## TOWN WARRANT



# State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Childs Opera House in said town on Tuesday the 14th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustees of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers herefore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights, and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

- Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges, culverts and sidewalks.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Memorial Day purposes.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be applied upon the account of the Hıllsboro District Nursing Association.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town and in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one-hundredth of one per cent (1|100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, the sum of \$288.00.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for the care and maintenance of the Town Clock, so-called, on Smith Memorial Church.
- Article 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- Article 13. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care and maintenance of Grimes Field.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the salary of an extra police

officer for four months in the summer, said officer to be hired by the Chief of Police.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to purchase the Maple Avenue cemetery and the Mary C. Atwood farm for town cemetery purposes, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 17. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed, under such conditions and to such persons as the Board may consider proper, the title to real estate taken by the town in default of redemption from a tax sale.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck and equipment designed for fighting forest fires.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to aid the Concord Hospital at Concord, N. H.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### GENERAL REPORT

It has been wisely said that communities with good schools for all children, are marked by certain attitudes and activities. Adults in such communities show sincere interest in all children. They seem to be constantly saying to themselves and to others, "Our children are important to us. We want to give them a better chance than we had. We consider the children of greatest importance to our community, they're very dependent on us, and they're certainly entitled to our serious thought, consideration, and sacrifice. They are our only real, present investment in the world of tomorrow."

Communities which recognize their responsibilities to children do more than talk about good education. They take action to provide good educational programs in adequate schools which really meet the needs of children.

At the last annual meeting, the district voted to have a committee investigate the possibilities of a new central school to replace our four old ones. The committee chosen was made up of: W. Earl Lutts, Henry Baldwin, and Harold Harvey. A majority report of that committee recently submitted to your school board urged the immediate initiation of a program to build the much needed school. Consequently your school board has included the necessary articles in the district warrant.

Every one in the district knows of the extreme need for such a new building. The committee has given the school board the go-ahead sign. The school board has inserted the proper articles in the warrant.

When the votes for and against the new building are

counted, we'll all know how many in the Hillsboro Town School District are talkers about good education and how many are willing to do more than talk.

To make it clearly apparent what such a program will probably cost you, the first interest and principal payments on such a bond issue as would probably be needed to build the school, are included in the proposed budget. There is no attempt here to force such a bond issue on anyone. If it isn't voted, this amount can be subtracted from the proposed budget.

Your district has an exceptional tradition in the fine schools it has built and maintained in the past. The very excellence of this tradition, however, must not serve to check the march of time and interfere with the building of an educational system to meet the needs of today. We can't maintain leadership in education with memories alone. We desperately need a new school house right away.

The great spirit of cooperation between teachers, parents, and pupils during the past year has been a source of great benefit to our educational program. The school board has worked diligently to constantly maintain and improve our program. In such a spirit of cooperation we now look ahead and face our next problem; that of providing a modern school building.

- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### THE GENERAL REPORT

The problems of present-day education are revolved around the question of exactly what will our boys and girls need for educational background to take them adequately through at least the next thirty or forty years of life. Frequently we meet the person who has to have penicillin or one of the other latest drugs for his ailment, has the latest television set and automobile or has the latest electrical gadgets in his kitchen; and yet is sincerely convinced that when it come to education, the old methods of education are everlastingly good. Obviously these views are at least inconsistent and can be dangerous to the welfare of the community. Our educational objectives are influenced by our conception of how the child learns and of how the social setting in which he lives affects that learning. Science has made tremendous strides in developing knowledge along these lines just as it has in the field of human comfort.

#### WORKSHOP FOR TEACHERS AND PARENTS

For five days in November, parents and teachers from this whole area, met in Henniker to study together, some of the latest knowledge concerning the ways children learn and current objectives of education. The response of parents from Hillsboro who attended was extremely gratifying. Much progress was made in mutual understandings of school problems. Guidance for the workshop was provided by personnel from the University of New Hampshire, the State Department of Education, Plymouth Teachers' College, and the United States Office of Education.

### SCHOLARSHIP GOALS

The primary job of our schools is to help each child develop his skills in the so-called tool subjects such as reading, arithmetic, spelling and language. We know that there seems to be no certain age at which every child begins to walk, or feed himself, or talk, etc. Similarly, not many people and particularly few teachers expect every child to learn any certain thing at any certain age. An understanding of this concept is important to the welfare of your children for education is no longer a lockstep enterprise in which all children in a classroom can be expected to be doing the same thing simultaneously.

