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MAJORITY VIEW REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRATIC PARTIES AS DIVIDED, WANT BOTH TO BE MORE MODERATE; TRUMP AND PARTISANSHIP MOST IMPORTANT PROBLEMS FACING COUNTRY

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DURHAM, NH – The vast majority of New Hampshire residents view the Republican Party as divided, while a smaller majority see the Democratic Party as divided. Slightly more Granite Staters say the Democratic Party represents their values well, while members of both parties are divided on whether they would like their party officials to be more moderate or more ideologically-driven. Residents have disparate opinions on the most important problem facing the country and most frequently mention political matters such as the President, partisanship, and division.

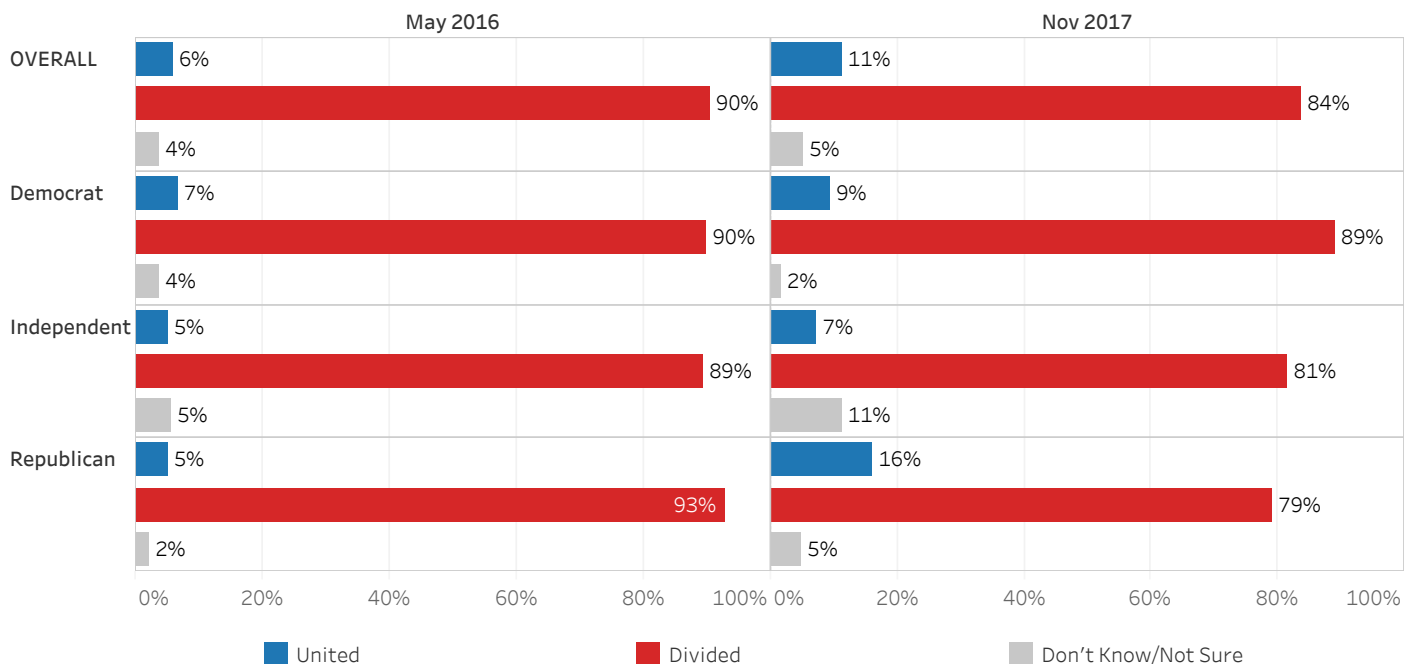
These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred and fifty-six (956) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and November 9, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.2 percent.

State of the Republican Party

Only 11% of Granite Staters believe the Republican Party today is united, while 84% say it is divided and 5% don't know or are unsure. This is largely unchanged since May 2016, when 6% said Republicans were united and 90% said they were divided.

This assessment of the Republican party is bipartisan: 89% of Democrats, 81% of Independents, and 79% of Republicans believe the party is divided.

