Warrant for the 1951 Town Meeting

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milton in the county of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, with polls not closing before six of the clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for Town Officers.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for winter maintenance.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00) for gravel and repair of highways and bridges.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for maintenance of highway equipment.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for oiling.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred twenty-two dollars and sixty-one cents (\$522.61) in

order to receive Town Road Aid. (The State of N. H. to contribute \$2,090.42.)

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the continuance of the Nute Ridge Road.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to meet the note on the Hough Loader.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the Camp Roads.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.0) for oiling the Hare Road.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for repair of sidewalks in Milton and Milton Mills.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for street lights.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) to pay Town charges and expenses, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the Town Beach.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate a sum of money not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the Fire Department, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for hose for the new fire truck.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) for maintenance of the Milton Mills Fire District.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for hose for the Milton Mills Fire District.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the maintenance of hydrants in the Milton Water District.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the Milton Free Public Library at Milton Mills.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) for Memorial Day.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and forty-seven dollars (\$247.00) which is one-hundredth of one per cent of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. (Request of the Lakes Region Association.) 23. To determine the salaries, wages and other compensation and allowances for all persons serving the Town, and to pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire on notes of the Town a sum of money necessary to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes of 1951, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay the first and second Engineers and Firemen in addition to the amount allowed by law; to see how much per hour the Town will vote to pay Engineers and Firemen while fighting fires and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Civilian Defense use.

27. That the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) be appropriated for the general improvement of the Willey Road in Milton Mills. (By petition.)

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the construction of a tar road on the so-called Goodwinville Road.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase snow removal equipment, pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

31. To see if the Town will reopen to public travel the road leading from Silver Street to the farm owned

now or previously by Shaber Williams or any part of said road or keep the same in usable condition, both summer and winter, for abutters thereof and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto. (By petition.)

32. To see if the Town will vote to retain the Knights of Pythias lot in Milton Mills Village for use as a park in future years, allowing the Selectmen to sell a narrow piece adjoining the property of Mr. Lombard.

33. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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Report of the Commissioners of the Milton Water District

Your commissioners submit the following report:

We started the year by buying a new meter for the pump house which cost \$192.50. Soon after this, one of the pumps failed and had to be sent to the company to be repaired. This cost \$217.47 besides the labor of getting it back in working position.

Mr. Fellows resigned in April and Mr. Warnecke took over as Superintendent of the District. He has filled the position very capably and efficiently.

At the District Meeting in March it was decided to scrape, repair and paint the storage tank. The details were left to the Commissioners. After careful consideration of estimations from local and other painters the job was given to Mr. Albert Wiggin of Sanbornville. The paint was bought from E. and F. King and Co. for \$236.61.

After the tank was emptied and cleaned it was found that the top and bottom sections were in fairly good condition but the two sections in between were in need of repair. It was advised to have these sections cleaned and spot painted again within two years. The painters took over and the job was finished in ten days. Mr. Wiggin's bill was \$400.00 which we considered reasonable.

With the pumps doing all of the work, it required constant watch to see that everything was working to keep a supply of water. The public was asked not to water their gardens or lawns during the ten days which was the only restriction. We feel that this job was done well and at a lower cost than had been estimated.

TOWN OF MILTON

Two new services were added this year. Mr. Pezold and Mr. Corson at the upper end of town had water installed at their homes. This leaves very few houses without the services of the Water District.

We consider the extensive repair work this year was expensive but we feel that the work done will not have to be repeated for some time to come.

We still have the frame, starter, magneto and numerous other parts that some day we may use.

I would like to call to the voters' attention that we need one and one-half inch hose for the new truck and three portable pumps.

I want to thank all those who have helped us in the past year and hope to have their continued support in the year ahead.

To the Commissioners and Voters of the Milton Mills Fire District:

First I would like to thank the residents of this district for their cooperation in keeping down the fire hazards for the past year.

The district has answered the following fires during the past year:

5 chimney fires

4 grass fires

1 building fire

We responded to calls from Milton, one house fire in West Milton, and one house fire on Route 16, near Union.

