To the inhabitants of the town of Hill, in the county of Merrimack
in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Hill
on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in
the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3 To see if the town will vote to establish a rate of pay for all town labor of not less than forty cents (\$0.40) per hour.
- 4 To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote of March 10, 1936, adopting the Municipal Budget Act.
- 6 To see if the town will vote to pay the Water Commissioners for their services and expenses.
- 7 To see what action the town will take in regard to any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds for non-payment of taxes.
- 8 To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for Class II roads and raise and appropriate \$936.00 for the same; or, to see if the town will vote to accept state aid for T. R. A. roads and raise and appropriate \$499.43 for the same.
- 9 To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to levy a tax of 10 cents per 1000 feet board measure for all logs delivered at the timber salvage skidway.
- 10 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

School District Report.

Superintendent's Report.

To the School Board and Citizens of Hill:

IN GENERAL.

Another year of over-crowded school rooms presents itself. The "Grammar Room" now has an enrollment of 32. The "Primary Room" has 35. These rooms were intended for 25 pupils each.

In the present 7th grade are 9 pupils, who would go to Franklin next September to enter the 8th grade. This would leave 23 in the "Grammar Room." Add to this 6 to be promoted from the "Primary Room" and the enrollment would be 29 for the Grammar grade next September, provided no unexpected pupils entered from families moving into Hill. This number is all that the room should have.

The "Primary Room" would lose 6 by promotion and probably gain as many or more from those entering school for the first time. Therefore this room would not be relieved of its numbers next year under present conditions. If however, the next year's 7th grade (10 pupils) could be transported to Franklin both rooms could be relieved by re-arrangement of classes remaining. Another mode of relief would be to secure another room and another teacher. The latter means would be the more expensive.

Citizens of Hill must understand that the increased enrollment in the local schools and the increase in number going on to junior high and high schools must necessarily mean an increase in school costs. We cannot educate 80 pupils for the same costs we can 60.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

The book and supply problem is serious. We have not had the books we should have had, the books we actually need for several years. This year the lack has been felt more than before because of larger classes to supply. We have borrowed some books and bought second-hand ones to tide over. This next year will present like trouble. It is quite necessary that the Hill pupils going to Franklin for their own advantage should have the same kind of books in 6th and 7th grades as those grades have in Franklin. We are not able to do this with the present appropriation for books and supplies. It should be increased by fifty dollars at least.

HEATING AND VENTILATION.

Sicknesses this year, so far, have been numerous—colds, chicken pox and two cases of scarlet fever. I have wondered how much of this sickness might be due to over-crowded rooms and poor ventilation. The heating system, too, should be investigated to determine means of its improvement

GRADUATION.

The graduation in June 1938 was planned as a local recognition of the Sesqui-Centennial observance by the State. Three one-act plays "The New Constitution" "The Four Absentees" and "The Flag Maker" were presented by the graduates, depicting the problems and difficulties in securing the ratification of the constitution by New Hampshire.

The plays were well presented and were educational and instructive to all present.

CONCLUSION.

The School Board, I am sure, realize the needs of the schools and the handicaps because of economic conditions. The teachers have been patient with working conditions, and

all of us have done our best with what we have had to do with, hoping the town would this year feel it could do more financially for the schools.