Republican Party United or Divided

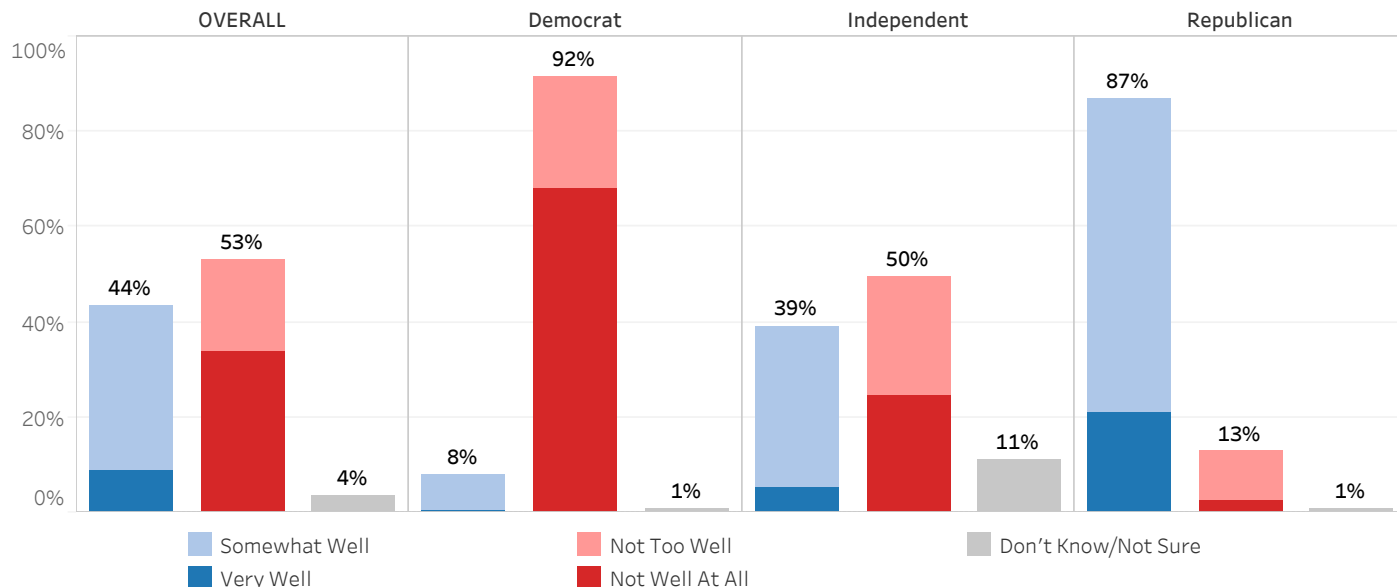

Forty-four percent of New Hampshire residents say the Republican Party represents their values very well (9%) or somewhat well (35%). Just over half (53%) say the GOP does not represent their values not too well (19%) or not well at all (34%), while 4% don't know or are unsure.

Eighty-seven percent of Republicans say the Republican Party represents their values very or somewhat well but only 39% of Independents and 8% of Democrats agree.

