#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Deering Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways and bridges for the ensuing year, and if the same shall be divided for winter and summer roads.

4. To see what action will be taken concerning the old caterpillar tractor and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Blister Rust control.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$650.00 (six hundred fifty dollars) to defray interest charges on long and short term notes.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to deliver the inventory blanks to residents when assessing.

8. To see if the town will take any action in regards to wages and hours per day for the ensuing year.

9.  $T_0$  see if the town will vote to raise for town road aid the sum of \$631.50, the state contributing \$2702.-87; or the town to raise for state aid construction \$631.50 and the state to contribute \$1262.00. (Only one of these available per year.)

10. To see if the town will vote to raise \$900.00 to cover last year's overrun on expenditures.

11. To see what action the town will take concerning janitor service for town hall and equipment shed.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,250 to cover long term notes. (One of these notes is for \$2,000.00 on the tractor, another for \$250.00 for PWA note.)

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

#### TRUSTEES' NOTICE REGARDING TRUST FUNDS

The Trustees of Trust Funds desire to call attention to the fact that all funds are now bearing interest at 3%, the rate at present prevailing in banks throughout the state. At this rate, a \$100 cemetery fund brings in only \$3 a year. This sum is barely sufficient for the annual upkeep. Frequently lots which require a considerable initial outlay, to put them into proper condition, are turned over to the town. Expenses of regrading, filling in and purchasing grass seed also recur. In view of this the trustees recommend that hereafter the town do not accept a lot for perpetual care until it has been put into good condition. They further suggest that persons desiring to bequeath an amount for care of a lot, should make the sum \$200 rather than \$100, as under present conditions the latter sum is insufficient.

Some questions have recently been asked us about the Gove General Fund. This fund, bequeathed to the town in 1918 by two sisters, natives of Deering, and for many years teachers in the Manchester schools, amounts at present to \$10,500. The principal, \$10,000, is now on interest in the Amoskeag Bank; while the remaining \$500 is loaned to the town. Until this year the loan bore interest at  $4\frac{1}{2}$ %. However, it seemed to the trustees unfair that the town should be charged an interest rate in excess of what the principal is earning, and they have reduced the rate to 3% for the year 1935, with the purpose of continuing at this rate until the rate on the principal is changed.

The interest on the Gove Fund has been used largely for the support of schools, with a small amount for

cemetery work. The bequest carries no restrictions except that it shall not be used for highways or for the payment of town debt. It may not be generally realized that this fund, in the seventeen years of its existence, has already paid into the town treasury between \$7,000 and \$8,000 interest.

#### GENERAL DISCUSSION

The program of studies suggested by the State Board of Education is successfully carried out by our teachers. The schools are furnished with modern textbooks, and scholars' supplies. It is gratifying that Deering has so many children attending high school. We have reached a point in American life which justifies the belief that a high school education should be the minimum preparation for intelligent citizenship.

Intelligence and achievement tests have been administered in the schools in order to discover weaknesses in the children's attainments, and to provide remedies for any unsatisfactory results, and to help the teachers get the utmost cooperation from the pupils for the purpose of attaining one hundred per cent promotions at the end of the year. A democratic theory of education has been emphasized. Our aim is to fit the schools to the interests, needs, and capacities of the children, rather than fitting the children to the schools. The various teachers have presented before the public fine Christmas exercises, school plays, socials, and exhibits. The public has been very responsive thus bringing together the home and the school in the interest of the children.

Parents should not be too anxious to have their children skip grades. The ability to do the work of the next grade is not the only factor to consider. The child who skips a grade misses the work, the information, and the social contacts and development afforded by the year's time spent in the grade. Children who skip grades oftentimes reach high school too immature to get the full benefit from a high school education. Such children leave school so young that they run the risk of having to remain at home with nothing to do.

It is a fact of common knowledge that poor New Hampshire school districts may enjoy equal educational advantages with the more prosperous communities by our system of state aid. Any town which raises five dollars per thousand on the equalized valuation of the district. and does not have sufficient revenue thereby to support its schools, will receive from the state the additional amount necessary to enable the town to run good schools. The state makes up the difference in question on the following items: principals' and teachers' salaries, textbooks, scholars' supplies, flags and appurtenances, other expenses of instruction, janitor service, fuel, water, light, janitor's supplies, minor repairs, medical inspection, transportation of pupils, elementary school tuition, other special activities.

Space does not permit to amplify much on this topic. Only one illustration is given to show how the principle The state has for years approved paying beginworks. ning teachers eight hundred dollars a year, and allowed an increase of fifty dollars a year for several years, until a maximum of nine hundred and fifty dollars is reached. It does not cost Deering any more to hire properly qualified teachers from eight hundred to nine hundred and fifty dollars a year than it does to hire them at less money. Even in these days of depression good teachers are not to be secured at less than eight hundred dollars a year. This year the Deering school board has hired teachers at eight hundred dollars. This increase has caused Deering no financial embarrassment whatever, for the state board of education is actually and incontrovertibly passing the additional money over before June. This applies to other items too. The deficiency appropriation which the school board is obliged to ask for at the annual meeting of the school district is due to the fact that insufficient money was raised a year ago for transportation, elementary school tuition, a wrong estimate on the surplus expected in June 1935, and a failure to receive the full amount promised from trust funds. The school board has left no stone unturned to properly cope with a situation and conditions for which they are not responsible.

The superintendent appreciates deeply the fine response of the teachers, and the school board to everything which he has called to their attention. He rejoices in his opportunity to make a contribution to the educational welfare of the splendid boys and girls of the Deering school district.
