THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the town of Walpole qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the tenth day of March, 1953 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose two members of the school board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers and agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into a contract with the school district of Rockingham, Vermont; for the payment of high school tuition.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$135,000, but not exceeding 8% of the latest assessed valuation of taxable property in the district, and to issue its serial notes and bonds therefor under and in accordance with the provisions of the municipal bond statute as amended, for the purpose of erecting in that part of the town of Walpole known as North Walpole, on land already owned by the school district, an elementary school with auditorium-gymnasium, and to equip and furnish the same and for the grading of the lot; or take any other action thereon.

- 11. To see if the district will authorize the school board to contract for the erection of an elementary school with auditorium-gymnasium, on land owned by the district in North Walpole, for the purchase of equipment and the furnishing of the same and for the grading of the lot; or take any other action thereon.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the trustees of the trust funds to turn over to the school district the money held in trust from the sale of old school buildings to be used in the building of an elementary school building with auditorium-gymnasium in North Walpole, for the purchase of equipment and the furnishing of the same and for the grading of the lot; or take any other action thereon.
- 13. To see if the district will authorize the school board to accept gifts from the village precinct of North Walpole, or from individuals or corporations, to be used with other moneys for the building of an elementary school with auditorium-gymnasium in North Walpole, and for the equipment and furnishing of the same, and the grading of the lot; or take any other action thereon.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.



TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, 1953, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman, for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collector of Taxes, Trustee of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers and all other necessary officers.

Article 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current expenses as may accrue.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$965.71 for Class V roads, the state to contribute \$6,438.04.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expense in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes as has been the custom in previous years.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds or bequests as have been left to it during the past year.

Article 7. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deeds after being advertised.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,312.00 to buy Hough Payloader.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,200.00 to buy new truck.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 to replace Bunker Bridge on County Road.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,700.00 to install a heating system in town garage.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to repair and improve March Hill.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to replace old stone drain on Union St., Walpole.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to gravel surface 425 ft. of Duffy St. in North Walpole. By petition.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to gravel and tar the new street off of High St. By petition.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,610.00 to be spent on reconstruction of streets in compact areas, the state to contribute an equal amount.

Article 17. To see what action the town will take to increase the salaries of Town officers.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for support of the Elliot Community Hospital, Keene, N. H. Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$425.00 to contribute to the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to protect the shade trees of the town.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to recind Article 13 of the 1950 Town Meeting which read as follows:

Article 13. (A) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$47.500.00 and to issue its serial notes and bonds therefor, under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, as amended, for the purpose of erecting on that parcel of land to be conveyed to the Town of Walpole by the North Walpole Village Precinct, a town hall, the same to house among other offices, the library, jail and courtroom. Said bond issue to be paid up in a period of (10) ten years. (B) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept such gifts or donations as may be presented or proffered in connection with said town hall. (C) That said bonds and serial notes be issued not prior to April 30, 1950.

Article 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to remain open until 6 p. m. or later if so voted.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the town of Walpole qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, in said district on the 10th day of March, 1953, at 2:00 in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose two members of the school board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers and agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into a contract with the school district of Rockingham, Vermont; for the payment of high school tuition.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of your schools:

The school population continues to increase. Next year's first grade at the Walpole School is expected to number 49, to be followed a year later by a class of 57 children. This means that an additional elementary teacher will be needed next year, and another additional elementary teacher will be needed the following year. Eight elementary classrooms will be necessary to house grades one through six next year, and nine will be needed for the school year 1954-55.

Next year the addition of an elementary teacher and the use of one of the second-floor classrooms for the sixth grade will make it possible to take care of the increase in the enrollment in the first six grades. To take care of increased enrollment in grades seven through twelve, periods will be shortened to allow another period to be added. A few additional minutes may be needed to fulfill requirements for the total minutes per week for each subject. If this is necessary school will start a few minutes earlier and be dismissed a few minutes later than this year's schedule. The added period each day will make it possible to have two sections for classes that need to be divided.

