STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lancaster on the second Tuesday of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, One Selectman for three years, One Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, One Library Trustee for three years, Three Members of the Col. Town Spending Committee for three years and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries, Town Officers' expenses, Election and Registration expenses, Municipal Court expenses, expenses of the Town Hall, Police Department, Fire Department, Damages and Legal expenses, Health Department including Dental Clinic, Vital Statistics, Sewer Maintenance, Town Maintenance, Street Lighting, Town Road Aid, Library, Town Poor, Old Age Assistance, Memorial Day, Parks and Playgrounds, Cemeteries, Garbage Collection, Information Booth, White Mountains Region Association, Sidewalk Construction, New Equipment, Interest on Temporary Loans, Interest on Long Term Notes, Payment on Long Term Notes and other town expenses.
- 3. To direct how money raised for the above purposes be expended.

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on temporary notes in anticipation of taxes, covering period from March 11, 1947 to the Annual Meeting of 1948.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired thru Tax Collector's deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the use of the Non-partisan ballot system for town election, as provided by House Bill No. 75, enacted by the State Legislature in 1943.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to have one thousand dollars (\$1000) raised to cover the expenses of a Federal survey of a local airport, its possibilities of a survival, its best location and so on.
- 9. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

To: The Board Members of the Public Health Nursing Committee:

The Board Members called six meetings during the past year in order to give supervision and guidance to the Nursing Service, and to analyze the needs for this community.

Total number cases admitted for service 322 Number of visits to or in behalf of these cases 1240

Kind of cases carried: Antepartum, Post-partum, Home Deliveries, Non-communicable, Acute-communicable, Tuberculosis, Crippled Children's Service, New Born, Infant, Preschool, Adults, Errands to or in behalf of these cases; Social Service and the special services such as Tuberculosis Prevention Work; Child Health Station and Tonsil Clinic.

The Orthopedic work is carried on in cooperation with the State Board of Health. Four clinics are held each year at the Littleton Hospital for cases reported by local doctors. For eight months during the year the Physical Theraphydist visits Lancaster to conduct the needs for these children. These clinics have been well attended. Our big problem here is transportation for same.

The Child Health Station sponsored by the Mahaney-Brisson Post, No. 30 and the Unit No. 30 Auxiliary of the American Legion, financially assisted by the Colonel Town Fund, as usual gave splendid service. There were 11 sessions, with a physician examining at each.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Colonel Town Spending Committee for the year 1946 was composed of Mrs. Roxanna J. Mc-Carten, Dr. James A. Ferguson and Mr. Harford A. Nay, whose terms expire in 1947; Mrs. Sally Sherman, Mr. Carroll Stoughton and Mrs. Margaret P. Guilmette, whose terms expire in 1948; Dr. William Bronson, Mr. O. Leo Connary and Mrs. Marion Balch whose terms expire in 1949. Mrs. Balch replaced Mr. Louis Bragg, who retired after years of faithful and diligent service.

At the first meeting of the Committee, the following officers were elected: Dr. William M. Bronson, Chairman; O. Leo Connary, Treasurer; and Mrs. Margaret P. Guilmette, Secretary.

The Chairman, Dr. William Bronson appointed the following Committees for the year:

HOUSE: Harford A. Nay, Chairman; O. Leo Connary, Mrs. Roxanna McCarten.

CAMP: Mrs. Sally Sherman, Chairman; Dr. James Ferguson, Mrs. Marion Balch.

FIELD: Dr. James Ferguson, Chairman; Mr. Carroll Stoughton, Dr. William Bronson.

SCHOLARSHIP: Carroll Stoughton, Chairman; Mrs. Marion Balch, Mrs. Margaret P. Guilmette.

As "Spending" is the business of this Committee, appropriations have been made as requested and in accordance with the terms of the Will. Approbation should be noted, as perhaps the people of Lancaster are not cognizant of the fact that the children are receiving many advantages.

Improvements were made in the Community

House. These were costly, but necssary. A ventilating system was installed in the Hall, and has been of much value during Basketball season, and will probably be so during graduation days. New shower rooms for girls, boys and referees were and have been used all winter.

The Juvenile Library received an appropriation of \$1000 for new books, encyclopedias and other equipment.

The sum of \$25 was expended for a project in dramatic work in connection with the Chase Barn Playhouse. The sum was for prizes for Lancaster pupils.

Hitherto, a prize of \$40 was given the Valedictorian of the Senior Class, and a like prize as a Junior English Prize. This year, the Committee considered it worthwhile, with incentive for better school work, to appropriate the sum of \$180 for prizes: \$40, \$30 and \$20 are given to the three highest ranking Seniors, and a like award in Junior English Prizes. The first awards were given at graduation in June, 1946.

The sum of \$100 was appropriated for School Activities.

Fifteen hundred dollars was appropriated to the Golf Club, with the stipulation that Junior and Senior High School pupils would have free use of the Course, at the discretion of the Club. Free lessons were given girls and boys during the summer by the Pro, and many took advantage of the opportunity to not only learn, but also to play, golf.

The sum of \$750 was given to the Skating Rink, sponsored by the Board of Trade. This continues to be one of the most popular places both for young and old.

With the opening of the Ski Slope at Mount Prospect, the Committee voted free instructions to the youth of Lancaster. Each child taking these instructions would have to expend the sum of \$5.00 for the series of instructions, and, as this was impossible in many instances, each child, willing and eager to learn, has been given this excellent chance. On Tuesday afternoons it is a pleasure to see this group in action.

