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

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### The State of New Hampshire

**Town Warrant** 

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Enfield qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whitney Hall in said Town of Enfield, on the eighth day of March next at Nine of the clock in the forenoon of said day, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose by ballot and major vote, a Town Clerk, a Selectman for three years, a Town Treasurer, Overseer of the Poor, one Library Trustee for three years, Tax Collector, and one or more Highway Agents. Art<sup>.</sup> 2. To choose by ballot one Trustee for three years and one Trustee for one year for the purpose of holding all trust funds of the town.

Art. 3. To choose by major vote, surveyors of lumber, fence viewers, constables, measurer of wood and bark, weighers of hay and straw, cemetery agents and such other officers and agents as the town may judge necessary to be chosen.

Art. 4. To see what action the town will take in regard to the compensation of the Collector of Taxes and the limitation of time of settlement with the town.

Art. 5. To see if the town will raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges. including maintenance of the poor, salaries and expenses of the town officers, health department, municipal courts, fire department and for fighting forest fires, cemeteries and driving hearse, and the expense of Whitney and Town Halls, Town Clock and other property owned by the town. Art. 6. To see what action the town will take with regard to the election of a police officer or officers, and raise money for the same,

Art. 7. To raise \$199.20, due the State for additional work ordered by the Governor and Council, for the eradication of Blister Rust in the year 1931: Also, to raise \$200.00 for the eradication of Blister Rust for the year 1932.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorise the Selectmen to borrow such sum, or sums of money as they shall deem necessary in anticipation of taxes, and the sum so borrowed to be paid during the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of highways for the ensuing year.

Art. 10 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repair of bridges, including Shaker Bridge, for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Public Library for the ensuing year

Art. 12. To see if the town will take any action with regard to the delivery of blank inventories,

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,500.00 to pay bridge notes due during the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on the town debt, or act thereon. Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,232.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year or act thereon.

Art. 16. To see it the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day or act thereon.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,134.50 for State Aid Construction to receive from the State \$2134.50 or act thereon. Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$4,270.97 for State Aid Maintenance and Trunk Line Maintenance, or act thereon.

Art. 19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to be expended in cutting bushes within the highway, or act thereon.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to impower the Selectmen to purchaser a grader, and raise the money to pay for the same. The amount to be expended, not to exceed \$600.00.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500 00 to accompany \$500.00 to be taken from the money raised under Article 9: said sum of one thousand dollars to be expended, under direct supervision of the Selectmen, in surfacing with gravel such portions of the Class V. highway as they and the state supervisor may approve. Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest under the will of the late Rev. Herbert M. Andrews, it being \$100.00 for care of the grave of his sister Emma in George Hill Cemetery: said sum being already in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds.

Art. 23. To see is the town will vote to authorize the moderator to name a committee to be known as the Finance Committee of fifteen members appointed as of the date of the annual town meeting of each year, or act thereon.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to elect, or authorize the Selectmen to appoint, an agent to sell and transfer the real estate formerly of Wm. H. Hornblower later of Leslie P. Brown, and of Kemp and Benuett as described in deeds of said property to the town of Enfield for the non-payment of taxes thereon.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highways in said Enfield herein after enumerated:

(A) The highway leading from Lockhaven Hill road, to the Choate road, so called:

(B) The highway leading from the 4th. New Hamp-

shire Turnpike, westerly, to the intersection of the road leading by the residence of H. O. Warren:

(C) That portion of the Goodhue Hill road lying southerly of, and adjacent to the property of Henry Smith, and extending sixty feet on the westerly line of the 4th. N. H., Turnpike and eighty-three feet on land of Henry Smith, and is of triangular shape.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sign a certain lease from the Boston and Maine Railroad for the right to maintain a walk under their Bridge No. 92 in order that access may be had to a public wharf located on private land on the Lake side of the tract.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the members of the Twin State Fire Districts Association, relating to the charges and use of fire fighting apparatus, equipment, and personnel of the Association.

Art. 28. Pursuant to a petition of 10 legal voters, to see if the town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot.

Art. 29. To see if the town will purchase a safe for the use of the town Clerk at his residence and raise the money therefore.

Art. 30. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# Superintendent's Report

To the Members of the School Board,

Enfield, N. H.

