declared Mr. Burnham elected. Mr. Burnham declined to serve. It was moved, supported, and carried that Harold E. Randall be nominated and the Clerk cast one ballot for Mr. Randall. It was done, Mr. Randall was declared elected, and took the oath of office from the Clerk.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

A motion was made, supported and carried that Oscar M. Polhemus be nominated as Clerk. It was done, Mr. Polhemus was declared elected and received the oath of office from the Moderator.

3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Pauline F. Record was nominated and on motion properly made, supported and carried was elected by the Clerk's casting one ballot for Mrs. Record. She was declared elected and took the oath of office from the Moderator.

4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Evelyn L. Winn was nominated and on motion made, supported and carried, the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot

for Mrs. Winn. Mrs. Winn was elected and received the oath of office from the Moderator.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other Officers or Agents of the District.

On motion by Mrs. Pauline F. Record, duly supported and carried, this article was passed over.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

No reports were submitted, but Mrs. Jessie Farrington spoke on making a Post-War project of the consolidated school idea as presented some years ago. On motion of Mrs. Farrington, duly supported and carried, the School Board was instructed to appoint a committee composed of representatives of the three sections of the town to study the matter and make a report to the District.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. On motion of Harry Winn, duly supported and carried, it was voted that the Town Auditors serve as Auditors for the District.

8. Under this article, Mrs. Alice Spaulding moved that the sum of (\$14,749.37) fourteen thousand seven hundred forty-nine dollars and thirty-seven cents be raised for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. It was properly supported and carried.

9. On motion of Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering, this article regarding an audit by the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission was passed over in proper form.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise the sum of \$2,600.00 to pay in whole or in part the cost of the transportation of every student residing in the town who is qualified and desirous of attending high school, payment to be made at the rate of not more than \$1.50 per week per pupil for those traveling more than fifteen miles per day. The details of carrying out the provision of this article are to be left to the discretion and judgment of the School Board with power to act.

After the Moderator read the article, Oscar M. Polhemus asked permission to ask the School Board a question. Before asking the question, Mr. Polhemus stated that he had "fathered" an article regarding the transportation of high school pupils, that he had secured the necessary signers, but that the article as in the warrant was not as it had been given to the School Board. His question followed, "Why had the Article been changed?"

Mrs. Agnes Chickering stated that the Article had been incorrectly copied into the warrant, that they were very sorry, etc., that the Board thought that if the money were raised, it could be expended as indicated in the Article as submitted by Mr. Polhemus. Some discussion followed. Mr. Polhemus stated that the article as he had submitted it to the Board contained provisions for paying transportation at the rate of \$1.50 per pupil per week for those travelling fifteen miles or less per day, and for paying transportation at the rate of \$2.00 per week per pupil for those travelling more than fifteen miles per day. The purpose being to pay \$1.50 per week for students attending high school in Brattleboro or Hinsdale, \$2.00 per week for those going to Keene. He expressed the hope that the article as stated in the warrant would be passed over.

Much discussion took place under the consideration of the article, and somewhere near its beginning, C. M. Burnham moved that the article be passed over. Mr. Merrifield supported the motion and Walter J. Post demanded the vote be made by ballot. When this was finally done and the votes counted, the article was passed over. The ballots showed sixty in favor of passing over the article, thirty-one against and one ballot was void.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned in proper form at 3.08 p. m.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
