

## SCHOOL REPORT.

---

The schools throughout the District for the year now coming to a close, as usual, have been prosperous. The cause of this prosperity in a great measure can be attributed to the employment of good teachers. This is one of the benefits derived from the new school system. It stands to reason that the committee who visits the schools and examines the teachers, is better qualified to judge of their merits than any other person. As a rule, ten teachers fail in the matter of keeping good order, while one fails from literary incompetence. There are usually plenty of teachers, but the scarcity of good teachers for the fall term, delayed the commencement of the schools, made the duties of the committee more laborious and of course incurred some extra expense for the district. The prevailing disease, so wide spread throughout the country, has been somewhat detrimental to the interests of education in this town, but we should be thankful that it has not been as serious as in many other places.

### SALMON HOLE.

This school for the entire year was taught by Miss Carrie E. Abbott, a graduate of the Normal school. Miss Abbott came highly recommended, and it is sufficient to say she

has fully sustained her reputation. We are disposed to make honorable mention of the several classes in arithmetic and geography, and will particularize so far as to say that the class in history has no equal in town.

#### WALKER HILL.

In accordance with the wishes of the people, there were but two terms, having a long term in the winter for the benefit of several large scholars. The first term was taught by Mary Wiles, from the Normal school, who gave entire satisfaction. The long term was taught by Miss Nettie L. Cone. Judging from the appearance of the school when visited, we can find no fault with the proficiency made by the pupils, but at the same time, we should prefer a little more rigid discipline.

#### NORTH LISBON.

The school during the summer term was composed mostly of small scholars, and was in charge of Miss Blanche E. Webster. Miss Webster's mild and pleasant manners were well adapted to this class of pupils, and the term proved to be very profitable.

Charles F. Weeks was teacher for the winter term. This was evidently the banner school of the district. The best of order was maintained and the scholars made excellent progress. Penmanship was a specialty with Mr. Weeks and we can truly say, we never saw scholars make better improvement in this branch.

#### PEARL LAKE.

Miss Ardelle Whipple, teacher for the summer term, seems to be the choice of the people in this neighborhood. Her reputation is too well known in Lisbon to require any words of praise.

Miss Ina M. Cutts, teacher for the fall term, is a superior scholar as well as teacher, having been educated at the Normal school. The expectations of the committee in employing Miss Cutts, were more than realized. The term was short, but during the time, it would be impossible for scholars to advance more rapidly in their studies. It was thought by some, that certain exercises introduced, adapted to high schools, might have been dispensed with in a school of this grade.

Miss Carrie E. Hall, teacher for the third term, is somewhat inexperienced, though the scholars made tolerable progress. The patrons generally, thought a more rigid discipline would have been conducive to the prosperity of the school.

#### GOODNOW.

First and second terms taught by Miss Ardelle Streeter and third by Miss Susie B. Whitney. This school, during the three terms has been in charge of good teachers, and has been very prosperous. We are sorry to erase the name of Miss Streeter from the list of Lisbon teachers.

#### STREETER.

First and second terms taught by Miss Laura M. Ingalls, third by Miss Effie M. Smith. Miss Ingalls possesses those qualities which render her mistress of the situation, in whatever school she undertakes. She was generally popular with the patrons, and the proficiency made by the pupils was all that could be required. Miss Smith is endowed with the happy faculty of maintaining good order, and gained the good will of her pupils. Her school came well up to our standard of a model school. The examination at the close was not surpassed by any school we visited.