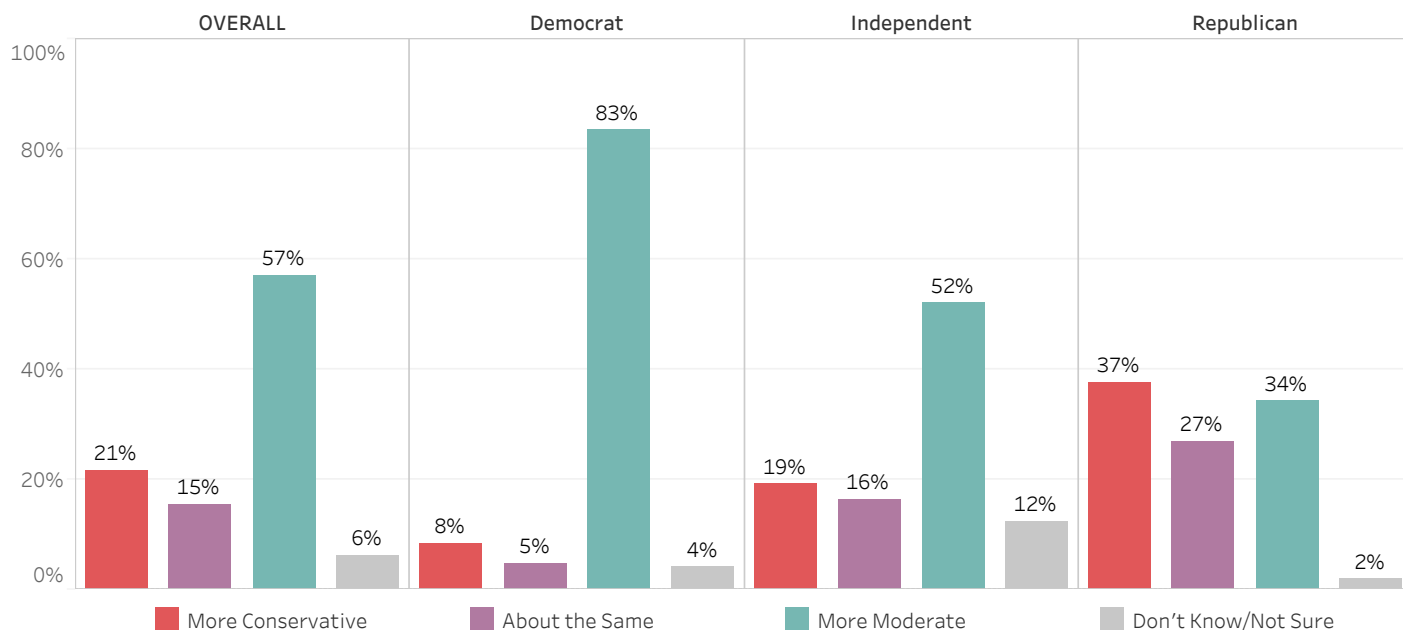
How Well GOP Represents My Values



Twenty-one percent of Granite Staters say in the future, they would like Republicans in elected office to be more conservative, more than half (57%) would like them to be more moderate, and 15% would like them to be about the same, while 6% don't know or are unsure.

Republicans are divided on this question: 37% would like more conservative party officials in the future, 34% would like more moderate ones, and 27% would like officials to be about the same as they are now. Just over half of Independents (52%) and most Democrats (83%) would prefer more moderate GOP officials.

