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THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Town meeting will be recessed for School meeting.

The articles in the warrant will be taken up at 11:00 o'clock a. m., and the polls will be closed at 6:00 p. m.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

- 3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise towards paying its indebtedness or take any action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see what action the town will vote to take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.
- 15. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$924.93. (State appropriates \$3,699.73 for this purpose providing the town raises the above amount.)
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for painting and repairing the Town Hall, Engine House and Academy Hall, or take any action relative thereto.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Albert E. Vitty property or take any action relative thereto.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the old Gen. Taylor Engine (hand pump) or take any action relative thereto.

- 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the old stone crusher and, or, boiler, or take any action relative thereto.
- 21. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

From the above tabulation it will be noted that not much total time was lost as in the previous year, although eighteen half days were lost by the high school. The number of pupils registered was 33 less than the previous year and 42 less than in 1941-1942. Although the percent of attendance has slightly improved it was not up to the state average. The amount of tardiness has also increased especially in the high school. We hope these conditions will be improved the following year. The total number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools was 226. Of this number one elementary pupil attended in Concord.

It was planned to begin an Agricultural Course in the high school in the fall of 1944 but no teacher was available. However, a course in Smith-Hughes Trades and Industries will be continued until a teacher of Agriculture becomes available.

There is still great need of better lighting for the Central Building. As mentioned in our annual reports for 1939-1940 and 1940-1941 there is only one unshaded light bulb in the front part of each room, and all rooms used except that occupied by grades 5-6 are lighted from three sides. As soon as materials are available these conditions should be remedied.

The teacher shortage continues to increase. We are informed that a total of only eighteen elementary teachers will be available from Teachers Colleges at Keene and Plymouth in June 1945.
