TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenland in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Greenland School in said Greenland on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at eight of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To hear the report of the Town Clerk on the election of town officers.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid of \$450.00 for the construction and maintenance of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$80.02 for same.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 to spray the trees for extermination of moths and elm tree beetles.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$450.00 for the support of the Weeks Public Library.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of parks and playgrounds.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise the salaries of the Selectmen; the Chairman to receive \$200.00 and the other two members \$150.00 each per annum.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To raise and appropriate for economic advancement of the town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Assoc., in cooperation with other regional communities, a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent of assessed valuation; namely \$82.00

11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by tax sale.

12. To see if the town will adopt the Provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano in this town.

13. To see if the town will vote to have all business places in town closed by 12 midnight. Ony violations of this rule will be prosecuted by town authorities.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for Civilian Defense purposes. This money to be expended at the discretion of the Civilian Defense Director and the Selectmen.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$8,500.00 for the purpose of building a Greenland Fire Station, such sum to be raised through the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in accordance with the provision of the Municipal Bonds Statute, and amendments thereto, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes, and to determine the time and place of payment thereof, under such terms and conditions as they may deem to be in the best interests of the town.

16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to represent the town on the Board of Directors of the Greenland Volunteer Fire Department, Inc., the full board to be the original Board of Directors of said

Volunteer Fire Department together with the three Selectmen.

17. To see if the voters of the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the town (should it be declared within a critical defense area in the future) will vote to give power to the Water Board to make application for a Federal Grant of funds sufficient for extending the town water mains.

19. To see if the town favors or opposes the establishment of a Military Air Base in the Portsmouth-Newington area. (By Petition).

20. To see if the town will direct the Selectmen to communicate with the Secretary of Defense for Air in Washington, D. C., and record with him the vote taken by the voters in regard to the establishment of a Military Air Base in the Portsmouth-Newington area. (By Petition).

21. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

The town of Greenland had a very favorable fire report for the year of 1951. The Greenland truck responded to five chimney fires, one grass fire which required the help of Newington and one automobile fire. A call for aid from Newington was also answered.

In October 1951 the Greenland Volunteer Fire Department was recognized by the Interstate Emergency Unit and voted into the organization as its 35th member. This membership brings to the town, aid from thirty-four surrounding fire departments including the Navy Yard at no cost to the town. Our men attend monthly meetings of the organization at which time they are instructed in modern methods of fire fighting.

It has been rumored that the Greenland truck is not adequate and is badly in need of repair. This is not so. The fire truck is in good fire fighting condition and as far as the inadequacy of the truck it is generally agreed among the neighboring fire departments that the Greenland truck with its large pumps and tank capacity is a valuable piece of equipment where rural fires are concerned. The essentials of a rural fire fighting unit are good pumps, plenty of water and well trained men.

Through the generosity of Mr. Willard Page, Mr. Stephen Vickery and hard work of the members, the truck is now being housed temporarily under Mr. Page's Electric Shop. By means of an ingenious system of canvas curtains, blowers and infra red lamps, we are able to keep the tanks of water from freezing. This is the first winter that we have been able to maintain full fire protection.

All members are insured by a blanket policy held by the department, and also by the New Hampshire State Fire-

men's Relief Association to which most of the members belong.

Through the cooperation of the people of Greenland, the Greenland Volunteer Fire Department has had a very successful year.

REPORT OF THE WATER BOARD

Report No. 3

Since the report of a year ago, much has transpired to change our plans in the attempt to secure financial assistance for extending the water mains within Greenland.

With the coming of the scheduled Bomber Base in near-by Newington there will be created a much greater demand to be thrust upon Portsmouth for water than would be expected under normal conditions and coupled with the loss of several wells that would fall within the Base itself, we have at present but little knowledge of what the engineering plans of the Portsmouth Water Division (the parent owner of the Greenland water mains) may develop into as a result of a population increase within the several surrounding communities.

