To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilsum in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Gilsum on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To receive the report of the Budget Committee and take any action thereon.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee for the observance of Memorial Day and appropriate money for same.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the advisability of adopting Zoning regulations and a Planning Board and report at the next Annual meeting with recommendations.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the Gilsum-Alstead road and appropriate money for same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to have the Chief Fire Ward appointed for an indefinite period in accordance with Chapter 110 of the 1945 Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase from the Carrie H. Smith Estate a lot of land on the so-called flat extending from the western line of land now owned by the Gilsum School District in a westerly direction, and vote to raise the necessary money to pay for the same.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Gilsum:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of your school:

For the first time in several years there were no changes in the teaching staff. There is a distinct advantage in retaining teachers over a period of years. They know their pupils better and are able to assist them much more than when they have to spend most of the first part of the year becoming acquainted with them.

It was thought to be better to extend the transportation route to the Belvedere School and bring those pupils into the village than to have them continue to travel to Keene and pay tuition for them. With a few minor changes in the transportation system we should have a first class arrangement.

We wish to thank the PTA for the assistance they have rendered this year, especially in painting the inside of the building, furnishing material for the playgrounds, and supplying athletic goods.

Early in the summer we had an opportunity to obtain a surplus furnace from the Portsmouth Trade School at a very nominal sum. This has been placed in the schoolhouse and takes the place of two smaller units that were nearly worn out. We now have a heating system that is capable of supplying sufficient heat to keep the two rooms it serves comfortable even in the coldest weather.

There are three major projects that should be taken care of as soon as possible. The most important is the replacement of the present toilets. They are a disgrace to the school and the town. They have served about as long as such units usually last, they are practically impossible to keep clean, and they are beginning to crack and come apart.

The second project is one that should have been taken care of many years ago; that is the re-laying of the foundation walls of the older part of the school. There is danger that the corners will fall out quite soon unless steps are taken to remedy the situation. An attempt was made last year to find a capable person to do this work, but time went on and the wall is still unfixed. There is a special article in the warrant to raise money for this purpose. You should give this careful consideration. Unless something is done soon the building may slip from the foundation with resulting damage that could run into several thousands of dollars.

The third project, and one that could well become a community activity, is the painting of the outside of the building. It has been pointed out several times in the past that the paint on some sides of the school is in poor condition. A great deal of repair work will be necessary unless some painting is started before another year or two. In many towns the people have contributed of their time to join in a painting bee to improve the condition of the public buildings. The school-board would supply the materials and the job would be done at a minimum expense to the town.

We have been without the services of a school nurse so far this year. Many of the nurses working in the schools of this state have been on the job for over twenty-five years, or since the formation of the school nursing corps. Consequently they are reaching the retirement age and dropping out of active service. There is a shortage of all types of nurses, but the low rate of pay for school nurses and the high mileage they travel from school to school makes it particularly difficult to obtain women willing to go into the work. Every effort is being made to find a nurse to take over the duties for the ten or so towns in this county that are without one. Meanwhile, we have had a doctor in to make an examination of every

child. We plan to do the same thing a little later in the season. The teachers have made the usual height and weight measurements.

School costs have not reached the limit as yet. Certain items and services have increased rather sharply since last year. Teachers' salaries continue to rise. The average for elementary teachers in this state is about \$2,300. The same average for the nation as a whole is over \$3,000. If a community expects to get good teachers and keep them it must expect to pay them an adequate salary that is comparable to those being paid in other school systems.

High School tuitions will rise rapidly for the next few years. The present state laws have prohibited towns from charging the full cost of high school education. The law states that only the costs of Instruction may be used in figuring tuition rates. These are only four of the eighteen or twenty items that go into a school budget. The actual cost of educating a high school pupil is over two hundred dollars in most secondary schools, running as high as four or five hundred dollars in some of the more expensive ones.

The transportation figure in the school board's budget for next year represents the actual cost at the present time. It is impossible to make any accurate estimate of the state aid figure for next year. There has been some discussion among the legislators of cutting the amount appropriated for this purpose. This would mean that towns like Gilsum would have to raise almost all of their own school costs—a difference of five or six thousand dollars in your budget. The state board of education has introduced a new education program that is designed to improve the educational opportunities in the state, and at the same time to equalize the load that all communities will carry.

Inasmuch as the district has been without a school nurse for the greater part of the year there can be no formal report on her activities such as is usually made here. A dental elinic was held last June.

- 34 pupils were treated and had their teeth cleaned.
- 31 of these had complete care.
- 38 extractions were made.
- 26 temporary fillings were placed and 9 permanent ones.
- It is hoped to have another nurse before too long.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground it not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.
