THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 10th of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the several highways and bridges.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain State aid on either new construction or town road maintenance.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow paths.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.
9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to purchase new Fire Equipment.

11. To see if the town will vote to accept a deed from Lester A. Colby of the building lot purchased by him from the Exeter Banking Company, but formerly owned by the Danville Building Association, said land to be used as the site of a Public Library Building.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell either at public auction or private sale, any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deed, and until such sale is made to administer such property in the interests of the town.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

14. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the year ensuing.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

I herewith submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

The facts and figures herein presented are for the school year 1940-41, but I shall discuss events which have happened since July 1941, as well as before.

At the time of writing this report, February, 1942, our Country, for the second time in a generation, is engaged in a great war. This war is unlike the first war of 1914-18, which was a war of aggression on the part of a militaristic European nation, involving a number of countries before the Armistice was signed. World War 2 is a world revolution with the major "HAVE NOT" nations, "have not" in the terms of material resources, combined to overpower all the "HAVE" nations, for the purpose of looting and for political domination.

The question arises in our minds, how could a group of nations which were lacking in resources before 1918, and completely disarmed in 1918, ever rise to a position of such tremendous military power in the space of a few short years? The answer is EDUCATION.

A people were sold on an idea that the one way out of their economic want and political instability was through complete subjection to one leader. This is known as the Leader Principle, or the Totalitarian State. Let me urge all of you to read in the February issue of the *Readers Digest*, the article entitled "Educating for Death" by Gregor Ziemer, in which the picture of how the Nazis have been able to build up and maintain their power is ably portrayed.

The above is simply a brief summary pointing to the importance of Education. There are many trite, but true, sayings which have pointed out this truth for many years, such as "As the twig is bent, so is the tree inclined," etc., but we must not fail to heed the lesson which we find in the article, "Educating for Death," and reversing the ugly purposes; but adopting some of the earnestness of the method, start educating our boys and girls for Life in a Democracy.

What I am trying to say is that we must inculcate by precept and example and all of the modern teaching skills available a real enthusiasm for the Democratic Way of Life; a deep and burning patriotism and an undying determination that the basic principles of freedom of speech; freedom of worship; freedom of press; and the equal rights of all before the law, shall be defended unto death.

This type of education can only be done by those who are themselves imbued with a deep feeling for the democratic way of life. This means men and women with character. Hence, it is of tremendous importance that in the stress and strain of fighting this war of wars, we do not lose sight of the importance of the educative process and its meaning in terms of men and women (who are boys and girls today) who will carry on the democracy of tomorrow. We must be careful even if it involves sacrifices on our part, not to lessen the efficiency and effectiveness of our schools. This year the underlying theme of all of the teachers in this Union has been Educating for Democracy, and the devices that have been used by the different teachers in doing this have been many and very interesting. The morning exercises have taken on a new meaning; the pledge of allegiance to the Flag is given with a new reverence; the "Star Spangled Banner" is being sung with a renewed enthusiasm; plays have been given; pieces have been spoken; and in countless ways the meaning of democracy, its great privilege and burdensome responsibilities have been taught. **OLD GLORY IS SHINING WITH A RENEWED BRIGHTNESS.**

Those pupils who are faithful in attendance should have special mention. This honor goes to Bernard Rumery and Donald Duston.
