TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to put first coat of tar on Wash Pond Road.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to meet the expenses of the Public Library for the ensuing year.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the cemeteries for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

8. To hear reports of auditors and committees, and to act thereon.

9. To see if the town will accept State Aid for Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate, or set aside, for said purpose the sum of \$168.49. State's share \$673.97.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 to pay note due on Fire House, June 2, 1946, and also to raise the sum of \$450.00 to pay additional notes due on the same in 1947, 1948 and 1949 in order to reduce principal on long term note.

11. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$75.00 for Health Department, to be used to care for Public Dumps, and expense of Health Officer. Money to be expended on approval of the Selectmen.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Trustees of the Trust Funds for reimbursement on part of the principal.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds.

14. To see if the town will vote to accept the Wm. Hamilton place, which was deeded to the town, to take care of Mr. Wm. Hamilton as long as he lives.

15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the Wm. Hamilton place.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of a water hole in East Hampstead.

17. To see if the town will vote to put in a street light in front of Ralph Rooney's home on Kents Farm road.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE HAMPSTEAD FIRE DEPARTMENT

The past year has been a record year for the least number of fires in town, both buildings and forest, since we have had an organized department. It shows more carefulness by the townspeople, and we hope the results for this year will be as good. We should be especially cautious this spring after the snow is gone, keeping incinerators repaired and obtaining permits for any burning.

Some of our appropriation for last year was used to finish our hall and paint same. It was necessary to have the pump repaired which put it in first class condition.

Our books show only three house fires in town; the Hartford place in East Hampstead, total loss; a large chicken-house owned by Fred Bailey, which could have developed into a bad fire had it not been for the Fire Department; a fire at Winthrop Inn also brought under control at a critical stage. In December we responded to a call from Sandown when the Bassett home was burned.

We have been called to several chimney fires but none of them serious ones.

No forest fires makes a good record.

PREVENT FOREST FIRES—IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousands of dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners, and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveals the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up the fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on his guard. He should

- I. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
 - a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.
 - b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.

- c. Seeing that others comply with the requirements.
- d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting,—that PAYS!

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead :

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools. This report deals with the Hampstead Schools for the school year July 1, 1944 to June 30, 1945. It is accompanied by Headmaster Peltonen's excellent report for Hampstead High School and by equally satisfying reports by Mrs. Soule and Mrs. Thompson.

As in the past I am presenting information about our schools in statistical form. Many interesting facts can best be shown in this manner. I commend these tables as well as the reports just mentioned to your attention.

There were three new teachers at the high school in September. Miss Mabel Plante had resigned and Mrs. Ruth Webster was appointed in her place. Miss Virginia Hayn resigned in order to return to her home in the middle west; Miss Margaret Kurtz was appointed to fill this vacancy. Miss Medora Sawyer resigned to be married and Miss Charlotte York was appointed in her place. We were unable to secure a fifth and sixth grade teacher and were obliged to combine grades. The first, second, and third grades are taught by Miss Mabel Emerson; and grades four and five by Mrs. Beatrice Reynolds. Mrs. Alice Davidson was appointed teacher of grades six, seven, and eight. We are fortunate in having an excellent teaching force in our schools.

The enrollment last year was 147 as compared with 146 the year before. The school attendance averaged 92 per cent of the membership. Ten boys and girls completed the work of grade eight and nine of these have entered a high school.

For a number of years the five towns that make up our Supervisory Union have owned and used a silent motion picture machine. The motion pictures have been very helpful, especially in the teaching of History, Geography, and Health. At present the majority of recent educational films are made for sound machines. I hope it will be possible soon to exchange our projector for a sound ma-

chine. The rapid rate of learning in the army is attributed, to a considerable extent, to the use of motion picture machines.

Nearly every classroom has one or more children with some hearing impairment. The average for the country is three such children per classroom. Hearing impairment can be measured by a special scientific device called an audiometer. These tests are to be given to all children during this school year by Mrs. Soule. An audiometer has been loaned to us by our State Board of Education. It has been found that 60 per cent of the hard of hearing can be given the aurological care he needs. Those children that the doctors can not help become educational problems. Instruction in lip reading becomes necessary in extreme cases. Speech defects are often caused by inability to hear certain sounds.

We hope it will be possible to hold a dental clinic soon.

Last Spring the New Hampshire Legislature passed a revised Teacher Retirement System which gives our teachers worthwhile retirement privileges. Women may retire at sixty years of age and men at sixty-five, providing their term of service meets the requirements. The retirement fund is built up by contributions, both by the teacher and the school district in which she is employed. A majority of the teachers of our state have joined the retirement system. Teacher Retirement Systems help to build better schools by maintaining efficiency and economy in the use of school funds; by raising the morale of the school personnel; by holding good teachers in public school service.

The school nurse, Mrs. Jessie Soule, R. N., is continuing her good work in the schools. She has made many home calls as well as the regular school visits in the interest of children's health. She has been generous in furnishing transportation to children at clinics and other remedial work.

"War Stamp Day" became a weekly institution during the war. It helped children learn to save, by making it easy for them to save. It taught arithmetic, attitudes of responsibility, and an appreciation of the citizen's part in government. Schools that wish to continue in peace time the educational advantages of "Stamp Day," will be able to get United States Savings Stamps as formerly. Study units and teaching aids in the field of personal money management will be available. It is hoped that at least some of our schools will continue this valuable project.

