To the Inhabitants of the Town of Strafford in the County of Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Strafford on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Public Welfare including Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.
4. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.
5. To see if the town will accept Town Road Aid and raise and appropriate the sum of \$913.01.
6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for State Aid Construction of Parker Mountain road.
7. To see if the town will vote to purchase a power sander and raise and appropriate the sum of \$425.00.
8. To see what action the town will take as to rate of pay for winter sanding.
9. To see if the town will accept, as town property, and maintain as a public way the private road known as Lake View Avenue. (By petition).
10. To see if the town will vote to have the Town

Hall shingled and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$320.80 for materials to complete the inside construction of the Crown Point Fire Station. (By Petition).

12. To see what money the town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

13. To see if the town will accept the report of the Soldier's Memorial Committee and raise and appropriate any money for the same.

14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust disease.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$90.00 for the Lakes Region Association.

16. To see if the town will grant a two percent discount on property taxes paid in full within 30 days of date of issue of collector's warrant.

17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL WARRANT**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Strafford qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March, 1953, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance, is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will approve the sum of

\$300.00 for special handwriting instruction, included in the school board's budget for current expenses, for 1953-1954.

10. To see if the district will approve the sum of \$450.00 for outside painting of the schoolhouses, as listed in the school board's budget for current expenses for 1953-1954.

11. To see if the district will vote to use printed ballots and vote to require candidates for school district offices to file with the district clerk, in a manner similar to candidates for town offices, and charge a fee therefor.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Miss Fletcher gave the regular inspection, including tests of hearing and vision and growth records, for 84 pupils, besides many special check-ups. Measles and chicken-pox were prevalent. Eighty children took advantage of the fluorine clinic for preventing tooth decay. Seven pre-school children were brought to the pre-school clinic at the Center School June 6. Every child about to enter school should be brought when such an opportunity offers. Mrs. George N. Hurley, R. N., serves as school nurse at the Academy.

The elementary schools presented a musical program in Rochester, May 23, under the direction of Mrs.

Merriam. The annual physical education demonstration took place June 6 at the Academy, under the direction of Mrs. Holloway. A special meeting of the district was held in August, at which reports were received from special committees on costs and facilities and cooperative district.

The legislative program for educational advancement in the state has been carefully prepared, as follows:

1. Act to permit the state board to pay back to local districts the full amount of the per-capita tax.
2. Continue the Municipal Bond Act provision to enable districts to borrow 5% and (by special permission) up to 8% for school building construction.
3. Clarify and strengthen the Cooperative School District Act, and the State Aid Act.
4. Budget appropriations to include:
 - a. State aid of \$1,230,000 to local schools.
 - b. Scholarship aid of \$40,000 to enable young people to prepare at the Teachers' Colleges.
 - c. Provision for employment of Directors of Elementary Schools, Secondary Schools, and Surveys and Studies.
 - d. A modest fund for revision and development of courses of study.
5. An auditorium-gymnasium at Plymouth Teachers College and a classroom-laboratory building at Keene.

In September, 1954 there will be an estimated 40 pupils attending Grades V and VI at Crown Point School, which has a building smaller than the others. Fourteen children are expected to enter Grade I in September, 1953.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COOPERATIVE DISTRICT

At the 1952 School District meeting a committee was appointed to study the cooperative school movement in New Hampshire, with the possibility in mind that Strafford at some future time might become a member of a cooperative school district. The committee reported to a special School District meeting called in August of 1952. Their report at this meeting may be summarized as follows:

What Is a Cooperative School?

A cooperative school is a consolidation of two or more pre-existing school districts so that they can pool their resources for more efficient and effective education of their children. The cooperative school district is a single administrative unit, just like any other school district. It may operate several different schools within its territory or concentrate all children in one or two schools, depending upon the buildings available, the geography of the district, and the wishes of the voters.

How Is a Cooperative School District Formed?

First, each district which wishes to consider joining a cooperative school district must vote at a regular or special School District meeting to petition the State Board of Education to set up a proposed cooperative district. After the State Board sets up the proposal, each district must vote again at a regular or special school meeting on whether it wants to join the cooperative district as proposed by the State Board of Education. At this time the voters are given complete information on methods and costs of operating the proposed district. If the voters of each separate district vote to join, a meeting of the voters of all the districts to be included is called. A majority at this meeting must vote to establish the proposed district. Thus each town has three separate opportunities to vote on the

question before a Cooperative School District is formed. If this is done, the Cooperative School District board is elected.

Who Pays Off Outstanding Bonds of a School District Joining a Cooperative District?

Each town must pay off its own outstanding bonds. If a town has a new building for which a substantial sum of bonded indebtedness is still outstanding, this building will probably have a fairly high appraised valuation so that the town having the building will receive for it a substantial payment from the other towns in the Cooperative district. This will ease the burden of paying off the bonds.

Advantages of Cooperative Schools:

1. Competent teachers
2. Improved and broader educational program provided

By understanding individual differences in pupils—this will reduce the number of drop-outs.

By offering a wide range of subjects and courses in such fields as mathematics, science, languages, industrial shop, business, art, physical education, social studies, music, home economics.

By offering a large variety of activities, such as orchestra, glee club, band, public speaking, athletics, dramatics, journalism.

By making available such special services as guidance, counseling, transportation, hot lunches, library, health examinations, etc.

3. Adequate school housing and equipment
4. Safe and convenient pupil transportation
5. Efficiency and economy of rural education—the cost per pupil is less in larger units
6. Equalization of cost of education to taxpayers

The Committee recommended a further study of the subject. At the present time Barrington, Durham,

Lee, and Madbury are considering the formation of a Cooperative School District and the possibility of Strafford joining this group was explored. However, principally because of the geographical location of this town and the distances involved, it does not seem that it would be feasible or to the advantage of Strafford to join this group. As no other towns around Strafford are interested in the cooperative movement at this time, it appears that the advantages to Strafford of forming or joining a Cooperative District must remain a possibility for the future.
