TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Francestown in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Francestown on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Selectmen or make alterations in the same, and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to finance the same as finally adopted.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) on serial notes, to tar and sand that portion of the Turnpike, between the Epps Four Corners and the Town Hall.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), deficiency appropriation to reimburse the Treasury for money expended on emergency washouts, sanding Turnpike, and printing town reports.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the recommendations of the Zoning Committee or take any action relating thereto.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take regarding the proposition of Mr. John B. Reid, in regard to the road leading to his place and if accepted, raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of the fire appropriation and add it to the Fire Truck Fund.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withhold one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of the fire appropriation, the same to revert to the Town Treasury to offset excess expenditures in 1950 fire account.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a by-law as follows: (Under authority of S.39, C233 R. L.) It shall be unlawful for any person to kindle or cause to be kindled a camp or outdoor cooking fire in this town, without permission of the Forest Fire Warden.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the revised laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town.
- 13. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and take action on the same.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

HIGHWAY REPORT

SUMMER HIGHWAYS

The work accomplished on summer highway money included fence posts and their erection; culverts and their installation; drilling and blasting of many of our most dangerous stones and ledges; erection and completion of one new bridge, and the planking of two others. Summer highway funds also included the usual work of dragging the roads in the spring, and graveling the worst places to give the taxpayer one way out of his home during the mud season. The grading of roads during the summer also comes under this appropriation.

GAS TAX

The gas tax money was used primarily to cut bushes and to remove the worst of these from the road sides.

PREPARATION AND TARRING OF TURNPIKE

The amount expended was used to get the road back into proper condition for tarring after the long open winter of 1949 and 1950. A road grader and operator were hired from Mont Vernon. The hand labor for picking rocks and sanding the two applications of tar was hired in town. A sand loader was hired from Greenfield in order to cover the fresh tar as quickly as possible. So far, on the new strip, we have had rather good results.

GENERAL FUND

The general fund is set up to buy material such as grader blades, salt, bridge planks and spikes.

EMERGENCY FLOOD MONEY

This was necessary because of the cloud burst we had in November which washed out and plugged a great many of our roads and culverts in the north end of town. The damage was confined to this region, and the Bible Hill area, because of the rugged terraine in these sections. These roads are at present all passable except for the back hill to Hob and Nob.

WINTER HIGHWAYS

In spite of having to plow very seldom we have had to sand frequently and the cost is the same or more than that of plowing. The State graveled Dodge's Hill with an excessive amount of clay, causing trouble all this winter. It will have to be regraveled before spring to eliminate the mud.

SUMMARY

If more money were appropriated by the town for highways we could repair and replace more culverts, fill more mud holes, grade the highways more frequently during the months of good weather, and get the roads into better condition for the winter months.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Francestown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is submitted herewith.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds and Library Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1949-Dec. 31, 1950: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1949 and December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$1,091.87 during 1950.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,123.86, less a net revenue surplus of \$1,053.00, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,070.86.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of Receipts and Expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1950, is indicated in Exhibit F.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpavers as indicated by the Collector's records.

Tax Collector:

The Collector should make a separate remittance to the Treasurer covering funds on hand on December 31, 1950, representing tax collections and redemptions from tax sales, as fallorra

Mrs. Trow, Eunice Patch, Mrs. Cleaves, Bette Murphy, Nancy Bowman, John Stewart, Thomas Curren, Judy Mace, Miss McKinlay, Mr. Bourne, Mrs. Park, Mrs. Langmaid, Thomas Hill, Mrs. McGreal, Stephanie Creighton, Miss Rand, Wayne Robinson, Mrs. Horton, Mrs. Emma Place, Charles Black, Mrs. Davis, Mr. Wright, Miss McLeod, Mrs. D'Olive, Mrs. Leonard, Miss Hall, Mr. Gray, W. A. Lord, Mrs. Mundy.

Through State Aid we received the World Book Encyclopedia and 85 other books, mostly for children. The annual card party, in the hands of Mrs. McAdam and a large committee broke the records and made it possible to buy 93 books. Thanks to the Improvement Society, and the Doll Fund sponsored by Prof. Hill, we were able to add 47 books to our collection. With the twenty dollars again given for special books we bought three more fine books for the art collection.

As usual, many voluntary improvements have been made during the year: new shelves were put in the supply closet, the lumber provided by W. A. Lord, and the work done by Thomas Place and Arthur Lord. Mrs. Brous repainted the Library sign, and Mr. Soule painted the back door; he also performed wonders around the badly neglected barbary hedge.

In connection with the Girl Scout projects on graphic arts, the group was taken to the Currier Art Gallery in Manchester to hear an illustrated talk on block printing by Mr. Chandler.