The disttrict answered the following fires in Acton, Maine:

3 chimney fires

1 building fire

The damage done by the K. of P. Block fire to surrounding buildings was approximately \$1,000.00.

The district had the pump on the pumper overhauled and new parts put in so that the pump is in perfect running condition. This is the first repairs done on the pump since it was purchased.

There is one item I should like to see taken care of and that is the plowing out of the water holes in the district after every snow storm either by the town or by someone appointed to do this job.

We are badly in need of new two and one-half inch hose for the pumper. We have lost several hundred

feet in the past year or so. If we do not have the hose it will be hard to fight fires at a distance greater than a thousand feet.

The rain coats for the firemen are very bad. The men get soaked every time there is a fire; also our roof ladders are in poor condition. Would like to see some action taken on these two articles.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Milton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said district on the 10th day of March, 1951, at 7:30 p. m. o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect District Officers.

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officers, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand three hundred dollars (\$13,300.00) or any part thereof for the support of Nute High School.

5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the transportation of pupils to Nute High School from Milton Mills and West Milton.

6. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency, or other U. S. Government or State Agencies.

7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the support of a school lunch program for the Nute High School.

8. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$1,686.00 to be used as a deficiency appropriation for the school year 1950-51.

9. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$150.00 to be used for legal advise.

10. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to dispose of the West Milton School House.

11. To see if the District will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for building a school auditoriumgymnasium for Milton. (Recommended by Milton Survey Committee.)

12. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$2,500.00, said sum to be placed in custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds and reserved for building a school auditorium-gymnasium for Milton in accordance with the Laws of 1943, Chapter 160 as amended by the Laws of 1945, Chapter 35 and Laws of 1947, Chapter 8. (Recommended by Survey Committee.)

13. To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for repairs to the Milton Mills Grammar School. (By petition of 35 voters.)

14. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Milton School Board, the Trustees of the Nute High School and the Citizens of Milton:

As I became your School Superintendent November 1, 1950 it will be impossible for me to give a complete picture of happenings during the past year. I will rely greatly upon Mr. Foster, Mr. Amadon and Mr. Lowry to relate facts in their reports.

Milton was fortunate in retaining all teachers in Nute High School. Ellen Deem Cochrance was replaced by Mrs. Clarence Amadon in the Milton Grammar School. At Milton Mills School Martha Hefler and Leslie Lowry replaced Mrs. Doris Lowd and Richard Gale. It is hoped that a music supervisor can be added next year.

Milton should feel proud of its schools and teachers who are doing an excellent job in teaching your children. There are areas which need attention as in all school systems. School systems like business can not stand still—it must continue to improve if it is to survive. Milton schools are good schools and will continue so as you people continue to give your support. Parents should visit schools more often to see teachers and pupils at work. Teachers and pupils like to see their work appreciated.

Schools are continually being criticized because they cost so much money, yet we in America spend less on education than England and Russia. In comparing cast of education to our national income we are spending much less now than we did ten years ago. Education is the backbone of Democracy and our teachers mould the countries future. We should be willing to support our country through its schools. The Milton Survey Committee deserve a great deal of credit for the time and patience they have shown in studying your schools and making such a fine thorough report. It is an asset for any community to have active enlightened citizens.

Instruction: Mrs. Doris Chase continues to handle the Remedial Reading as before. This year the work is specifically with Grades 1 through 3.

In addition to the Phonics taught with the basic reading system, class room teachers, with the assistance of Mrs. Chase, have been giving supplementary instruction and drills in Phonics.

Mrs. Leona Foster has been teaching the music to all grades once a week with the classroom teacher continuing the work during the week. To make such a program possible in the lower grades, Mrs. Foster was relieved of one-half hour's noon duty with the principal assuming that duty.

Our supervision practices of the two previous years continue.

School Plant: In general, our School Plant is excellent. No major repair work has been done within the building. During the fall the playground area in the front of the school building was covered with a

layer of fill to make a safer play area. In the rear of the building, the baseball backstop had to be rebuilt and new standards, backboards and baskets have been erected on the out-of-door basket ball court.