Increased school population is not a problem at North Walpole. On the contrary, smaller classes are expected. The kindergarten has an enrollment of twenty-one this year, and thereafter for the next five years the school census indicates that classes will average eleven.

There is plenty of classroom space at North Walpole, however the buildings are very old and should be replaced by a more modern building that will better serve the needs of the community.

There has been a change this year in the teaching of handwriting. The former plan was to teach manuscript writing in all the elementary grades. Manuscript writing is now taught in grades one, two and the first semester of grade three. The change from manuscript to cursive writing is begun in the second semester of grade three, and continues in the succeeding grades. It is planned to retain the skill of using manuscript writing by requiring its use on maps, drawings, etc.

It is hoped that sufficient funds will be available to increase the testing program this year. There is a definite amount in next year's budget for a testing program in both the elementary and secondary grades. The teachers have held two meetings to discuss this important part of the educational program. Mr. McIntyre, who heads the testing department of the University of New Hampshire, discussed a proposed testing program at one of these meetings and further meetings are to be held to complete the plans.

As fast as improvements are accomplished, other educational problems will be studied by the teachers with the view to keeping abreast of the current practices in education. Constant study and revision of the curriculum is a requisite in order that we may have a dynamic educational program.

Good teachers are the basis of good schools. If a system is to progress, it must utilize the thinking and good ideas that result from the teamwork of the educational staff. To retain a good staff, a community should pay a salary that is in keeping with the professional status that a teacher must have by reason of training and certain inate qualities that enable them to deal successfully with children.

The school budget for next year reflects the cost of providing education for more pupils and increased cost of operating the schools. The dollar will not buy as much as it did a few years ago. We all realize this fact when we buy goods or services for our own use, and we cannot escape this trend in education if we are to provide the educational opportunity that we desire for our children.

The following teacher changes took place this year: Mr. Edward Gaffney replaced Mr. Eldridge Wallace as teacher of Agriculture; Mrs. Winifred Langtry replaced Miss Jane Mills as teacher of Home Economics; Miss Grace MacNevin replaced Miss Ruth Carr as teacher of English, Social Science, and Physical Education; Miss Barbara Stevens replaced Miss Norma Hunt as teacher of Commerce; Mr. Roger Weeks replaced Mrs. Madeline Tole as teacher of Music; Mr. Raymond Bolduc replaced Mr. John Barry as teacher of grade seven at North Walpole; and Miss Ellen McAfee replaced Miss Frances Edgett as school nurse.

This is a considerable change in a total staff of eighteen, and makes it extremely difficult for the principal to develop and hold improvements.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL NORTH WALPOLE SCHOOLS

Mr. Elliott W. Keach, Superintendent of Schools, Walpole, New Hampshire.

Dear Sir:

I submit herewith my annual report as principal of the North Walpole Schools:

SCHOLARSHIP

A testing program, including reading tests, mental tests, and achievement tests, for all the grades is now in the process of being adopted. Various tests were considered by the teachers at one of their meetings. Those tests which seemed best suited to the needs of the school system were selected for further study, and final action as to what tests will be adopted will be forthcoming soon.

The reading tests will indicate what skills a pupil needs help in, in order for him or her to succeed. They will also suggest what grouping within the class will be needed in order to get the class working at maximum efficiency.

Mental tests which test mental abilities will enable us to judge whether a child is working to the best of his abilities.

Achievement tests will indicate pupil weaknesses and will point out the areas that will have to be re-taught before the pupil can proceed satisfactorily with the regular class work.

Beginning with the second semester, three new periods have been added to the school schedule. These periods are known as "Opportunity Periods" and are held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week. Pupils needing extra help in order to carry on the regular work of the class are given the additional help required during these periods, and those who have been retarded for various reasons are given an opportunity to get caught up in their work.

Teachers' meetings are held monthly, at which problems concerning the school are discussed, as well as topics of interest to the teachers as a group. "What Can Be Done For The Slow-Learning Child" is the topic under discussion at the present time. This is being taken up under three main headings; "Characteristics of the Mentally Slow-Learning Children," "Grouping in the Class Room to Provide Better Instruction for the Slow-Learner," and "The Skills Program."