Last year we published studies of scholastic achievement in the High School showing the steady progress we've made in up-grading the work of the pupils in tool subjects. To avoid repetition we are not repeating the tables here. We have continued the study this year with the same good results and the charts are available in the office of Mr. Bernard. Examination of records of our new graduates now attending colleges reveals that at least two are listed on the Dean's lists for honors in scholarship. The others are all doing very satisfactory college work.

The record of our college attendants is most gratifying but no less so are the records of our graduates who are working in actual life positions such as secretarial.

Your school has seriously expanded its training in the non-academic fields because this is very important to a large percentage of the graduates.

### SCHOOL FINANCE

The cost of operating your schools during the last school year was lower in each of the three classifications than the state average. The classifications are: Elementary (Grades 1-8), High (Grades 9-12), and whole (Grades 1-12). Because of the inattention to our needs by the past legislature, our statistical surveys usually available from the state, are not available this year.

Likewise because the legislature was otherwise engaged and could not seriously enact a state aid program, for schools, your local tax had to make up for the \$13,300.00 which was lost in State Aid.

Your school finance program is now operating at an absolute minimum. We are not able to provide for depreciation of the costly buildings we're using. Someday soon, someone will object to bonding the district for new schoolrooms because they won't want to tax future generations. To avoid this, some districts are putting the value of depreciation on school buildings into capital reserve funds. If this generation can't afford to "Pay as You Go" which we hear so much about, we might as well admit it.

Part of the answer lies in the fact that property can no longer bear the whole tax load. The State Aid program enacted by the 1947 legislature provided real financial assistance to towns such as Hillsboro where the money was needed. The 1949 legislature chose to complain about the formula and everything else having to do with the aid program. It finally took the state backwards thirty years to the 1919 formula and appropriated less than 20% of the funds needed.

Schools have to have money to operate. If you look at our budget, you will notice that it costs you less than two dollars per day per child for everything in your school budget, but the total is staggering when loaded on the local property alone.

In 1873, property such as a farm was the only means by which one could earn a living, so property was the tax base. Now a house has very little earning capacity. But we have to use it to raise our money on because the 1949 legislature couldn't really face the issue of our needs. The constitution says that education is a responsibility of the state with certain responsibilities delegated locally.

### NEW FURNITURE SORELY NEEDED

Your School Board has been very attentive to trends and problems in current education. They were active participants in the Workshop. They have attended area School Board Meetings and meetings of the State Boards Association. Consequently their educational policies are refreshingly modern and reflective of intensive study.

The new budget provides for the replacement of two rooms of obsolete furniture at the grammar school. The new furniture will be of the table and chair type, providing maximum flexibility and comfort as required by our educational programs. The same type of furniture is just as sorely needed at the high school to provide for better teaching arrangement and pupil accommodation.

Two years ago we initiated a new lighting program at the high school but have been held up because of a lack of funds. The total lighting program will not be completed for some time perhaps. Modern lighting systems also require modern painting for maximum efficiency.

### CAN DEMOCRACY BE TAUGHT?

A newspaper recently expressed intense surprise that so many highly intellectual people apparently were susceptible to the lures of Communism or some other "ism." Those who have studied education and its responsibilities have long ago discovered that democracy has to be thoroughly experienced in the classroom if it is to be understood and be lived by these, children become adults.

Educators know that the book-worms so-called may likely not come to love and understand the democratic way of life, unless they really experience this way of life. School life has to be such as to let them live through real situations common to the democratic process. To achieve such of democratic living thoroughly, themselves. For some time practise will require teachers who understand the process now we have relied on the stories of wars and treaties to inculcate in our boys and girls, a burning love for our democracy. Democracy never has meant any such a thing to any one and consequently we have a world of people, some of whom give lip service to democratic theories, but we find few who understand democracy as a way of life.

Teachers and parents too must emphasize the reasons for its success. Children have to learn now to live democratically in their schools and communities. Some schools will take longer than others to adopt a democratic way of life. When all children in our schools live and understand the basic principles involved, democracy will win, over any "ism" and a stronger democracy can force a lasting peace on the world, because of its intense effectiveness.

As Dr. Edgar Fuller, our former Commissioner of Education so aptly put it: "New times demand new schools. Rote learning, lock-step teaching, 'busy work' which wheedles hours away in meaningless memorizing or pointless copying are not suited to the needs of growing boys and girls. Neither, are dingy, dark, and unsanitary buildings, creaking with memories which only the elders, looking back, revere.---The young people in our schools should be living happily and working hopefully as friends and neighbors, building together a commonwealth of good citizens for a peaceful world."