Desired Ideology of Future Republicans

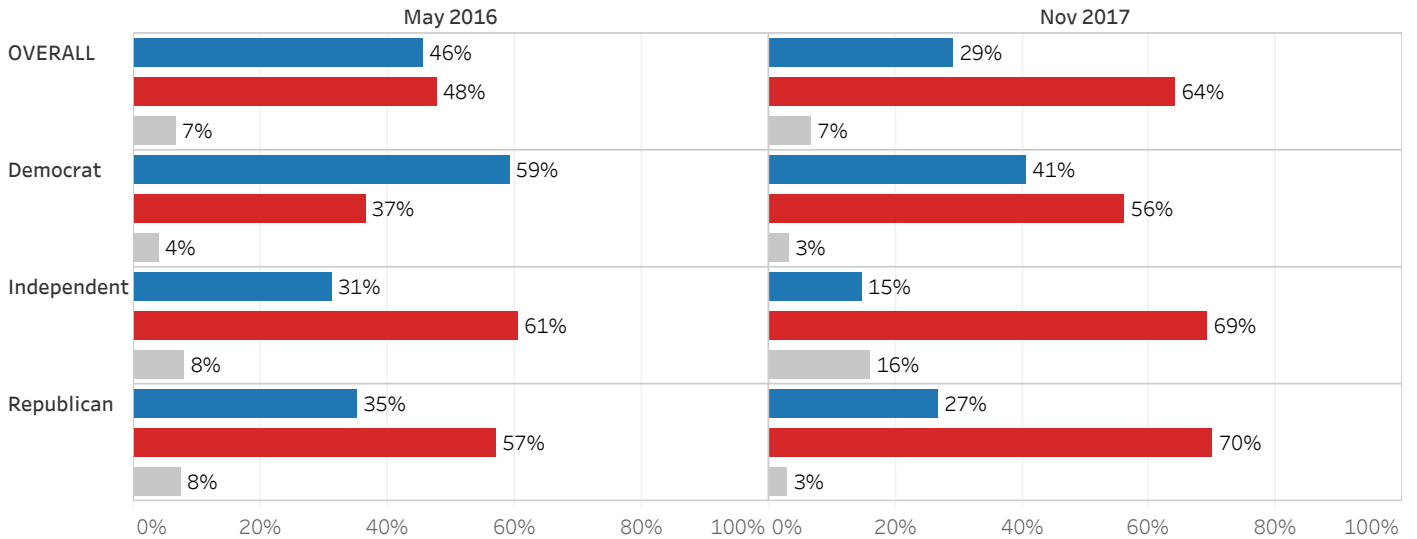


State of the Democratic Party

Twenty-nine percent of Granite Staters believe the Democratic Party today is united, while 64% say it is divided and 7% don't know or are unsure. This represents a significant drop in how united respondents see the Democratic Party since May 2016, when 46% said the party was united and 48% said it was divided.

Seventy percent of Republicans and 69% of Independents believe the Democratic party currently is divided, and even a majority of Democrats believe their party is divided (56%).

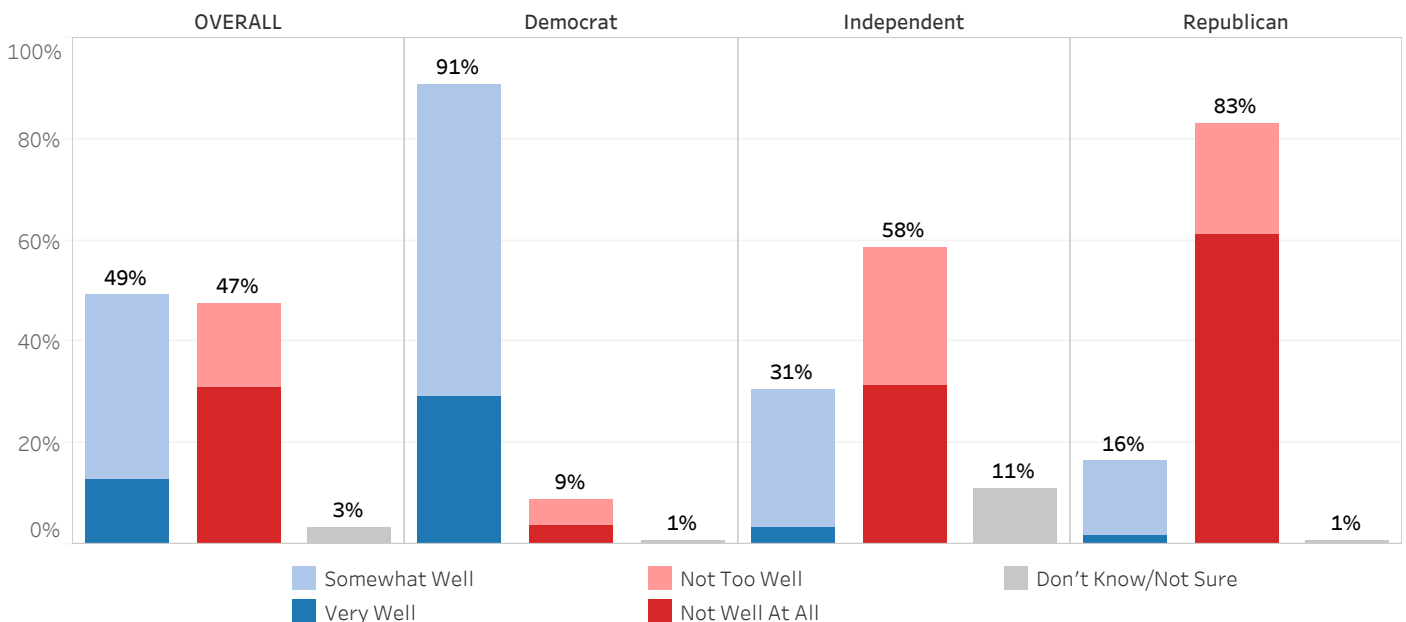
Democratic Party United or Divided



Forty-nine percent of New Hampshire residents say the Democratic Party represents their values very well (13%) or somewhat well (36%) while 47% say the Democratic Party does not represent their values too well (16%) or not well at all (31%), and 3% don't know or are unsure.