The services of our janitor, Mr. Alfred Moody, are excellent. Our building is kept immaculate and in good repair. It would be difficult to find someone as interested in the appearance of the school.

Health Services: Mrs. Poland, School and District Nurse, renders us a valuable service. Few schools have the services of a nurse daily.

The Lunch Program has been a decided contributing factor to the healthy condition of the boys and girls.

This year Mrs. Amy Stowe is the cook and Mrs. Emma Avery is the assistant for the Hot Lunch Program. Both women have worked hard to improve our lunch service. Mrs. Julin, in addition to a regular teaching load, plans the menus and does the buying. Her assistance is invaluable.

Approximately one hundred thirty-six lunches are served daily — about twenty more than last year. Our lunch room is crowded at each of the two settings and it is difficult to do very much instructing in the every day table courtesies.

Physical Education: The lack of an auditoriumgymnasium has been realized many times, especially when it has been important that the whole school assemble as one group. Without facilities for indoor sports and physical education and with a playground limited in size, we do no more than the present facilities permit. During warmer weather, lower grade teachers and pupils organize and play games and the pupils of the upper grades play soft ball, volley ball and basket ball. During the winter when the Nute Auditorium is available, Mrs. Chase takes the girls of Grades 6 through 8 for basketball practice. The principal takes the boys who are interested in basketball from Grades 3 through 8 for practice when the hall is available.

Visual Aids: To supplement our Visual Aids equipment an Opaque Projector has been added. It has proved a very effective teaching aid.

Personnel: Your teachers in the Elementary School are professional people interested in keeping abreast of the latest in educational patterns. All teachers have maintained the qualifications for Elementary Teachers as set by the State Department of Education. One hundred per cent are members of the Supervisory Union Teachers Association, the New Hampshire State Teachers Association and the National Education Association. The principal belongs to the Southeastern New Hampshire Elementary Principals' Association and to the New Hampshire State Elementary Principals' Association.

Last summer, courses were taken by Mrs. Leona Foster at the University of New Hampshire. The principal went to Boston University. During the present school year, Mrs. Doris Chase and Mrs. Florence Amadon are taking a course at Somersworth offered by the University of New Hampshire. Mrs. Elsie Julin and the principal are commuting on Saturdays to Boston University to take courses.

Some professional books and periodicals have been made available to us: "The Teaching of Reading" by Paul McKee; "Reading in Modern Education" by Paul Wittty; "Growth and Learning in the Elementary School" by Huggett and Millard; "Methods and Materials in Elementary Physical Education" by Jones, Morgan and Stevens; "Teaching Social Studies in the Elementary Schools" by Wesley and Adams; "The Nation's Schools," "The School Executive," the "National Educational Association Journal" and "The Grade Teacher."

In conclusion, I wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, the members of the School Board and the parents in helping us in our efforts to present learning situations for the growth of the children in our school.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE MILTON MILLS GRAMMAR SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board of Milton:

I am pleased to submit my first annual report of the Milton Mills Grammar School. School opened September 6, 1950 with an enrollment of fifty-two pupils. Due to transfers this enrollment has decreased to forty-one pupils.

This year, in addition to the annual Open House, two evening programs were held to stimulate more interest by the parents in the school and promote closer cooperation between the parents and the school. An increased representation at the P. T. A. meetings was brought about by these programs and resulted in Miss Hefler's room wining the attendance banner for the month of January.

In the classroom both individual and group work have been encouraged. We have attempted wherever possible to meet individual differences in learning ability. Our aim has been to enable the pupils to adjust adequately to their social and physical environment.

This year for those children who eat their lunch at school, hot soup or cocoa has been provided by The Dorcas Society during the cold winter months. During the morning recess, milk is available for those who desire it.