#### CONCLUSION

It has been a privilege and real pleasure to work during the past year with Mr. Mason, Mr. Martin and Mrs. Tasker in solving educational problems pertaining to the local schools. The loyal and energetic participation in the educational program by Mrs. Murdough and Mr. Bernard and their fellow teachers has been dramatically reflected in the improved school programs. To all these and the parents and pupils who also participate daily in our program, we are deeply grateful for aiding in the promotion of better educational opportunities for the boys and girls of Hillsboro. Young people, by nature, look ahead. When we work with them, we too, have to look ahead.

Mr. Stewart McCormack, Superintendent of Schools

My dear Mr McCormack:

The most significant educational development during the preceeding year and a half has been the tremendous interest of the citizens of Hillsboro in its schools. At the high school level, this interest has ben manifested in capacity attendance at school functions such as: Graduation, the minstrel show, "Club '50," basketball games, and the physical education--home economics--shop exhibitions. Individual citizens have graciously cooperated with us in our work experience program. We are indebted to Mr. Walter Sterling, Mr. Walter Heath, Mr. Marshall Derby, Mr. James Hines and Miss Lisabel Gay for their cooperation with the shop and commercial departments in our work experience program. Dr. Harrison Baldwin is donating his efforts in building a high school band. The Community Association, through a committee composed of Mr. Earl Lutts, chairman, Dr. Whitney S. K. Yeaple, Dr. Harrison Baldwin and Mr. James Hines have enriched the curriculm by arranging for a series of outstanding career speakers to aid our pupils in making prudent vocational plans. Dr. Mildred Chamberlin and our junior and senior girls have discussed marriage and its problems together. Mr. Cyrus Phelps has given fine aid to our Photography Club. The directors of the newly formed ski club, Dr. Henry Baldwin, Mr. John Tasker, Mr. Harry Nissen, Mr. Bernie Pierce and Miss Kay Carew are aiding in planning the annual winter carnival. The Fortnightly Club is offering an annual Senior Scholarship. Such splendid cooperation and interest is a source of inspiration for myself and my faculty.

In the annual Senior class tests conducted by the University of New Hampshire or the State Department of Education, the class of 1950 scored substantially better than average on both state and national scales. I am pleased to note that our Senior class scored very substantially above the national average on the Iowa Tests of Educational Development.

The High School enrollment has reached an all time high. Our September enrollment is as follows: Seniors; Boys, 17; Girls, 21; Juniors; Boys, 15; Girls, 9; Sophomores;

Boys, 21; Girls, 17: Freshmen; Boys, 14; Girls, 22; 7th Grade; Boys, 15; Girls, 19; 8th Grade; Boys, 13; Girls, 12; Total, 195.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the Board of Education, Nurse Bailey, the faculty of Hillsboro High School and the citizens of Hillsboro for their fine cooperation.

We could only do what was absolutely necessary and hope that we may be able to do something further along these lines the next year.

The School Lunch Program is going along very nicely under the supervision of Mrs. Elsie Mosley and her assistant, Mrs. Ione Nelson. Due to the generosity of several organizations in town we have been able to give free lunches to those unable to pay.

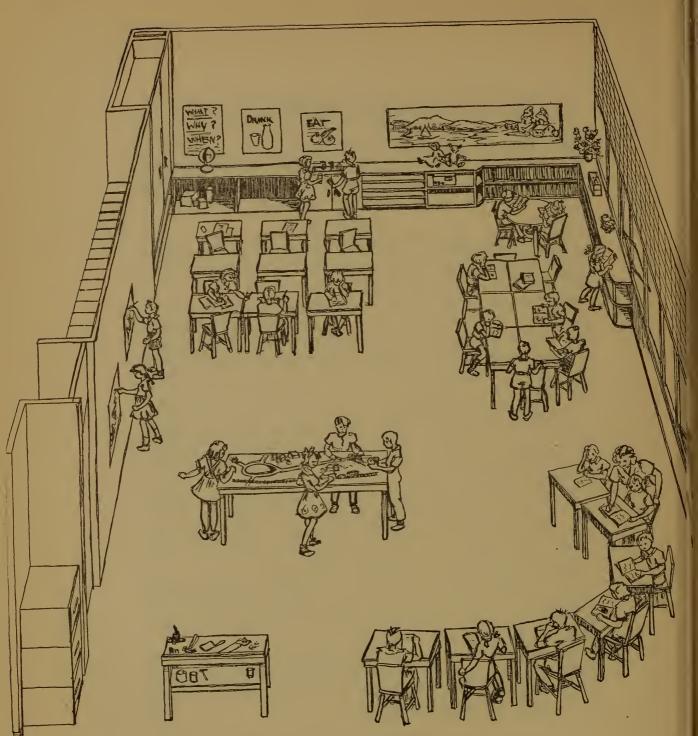
