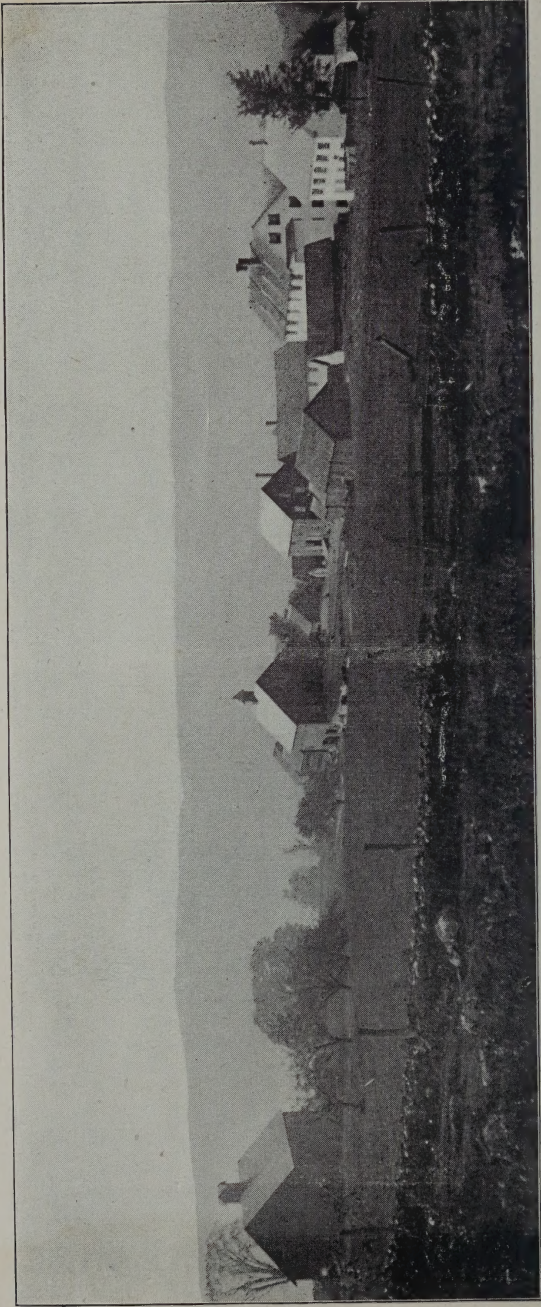

SULLIVAN COUNTY FARM BUILDINGS

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Commissioners' Report

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

We herewith submit a report of the financial condition and business affairs of the County, together with the reports of the respective County officers for the year ending Dec. 31, 1908.

COUNTY FARM.

Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam still continue in charge of the Almshouse and House of Correction and we believe are doing all in their power to provide for the wants and supply the needs of those committed to their care.

The superintendent's report shows that the farm has produced good crops during the year, and improvements have been made about the buildings in the shape of new steel ceilings for the kitchen, dining room and smoking room, and the interior of the main building painted.

Modern iron fire escapes have been erected on the south side and east end of the main building connecting with each floor, in both the men's and women's wards.

The water system constructed during the year 1907 has proved very satisfactory, furnishing a plentiful supply for all purposes during the unusual drouth of the past season.

FINANCIAL.

The total expense of caring for the prisoners at the jail for 1908 has been \$1,341.70 as compared with \$927.32 in 1907, an increase of \$414.38.

The expense for the support of paupers, dependent soldiers and children for the year 1908 has been \$22,794.-68 against \$17,075.49 for the year 1907.