However any extension of our water mains, in whatever manner they are financed for our town needs will be owned by the Portsmouth system as at present and from which we would purchase water.

We have for more than 6 months visualized the possibility of a population growth here due to the air base and have corresponded with our 2 Senators and Representatives in Washington (during this period of time for the purpose of getting assistance from the Federal Gov.) and they have taken the matter in hand and put us in touch with the Defense Mobilization Administration at Washington and the housing and Home Finance Agency at N. Y. City for this Region. In this manner with their great assistance we may be able to qualify and make application for a grant from the Fed. Gov. to cover the cost of any necessary water mains after the Advisory Committee within the Defense Mobilization Administration have ap-

praised and at such time have declared Greenland as a critical defense area along with Portsmouth, thus making us eligible to apply for a grant.

Our request for funds has been one of the first to be received at Washington. The application for a Federal grant of funds for this purpose must be approved by a vote of the town when as and if this town is declared a critical area, before the application can be made.

Although the Housing and Home Finance Agency handle the funds for Community Facilities such as we require, it is entirely apart from the funds for housing. It is used only for those communities within the approved critical area and who can meet the requirements as established by Public Law 139 of the 82nd Congress as approved on September 1, 1951.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland, New Hampshire:

It is with pleasure that I submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1951-1952 opened with the following personnel:

Mr. Douglas Harlow, Principal and Teacher of Grades 7-8.

Mrs. Marion Kenison, Teacher of Grades 5-6.

Mrs. Lillian Hodges, Teacher of Grades 3-4.

Mrs. Margaret Blakeney, Teacher of Grades 1-2.

Miss Mabel Thaxter, Teacher of Home Economics.

Mrs. Eleanor Henry, Teacher of Music.

Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse.

There was only one change in the teaching staff. Miss Mary Shea replaced Miss Nancy Carnegie as school nurse. Miss Shea has her Master's Degree in Public Health Nursing from Columbia University and for several years she was the head of educational health services at the Engelwood Hospital, Engelwood, New Jersey.

This staff is experienced and competent and it is working diligently to provide good training for the boys and girls of Greenland.

Schools are really what the citizens make them and the importance of good schools becomes more and more apparent with each passing year. The majority of people desire to have good schools for their children. They want their schools to be wholesome places for learning and growth. They want the surroundings to be safe, comfortable, clean and attractive. They wish their teachers to be competent instructors, but equally important, to be ma-

ture and cultured persons who understand children. They desire classes that are not too large, and classrooms with suitable equipment and supplies.

But does the average citizen want good schools badly enough to do the following:

To help plan and achieve needed improvements? Will he serve on committees and work in the parent-teacher association and in other organizations, planning and working for the things the schools most urgently need?

To cooperate with our schools? Will he give direct personal assistance, when needed, with various school projects and activities? Will he encourage a wholesome attitude and favorable response on the part of pupils toward the school and its program?

To appraise the schools fairly? Will he ignore petty criticisms that have no valid foundation in facts and help to create and maintain a constructive and helpful public opinion toward education in the community?

To insist on the best possible teachers? Will he give full support to the kind of salary schedule, job security, working conditions and status in the community which will attract and hold the most competent teachers?

To help pay for good schools? Does he understand and expect that good schools cost money, and will he pay the taxes necessary to get them?

It is only as affirmative answers are given to the above questions, that communities can hope to maintain good schools.

No one can foresee the extent of the impact which the air base may exert upon Greenland. It will certainly be felt and every effort should be made to keep abreast of developments and information as it is released. The schools are filled to near capacity at present and any

sizeable influx of students will cause major school housing problems.

It would seem to be a wise step which the School Board took last September when it applied for general Federal Aid for the School District, for this should place Greenland on the ground floor so to speak as far as future aid is concerned.

New Plus-lite chalkboards were installed in all of the classrooms last summer. These help greatly in increasing the light in the rooms. Also, the coating of the driveways and the area immediately in the rear of the school has improved those surfaces as well as lessening the amount of dust and tracking into the building.

