Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of East Kingston, New Hampshire:

It is with pleasure that I submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1951-1952 opened with the following personnel:

Mrs. Eva Philbrick, Teacher of Grades 1-4.

Mrs. Frances Nesbitt, Teacher of Grades 5-8.

Mrs. Eleanor Henry, Teacher of Music.

Mrs. Regenia Matthews, Teacher of Art.

Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse.

There were two changes in the teaching staff as school started. Mrs. Frances Nesbitt of Newmarket replaced Mrs. Pearl Wilbur as teacher of Brown's Academy and Miss Mary Shea replaced Miss Nancy Carnegie as school nurse for Supervisory Union No. 16. Soon after the beginning of the school year Mrs. Philbrick was forced to resign her position because of ill health. After a period of time Mrs. Blanche Loch of Exeter was elected to fill this position for the remainder of the school year. This is a competent staff of teachers who are working diligently to provide good training for the boys and girls.

Mrs. Eva Philbrick's passing in December was a great loss to the town. She had taught at the Pound School for over thirty years and the generations of boys and girls who benefitted by her excellent instruction and example owe her memory an untold debt of gratitude for a job well done.

The Trustees of Brown's Academy weatherstripped the windows and redecorated the classroom last summer. They also voted to pay one half of the cost of the club membership in the film library of the University of New Hampshire to show their continued interest in the Visual Aid program. A new set of Encyclopedias was purchased by the Trustees for the use of students at Brown's Academy

The installation of flush toilets and sinks with running water at the Pound School during the past summer has done much to modernize the facilities of this building.

Schools are really what the citizens make them and the importance of good schools becomes more and more apparent with each passing year. The majority of people desire to have good schools for their children. They want their schools to be wholesome places for learning and growth. They want the surroundings to be safe, comfortable, clean, and attractive. They wish their teachers to be competent instructors, but equally important, to be mature and cultured persons who understand children. They desire classes that are not too large, and classrooms with suitable equipment and supplies.

But does the average citizen want good schools badly enough to do the following:

To help plan and achieve needed improvements? Will he serve on committees and work in the parent-teacher association and in other organizations for the things the schools most urgently need?

To cooperate with our schools? Will he give direct personal assistance, when needed, with various school projects and activities? Will he encourage a wholesome attitude and favorable response on the part of pupils toward the school and its program?

To appraise the schools fairly? Will he ignore petty criticisms that have no valid foundation in facts and help to create and maintain a constructive and helpful public opinion toward education in the community?

To insist on the best possible teachers? Will he give full support to the kind of salary schedule, job security, working conditions and status in the community which will attract and hold the most competent teachers?

To help pay for good schools? Does he understand and expect that good schools cost money, and will he pay the taxes necessary to get them?

It is only as affirmative answers are given to the above questions, that communities can hope to maintain good schools.

There are two problems facing the school district. One is the difficulty in finding qualified teachers who are willing to teach four grades during this period of shortage of elementary teachers.

The other problem is the increasing numbers of boys and girls in the lower grades. At the present time there are thirty-four students at the Pound School and next year the figures indicate that this may increase to nearer forty.

The time may be near at hand when it will be necessary to hire a third teacher and to find facilities for a third classroom. Serious thought should be given to these problems.

I call to your attention the reports and tables which follow. I trust that these will be of interest to you.

I wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board and the teachers for their fine cooperation and support.

Report of the Art Supervisor

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The main objectives of the art program are the development of imagination and creative ability, the encouragement of each child's love of beauty and the greater use of his artistic judgment in his daily life.

An attempt was made to give children experience and training in a variety of mediums so that special talents might be recognized and encouraged.

The children in the first four grades worked with crayons, cut paper, clay, and poster and finger paint. Some very excellent work was produced.

The upper grades discussed color harmony problems, the use of art in daily life, and did some research into the lives of some of our great artists and architects. They worked out a few problems in perspective and in enlarging to scale. As boys love working with tools, several wood working projects were planned for the year. These included making a working drawing, discussions of wood finishing methods and practice in sanding and finishing wood which in later life can be utilized to refinish furniture. They also worked with finger paint, poster paint. crayons and linoleum block designs. In the latter, the group showed a noticeable improvement in technique over the previous year and did some very excellent work.

I wish to express my appreciation to all who have cooperated so splendidly in making this a successful year.

A pre-school clinic was planned for May. However, not enough interest was shown and the clinic was cancelled. It is hoped that in the future this will become a part of the school health program.


Along with the physical observation of the students a health education program was also conducted. Health education is the key to effective school and community action for improved health.

Much group health education goes on informally in relation to day by day living at school. The teachers have cooperated with the school nurse in a variety of ways to help make each child health conscious.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the teachers, superintendent, school board, parents and friends who have helped and cooperated so generously with the work of the school nurse.