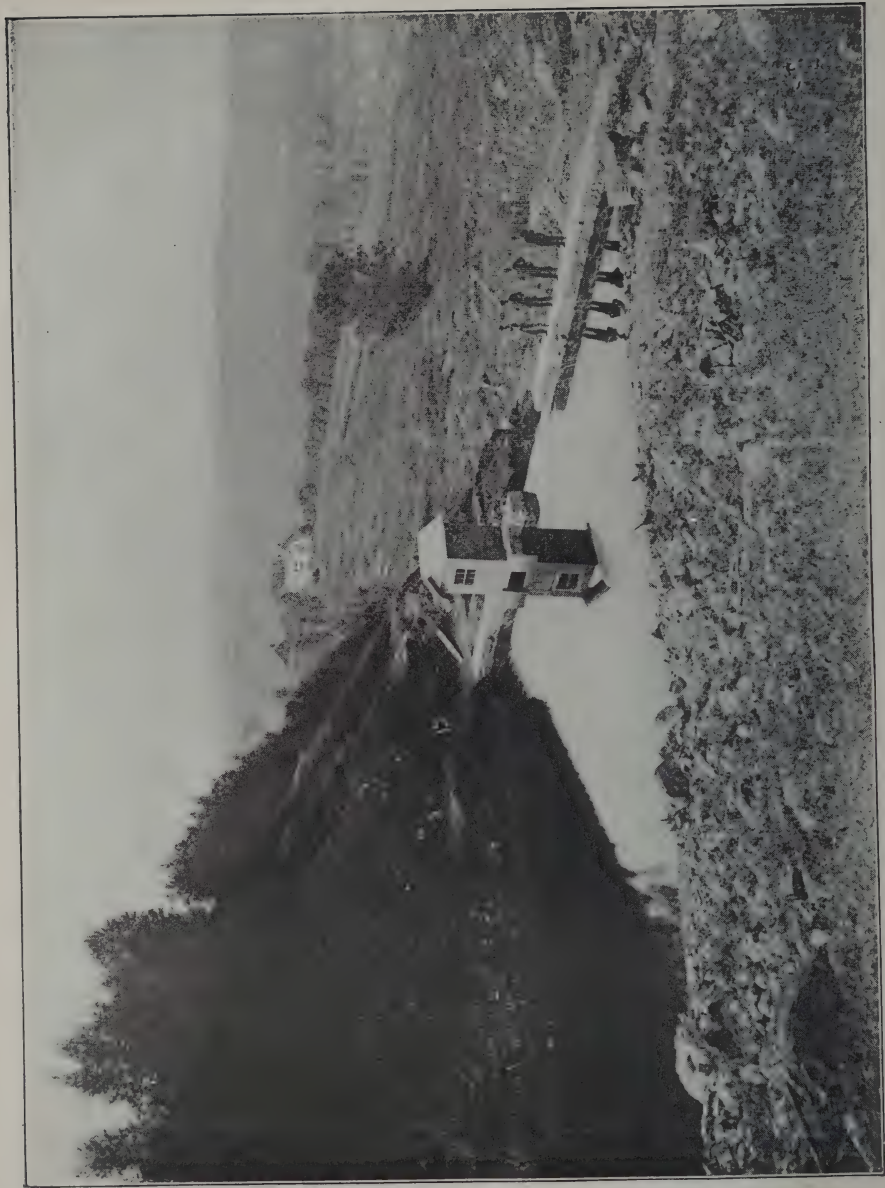

Chaplain's Report

North Charlestown, N. H., Jan. 20, 1909.

*To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Sullivan
County:*

Gentlemen:—In presenting my annual report will say that services have been regularly held and such other duties as have been necessary have been performed.

The services have been well attended and appreciated. A few sets of 1908 magazines were contributed by the North Charlestown people for the use of the inmates. On several Sundays flowers were sent by the Flower Mission connected with the church at West Unity; flowers were also sent from the church at North Charlestown.

The Christmas exercises were greatly enjoyed by all present and showed the interest of the superintendent and his wife for the welfare of those under their care. Generous contributions were made by the people of Claremont, Charlestown and Unity for the Christmas tree.

The W. C. T. U. of Claremont visited the farm early in January and after a musical and literary entertainment they distributed fruit and confectionery to the inmates.

An inspection of the farm and buildings by the County Officials and members of the W. C. T. U. showed that everything bears witness to the best of management and it is surely a blessing that Sullivan County has such a place for its poor and unfortunate ones.

The Commissioners have done all in their power for the comfort and convenience of the inmates. The dining room has been renovated, fire escapes have been provided and many other things have been done showing that these men have the best interests of the institution at heart. Everything is neat and tidy about the buildings; the inmates are kindly and tenderly cared for.

I have received every courtesy from the Commissioners, the Superintendent and Mrs. Putnam and everyone connected with the Institution for which permit me to express my heartfelt thanks.

Solicitor's Report

The following six indictments were found by the grand jury at the May term of court, 1908:

William Hillard for attempted rape. The respondent pleaded not guilty, was tried by jury, found guilty and sentenced to not less than ten nor more than fifteen years in State prison.

Exelow Bishop, for cruelty to animals, pleaded guilty, sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$25 and costs, jail sentence suspended during good behavior.

Joseph Romano for selling liquor, pleaded guilty, was sentenced to thirty days in jail and fined \$25 and costs, jail sentence suspended during good behavior.

William Bowker for breaking and entering with intent to steal, pleaded nolo, sentenced to six months in jail, sentence suspended.

Philip Davis for assault and attempt to rescue prisoner from officer, pleaded not guilty, was tried by jury and sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$10 and costs, jail sentence suspended.