It would greatly improve the playground program if new teeter boards for the younger children and outdoor basketball standards for the older boys and girls could be installed.

It is indeed worthy of note that in the December issue of the State PTA Bulletin a listing was given of the hot lunch programs in the state which had received a rating of 75 or better. Greenland was tied with one other school at the top of the list with a rating of 90. This is certainly a fine tribute to Mrs. Mary deRochemont and her assistants for the excellence of the hot lunch program.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues its active interest in the school. The assistance given in the audio-visual program and the part played in the hot lunch program deserve notice.

Few building custodians take as much interest and pride in their work as does Mr. J. Adams deRochemont. He should be commended for his untiring efforts in keeping the building clean and sanitary.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which fol-

low and trust that these will be of interest to all parents and citizens.

I wish to thank the citizens of Greenland, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their fine co-operation and support.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure that I submit this annual report of the principal of the Greenland School.

There has been only one change in the staff from last year. The School Nurse for Supervisory Union No. 16 is now Mrs. Mary Shea who replaces Miss Nancy Carnegie. Mrs. Margaret Blakeney continues in her position as teacher of grades one and two; Mrs. Lillian Hodges in grades three and four; Mrs. Marion Kenison in grades five and six, Douglas Harlow in grades seven and eight, Mrs. Eleanor Henry, music, and Miss Mabel Thaxter, home economics.

The school plant is in exceedingly good condition. During the summer new boards were installed that do much toward brightening the rooms and are much more useable. In addition our bulletin board space has been increased which is a marked improvement. A bulletin has been installed in the auditorium for both school and public use. The graduating class of 1951 purchased an electric clock for the auditorium as a class gift.

The school has carried on activities in various fields of endeavor for children at all levels. During the winter a music and dance festival was produced by all grades for the public. As usual all grades participated in the annual Christmas program. The track meet and lawn fete was held in June with all grades having some sort of activity. During the year several programs were held for the children to help promote social development. Athletic contests were held with other schools. These included, besides the track meet baseball and football games for the boys and girls. A play and supper for the benefit of the seventh and eighth grades was held to

help defray the expenses of graduation. Class trips and picnics were held for all the grades in June.

The Parent-Teacher Association has again appropriated a sum of money to obtain films from the University of New Hampshire for our visual aid program. We are indeed fortunate to be able to afford the outstanding visual aid program which we have.

The Hot Lunch program continues to be sponsored by the P. T. A. and is continuing its fine work. Nearly all the pupils are now taking lunches at school. Our Hot Lunch program rates with the best in the state. Mrs. deRochemont and the parents are to be commended for helping to make the project so successful.

The seventh and eighth grades have produced a year book of school activities and graduation. The book contained nine pages of printed material and twenty-three pages of pictorial material.

The schools of our American Communities belong to the people. It is through their efforts, interest, and sacrifices that the schools become the working tool of democracy. This democratic spirit is truly exemplified in the parent participation in our schools. It is vital that this spirit continues to grow if we are to have the greatest nation in the world, for from such small communities as Greenland the beginnings of this spirit comes.

The cooperation of the School Board, the superintendent of schools, members of the faculty, and the student body has been sincerely appreciated.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

January 1, 1951 - December 31, 1951

In March, the school children received the tuberculosis patch test under the supervision of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association. The positive reactors were checked by x-ray and all were negative for active lesions.

A pre-school clinic was held in May at the school. Members of the P. T. A. assisted with this clinic. It is hoped that in the future this will continue to be a part of the school health program.

Along with the physical observation of the students a health education program was also conducted. Health education is the key to effective school and community action for improved health.

Much group health education goes on informally in relation to day by day living at school. The teachers have cooperated with the school nurse in a variety of ways to help make each child health conscious.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the teachers, superintendent, school board, parents and friends who have cooperated so generously with the work of the school nurse. It has been a pleasure to work with you.
