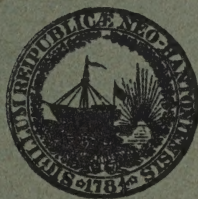

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## TOWN WARRANT

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### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.

2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein, or to pass any vote relative thereto.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town buildings.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Social Library and Orford Free Library.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

9. To see if the Town will vote for the removal of snow from the Town roads, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

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10. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II. road known as Dame Hill Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,138.50; or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V. roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$466.39

11. To see if the Town will vote to turn any unexpended balances of special appropriations into the general funds of the Town.

12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any real estate acquired by Tax Deed.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Fire Department equipment, and to raise and appropriate money for the same, or to take any vote relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road from the present driveway to the wood lot now owned by Charles L. Cushman to the Lyme Town Line, this road known as the Stone House Road.

15. To see if the Town will vote to subject the road to gates and bars from Indian Pond four corners to land now owned by George Downing.

16. To hear reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

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To the Orford School Board and  
Citizens of the Orford School District:

Ladies and Gentlemen: I hereby submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Since my last report the East Orford and Mr. Cube schools have been closed, and the pupils of these schools transported to the Orfordville school. Rosina Cummings of the Mt. Cube school was transferred to the newly organized primary room, and Norman P. Sargent relieved of the four lower grades. From an educational view this is a distinct advantage. Men seem to be successful with older pupils, and Miss Cummings is especially adapted to the smaller children. The children in both rooms are busily engaged in worthwhile work and are progressing satisfactorily. All the children are having the advantage of more competition and group work. A fence has been erected across the front of the playground, and the children are safely enclosed. Transportation is safe, comfortable and efficient. The building is well equipped with heat, light and electricity.

The enrollment of the Orford Street elementary schools is the lowest for some time. It is hoped that this will remain fairly constant for the present, as it is an ideal membership for the most efficient work with the present staff and equipment.

It is my recommendation throughout this supervisory union that the honor roll for perfect attendance be discontinued after the present year. Originally intended to increase attendance, I am firmly convinced that, at the expense of health, it defeats its own ends. Children with hard colds, sore throats, etc., often fore-runners of contagious diseases, expose the entire school to illness in their zeal to maintain perfect attendance. The State Board of Health says that when contagious diseases are prevalent such children should stay at home. These children often times should not be out in stormy weather, and there are probably times when small children, tired or nervous, may well be kept at home a day or two. The whole matter of school attendance is one



of common sense. When children are well and able they must attend, and when they are sick and ailing they should stay at home. The children on honor rolls would probably attend regularly anyway, and those of poor attendance are not motivated to attend any more regularly.

The driveway to the Orford Street School should be plowed regularly in winter. In walking in the tracks of cars, children are forced to step into the deep snow when meeting vehicles, and during thaws these tracks are running streams of water. Severe colds, sore throats, etc., often come from sitting in school with wet feet.

The report of the Headmaster of the High School appears elsewhere in this book. The school starting approximately ten years ago with a few students has grown steadily to an enrollment of about 75 pupils. It is difficult to organize the work to motivate to best advantage in such crowded quarters. The curriculum should be revised to meet the needs of the students. During the last six years only a little over 20% of the graduates have been known to enter schools above high school, and yet all the courses are in commercial, language, scientific and English fields. Agriculture, manual training and domestic arts should be offered. The boys could learn milk testing, crops, etc., and to make minor repairs around the farm. The girls could learn to be good home makers. A certain amount of cultural subjects should be retained to give a well rounded secondary school education. Accordingly, an addition or small new building is urgently needed to take care of the needs of the children in Orford and vicinity. I believe that such a project in conjunction with the Plymouth Normal School is possible without a financial hardship to the district.

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### HEADMASTER'S REPORT.

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Mr. Allan McCurdy, Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report of the Orford High School.

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School opened on September 3 with an enrollment of 76. Three entered later, and since then five have left school, making our present enrollment 74. Of this number, there are 13 seniors, 15 juniors, 23 sophomores, and 23 freshmen.

There are 32 from Orford, 21 from Lyme, 15 from Fairlee, 2 from Ely, 2 from Piermont, and 2 from Wentworth.

There are eight pupils taking the college preparatory curriculum, nine juniors and seniors taking the commercial curriculum, and 31 in the two lower classes taking a commercial subject.

One commercial subject is offered for the first two years in both the English and commercial curriculum, so that the pupil doesn't definitely have to decide which one of the two curricula he will take until the end of his sophomore year. The majority of the pupils take the English curriculum.

The school is well equipped this year for the science courses and for the reference work in other subjects.

We are also well supplied with magazines, some of which are furnished by the State, some donated, and one, the American Observer, is bought by some of the pupils.

Much emphasis is laid in all of the social science classes on current events in order that the pupils may understand present conditions and, therefore, be better prepared for citizenship.

Much interest has been taken by both boys and girls in basket ball. In the fall, a schedule of 14 games for both boys and girls was made out, seven to be played here and seven at the other high schools. They have met with a very good degree of success considering that they can practice, on the average, only one night a week.

The senior class gave their annual play at Fairlee Town Hall in November, from which they cleared about \$60. This money will be used to defray graduation expenses and to help out on the class trip.

Much enthusiasm is being shown in the winter carnival, for which preparation is being made as this goes to print. W. E. Chapman has donated a trophy. The school winning the most points in the snow and ice events will have the trophy in its possession for one year, and the school winning it for three years will at

the end of that time permanently own it.

A school orchestra has been organized by Miss Mary Dearborn, one of the cadet teachers from Keene. They are making good progress, so it is hoped that they will play at a school entertainment to be given in the spring.

The progress made by the pupils this year has been good. They have shown a cooperative spirit and their general attitude has been commendable.

While the results have been encouraging, we feel that we have two real needs: (1) more room, and (2) a curriculum in domestic arts for girls and one in manual arts for boys.

The curricula which we now have, college preparatory, English and commercial are all right for some pupils, but they are not practical enough for many of the boys and girls who do not plan to go on to higher institutions of learning.

The commercial curriculum is practical for those who are interested in that type of work and plan to go on with it. This is true of only a small number. Some take the curriculum because they do not care for the subjects in the other curricula, but in cases of this kind it is of but little value.

The majority of the girls will, no doubt, become home makers, and for that calling, one of the most important there is, we are giving no preparation. Some may think that girls should learn how to keep house in their own homes, but today that is the exception rather than the rule. The curriculum in domestic arts gives much more than cooking and sewing. It gives a training in general home management.

The curriculum in manual arts gives training in both wood work and mechanics, both of which are practical for boys who do not plan to go beyond high school.

If a building could be erected for these curricula, it would relieve the crowded condition in the school building.

Next year there will have to be two divisions of biology because our laboratory is not large enough to accommodate the size of class that we shall have. By having to use the laboratory for this extra class, it will

make us short of class rooms. Classes could be held in the domestic arts rooms certain periods a day, which would help out greatly on the class room situation.
