#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warner in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Warner on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in the anticipation of taxes on the note or notes of the Town.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property taken for taxes.
- 5. To hear reports of the Officers of the Town heretofore chosen and Committees appointed and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (\$376.00) towards payment of the Concord Hospital deficit.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing new equipment for the Town Highway Department, the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be raised by taxation in the year 1969 and the Board of Selectmen and the Town Treasurer be authorized to borrow the remaining amount not exceeding (\$6,000.00) on note or notes of the Town to be paid off in the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) plus interest annually until said note or notes are paid in full.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Warner Planning Board.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Building Code Ordinance proposed by the Warner Planning Board.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### PROPOSED

Zoning Ordinance

As Revised Following First Public Hearing January 6, 1969

Town of Warner, N. H.

#### ARTICLE I

Preamble

Pursuant to the authority conferred by Chapter 31, Sections 60-89, New Hampshire Revised Statutes, 1955, as amended, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants, and preserving the values and charm, now attached to the town, the following ordinance is hereby adopted by the Town of Warner, N. H. in Town Meeting convened.

#### ARTICLE II

Districts

For the purposes of this ordinance, the Town of Warner is divided into three districts, as shown on the official zoning map, filed with the Town Clerk and dated January 15, 1969 as follows: (1) Residential Districts, (2) Rural-Agricultural District, (3) Business-Commercial District.

#### ARTICLE III

# Definitions

- A. Right of way means and includes all town, state, and federal highways, rights of way dedicated to public use, and the land on either side of same as covered by statute to determine the widths of rights of way.
- B. Signs. A structure, building wall or other outdoor surface, or device used for visual communication which is to be used for the purpose of bringing the subject thereof to the attention of the public; or to display, identify and publicize the name and product or service of any person.

- C. Home produce means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident; also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of the property.
- D. Front yard. A space extending for the full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest side of the public right of way.
- E. Frontage means the length of the lot bordering on the public right of way.
- F. Lot of record. Land designated as a separate and distinct parcel in a legally recorded deed and/or plan filed in the records of Merrimack County, New Hampshire.
- G. Non-conforming use. A non-conforming use is a use of any building, structure, or land, which does not conform to the use regulations of the district in which such use exists at the time of enactment of this ordinance or any of its amendments.

#### ARTICLE IV

#### General Provisions

The following provisions shall apply to all districts.

- A. No owner of land in any district shall permit fire or other ruins to be left, but within one year shall remove or refill the same to clear ground level, or shall repair, replace or rebuild the structure.
- B. The removal of sand, clay, sod, loam or gravel is permitted either for private use or for sale, provided that the premises are left in a safe and sightly condition and protected against erosion. Such restoration shall be done within (6) six months after the completion of the project.

- C. Any junk yard or place for the storage of unregistered vehicles or other scrap material shall be maintained in accordance with the standards set and enforced by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1967, Chapter 267, Sections A-1-17, as amended.
- D. Sanitary systems shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with standards set and enforced by the New Hampshire State Department of Health and the New Hampshire Water Pollution Commission.
- E. Signs or billboards shall be permitted only upon issuance of a sign permit by the Board of Selectmen and they shall not issue permits for any signs except:
  - a. In any district a sign not exceeding four square feet
    (4) in surface is permitted to announce the name,
    address, or professional activity of the occupant of
    the premises on which the sign is located.
  - b. In any district temporary real estate or construction signs not exceeding twenty-four (24) square feet are permitted on property being sold, leased or improved.
  - c. In any district signs not exceeding two (2) square feet in area to point direction to residences, businesses, or meeting places are permitted subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing.
  - d. In the business-commercial district signs in connection with any business shall be permitted provided they are on the same premises as the business and do not advertise any product or service not sold on those premises.
  - e. In the case of businesses in the rural-agricultural zone paragraph IV D (d) will apply subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing.