Gentlemen:

The purpose of this report is almost wholly to explain through you and the press to the public financial matters pertaining to the school board's report and the budget of next year. The financial report accompanying this statement shows a larger balance than usual which was carried over to this year. It was larger than usual because certain expenses for which allowance was made in the budget of a year ago were not met out of the appropriations of that year and were carried over and paid out of the current year's money. These items were in part a portion of the coal bill, not ready for payment at the close of the last fiscal year; a portion of the tuition due to the Plainfield School District for our share of the support of the Methodist Hill School. There were also savings made through the year not anticipated two years ago,-all resulting in a rather large fund of ready cash. By consulting the budget for the present year, herewith presented, it will be seen that most of this balance has been applied to the reduction of the money necessary to be raised this annual district meeting. In fact we have been having favorable experience on the whole in operating our budget for two or three years past, our actual expenditures falling below the amounts which were expected at the time of raising the school money.

The consumption of fuel in the high school building is but little more than used to be experienced in the old and much smaller building with the old system of heating then in operation. This lower fuel consumption is due in part to a more efficient heating system, but a great amount of credit for fuel savings is due to the interest which our present janitor takes in his job and to his skill as a fireman.

It would seem that the items of the financial report sufficiently explain themselves without further comment: probably it would be of more interest to discuss the budget for the ensuing year. In the budget of the ensuing year it will be noticed that a total saving of \$1,500.00 has been effected over that of last year, the amount asked for this year to balance the school board's budget being \$19,000 co. Immediately the question will rise in the minds of interested people; will this amount maintain our schools at their present high level of efficiency? The answer is that we see no reason why it should not do so although it should be plainly understood that we are shaving pretty close to the margin of safety. We are sacrificing pretty nearly all of the cash balance usually carried over to pay the expenses of the schools through the summer months. This of course will not affect us this coming summer but it will during the summer of 1933. Furthermore the district will have to expect to raise more money at the March meeting on 1933 for the next ensuing year or cut into its schools. But all that is another year and perhaps business affairs will take an upward turn by that time.

To take up the detail certain items and means where savings are expected to be made may interest the voting public.

In the first place it is proposed to increase no salaries during the ensuing year. Neither is it proposed to reduce any of the existing salaries now being paid in spite of the fact that certain districts are becoming alarmists over the present situation. New teachers will be hired at a decrease from the salary scale which has heretofore been paid.

We have on hand a considerable stock of Scholars's Supplies which have been bought within the year at low prices which will enable us to reduce expenses a little there,—also less text books will be needed as our equipment has been brought up to a better level than ever before.

Averages of the expenditures in items in which the costs vary considerably year by year have been taken for the past seven years and these averages have been used to forescale our probable expenses in these same items for the year to come, resulting in some saving. Fuel, all but coal, is cheaper; paper stock has reached a new low level. The price of textbooks has not been reduced much but some.

Repairs, under which item come cleaning the schoolhouses, repair of furniture, minor items of property maintenance, have averaged \$481.85 per year for the past seven years but have been entered on our budget as \$400.00. Right here it should be stated that we believe it poor policy not to begin some upkeep repairs on our new school building to prevent deterioration. A little paint in time is a wonderful expense saver later on. However there is the item. An average of \$251.10 has been our cost per year on Insurance over the past seven years, probably a sum well-spent.

In the item of Transportation of Pupils an amount has been allowed which is the present rate of expense. Here it should be understood that no one can foretell what that item may be from one month to another. But we believe it good business policy not to try to forecast this expense for the future but to raise money for what transportation is in sight. If there be any unexpected increase let the district raise it as a deficit at the next annual meeting. In that case we will know exactly how much money is needed and will not have to raise money on taxes in any year in excess of what is needed.

In the item of school nurse we have not allowed as much money as we should. The way our nursing is arranged at present is giving rise in the minds of our school officials to dissatisfaction. We are "sold" to the idea of the school nurse. Our nurses in the past few years have demonstrated the value of school nursing. There is no longer any doubt in the minds of informed people that this money is well spent. But here is the territory over which our present nurse has to spread herself,-Enfield, Canaan, Grafton, Danbnry, Orange, Alexandria, Hill, Sanbornton, and two widely separated schools in Bristol. She has to examine all school children, visit childrens' homes whenever necessary, attend clinics, carry children to hospitals, and a lot more. It simply can't be done with any degree of efficiency. The present nurse reported to me an amount of travel in one day this Fall of over 100 miles. What we need to do is raise enough money for school nurses to enable us to hire a nurse for a fewer number of districts. It may be said here that the state has reimbursed us thus far for all such money we have paid a nurse on account of our elementary schools.