At the November term, five indictments were returned as follows:

John A. Patten for arson, was tried, found guilty and sentenced to not less than three nor more than ten years in the State prison.

Eugene I. Harriman for assault with intent to kill, pleaded nolo and was sentenced to one year and one day in the State prison.

Charles P. Leslie for stealing milk cans, pleaded nolo, and was fined \$25 and costs.

Herbert Kimball for larceny of watch, sentenced to six months in jail.

Albert St. George for assault with intent to rob, respondent not yet apprehended.

Upon the prosecution brought against Fred C. Buzzel for keeping liquor for sale, the grand jury failed to find an indictment. The respondent paid the costs of the preliminary trial before the justice.

The grand jury were in session two days at this term. The criminal docket contains no cases left over for trial at the coming term and the only criminal matters now pending are three injunctions issued by the court against parties in Newport for the infringement of the liquor laws.

No civil cases are pending by or against the County. The cases of Patten and Harrimen entailed upon the County an unusually large expense on account of the large number of witnesses that were summoned by the State and in the defence and the expense that was required to be met in the preparation and trial of the cases.

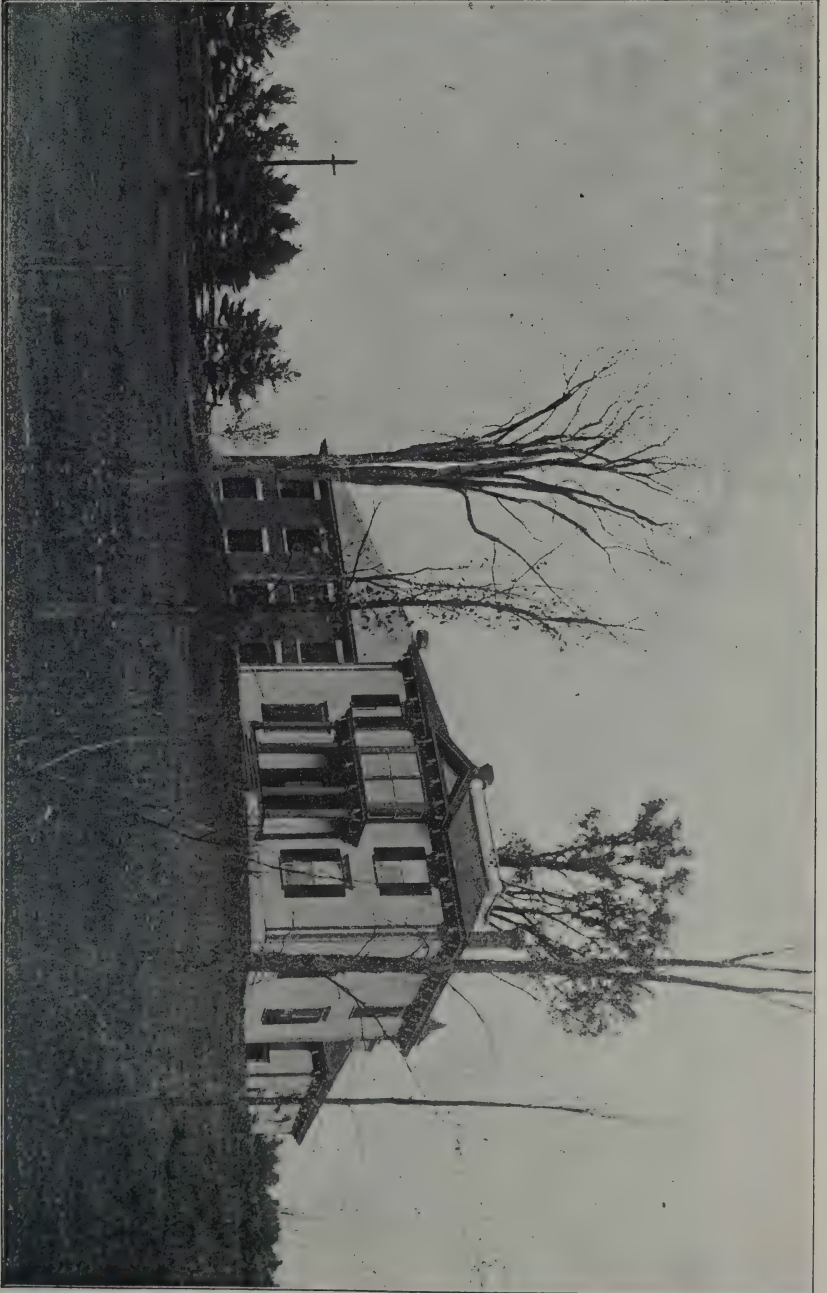
