## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE TOWN OF DUBLIN.

FROM MARCH 14, 1905 TO MARCH 13, 1906.

In submitting this, the eighty-fourth annual report of our schools, we are pleased to say that they have as a whole, fully met our expectations. Thirty-five weeks of school have been taught in Districts No. 2, 3 and 5; thirty-four in No. 1; twelve in No. 4. Owing to sickness of the teacher in No. 1, a substitute was secured to teach the last four weeks, who proved most satisfactory to the Board.

Owing to the small number of scholars in Districts No. 3 and 4, they were united for the Fall and Winter terms. Satisfactory arrangements were made for the conveyance of the pupils, and the school was opened at No. 3 schoolhouse. Measles and whooping cough in this school caused a slight break and no doubt lessened the average attendance.

Eight different teachers were employed during the school year, three of them being Normal school graduates, all having had experience in teaching before coming here.

It was thought best to introduce music and drawing at the commencement of the Fall term. Miss Sadie M. Reed of Goffstown, was engaged to teach school in No. 3, and teach music and drawing in each of the other three schools, devoting one day in each week to this study. The school board, teachers and scholars have been much pleased with this department, and we find a good number of pupils who have taken to it, and made rapid progress. It is not expected that all will be able to make musicians or artists, but the fact remains that they will get something out of it that will be of advantage to them in their school education. Three pianos were purchased so that each of the Fall and Winter terms had the advantages of music.

It seems to us that there is a large amount of musical talent in town, undeveloped, which ought to have the advantages of a town singing school, certainly during the fall and winter months. Vocal training of the young has been sadly neglected and should be encouraged far more than it is at the present time. Why not all take hold and open a school of this kind early next autumn, employing competent teachers? It would surely be a success.

- Many needed repairs have been made during the past year, and many more are needed and must be made during the coming year.



The heating facilities in some of our school houses were very poor. A new stove has been placed in No. 3 schoolhouse. At No. 2 the old stove was converted into a furnace heater, which at the present time warms the schoolroom and has a tendency to make the whole room, including the floor, more comfortable. At No. 1 a heating arrangement was installed, similar to those recommended by the Vermont board of health for heating country school houses. This heater is giving perfect satisfaction. We have endeavored to make the out-buildings more sanitary, which has involved only a small expense. This is a matter that should be looked after by the board at all times and attended to.

We are glad to note the interest parents and friends have taken by their numerous visits, and hope this will increase as it goes far toward the making of a successful school. It is also our opinion that the teacher should avail themselves with more social intercourse with both parents and townspeople, for such intermingling and acquaintancè is a great help in many cases to the teacher and the people in general. A teacher's whole duty is not altogether in the schoolroom, but also to be conversant with those in the district and townspeople as a whole.

A teacher before entering the schoolroom for the day should plan her work, look over the different lessons and be prepared to give such information as may be obtained outside the text book bearing upon the topics of each lesson ; also be able to conduct the lesson without the aid or strict adherence to the text book. This in all cases will create more interest in the pupil, who in turn will search more for the desired information himself. We believe our teachers have been efficient and faithful in their work, and we are convinced they have spent a good deal of their time, on school work, outside the regular school hours. With the assistance of a Superintendent our schools are all graded as far as possible. This is a great help, especially in case of a new teacher, who can readily see the standing of each pupil.

We are sorry to note so many tardy marks in some of our schools, but we feel that it is not altogether the pupil who is to blame, but the parent. Parents should so far as possible, have their children attend school every day and see that they are at the school house before school begins. One way to avoid this may be to send a report to the parents weekly, and receive their endorsement. This would certainly acquaint the parent, not only of the pupil's attendance, but of his or her standing in school. We find one pupil on the roll of honor for the whole year ; others for one and two terms. It is an almost universal rule that such scholars are thoroughly interested in their work and are encouraged by their parents at home. The rank of a pupil in almost every case depends on the interest he takes in his studies and his punctuality at school.

It is hoped that a writing school may be had during the coming year. It is our opinion that the Medial system should be adopted by

all the scholars, as the Vertical system is a thing of the past. The writing of spelling lessons is a great help to the pupil and should be encouraged.

A Summer Vacation School was opened at the Town hall under the auspices of the Monadnock School of Handicraft, soon after the close of the spring term. The attendance was large and comprised the children of our summer people and townspeople also. We are of the opinion that the school had a good influence throughout the town in awakening an interest among the scholars that was carried into the day school. We see no reason why this Vacation School should not be made a permanent thing and eventually promote a large amount of good, especially in bringing all the children together on a level socially.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

FOR THE YEAR 1905—1906.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF DUBLIN:—I have the honor to submit my fourth report as superintendent of schools. A considerable improvement in school conditions and school work can be reported. Many needed repairs have been made on the school houses. The buildings are now comfortable. In the coming year the interiors should be made more attractive.

Dublin, compared with most small towns, is well supplied with text books. More are still needed for work in literature and nature study, and also more reference books. A good set of wall maps should be placed in each school. In several of my schools in other towns, small school libraries have been introduced the past year with excellent results. Ten dollars will purchase a good collection of books. Forty dollars would buy four libraries. By moving these, after they have been read, from one school to another a large amount of reading matter could be furnished. This would bear directly on the school work by making the children, through practice, better readers, and would also be a great aid toward general culture.

A new departure in Dublin school work has been made this year by employing a supervisor of music and drawing. The educational value of these subjects is now too generally recognized to require a defence. They are universally taught in all cities and large towns. If a child goes from a small school, where he has not had instruction in these branches, to a large school, he is obviously placed at a great disadvantage. The art of reading music can be taught in a school of only ten or twelve pupils as well as in a large one. Too much is not to be ex-

pected, however, with so small a chorus. Very few naturally good singers, if any, will be found in the average small school. Upon these few good voices the effect depends. In some of our schools there have been a good number of these, and good singing as well as good reading of music has resulted. Every school has been equipped with a good piano and this has helped greatly to overcome the inherent defect referred to above. We have also been especially fortunate in the fact that everyone of our teachers has been a good musician.

Some of the teachers started work in drawing last year. The summer school interested all the children in this subject. The work accomplished since the employment of the special teacher last fall has been far beyond what could have been expected.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Officers, and Committees, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money, as may be necessary, for the support of school ~~houses~~, for the repairing of school houses, for the public library, for the maintenance of the poor, for building and repairing highways and bridges, for electric lights, for observing Memorial day, and for other necessary charges arising within the town.

4. To see what action the town will take on the petition of Daniel A. Dwight and others, to discontinue the electric lights on the Lake road.

5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to apply for state aid for highways for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the present highway, from Col. T. W. Higginson's avenue, west, to the avenue of Joseph L. Smith, when a substitute a short distance farther to the south, is built to the satisfaction of the selectmen, and paid for by Henry Copley and Belle Greene.