Five teachers of the faculty have finished the course given at Charlestown in "Supervising a Student Teacher." I am pleased to see so many of our teachers interested in their own professional advancement. Such interest makes for better teachers and better schools, and it follows that the pupils benefit thereby as well.

The Teachers of the North Walpole Schools had 100% attendance at the State Teachers' Convention held at Manchester last October.

ORGANIZATION

The year book, put out by the seventh and eighth grade pupils last May was well received. The present classes are now working upon their year book and hope to exceed last year's publication.

The annual school exhibit was held in May at the schools. This exhibit included, school work, and the articles made by the boys and girls during the "Interest or Hobby Period," which meets for one period a week. The boys' projects in woodwork were limited, due to the fact that no provision for lumber for this purpose was made. The exhibit was well attended by townspeople. The grades are striving for a bigger and better exhibit this year, which again will be held sometime in May. The upper grades presented two one-act plays, "Comin' 'Round the Mountain," and "Freddie Plays Cupid" in January at the Parish Hall. Comment on the acting and on other phases of the plays, was very favorable. Credit for their success is due the individuals participating and Mr. Bolduc who directed them.

The School safety patrol operated the past year as in other years. This patrol, entirely a pupil project, has rendered valuable assistance in seeing that our pupils cross the main lines of traffic in safety. I wish to congratulate the boys and girls who have performed so efficiently this service to their fellow-pupils.

Assemblies are staged by the pupils of grade seven and eight every two weeks. The grades alternate in putting on a program for the entertainment of the other grade. Sometimes these programs are in the form of a social gathering as was the case at Halloween and Christmas.

Our winter athletic program is somewhat limited, due again to the fact that no place in the village is available to carry on an extensive program. Our boys and girls are missing a great deal in the line of their physical development, a condition which I hope will be remedied as soon as possible.

Fire drills are held monthly, weather permitting, and pupils are required to use various exits, in order to acquaint themselves with all possible exits.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation to the school board, superintendent, teachers, and the people of the School District for their co-operation.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

I herewith submit my third annual report as principal of Walpole High School:

GRADUATES

Of the fifteen graduates of the class of 1952, two are at Keene Teachers College, one at Plymouth Teachers College, one at St. Mary's Novitiate, Deerfield, one at the Elliot Community Hospital in Keene, one at Notre Dame Hospital in Manchester, one in the armed forces, and eight are working.

SCHOLARSHIP

Walpole High School is fully approved by the State Department of Education, and our graduates of college caliber have a high degree of success in the colleges and universities of the country. An average of 85% is necessary for recommendation to college. The passing is 70%. Scholastic standards are such that only two or three students a year are able to maintain an A average, from a student body of approximately 100.

HEALTH

Miss Frances Edgett retired in June at the end of twenty-three years service to the students of Walpole. Her place was filled by Miss Ellen McAfee, R. N., a graduate of the St. Johns Hospital, Brooklyn, New York.

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AGRICULTURE

The Annual School Fair was held in September, sponsored by the Future Farmers of America and the Future Homemakers. The parade, community exhibits and Harvest Dance were the highlights of the affair.

Five boys went to the National F. F. A. Convention in Kansas City. William Farrow sang in the National F. F. A. Chorus. Teams were entered in the Interscholastic Judging Contest at Durham last fall. Robert Staples, as a result of his high score in judging poultry, will represent New Hampshire at the Eastern States Exposition in Springfield next fall.

Edward Jennison received \$100 as recipient of the State Dairy Award. Edward also represented New Hampshire in the Milk Judging Contest in Springfield last fall. Roger Adams received the Chapter Farm Mechanics Award. The Walpole F. F. A. Chapter exhibited vegetables at the Cheshire Fair. The Chapter sold cider from apples picked at the school orchard.

COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

Several of the recent graduates have secured excellent positions as a result of their training in the Walpole High School Commercial Department. Others have gone to business colleges for further training and specialization. The aim of the Business Department is to prepare our young men and women with a thorough knowledge of the world through the study of bookkeeping, shorthand, typing, and office practice.

