Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Acworth, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Acworth on Tuesday the twelfth (12th.) day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways and bridges.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of town poor and old age assistance.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for class V roads and raise money for the same.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lights.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on notes on credit of the town, such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for observance of Old Home Day.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of Silsby Free Public Library.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for control of white pine blister rust.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to close the road from the Church to the Corner.

- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept as a gift about five acres of the so called Fisk property in South Acworth as a town dump, the same to be under the supervision of the health officer.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise five hundred dollars to be added to the trust fund for betterment of the Acworth educational system, according to chapter 160, laws of 1943.
 - Art. 17. To determine and appoint the salaries of town officers.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) as partial or complete payment for additional road equipment and instruct the selectmen to borrow balance if more money is needed, a committee consisting of the selectmen, the road agent and two others elected by the voters, be given the authority to decide what equipment is best suited for the town.
- Art. 19. To see what charge if any be made for use of town house.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation for same.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to appoint or elect a road agent at forty-five dollars a week.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the town house.
- Art. 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the twelfth (12th.) day of March 1946, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - Art. 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- Art. 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- Art. 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
 - Art. 9. To see if the District will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars for the purpose of painting one of the school houses.
 - Art. 10. To see if the District will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees (other than those eligible under the Teachers' Retirement System) in the Employees Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by Chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

Art. 11. If the District votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve dollars (\$12.00) for the purpose of providing funds for the district's contribuion to said retirement system for the coming year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Acworth School Board:

I hereby submit my sixteenth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

We have had the good fortune to retain the services of Mrs. Gladys Murdough at the Center and Miss Helen Berry at the South for this year. Both schools are in good condition and the children are making good progress.

The buildings will soon need painting outside and some painting inside, but it is questionable whether too many repairs should be made until we can determine just what is best for the Acworth School District and for its children.

It is becoming more and more difficult to obtain teachers who are able or who are willing to teach rural schools. I believe that Acworth, by paying good salaries will be able to obtain two teachers for her schools during the crisis, but we may have to adopt some radical changes in order to keep the expenses within the limits that will not over burden the citizens. I am going to suggest some rather fantastic plans. I certainly do not advocate any of them at this time, but it would be well for the citizens to study them, as we may be forced by circumstances to adopt one or more of them. There is no doubt that we would like a new school house with two large rooms, situated such as to reduce the cost of transportation, but this is no time to build because of the expense, also because it is impossible to determine what the outcome of the rural school situation is going to be.

We could prepare the South School, using two rooms, thus closing the Center School for one year or we might use the Town Hall together with the Center School and thus close the South School. Perhaps the South School could be used for town purposes. If we really determine to cut down expenses the seventh and eighth grades thus could be taught by the same two teachers. This has been

tried out in Langdon and seems to have given very good results. The difficulty with this is that high school children would then have to board themselves near a high school or provide their own transportation. Another plan would be to furnish a big bus running from East Acworth to Alstead and another from South Acworth to Charlestown or one from the Charlestown line to Alstead and close both schools. It would be cheaper to run to Charlestown, if Charlestown had the school buildings, because the same bus could bring in many of the Charlestown children, also some of the Langdon children, thus cutting down the expense for Acworth. This plan would still provide high school transportation, but it would take all the schools out of Acworth. There are only a few children left in the Derry Hill district, and if the roads are good, a small car would bring them in to the bus in Charlestown. I believe, also, the children from Black North could be brought to that bus.

I hope nothing as radical as that would have to come to pass, but the larger towns are establishing salary schedules so much higher than the rural towns can pay and the legislature has failed to raise funds during the last few years to anywhere meet their obligation to the rural districts, together with the fact that very few girls are attending normal schools and none of them seem willing to prepare to teach rural schools, that some rural districts are bound to find themselves without teachers.

The expenses of school in Acworth have already increased rapidly, as can be determined by studing the report of 1931-32 and the report of this year. In 1931-32 Acworth had five rural schools with the teachers' salaries averaging \$754.00 This year it has two schools with an average salary of \$1200.00. Wood then cost \$9.00 a cord, now \$18.00. I am giving a table to compare other items.

The tuition last year of the seventh and eighth grade and high school was \$2,582.91 and estimated for this year as \$2,822.00. Transportation in 1931 was \$1,076.00. Last year it was \$3,809.00 and this year it is estimated at \$4,245.00.

I have always appreciated the friendliness, help and co-operation of the Acworth School Board and the Acworth citizens.