I am taking this opportunity to express my appreciation for the cooperation and invaluable assistance given me by the School Board. Superintendent Danielson, Principal Amadon, Miss Hefler, and the parents in Milton Mills.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF THE NUTE HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools and Members of the Board of Trustees:

I hereby submit my second annual report of the Nute High School which opened its sixtieth year September 6, 1950, with an enrollment of one hundred and thirty-one pupils. Transfers and withdrawals to date have left the present enrollment of one hundred and twenty-seven pupils divided as follows: Seniors, twenty; Juniors, twenty-nine; Sophomores, twentyseven; Freshmen, thirty-three; Eighth Grade, eighteen.

The approved program of studies is the same as last year with the following alternates being substituted: General Science for Biology, Foods and Clothing

for Foods and Nutrition, French 1 for French 2, Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry for Fused Geometry, Sociology for Consumer Buying, Economics for Human Behavior, Chemistry for Physics, The Family for The Home, Stenography and Typing for Office Practice, Business Law and Salesmanship for Bookkeeping.

Again this year, many changes were made in our school building. The large main room has been divided to make an extra class room; asphalt tile has been laid in these two rooms and the main hallway; ten new desks and chairs plus a teacher's desk have been purchased. I believe it is the intention to gradually replace worn out desks and chairs over a period of years.

Because of the generous appropriation of fifteen hundred dollars by the town of Milton, we were able to start our Hot Lunch Program in November, which has met with huge success. A kitchen has been built in the storeroom off the auditorium and has been equipped with gas stove, refrigerator, sink, dishes and benches. Second-hand tables were given to us by the Somersworth district, and three were made in our shop. Mr. and Mrs. Harriman, who have been highly commended by the State Lunch Supervisor, serve appetizing meals which meet state and federal requirements. Almost seventy-five percent of the student body takes lunches at school. We thank the Parent-Teachers Association for its generous gift of two hundred dollars to our lunch program as well as all the people who donated dish-cloths, hot-pads, and other kitchen equipment.

Approximately one hundred and thirty-five people attended Open House the evening of November 9, 1950, where many school functions were demonstrated by the students.

Our students participated in athletics at the Deer-

field Fair and the annual field day held at Coe-Brown Academy at Northwood. At the former, boys played baseball and both boys and girls ran track events. At the latter, the girls played for the volley ball championship, and for the third successive year won the trophy. Last spring the girls won the softball trophy.

Last winter the boys had a fairly successful basketball season, having been chosen to play Henniker at Goffstown for a state tournament bid. Many rabid spectators followed the team only to be disappointed when we were eliminated. However, one ray of sunshine appeared when we won the runner-up trophy in our own league tournament.

Approximately fifteen girls, of which ten were chosen, turned out for cheerleading. New uniforms have been purchased, several new cheers and songs initiated, and the girls will compete in the cheerleading contest to be held during our basketball tournament in Farmington in February.

An active student council has been inaugurated this year with Miss Leathers as faculty adviser. Many suggestions initiated by it have been tried. As the council becomes more school conscious and experienced, it is hoped that it will be able to conduct more school functions.

Through the vote of the student council, a new club was formed at Nute this year, the National Honor Society. This club sponsors service, character, leadership and scholarship. It is open to any senior who has maintained a total average of eighty-five percent while in high school and qualifies in other respects. Juniors may become eligible the second semester of their third year.

Practical English, a weekly magazine particularly prepared for remedial work in English, is being used

by special students, and is also greatly enjoyed by all students when extra copies are available. French records to correspond with lessons in basic French texts have been used and greatly appreciated by the students as an aid in pronunciation. Several new sets of translation books have been obtained for French I and II.

The bookmobile continues to supply books to furnish students with wide and varied outside reading material. Many new library books have also been selected with the idea of benefiting the student of English.

The annual Boston trip was enjoyed by fortyfour Juniors and Seniors this fall. The Mapparium, the Mrs. Jack Gardner Museum, Bunker Hill Monument, and the Harvard Museum were points of interest visited in addition to attending a production of Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar" presented at New England Mutual Hall. "Hamlet" and "Macbeth" have appeared as movies in Rochester and the students have been able to attend these in a body. Three one-act plays to follow up their play-reading and play-witnessing gave the students an opportunity to produce drama themselves.

