Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday the 13th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.
2. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman for three years ensuing.
3. To choose by ballot and major vote one or more Auditors for the year ensuing.
4. To choose by ballot and major vote, Library Trustees for the year next ensuing.
5. To choose by ballot and major vote one Trustee of Trust Funds for two years next ensuing.
6. To choose by ballot and major vote one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years next ensuing.
7. To choose by ballot and major vote a Tax Collector for the year ensuing.
8. To choose by ballot and major vote all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
10. To raise such sums of money as necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct its Selectmen to take such action regarding rolling, plowing or otherwise, in keeping winter roads open in said Town for the year ensuing, as in their judgment seems most conducive to the best interest of the Town, and appropriate money for the same.
12. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purposes the sum of \$. ; and the State will contribute the sum of \$
13. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of cemeteries.
14. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Department for the purpose of extinguishing of fires, in said Town, and in event of favorable action, to make the necessary appropriation for the same.
15. To see if the Town will vote to fix the price per day for the hiring of manual labor, teams and trucks for work on town roads.
16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur the debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes of the ensuing municipal year and to pay such debts out of the tax money when it is received.
17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.
18. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the town charges for the ensuing year.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct its Selectmen to purchase a truck or other equipment for the construction and maintenance of highways in said Town, and make appropriation for the same.
20. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of establishing a capital reserve fund to be used for (buying a road machine; repairing the town hall; installing a system of assessment maps and records; or for the construction of highway; for the purchase of road machinery; or the repair of town buildings, as the case may be.)
 - (a) To see if the Town will vote to ratify and confirm a vote taken at the Annual March Meeting 1944, whereby it raised the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.) Dollars, under Chap. 160 of Laws of 1943; An Act relative to a Capital Reserve Fund; and the same to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds.
21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of Agents, Auditors, Selectmen, and all other officers and ratify and confirm the same.
22. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.
23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to apply on Town Indebtedness.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