Ninety-one percent of Democrats believe the Democratic Party represents their values very or somewhat well, but only 31% of Independents and 16% of Republicans agree.

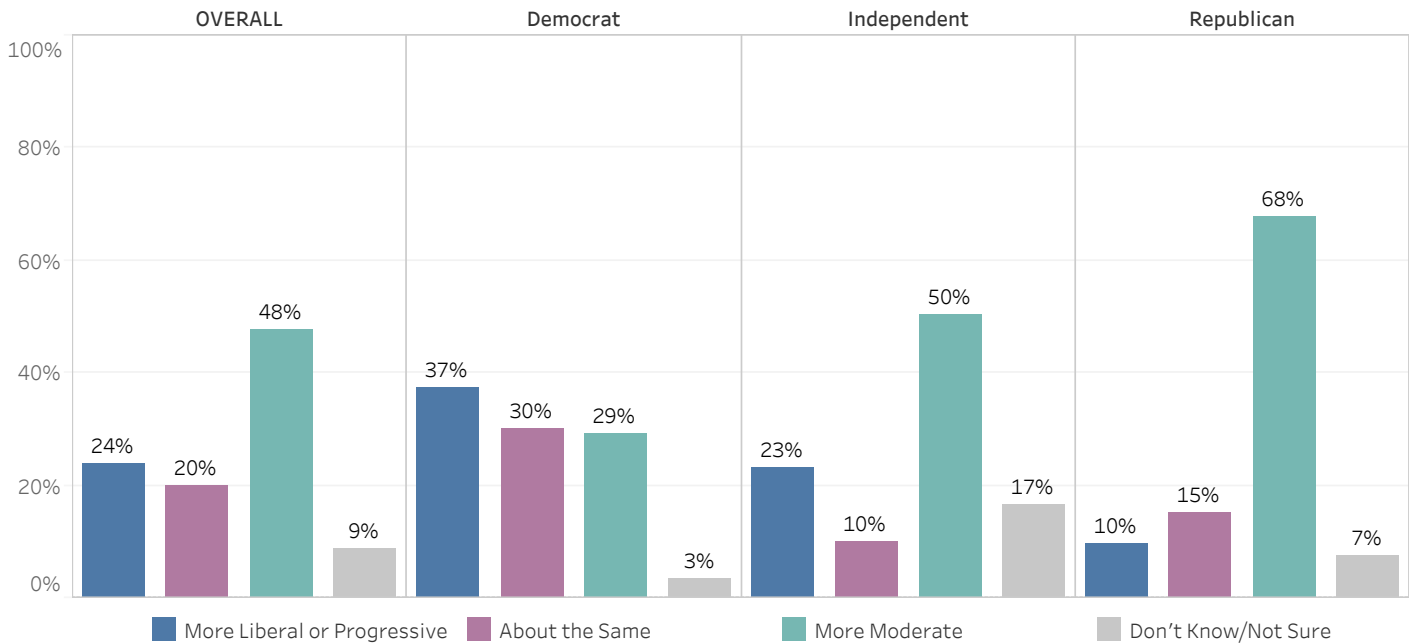
How Well Democratic Party Represents My Values