The *Nute Flash*, the school paper, is published about every six weeks. Effort has been made to make the publication more enjoyable and informational for all. As an educational project and as a unifying force in the school, it is felt that it is well worthwhile.

In the fall, typewriting students were privileged to attend a special assembly at Spaulding High School to witness a demonstration by a champion typist who was sent there by a typewriter concern.

Since the last annual report four new typewriters have been purchased and only two old ones traded in, thereby increasing our total number of machines. We have also been able to acquire from the government an electric typewriter.

The shop boys have made several things, including bowls, bookcases, desks, lamps, and a gun rack. They are also repairing and reconditioning sleds and skis. New scenery, very much needed by the drama groups, was made in the shop and a bookcase for the Senior homeroom. They are also delegated to put up the tables for the lunch at noon, take them down after lunch so that the auditorium may be used for other activities and to keep them repaired. A new cloak rack has been installed in the girls' room.

The Foods and Clothing Classes have been busy in making skirts, blouses, dresses and pajamas, and cooking bread, pies, and cookies. In the fall, some canning was done. The eighth grade has learned to darn socks, mend tears, sew buttons, make button holes, and read a pattern besides making muffins, biscuits, and learning to cook vegetables.

The Mathematics and Science departments are progressing at a normal pace. New apparatus and chemicals have added to the joy of experimental work of which one was demonstrated at Open House.

The General Science Class now knows how the world uses scientific knowledge; about the source, procurement and use of natural resources; how we have attempted to rule the air and how the world uses its water supply. They are now in the process of learning how the world uses living things.

Many movies have been shown dealing with the atom, glass making, and aluminum making.

The outstanding difficulty is the lack of a laboratory of sufficient size to carry on several experiments.

To Mr. Danielson, the Board of Trustees, and to

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools and Citizens of Milton:

I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

The routine health services have been conducted as usual. Pupils were weighed and measured and teeth checked in September and October. Inspections of skin and hair were made from time to time to prevent the spread of skin diseases and pediculosis. Vision tests were conducted and defects reported to parents. Hearing tests are to be given later this year.

Our third Pre-School Conference was held at Milton Grammar School with 95% attendance, and at Milton Mills School with 100% attendance. This day is a very important one in the life of the pre-school child. It affords him the opportunity of meeting his future teacher and classmates. He also receives an eye examination by the nurse and a physical check-up by the school physician. Dr. Brown administered vaccine and toxoid to several of the children who had not received this treatment.

In February an epidemic of mumps started, which continued to the end of the school year. There were also a few cases of German measles and chicken pox. Many visits were made in the homes and advice given concerning the care of the children while ill.

In October it became necessary to appoint a new school physician and Dr. Robert Lord of Farmington accepted the position. Several accident cases were treated by him and all pupils at the high school who participated in sports were given a physical examination.

I wish to thank the teachers for the splendid cooperation they have given me during the past year. Their recognition of health problems in pupils is of great value.

REPORT OF THE SURVEY COMMITTEE

As directed by the 1950 Annual School District meeting, the Special committee appointed at that time to make a survey of the Milton School system has endeavored to find out where we stand in relation to public needs and present facilities.

The survey of 1948 conducted by the School Board and the then superintendent is in greater detail and its findings and conclusions are to a great extent still warranted.

POPULATION TRENDS

According to the last National census the population of Milton is approximately 1,520, an increase of about 200 in the last ten years. A study of the school attendance shows that the attendance in 1946-47 was 338. Enrollment since last year has increased slightly and this year stands at 341. There is no industrial boom in prospect and the building of many new homes in this town is not expected; therefore it would seem that no great variation in school population is pending in the forseeable future.

BUILDINGS

The school system is comprised of four school buildings, three of which are in use. The fourth, the Nute Ridge School, has not been used for two or more years.

