Daland Memorial Library

The librarian of the Daland Memorial Library submits the following report:

On the whole the library has had a very successful year, though the circulation for the present year has been less than last year, 3351 books given out in 1925-1926 against 3941 for 1924-1925. However, the same complaint comes from many small libraries, the moving pictures and the radio being given as the explanation.

The present year 208 new books have been added to our shelves, over 50 being for the children. The total number of volumes in the library is 3904 of the newer books, and about 800 in the Appleton library, making 4704. There are also 120 duplicate books besides those on the shelves. One hundred and fifteen books have been discarded, being beyond repair. These are given to anyone caring to take them away. From the duplicate books 20 were sent to the Boston Public Library, sent from there to the sailors' libraries on various ships.

On the reading table are found the following magazines: The Century, Harper's, The World's Work, Ladies' Home Journal, Good Housekeeping, Daughters of the American Revolution, St. Nicholas, Asia and The Dearborn Independent; for newspapers, The Milford Cabinet, The Monitor and The Farm Bureau, many of these given by individuals.

As usual the many friends of the library have been very generous and gifts are due to the following donors, Mr. O. C. Hubbard, J. F. Wellington, Mrs. Leslie Boutwell, Mrs. James Abbot, Mrs. Champion, Mr. Cecil Bancroft, Miss May Trevitt, Miss Sarah Wister, C. Vance, George Kittredge, Jr., and Paul Brusquini.

We are most happy to record the following gifts to

the library: from Mrs. Loretta Phillips a china cup, saucer, and silver spoon; from Mrs. Frank Smith an exposition of the Scriptures, by Dr. Doddridge, formerly belonging to Mr. Trask W. Averill, accompanied by his daguerreotype; a bust of Beethoven from Mrs. Winters: money of the Civil War, both of the United States and Confederate, from Mrs. Ruth Endrejat: two ancient plates from Mrs. Mary Alexander; from Mrs. Emily Hartshorn, a cup made from wood of the first meeting house; a hand made pewter spoon from Mrs. Marcia Lamson; and through the Daland trustees a portfolio of the old songs sung by the Hutchinson familv. A fine photograph of Mrs. Sophia Daland, through whose generous bequest the town has its beautiful library, has been placed on its walls, also an oil portrait of Mr. William Conant, given by his children. It is most fitting that this picture should hang in the library, as it was through Mr. Conant's suggestion that Mrs. Daland donated the money for the building and grounds.

November 8, 1925, our library, with many others all over the United States, celebrated what is known as "Children's Week." The library was bright and attractive with many posters, and with strings of the pretty jackets of the new books, which were first distributed at that time, and the children seemed much pleased with their very own day at the library.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Mont Vernon:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report, which is the eighth in the series of such reports.

Organization of Supervisory Union No. 40

Four school districts form this Union, namely Amherst, Brookline, Milford, and Mont Vernon. By agreement joint expenses are apportioned respectively five-twentieths, two-twentieths, twelve-twentieths, one-twentieth.

Teachers and Instruction

Mrs. Hadley and Miss Taggart, who were our teachers last year, left at the end of the school year. Their places have been taken by Miss Albena Beland of Reeds Ferry, in the upper room, and Miss C. Frances King of Nashua in the lower room, with grades divided as heretofore—5-6-7-8 and 1-2-3-4. Miss Beland has had three years' teaching experience and three summer sessions at Keene Normal School. Miss King completed the two year elementary curriculum at Keene in June 1925.

Table C shows conditions at the Village school only. In the west part of the town five pupils attend the Johnson Corner school in Lyndeborough where tuition

is paid at the rate of \$36 per year per pupil. The following pupils are attending secondary schools out of town:

Milford High School: Cynthia Darrah, Doris Endrejat, Lester Johnson, Mildred Johnson, George Kittredge, Ruth Putnam, Earl Trow.

Amherst High School: Zelpha Powers, Harold Stroncer.

Tilton School: Maude Connor. Whittier School: Edna Connor.

The law in regard to tuition in high schools has again changed. Now any school district not maintaining a high school and sending pupils to approved high schools in New Hampshire or in some cases of border towns to nearby high schools in adjoining states is liable for the tuition charges, which may not be more than the average cost of instruction per pupil for the previous year in the school concerned and in no case more than the state average. For the current year Mont Vernon will have to pay aproximately \$80 per pupil. The state average for 1924-1925 was \$97. Parents will not have any excess tuition charges to pay.

Buildings and Grounds

During the last year or two there has been more or less talk about a new school building for the Village, the same to be large enough to accommodate all pupils. Such a building would replace entirely the present schoolhouse which has two rooms, one above the other, each heated by a separate stove. Although the present building is large enough for the number of pupils and has been put into very)good condition for a remodeled building, yet if a new building should be constructed modern ideas could be incorporated which could never be brought about in the old building. With a view to the possibility of some definite action being taken the school board and superintendent have visited and in-

spected several new buildings in this region, among others two in Bedford, one in Temple and one in Litchfield. The general plan of a two-room horizontal building with full size basement would seem to be the only type to consider. The basement could contain heating apparatus, toilet rooms and a play room and should not be depressed to prevent good direct lighting. The two class rooms should be large enough for forty seats each and should contain ample wardrobe space and storage for school room supplies. Lighting should be on one side only, preferably not from the south, and should be in area not less than one-fifth of that of the floor space.

The grounds about a building are an important consideration. Since pupils need ample space for organized games and should not be forced to use the highway for this purpose. The site should be as carefully considered as the building itself.

Whatever is done in regard to a new building, the old school house ought to be painted on the outside this coming summer and if possible some single unit heating system installed for the whole building.

I would recommend that the whole matter be definitely settled at the coming school meeting, an article having been put in the warrant for this purpose.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Mont Vernon, N. H.:

The following is my third report of the health work in the Mont Vernon schools, it being the sixth year of this work in the schools.

The medical inspection was carried on as usual in the fall, at which time each pupil and teacher was examined by Dr. Burns, assisted by the nurse. The changes as outlined in last year's report were carried out again this year, namely, the examination of the chest.

The matter of vaccination was checked at the beginning of the year and the report sent to the Health Officer. At that time there were three pupils unvaccinated without proper excuse.

On the whole the physical condition of the Mont Vernon pupils is very good. The parents show excellent co-operation and are ready to have the physical defects corrected when such defects are called to their attention. The problem of defective teeth is most important. Children of school age require regular dental care if the permanent teeth are to be saved.

Dr. Burns' report, following, gives in tabulated form the results of the examination.