- f. In the rural-agricultural zone, signs not exceeding thirty-two (32) square feet used only to advertise products, facilities or services offered for sale within the Town of Warner are permitted subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing and provided that no person, firm, or business is permitted to erect more than four (4) such signs exclusive of those on the premises where the product, facility, or service are offered.
- F. No land in any district shall be used for storage or disposal of junk as described in the state laws: nor discarded machinery, metal scrap, old bottles, other solid textile waste, unfinished cloth or other textile mill yarns, old paper products, old rubber products, old plastic products, old wood products, and other second hand or waste articles, the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.
- G. Use Permit: No permit for the erection, exterior alteration, moving or repair of any building shall be issued until an application has been made for the certificate of zoning compliance, and the certificate shall be issued in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance upon completion.
- H. Construction of new streets, drainage facilities, sidewalks and curbs must be done under the supervision of, or with the approval of the Road Agent and the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Warner.
- I. Nuisance provision: Any use that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of production, emission of odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise vibration or similar conditions, or that is dangerous to the comfort, peace, health or safety of the community or tending to its disturbance or annoyance, is prohibited.

#### ARTICLE V

The following provisions shall apply to the Residential District.

# A. Uses permitted

- 1. It shall be a district of residential dwellings.
- 2. Customary uses by owner or tenant of home business or profession.

# B. Frontage and yard requirements

- 1. Frontage: Every dwelling shall have a minimum lot frontage of one hundred (100) feet, and an area of not less than ten thousand (10,000) square feet except if such dwelling is not served by the Warner Fire Precinct sewer system in which case the area shall not be less than forty thousand (40,000) square feet.
- 2. Yard requirements: No building shall be located nearer than fifteen (15) feet to an abutter's property line and thirty (30) feet from the edge of a public right of way.

#### ARTICLE VI

# Rural-Agricultural District

The following provisions shall apply to the Rural-Agricultural District.

# A. Uses permitted

- 1. It shall be a district of farms and residences.
- 2. Home produce may be bought and sold and exposed for sale in the district.
- 3. Any agricultural use is permitted excepting that the establishment of any feed lot, fenced runs, pens or similar intensively used facilities for the raising and care of animals or poultry shall be subject to the

- approval of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing.
- 4. Any uses permitted in the Residential District shall be permitted in this district.
- 5. Any industrial, commercial or business use, subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment, after a public hearing.

# B. Frontage and Yard requirements

- 1. Frontage: Every dwelling shall have a minimum lot frontage of one hundred and fifty (150) feet, and an area of at least forty thousand (40,000) square feet. Any building lot bordering the shore line of any public lake or pond shall not have less than 75 feet of shoreline.
- 2. Yard requirements: No building shall be located nearer than fifteen (15) feet to an abutter's property line and thirty (30) feet from the edge of any public right of way.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### Business-Commercial District

# A. Use permitted

- 1. Any use permitted in either the residential or the rural-agricultural districts.
- 2. The establishment of retail business including automobile stations, eating and drinking establishments, and personal and professional services, and offices.
- 3. Light manufacturing and wholesaling uses subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing.

# B. Frontage and yard requirements

- 1. Frontage: Same as Article V, B-1.
- 2. Yard requirements: Same as Article V, B-2.

#### ARTICLE VIII

# Non-Conforming Use

When a non-conforming use (existing) of land or buildings has been discontinued for a year, the land or buildings shall be used thereafter only in conformity to this ordinance.

#### ARTICLE IX

## Enforcement

- A. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given the power and authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.
- B. Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Board of Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the superior court or by any other legal action.

#### ARTICLE X

# Board of Adjustment

Within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment of five members, of whom one may be a member of the planning board, conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the Revised New Hampshire Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### Amendments

This ordinance may be amended in accordance with Chapter 216, The Revised New Hampshire Statutes Annotated, 1967, as amended.

#### ARTICLE XII

Penalty

Upon conviction, thereof, every person, persons, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be fined not more than ten dollars (\$10) for each day such violation shall exist.