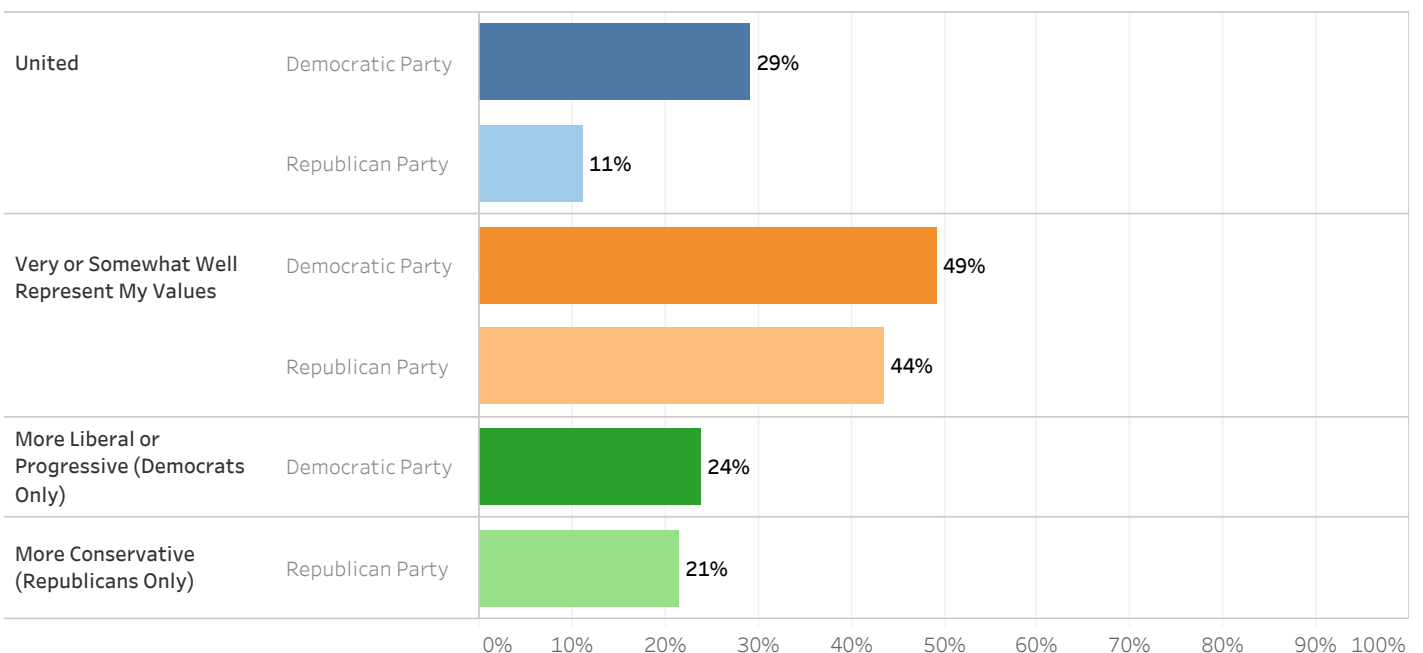
Twenty-four percent of Granite Staters say that in the future, they would like Democrats in elected office to be more liberal or progressive, just under half (48%) would like them to be more moderate, and 20% would like them to be about the same, while 9% don't know or are unsure.

Democrats are divided on this question: 37% would like more liberal or progressive party officials in the future, 29% would like more moderate ones, and 30% would like officials to be about the same as they are now. Half of Independents (50%) and just over two-thirds (68%) of Republicans would prefer more moderate Democratic officials.