The Milton Mills School is a wooden building of three rooms, two class rooms, housing 52 pupils on the first floor and a large room on the second which has not been in use for some time. It is in reasonably good repair and is better equipped than the average school in this state. The yard is quite small and limits its uses but a field across the street is used for sports. The elementary school building in the village proper built in 1914 is a well constructed brick building with five well-equiped class rooms satisfactorily heated, lighted and maintained. The crowding of the room used as a cafeteria still prevails and no solution seemsin sight. The lunch program is very satisfactory and the entire project is well administered and carried out. The lack of an assembly room is also apparent.

The school yard as previously reported is entirely inadequate and should be enlarged. Some sand and gravel was spread recently covering many of the protruding rocks and should save many a skinned knee or barked shin.

The Nute High School building, built in 1890 of brick construction is in good general condition, but needs a great deal of repair and renovation. Some progress has been made in providing adequate lighting and this should be continued. The auditoriumgymnasium is, first of all, too small and its situation on the second floor of the building prevents its use for many extra curricular activities during school hours. A cafeteria has been installed which has been greatly appreciated and also uses this room. The undesirability of using the library as a class room has been emphasized many times as it prevents its use as a library and is also inadequate as a class room.

The shop located in the basement is a makeshift arrangement and can serve only as a sort of hobby shop or a place to interest boys who do not have a full program scholastically. The machine tools are in some cases broken and beyond repair and others are not too dependable. Hand tools are few in number and not too well kept. Arrangements of equipment is poor and would seem that a complete rearrangement could be made without too much expense. The room itself could be renovated to some extent by providing proper drainage, better lighting, removal of fire hazards and addition of a wood floor. The boiler room is not fire proofed as recommended in the 1948 survey. The boys' shower room is also a dingy affair and apparently not used.

NUTE RIDGE SCHOOL

This is a one room wooden building and is not in use now, nor does its use in the future seem desirable at its present location.

CURRICULUM

The committee did not delve too deeply into the technical problem of curriculum and assumed from conversation with the Superintendent and others that the curriculum is sufficient and meets the needs of the children and comes up to the standards set by the State Board of Education.

There is no guidance program as such, and this need is filled by individual teachers.

HEALTH PROGRAM

The school nurse supervises the health program of the children. She visits the schools daily, gives health talks and is always on call; also follows up absentees. A medical doctor examined the children biannually and all pupils engaged in athletics annually.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

There is no program of physical education as such in the schools. However, sports are engaged in by a very limited few in the high school. During recess periods in the elementary schools some pupils are grouped for softball or volley ball games, but here again the number reached is limited. Funds for equipment and a complete program are wholly inadequate in all schools. One hundred dollars is available for trans-

portation of high school teams and this affords only a limited number of trips, then parents are asked to provide transportation.

TRANSPORTATION

Regular transportation routes by bus are provided for children in the elementary grades to within two miles of the school, for high school pupils to within three miles of the school. Bids for these routes are called for by the school board each Spring. State laws and regulations are complied with by buses and drivers.

Library facilities in the high school are not used to advantage, because the eighth grade uses the room during most of the school hours. A small fund, last year (\$250.00), is provided for the library by the trustees, to cover cost of the subscriptions to magazines, periodical and reference books required by the schools.

ISSURANCE

Nute High School Trustees carry \$95,000.00 insurance on their building and \$10,000.00 on furnishings which is probably sufficient. The elementary schools are covered as follows:

TUITION PUPILS

There are at the present time 26 tuition pupils in the grammar school and 32 in the high school. Tuition rates for the grammar school are \$100.00 and \$165.00 for the high school. State laws in the past have limited tuition rates, to out of town pupils, to the cost of instruction plus supplies. It is understood that this regulation has been changed and that the full cost of instruction can now be charged. The rates for tuition pupils for school year 1951-52 will be \$150.00 for the elementary school and \$205.00 for the high school.

Reports and personal observation seems to indicate that our teachers as a whole are well prepared for the job of teaching and we are indeed fortunate in holding a complete staff in these troublesome times. The salaries paid in most cases are believed to be low compared to other communities of similar size and some readjustment to meet the increased cost of living would seem to be imperative if we are to retain a high standard in the teaching profession.