#### ARTICLE XIII

Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not in any way affect the validity of any other provision.

#### ARTICLE XIV

Appeal Procedure

Any person aggrieved by a decision of the Board of Selectmen made under this ordinance may appeal such decision to the Board of Adjustment in accordance with Chapter 31 of the Revised New Hampshire Statutes, 1955, as amended.

#### ARTICLE XV

When Effective

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

#### PROPOSED

Building Code Ordinance for the Town of Warner, N. H.

As Revised Following First Public Hearing January 6, 1969

For the Protection and Direction of the Location and Construction of Buildings and Structures in the Town of Warner, New Hampshire

#### ARTICLE I

This ordinance is established and governed by the laws of the State of New Hampshire, Chapter 31, Sections 60-89, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and Chapter 156, Sections 1-5, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, and as amended by future laws of New Hampshire.

#### ARTICLE II

- A. No building to be used as a dwelling or for commercial purposes shall hereafter be constructed, moved, or altered except in conformity with the regulations specified for the zone in which such property is situated; nor shall any outside construction of an estimated value of \$500 or more be done without a permit to be issued by the Board of Selectmen or a building inspector. Normal repairs, restoration or improvement, interior or exterior, which do not alter the principal use of a building shall not be deemed to require a building permit. After issuance of the building permit, construction must be commenced within six months, and the exterior completed within two years, except that said board may extend the time upon application.
- B. No permit shall be granted unless the builder will meet the following requirements:
  - 1. Every dwelling shall have a minimum of two (2) easily accessible exits, windows excluded. Any building to be erected or altered for use as rented apartments shall have a minimum of two (2) readily accessible exits, windows excluded, from each apartment.
  - 2. Chimneys shall be constructed of stone, brick, cement, or cinder blocks from the ground upward, and shall be internally lined with tile. Any other chimney construction that is approved by the Board of Underwriters shall be permitted.

- 3. Thimbles: No wall paper or other combustible material shall be laid over any thimble or thimble hole in any chimney.
- 4. No building of wood or other combustible material shall be erected without providing fire stops in every combustible wall or partition, at every floor and between floor joints at every partition.
- 5. Dwellings shall be framed according to good building practices and outside walls shall be covered with permanent materials customarily used, such as wood or fire resistant shingles, sidings, clapboards, brick, stucco, concrete or cinder blocks. Material customarily painted shall be painted or otherwise finished.
- 6. Septic tanks, cesspools, privies, or sewage disposal areas shall conform to state regulations.
- 7. Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor living area of at least five hundred (500) square feet.
- 8. All electrical wiring shall conform to approved methods and practices for safety to life and property. Compliance with the National Electric Code 1965 as published by the National Fire Protection Association shall be prima facie evidence of such approved methods and practices.
- 9. Foundations: All structures shall be set on solid foundations of brick, stone cement or other acceptable materials.

#### ARTICLE III

The Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of five members, of whom one may be a member of the Planning Board. Said Board of Adjustment is to serve without compensation. The Board shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.

#### ARTICLE IV

This ordinance may be amended in accordance with Chapter 156 of the Revised Statutes of New Hampshire 1955 as amended.

#### ARTICLE V

This ordinance does not affect in any way, any dwellings, buildings, trailers, or recorded lots that are existing or under construction at the time of its passage.

#### ARTICLE VI

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be fined not more than ten (10) dollars upon conviction, for each day such violation may exist. Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the selectmen shall, upon their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

#### ARTICLE VII

Any person aggrieved by a decision of the Board of Selectmen made under this ordinance may appeal to the Board of Adjustment in accordance with Chapter 156 of the Revised Statutes of New Hampshire 1955 as amended.

## ARTICLE VIII

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

## ARTICLE IX

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

# REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increases in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted match is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in wood lands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearence of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

## The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To *never* discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal braziers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow

burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.

- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

### REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

The percent of increase in crimes investigated by this Department is in line with figures released by the FBI. All Police Departments request the assistance of the general public by reporting suspicious activities immediately, providing as accurate information as possible. Parents are urged to give more strict supervision to their children, whether they be grade school age or teenagers. Know where your children are, in whose company they are, what they are doing — and, you will save you and your children much grief.

Almost every operator of a motor vehicle is well aware of the increase in traffic on Route 89. Recent traffic checks, at the time when skiers are returning home on Sundays, have shown a traffic pattern of about 1,000 cars per hour, southbound. Eighty-nine has taken its toll of lives in which this Department either investigated or assisted. Sixteen other auto accidents were covered by this Department plus those covered by State Police on this Route.

Four members of Warner Police Department took the first of a series of Federal training courses for enforcement officers and feel they gained a great deal from the sessions.

The officers who serve this community are still faced with the problem of furnishing their own cars while on duty. It does not seem proper that the officers should have to support, personally, their vehicle for Police work.

Just about one year ago, the Federal Communication Commission advised all town Police Departments that the AM radio frequency, issued under license to N. H. State Police, would be cancelled in June 1969. An extension of one year has been granted to allow for the changeover, making our present AM set, the most important piece of equipment we have, obsolete at that time. FCC issued a new FM license and new radio units were installed in State Police and Fish and Game cars during the past year. They have proved to be very satisfactory especially with the elimination of noise and interference. Now, the FCC has issued a new FM frequency for town Police Departments.

There are more than 100 towns and small cities affected by this change, as well as the Sheriffs Departments and other State agencies. As a result of a great deal of consideration, the general consensus was that these divisions stay with the State Police hookup rather than try to do it "on their own." A few of the reasons for this opinion are:

- 1. The new frequency will be covered, as in the past, 24 hours a day. On the new sets, officers can speak directly between cars in the area or to the local base, where installed, as well as to state Police headquarters.
- 2. The frequency is covered by Police personnel who have the necessary knowledge to service the call.
- 3. State Police headquarters have at their fingertips extensive directories and telephone numbers of enforcement personnel, medical services, ambulance and wrecker operators throughout the State, as well as personnel of State agencies.
- 4. State Police technicians install and service the sets on this frequency at no cost to the Town, other than re-

placement parts which are purchased through the State at its yearly contract price.

5. Units purchased through the State are grouped together, giving the Town the benefit of quantity purchase prices.

All the members of Warner Police Department wish to express our sincere thanks to the Selectmen, Fire Department, Highway Department, State Police and local residents who have worked with and co-operated with us, making our job a little easier.

### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The past year's activity of the Warner Planning Board has been directed toward submission of proposed zoning and building code ordinances for consideration at the 1969 Town Meeting. The proposed zoning ordinance was framed with the intent of coming up with a much simpler form than that which was not accepted by the Town Meeting two years ago. Similarly, the building code offered is a very simple one. If adopted, it may well be found that amendments should be made to these ordinances in subsequent years to make them better serve the wishes of the town in keeping Warner the attractive community we feel it is today.

Please note that these ordinances are being placed before the Town in the manner prescribed by New Hampshire law. A properly notified first hearing was held on January 6, 1969. Following it, the Planning Board made rather extensive changes in the text as a result of comments made at the hearing. The texts of the ordinances as printed elsewhere in this report are the revised versions, and these may not be modified except for minor corrections of punctuation or to clarify wording with no change in intent after the second hearing held February 17, 1969. Copies of the final text and the proposed official zoning map will be placed on file with the Town Clerk two weeks prior to Town Meeting and will be posted in the Town Hall on Town Meeting day. The Planning Board sincerely hopes you will vote "yes" on the two questions which will appear on the official printed ballots for the election of town officers as follows:

"Are you in favor of the adoption of the zoning ordinance as proposed by the planning board?"

"Are you in favor of the adoption of the building code ordinance as proposed by the planning board?"