The office practice course offers to the girls a study and use of various business machines, such as the adding machine, calculator, duplicator, and mimeograph. This year for the first time there will be a unit of work in the use of the electric typewriters. The office practice group are receiving a great deal of practical knowledge by working in the office. They are responsible for all the secretarial work which is done there. The course this year consists of eight girls. Six students are taking Typing I, and four students are taking II. Twenty-three are enrolled in the Bookkeeping course, and seven are taking Shorthand.

The Business Department prepares the school newspaper, CHICKS' CHIRPS. An issue has been printed each month for sale in the school and in town. The use of the mimeograph and typewriter has enabled the students to put out an excellent copy most of the time.

LIBRARY

The library is open for the checking of books from eight-thirty until nine-thirty in the morning, and from three to three-thirty in the afternoon. During all the other periods the room is available for students to secure books for reference work in study hall.

Through the generosity of various townspeople, many valuable books of a reference nature have been added to the library. Thanks are due the interested students who have not only helped to arrange the books but have also periodically restored order to the arrangement of the shelves.

By regular subscription the library receives the following periodicals: Newsweek, U. S. News, The National Geographic, Fortune, and Student Life. Through the kindness of an interested townsperson, copies of the D. A. R. Magazine have been presented to the school. The Manchester Union comes daily, and through Mrs. Floyd Smith's interest, The New York Times for Sunday is available every week. Three sets of Encyclopedia Britannica, the World Book Encyclopedia, an atlas, a globe, a new Merriam-Webster Unabridged Dictionary (the gift of the class of 1952), have all been added since last year. Also available for the first time are copies of Who's Who in America.

The library could still use some good fiction and statistical abstracts.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The Student Council has been enlarged this year to include two members from each of the major organizations in the school, as well as two members from each class. With the added impetus of more heads and more enthusiasm, the Council is functioning as a constructive and influential agency in the school. Council recommendations have been thoughtful and workable, and in the main have received faculty approval. The constitution has been rewritten to include changes necessitated by the new school. Attendance at the State Student Council Convention in Manchester in October provided invaluable information about student council activities in other New Hampshire Schools, and many of these suggestions have guided the thinking of the Walpole Council. A visiting day to other high schools further increased the working knowledge of the Council. The Council assumed responsibility for the Christmas decorations, and has purchased a sizeable record library for the school.

In the Physical Education Department, it is to be noted that students who are not on organized teams do have the benefit of a scheduled period of physical education once or twice a week.

During the fall the high school boys played an eightgame schedule in touch football. The season was very successful with a 6-2 record. The winter period has actually produced greater interest and participation in basketball than ever before. Boys who have never tried their skill have shown good development in attitudes and team play.

The school is represented by six teams in basketball, and each of these has done well. The ever-popular intramural competition is scheduled to begin shortly after this writing. The chance to see the advancement and growth of so many boys makes these games actually more valuable than the interscholastic ones.

The boys varsity basketball team has a record of 13 wins and 3 losses, and it is hoped that the team will con-

tinue to represent the school in a commendable manner.

The spring program includes the conclusion of intramural basketball and then intramural volleyball. These are then succeeded by softball and baseball training.

P. T. A.

The Parent-Teachers Organization meets the first Monday of each month at 8:00 p.m. in the Cafeteria. Programs are centered around the educational program of the school and child development. Many outstanding speakers have been presented. The P. T. A. has lent its voice and support to worthwhile projects for the improvement of the school, such as curriculum improvement and an improved Guidance Program. As a result of the Febbruary meeting a considerably expanded Guidance Program is already in effect for the current year. Group Guidance, in line with the National Guidance Forum outline, has been incorporated into the home room period one or two mornings each week. A much more elaborate testing program, sponsored by Mr. Keach and antedating the February meeting by several months, will further improve the Guidance Program for Walpole High School.

The P. T. A. presented the Dartmouth Glee Club last spring, and realized enough profit to sponsor dental assistance to the elementary students in need of such service. The P. T. A. is also the sponsoring agency for the newly-created Walpole Recreation Council, which seeks to provide a more adequate recreational program for children of school age, on a year-round basis.