At the Library Mrs. Brous gave a most interesting demonstration-talk on jewelry making to the entire school. Some fine pieces of her own work were included in the annual art exhibit at the end of the summer. This exhibition also contained foreign

objects of art lent by Evelyn Vadney and Mrs. Nickrose; draperies designed by Rosamond Langmaid; copper ware by Mrs. Henry Hill and Mrs. McAdam, decorated tray by Mrs. Lela Place; paintings and drawings by Miss Hirst, Patricia Place, Mrs. Bosworth, Sheila Hoffman, Dariel Peterson, Mrs. Kunhardt. Mrs. Kunhardt and Mrs. Bosworth won first and second prizes at an exhibit in Hillsboro; later, their work, with paintings by Mrs. Brous, was shown at the Nashua Library.

Mrs. Burke and Miss Wright have used the Historical Rooms for special classes that were studying local history, and Mr. Thomas met at the Library with the older children, Selectmen and Town History Committee to discuss the names of old town

roads for the signs which they have made and put up.

During the year, 238 books were borrowed from the State Library and the Bookmobile comes every three months. We are receiving State Aid this year, but still fall far short of the books we need. The circulation of books and magazines has nearly doubled in the past three years. The number of school children is constantly increasing so that we are giving an extra hour on Wednesdays in order to accommodate two large groups. They will be larger next year. The older children continue to help most efficiently and often give their services on other days also, not only at the desk, but in such unlovely tasks as unloading the attic of old books in preparation for the new insulation.

In many places books are purchased for libraries instead of flowers for deceased friends; this is a growing custom and if anyone wishes to do this here, suitable book plates will be provided. Memorial books are usually bought with the special interests

of the deceased in mind.

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF FRANCESTOWN. N. H.

1. The Town of Francestown, in pursuance of the authority conferred by Chapters 51 and 53 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942 and any amendments, hereby adopts the following Zoning Ordinance.

2. The Town shall be divided into two zones:

The Village Zone shall be from the junction of the Bennington Road and the Pleasant Pond Road south to the Old Meeting House, thence northeasterly on the Poor Farm Road to the bridge over the South Branch of the Piscataquog River, easterly from the Old Meeting House to the Mill Village Bridge, southerly from the Old Meeting House to a point on the Second New Hampshire Turnpike where Potash Road joins said Turnpike, southeasterly on the Greenfield Road to a point where the Old County Road joins said Greenfield Road, and from the junction of the Bennington Road and the Oak Hill Road northwesterly for a distance of 1500 feet on the Oak Hill Road, and for a distance of 300 feet on each side of the center line of each road.

The Rural Zone shall consist of the remainder of the geo-

graphical area of the Town.

- 3. Within said Zones no person or persons shall erect or place a building for the use of human habitation, permanent or temporary, or for a commercial enterprise without first obtaining a permit to be issued by the Board of Selectmen. The Board of Selectmen, when granting or denying this permit, shall consider the preservation of the attractiveness of the Town, its desirability as a place in which to live and do business, the safeguarding of health, welfare, morals, convenience and safety of its citizens, and an orderly growth in the future.
- 4. The Selectmen shall publicly post a copy of the permit for 14 days before said permit becomes valid.
- 5. The Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment conforming in membership and duties to the provisions of Chapter 51, Sections 56 to 71, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, and any amendments thereto.
- 6. No junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, or other materials shall be established in any part of the Town.
- 7. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent the continuance of any existing use of land or buildings.
- 8. This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting and when such amendment has received a public hearing which has been advertised and given a fifteen-day notice.
 - 9. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

FRANCESTOWN IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY

During 1950 the Francestown Improvement Society made a major move, which we hope will mean much to the young people of the Town. The triangular area between the Greenfield Road and the old County Road was purchased for use as a ball field and playground. This was the result of the suggestion and recommendation of the Boys' Club. There is a large open area on it which seemed very suitable, both in size and in proximity to the center of the Town. It had many large rocks and boulders, which were removed by a group of volunteers, under the leadership of the Boys' Club, who spent many long hours clearing them out. When grading is completed, it will make a fine baseball field. The Society will own it, but gives the use of it for sports to the residents of the Town.

In addition, considerable work was done in tightening up the old Creamery Dam so that the water supply would be adequate

for fire protection in the northerly part of the village.

Our one source of revenue, aside from dues, is the Labor Day Carnival. There was a gamble on the weather this year, as it was raining the night before and in the morning. However, the skies cleared in time so that the parade was very successful, with some excellent floats and entries, which showed imagination and were the fruit of much labor. The theme was "Mother Goose Rhymes" and many were represented. The booths were filled with offerings and did a thriving business, and the Scotch Auction was very popular. The Peterborough Band led the parade and gave a concert thereafter in front of the Town Hall. The entertainment for the children was a puppet show, which they enjoyed greatly. The firemen served a supper in the Town Hall, and the Grand Ball was square dancing with Ralph Page and his orchestra.

