

BUILDINGS ON GRAFTON COUNTY FARM

Commissioners' Report

To the Citizens of Grafton County:-

We herewith submit our report of the affairs of the County for the year ending December 31st, 1909, together with the reports of the Sheriff, Solicitor, Clerk of the Court, Jailer, Treasurer and Auditors, and the Superintendent, Physician and Chaplain of the County Farm.

The Treasurer's report shows that there are no notes against the County, and only two orders of small amounts outstanding: that there is a small balance in the treasury and over \$3800 due from towns and individuals.

This with the value of the personal property at the County Farm gives us a surplus of \$27,738.04, a gain over last year of \$1226.20.

The cost of supporting dependent children is constantly increasing and the past year we have paid the different homes more than ever before.

In accordance with a vote of the County Convention we bought last spring a house and one acre of land just below the County Farm for which we paid \$700, and have expended about \$400 on same in improvements. A wall has been built at the foot of the bank below the almshouse at an expense of \$1000. Eight hundred has been laid out upon the heating plant and all the buildings have been painted outside during the past summer.

The expense of running the hospital which was started last year has been about \$1000, but we believe it is a success financially as well as making our inmates much more comfortable.

We have on the farm over one hundred high grade holstein cows and over fifty head of young stock, besides the usual number of hogs and horses.

SELECTMEN OF TOWNS

AND

OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

Your attention is called to the following extracts from the laws of 1903

CHAPTER 42, SECTION 1

Section 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such person the sum or sums paid out for such assistance, the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after the payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration, provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his decease.

CHAPTER 106, SECTION 1, as amended

"Section 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support; provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town."

CHAPTER 110, SECTION 1, last clause

"IX. Any person of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state, and, being taxed for his

poll for seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on his poll and estate during that term, and any unmarried woman of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on her estate during that term, shall thereby gain a settlement in such town." Also to Chapter 67 of the laws of 1903, Chapter 84 of the Public Statutes, Chapters 1 and 71 of the laws of 1907, relating to paupers, and the following from Chapter 110, Public Statutes, relating to "assistance to persons in quarantine."

Section 1. Whenever any person or family is placed in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public against small pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other dangerous, infectious or contagious diseases, it shall be the duty of said board to assist such person or family while in quarantine in such manner as in the judgment of the board may be deemed wise and necessary.

Sect. 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part thereof as the board may determine, shall be deemed a legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public health and shall be charged to the account of incidental expenses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the person or persons so quarantined and assisted unless such person or persons are already paupers as defined by the Public Statutes.

HORACE F. HOYT, Etna, N. H.:—Dorchester, Enfield, Canaan, Grafton, Hanover, Lebanon, Lyme, Orford, Orange, Piermont, and present their bills to the commissioners at Lebanon on the third Tuesday in April and the third Tuesday in October.

GEORGE H. TURNER, Bethlehem, N. H.:—Bethlehem, Bath, Benton, Easton, Franconia, Haverhill, Landaff, Littleton, Lisbon, Lyman, Livermore, Monroe, Warren, and present their bills to the commissioners at Woodsville the third Tuesday in March and the third Tuesday in September.

All applications for aid should be immediately reported to the Commissioners as under the laws of 1903 no bill will be paid for more than ten days' support previous to the proper affidavit being received. Affidavit blanks will be supplied by the Commissioners upon request.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1909, one hundred and eight (108).

The number of weeks board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual and dividing that number by seven, which gives the number of weeks each individual has been supported.

The whole cost of supporting Paupers at the Farm for the year ending December 31, 1909, is \$13,587.11 and the sum divided by the whole number of weeks board furnished, viz: 5664, gives \$2.40 as the price per week.

In addition to the foregoing there were on April 1 three actions on the Equity docket under the nuisance act, viz., complaints against Oscar L. Rand, Dennis H. and Harry E. Sargent, and Henry H. Brown. The Rand case has been dismissed. The Sargent case was tried at the April term, the defendants found guilty, D. H. Sargent sentenced to four months in jail and H. E. Sargent to two months in jail. The Brown case is still on the docket. One other case under the same act has been brought against Lewis Sorrell of Woodstock, which is still on the docket.

There are two cases on the civil docket to recover defaulted bail in the case of State v. Constantine and Brawn, and one action has been brought against Napoleon Bedard to recover a portion of the expense for maintaining Bedard's children in the Orphan's Home. This case has been settled.

The Solicitor recommends to owners and keepers of dogs that they familiarize themselves with the provisions of the dog law, ch. 60 of the Laws of 1891, and the amendments thereto, and particularly recommends to Selectmen of towns that secs. 11. 12 and 13 of that chapter be strictly complied with. The law is imperative that the Chairman of each Board of Selectmen transmit a proper certificate to the Solicitor within ten days from the first day of July of each year showing the proper observance of the law relating to the licensing of dogs in their respective towns. To make this certificate the Selectmen must insist upon strict compliance with the provisions of sections 11 and 12 of chapter 60. Much of the delay that has happened in each of the towns in getting dogs licensed the past year might have been avoided if the Selectmen had called the attention of owners and keepers of dogs to the provisions of the law in this particular at the time of taking the annual inventory.

Proceedings of County Convention

Tuesday, Jan. 13, 1909.

In accordance with notice given by the speaker the members of the House from Grafton County met this day, after morning session, to organize the county convention.

Jonathan M. Cheney of Ashland was elected chairman.

F. A. Musgrove of Hanover was elected clerk.

Senator Turner addressed the convention and called attention to the proposed trip, date not yet determined, to the county farm buildings.

Voted to adjourn.

Feb. 3, 1909.

At a meeting of the convention, held this day final arrangements were made for the visit to the county buildings tomorrow. Chairman Cheney announced the plans in full, and Senator Turner made further announcements.

Voted to adjourn.

Feb. 5, 1909.

The convention met this day at the county farm buildings in Woodsville, leaving Concord on the 6 a.m. train, and reaching Woodsville at 11 a.m.

The convention was conducted about the grounds and buildings, making a thorough inspection of all departments at the farm.

The universal opinion was that the farm was in a prosperous condition and excellently managed.

At a noon meeting of the convention in the office the chief subject discussed was House Bill No. 235, providing for an increase in the salary of the County Solicitor. The commissioners called the attention of the convention to a small house, known as the Drown house, which the county is now renting but wished to purchase.

Discussion of these subjects led to no official vote, as it was decided to pass no votes appropriating money except at a regularly called meeting at Concord.

Tuesday, March 16, 1909.

A meeting of the convention was held after the morning session, Chairman Cheney in the chair.

House Bill No. 235 was discussed by Senator Turner, Representatives Clough, Woodbury and Dodge.

Voted to lay the bill on the table for future consideration.

Senator Turner called attention to the county reports and the estimate of expenses for the ensuing two years. The estimate was thoroughly made, item by item, and showed a total of \$41,350, exclusive of the amount necessary for purchasing the Drown house.

Commissioners Hoyt and Ayer explained that this was a conservative estimate.

Dodge of Lincoln moved that we appropriate \$42,000 annually for the next two years. This was amended to \$44,000, said amendment being accepted by Dodge, and it was "voted to appropriate \$44,000" for each of the ensuing two years.

Voted to authorize the Commissioner to purchase the Drown property at a sum not to exceed \$700.

Commissioner Ayer presented to the convention the draft of a bill proposing to pay the Commissioners a stated salary, instead of a per diem and expenses. The bill was laid upon the table for future consideration. Voted to adjourn.