Our janitors are high grade men and have done much to maintain the schools in an excellent condition. The ladies who prepare the school lunches have also done an excellent job.

CONSOLIDATED HIGH SCHOOL

Inquiry in neighboring towns has brought forth no evidence of any serious attempt to bring about the building of a consolidated high school. It is thought that the differences of opinion in requirements, location, etc., will not be immediately solved and the expense of building at the present time would indicate that such a type building will not be available in the immediate future, even though highly desirable.

ADMIMNISTRATION

The schools in Milton operate under a dual system of administration. The elementary school is under control of the School Board and the High School is administered by the Trustees of the will of Lewis Nute. Under the provisions of the Nute Will a free high school was established and apparently sufficient funds were available to meet the costs of operating the school at first. In recent years, interest on invested funds has generally decreased and operating expenses increased so that the town now bears the major cost of maintaining the high school. There is every indication that additional money will be required as time goes on.

While relations between the two groups is generally harmonious, the school board has no vote in any matter pertaining to the administration of the High School. They meet regularly with the Trustees and have a part in its discussions.

Both schools are supervised by the District Superintendent and operated under regulations set up by the State Board of Education. Costs of education have risen sharply in recent years and will probably go higher if we are to secure capable and efficient instructors and suitable equipment. How for we can go in taxing our people depends on their willingness and ability to pay for the type education they feel their children should have. Services are demanded today which are expensive and were not thought of in the so-called "horse and buggy days." The decision is up to you.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

From the above facts it is evident that some things can be done to improve the school set-up and the committee makes the following recommendations:

1. Take necessary action to dispose of the Nute Ridge School in West Milton.

2. Increase tuition rates to out of town pupils making them more in accord with present day expenditures.

3. Re-appraisal of School property to see that all property is adequately covered by insurance. This has been done by the Nute High Trustees and it is understood that similar action will be taken by the School Board.

4. Adjust salaries of teachers and other employees to meet rising costs of living. The average rate of pay for Milton teachers is \$2,600.00 for the high school and \$2,300.00 for the elementary school while the state average for high school teachers is \$2,850.00 and \$2,632.00 for elementary school teachers, principals not included.

5. Recommend that consideration be given to acquiring additional ground for playground purposes for the elementary school.

6. Change present transportation regulations so that all elementary school pupils living north of the residence of Arthur Chase, on North Main Street will be transported to school. There are no sidewalks north of this point and small children walking in the road present a serious hazard both to themselves and the motor traffic.

7. The committee strongly recommends consideration of a new gymnasium and auditorium to be used as a public meeting place as well as a part of the School system. The present assembly hall in the High School is entirely inadequate for many public school functions and in the opinion of some of our people not entirely safe.

There are several problems involved such as location, type of building, its uses and necessary finances. Further study of all these problems is essential and should be continued. If a new building is decided upon it would be possible to add two classrooms to the high school building by installing a partition in the assembly room on the second floor. Acommodations would then be available so that grades 7 to 12 could meet in this building which in turn would ease conditions in the elementary school.

8. The committee recommends that grades 7-8 of the Milton Mills School be sent to the Milton School starting in the school year, September 1951. If and when the building program materializes all grades from Milton Mills should attend school in Milton.

9. The committee recommends that the administrative control of the entire school system of Milton be vested in one body of elected representatives. Further study of this project should be carried on in connection with the preceding recommendations as some legal problems will have to be settled if the town should consider it desirable to erect a new building on High School property.

10. The committee recommends that a capital reserve fund be set up immediately and that the sum of \$2,500.00 be appropriated annually beginning this year, in order that some money will be available when and if a new building is decided upon.

11. It is further recommended that the present committee be continued, or a new committee appointed, to work with the School Committee and the Nute High Trustees with instructions to further explore the possibility of a new gymnasium, its location, size and type, uses, legal aspects and financing. If possible, plans should be prepared, costs investigated and authorization given the School Committee to apply for such funds, federal or State, which are or may become available for the preparation of such plans and report to the next Annual School District meeting its progress.