It was through the cooperation of many people in Town that the Carnival was a success. Working together for such a purpose means a great deal to Francestown. From the proceeds this year, the property for the playground was paid for, and money was appropriated for the Red Cross, Community Christmas, Historical Society, new books for library, refinishing World War

II memorial, upkeep of Common, and repairs to dam.

Future success will depend on everyone taking part and backing up the leadership which the Improvement Society tries to give.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Francestown qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March 1951, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF FRANCESTOWN:

I respectfully submit my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Instruction

The Francestown School under the able instruction of Mr. Alfred Thomas and Mrs. Gladys Burke, assisted by Miss Ethelyn G. Edwards, the music supervisor, is continuing to show progress. Definite stress is being placed on the fundamental tools of learning, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic and Language Arts, complemented by the essentials to successful living as health, science, social understanding, appreciation of music and an ability to competently live in a democractic society. The children are learning about, and actively expressing an interest in, their community. This was very forcefully brought out by the "sign project," directed by Mr. Thomas. It was of distinct advantage to the town and has received much favorable comment. The type of work done in the Francestown School was recognized by Keene Teachers College, when they petitioned the Francestown School Board to permit a cadet teacher, Miss Norma Wright, to receive instruction in teaching in our school.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Our new school lunch program has contributed a great deal to our school by giving the children an opportunity to accept responsibilities and discharge duties that contribute to the general welfare of all. It is being very capably managed by Mrs. St. John, assisted by Mrs. Hoyt. This activity, and the manner in which it was developed, warrants great commendation for all those who took part in it.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

Mrs. Ola Myhaver, has very capably carried out her duties as School Nurse. Every effort has been made to keep the parents informed of any difficulties that have arisen relative to the health of their children. The excellent cooperation given her by the parents and various organizations in town has made it possible to keep the health standards high in our school. For details of her work I refer you to the Report of School Nurse.

PLAYGROUND FACILITIES

The playground area, as improved by the men of the town a year ago, has made available to the children, an excellent space

for large recreational activities, and is quite adequate for softball, baseball, etc. However, the facilities for the younger children are decidedly limited. We presently have, one old set of swings, which are in constant use, but in poor condition. I would like to recommend that in the near future some consideration be given either by the School District or some interested group, to the establishment of a plan whereby one piece of equipment be added to our playground each year. The equipment, in order of importance, might be a set of swings, a set of see-saws and a wave slide.

IMPROVEMENT TO BUILDING

The time has come, or is rapidly approaching, when some consideration should be given to repainting the school building. Our school building is now ten years old, and in that time three sides have received no attention, consequently they are weathering badly. Provisions have been made in this year's budget to have this done. The classrooms also need some attention. Provisions have been made to paint and varnish the primary room and library adjacent to it. In two year's time the whole interior could be completely re-decorated at a nominal cost. The entrance hall and boys' and girls' lavatories were done a year ago.

TRANSPORTATION

Our bus routes are operating well and it is planned to continue the routes as laid out this year with perhaps minor changes. It is hoped that we can operate on the same budget for transportation for 1951-52 as for this year.

FINANCE

Every effort is being made to offer our young people an adequate education as economically as possible. The budget as submitted for 1951-52 provides for only actual necessities. An analysis of the School Board's budget shows that the larger increases are due to tuitions, teachers' retirement, repairs, equipment and teachers' salaries. We have no control over the tuitions or teacher retirement. The first is set by the receiving districts and as our number of pupils attending high school increase, so will our tuition. This figure is controlled by the average per pupil cost for the State of New Hampshire. In 1949-50 this was \$252.04 for high school pupils. Tuition to Peterborough in 1951-52 will be \$250 per pupil; Hancock's tuition will be \$225 and New Boston's \$225. The district's contribution to the State Teachers' Retirement System is set by statute at 6.09% of the gross teachers' salaries. All other increases are the result of increased enrollment, needed repairs, and the general increase in the cost of living reflected by the present economic conditions of the Nation.

STATE AID

The status of State Aid is uncertain, and dependent upon the attitude of the present Legislature toward State Aid to Education. The new bill does not provide for any State Aid for Francestown, consequently the School Board made no estimate of income from this source. Much publicity has been given to this bill, thus it is not felt necessary to go into details in this report.

CONCLUSION

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of Francestown, the Parent-Teachers' Association, the local Chapter of the American Red Cross, the Grange, and all other organizations who have assisted the teachers and me in our endeavor to provide a sound educational program for the children of Francestown. I especially wish to thank the Francestown School Board for the excellent cooperation and help they have given me.