Eight hundred dollars was set aside for transportation of High School Students living at distances too great for walking. As the State does not provide transportation beyond the eighth grade, were it not for this appropriation, many students, like students in surrounding towns, would have to find ways to reach school, other than in warm cars or buses, and at the expense of parents.

One hundred dollars was given each of the tollowing organizations: Boy Scouts Troop 219, Cub Scouts, Lancaster Hospital Auxiliary.

Fifty dollars was given to the Girls Scouts and to the Brownies. It is interesting to note at this time that Col. Town has outfitted all the Girl and Boy Scout Organizations in Lancaster, and a fine showing was made on Memorial Day, and Fourth of July.

Col. Town Community Camp was re-opened after many improvements had been made and a caretaker hired. The Camp Committee worked diligently and got this fine place in shape for summer. It was well patronized.

The sum of \$103.85 was given Kiwanis for playground equipment, salary of instructors, and sandboxes.

An excellent report was given the Spending Committee by the Chairman of the Scholarship Committe.

- 45 loans have been repaid in full.
- 16 loans have been paid in part.
- 10 loans have never been paid.
 - 9 loans are in use at the present time.

It was voted to make the Scholarship Committee a separate Committee after Jan. 1, 1947, and this Committee is to handle its own funds.

Letters have been mailed to all persons, except to those in school at the present time, showing a complete statement of loans and payments, if any, and balance due the Scholarship Committee.

Mr. and Mrs. Michael Daley were re-elected Superintendent and Matron.

The entire house has been open year round, and many nights all three floors are occupied by different organizations.

Organizations using the building are Unity Club, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, 4-H Club, Board of Trade, Hi-Y Club, Parent-Teachers, Inter-Church Council, Outing Club, Business and Professional Women, North Country Nurses' Association and Red Cross.

The Fiftieth Anniversary of Mount Prospect Grange was held in the Auditorium.

The Building has been used for other activities an aggregate of 500 hours.

During the school year all dances (except school socials) are held in the Auditorium.

Many visitors have been shown through the building during the past year and while in town make it their headquarters to read and relax.

In closing my report I would like to thank the young people, the citizens and Col. Town Spending Committee for the many favors shown Mrs. Daley and myself.

Report of Librarian, Weeks Memorial Library

The year 1946 brought changes to the Weeks Memorial Library. Miss Martha Brackett, librarian for 38 years, retired and was replaced by Mrs. Graydon Hickey, July first.

During the summer, Miss Catherine Pratt, Assistant State Librarian, of Concord, came to supervise changes in arrangement of books and furniture, to utilize materials and space to best advantage. Miss Pratt has had many years' experience aiding small libraries to get better service.

In order to serve the rural patrons and High School Communters, it was decided to open the Library one morning a week—Wednesdays.

A new State Bookmobile stop was arranged for in the Great Rock Schoolhouse district, for adult patrons.

Books were exchanged with the libraries in Groveton and Littleton to supplement the supply of western and mystery stories, which is low. Many books of technical nature were borrowed from the State Library to fill the requests of many borrowers.

Numerous summer visitors have made use of the library, and made favorable comments on the building and book selection.

Mrs. Urban Shorey and Mrs. Louis Bragg gave flowers from their gardens to brighten the library.

Beverly Osgood, a High School student, gave several hours of her time as typist.

Several paper-bound mystery stories were given and because of the type of binding, could not be used in the library. These were given to the Lancaster Hospital library.

Report of Children's Librarian

Purchased in July, a set of Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia already has proved its usefulness in connection with school work. The 1946 post-war edition makes an important supplement to older reference material. Exclusive of the encyclopedia, 154 volumes were added during the year, of which eight were gifts. Visits by the Bookmobile continue to provide the opportunity of borrowing books not owned by the library, and the Groveton Library has generously lent additional titles. The circulation for 1946 totaled 6054.

In April the librarian attended a meeting in Woodsville of the Northern group of the children's section of the New Hampshire Library Association. A selection of juvenile literature was shown and discussed. When on July 1st Mrs. Graydon Hickey relinquished the position of Children's Librarian, she was replaced by Miss Faith Kent. The latter attended the Library Institute held at Concord in June for two weeks classes in reference, children's books, classification, cataloging and other phases of library work.

The collection of mounted birds was increased in May by additional birds and several small animals from the work of Mrs. Elva A. Nourse, a gift of Mr. Almon D. White. Summer visitors, as well as residents, find this collection of interest and have utilized it as a means of identifying local birds.

Book Week was observed with story hours and a display of new books in the Children's Room. Story hours during the year were given by Mrs. Louis Bragg, Mrs. Chester Parker and Mrs. Wilton Chase.

Teachers

In October, Mrs. Gertrude Severance resigned on account of her daughter's health, and moved to Arizona. Fortunately Mrs. Nellie Rogers, a capable, experienced teacher, was available for the position.

Repairs

For the first time in several years, it was possible to make major repairs. All five schools were painted and many small repairs made. Fluorescent lights were installed at Mt. Cabot.

Enrollment

The number of pupils remains large at South Lancaster and Stebbins Hill, but the small enrollment at Mt. Cabot should raise the question of transporting the pupils to the Grange School.