Teaching of the basic skills is the essential task of the schools

and it has been our plan to see that the job is thoroughly done by means of the best accepted methods. In order for pupils to succeed in school work, it is necessary that they possess a good foundation in reading habits and abilities. For this reason a substantial part of book expenditures has been to continue to equip elementary grades with a good reading system supplemented by work book exercises for reading growth, with correct language habits in writing and speaking.

The progress made by each pupil in grades one to eight will be checked by an achievement test during the year and as early as possible after the middle of the year. These tests help us understand the educational needs of the child and the class.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Parent-Teacher Association for their continued assistance.

We expect the new Central School will be completed and ready for use by grades 1-8 after the February vacation. The children of Hampstead are very fortunate to live in a town which had the determination to replace the burned Central School in such difficult times and provide such a durable and modern building for their use.

The chief factor in a school system is the pupil; next in importance is the teacher; the methods used and the knowledge gained make up the third factor; these together with the proper physical environment, and necessary operating funds constitute a school system. The School building and its equipment exist as a means for putting the educational program into operation. The new building is constructed so as to meet in an excellent manner the modern standards of safety, comfort, and educational program.

For the Teachers, the School Board, and myself, I express the common desire that a larger number of parents and friends visit the schools. If parents will come to school to see their children at work, what they are doing, what they are given to do with, and how their work is directed, it will give them first hand information concerning our schools.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation on the part of the School Board, Teachers, Local Organizations, and the Community.

The statistics above are a tabulation of the September 1945 to January 1946 registrations for Hampstead High and Junior High Schools.

It is a pleasure to report a wholesome pupil and teacher attitude conducive to scholastic achievement. In the junior high school, we are particularly fortunate in having the services of Mrs. Robert L. Davidson as a teacher.

The Program of Studies for the current year is changed to provide for French I to meet the requests of parents and pupils.

Each girl during her four year high school course receives a minimum of two units of work in home economics subjects which include the following: clothing, family, foods, and home management.

The pupils of Hampstead High School are to be commended in their most excellent participation in the War Savings Program of the United States Treasury Department. During the year the sales of bonds and stamps exceeded \$2500.

The books of our school are supplemented by material from the local and the state libraries. Current reading material is again supplied by the generous donation of the Parent Teacher Association.

Hot lunches are prepared as a project of the Foods class under the supervision of Miss Charlotte York, Home Economics teacher.

The graduating class of 1945 has its four boys serving in the armed forces: Alfred Brickett, Paul Beeman, Gene Duston and George Gorton. All were selected for specialized training in army schools, with Paul Beeman attending Norwich University under the Army Specialized Training Reserve Program. Maxine Chase is enrolled at the University of New Hampshire. Elaine Tait is training at the New Hampshire State Hospital in Concord. The remaining members are employed in nearby industries.

The Jr. O. U. A. M. Cup One Act Play Contest was revived being won by the Class of 1946 with the Reverend Thomas E. Moye, Mrs. Maurice I. Randall and Miss Doris M. Spollett judges.

The operetta, "The Pirate's Daughter" was directed by Mrs. Eva Thompson, assisted by the teachers and Mrs. Ralph Rooney.

Plans are being made for class dances, a senior novelty night, junior prom and other activities. A public prize speaking contest is planned to afford experience and training in expression.

During the year the biology class members visited the Harvard University Museum of Natural History accompanied by Ernest Peltonen, teacher. Members of the junior and senior classes, as guests of Representative Doris M. Spollett, inspected the state institutions in Concord with transportation furnished by Miss Spollett and Mrs. Benjamin H. Clow. In June the senior class, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Peltonen, made a tour of New York City. As guests of Dr. Raymond Moore, members of the biology class had an educational lesson in his office and laboratory. Members of the Home Class visited the Hale Hospital in Haverhill, Massachusetts. In addition, many field trips were taken.

Our purpose is to gain a practical approach to learning. Touring New York makes more vivid the study of the problems of a large city and incidentally develops a greater appreciation for the benefits of small town living. Studying exhibits such as the development of hybrid corn in a museum brings more meaning to the paragraphs of the biology text. Education as a living part of the life of the pupil is best preparation for active participation as a desirable citizen in a democracy. The time tested and proven formal text book method of presentation requires this modified emphasis.

Youth today more than ever before in the history of man-

kind must be prepared to become intelligent, and alert citizens if they are to fully enjoy their fortunate birth in a leading democracy. This preparation results through an educative process that supplies the tools and synchronizes vicarious and actual experience to give rise to a democratic individual.

In conclusion, on behalf of the teaching staff, I extend our appreciation for the cooperation and support received from the Superintendent of Schools, School Board and citizens of Hampstead.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To Mr. William J. Nelson, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my annual report as supervisor of music in the Hampstead Schools.

The music program in our schools provides an integrated experience which develops an understanding of and a love for music. The first step is to let the child listen to the singing of simple songs with a good tone quality. His next step is his own acquirement of a beautiful tone. Along with the development of tone quality, consideration is given to expression and diction. As the children develop in singing, listening, and music reading, they learn to sing in parts, always an interesting experience. The adult male voice becomes interesting as a conscious singing and listening experience as the boy's voice changes. It is usually at this time that such classifications as soprano, alto, tenor and bass take on a definite meaning.

Listening is the basis of all music learning. In music study, from the first song taught by imitation listening remains of great importance throughout the succeeding years. Through listening children become acquainted with the music of the master composers.

The operetta "The Pirate's Daughter" was presented by the High School students on December fourteenth. The group was assisted by the Junior High School pupils.

For your co-operation and that of the teachers, I am most grateful.