Desired Ideology of Future Democrats



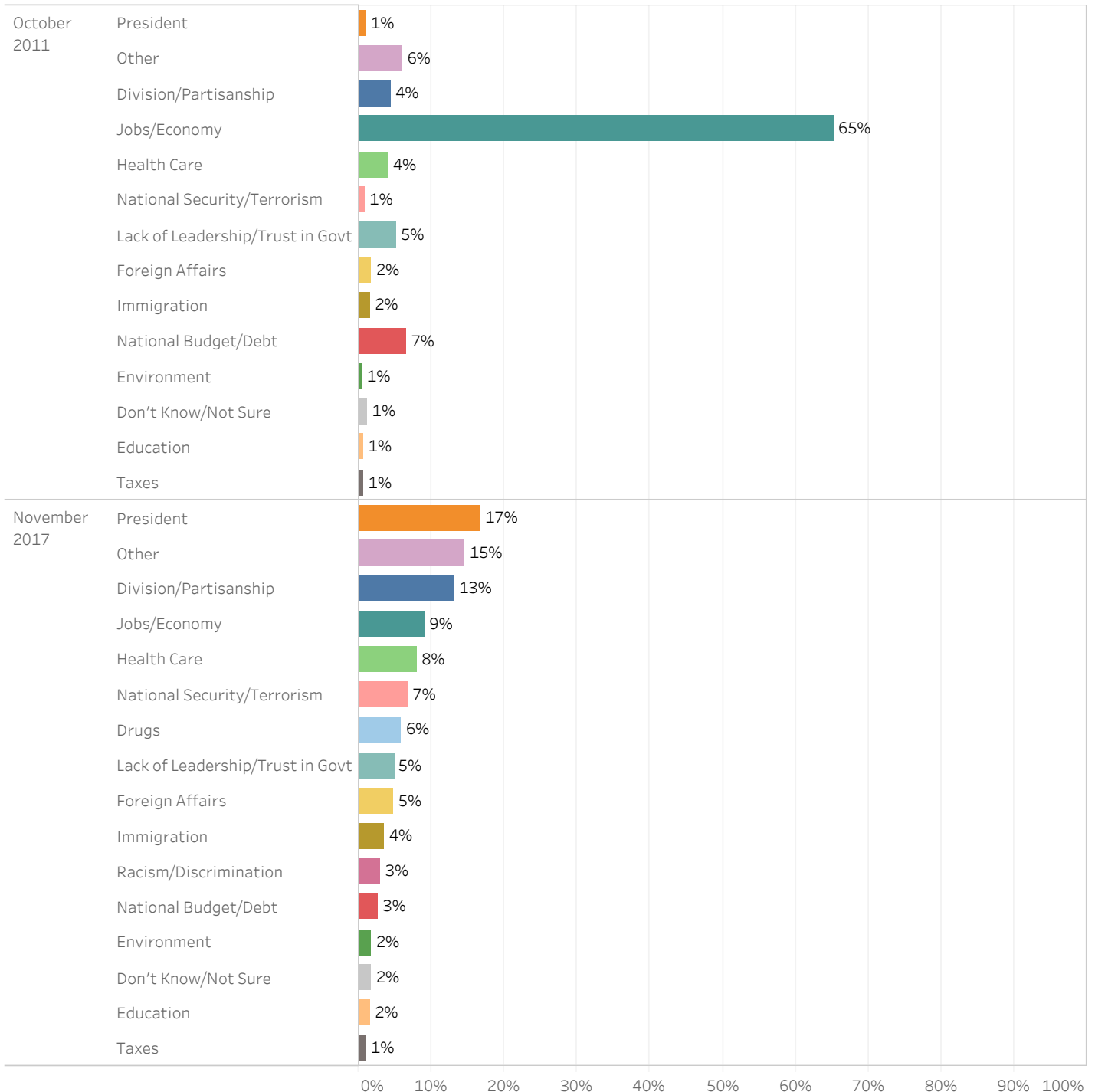
New Hampshire residents are more likely to say the Democratic Party is united (29%) than they are to say the Republican Party is united (11%) and slightly more respondents say the Democratic party very or somewhat well represents their values (49%) than say the same of the Republican party (44%). Roughly equal numbers of Democrats desire more liberal or progressive party officials in the future (24%) as Republicans who want more conservative party officials (21%).



Most Important Problem Facing Country Today

Granite Staters have a wide range of opinions on the most important problem facing the country overall today. Seventeen percent say the most important problem is the President (17%), 13% mention division or partisanship, 9% cite jobs or the economy, 8% mention health care, 7% cite national security or terrorism, and 6% mention drugs. Five percent or less of respondents say lack of leadership or trust in government (5%), foreign affairs (5%), immigration (4%), racism or discrimination (3%), the national budget or debt (3%), the environment (2%), education (2%) or taxes (1%) is the most important problem facing the country, while 15% provide another answer and 2% don't know or are unsure.

Responses to this question are quite different than those provided in October 2011, when nearly two-thirds (65%) cited jobs or the economy as the most important problem. The proportion who mention the President or division or partisanship (30%) has increased considerably since 2011 (6%).



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred and fifty-six (956) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and November 9, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.2 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.3%.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
