SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The selectmen, in submitting their report for 1931, wish to call the tax payers' attention to some excess expenditures, which in their opinion were necessary.

Town Maintenance:

An excess expenditure of \$583.51 was created by the Sanborn Bridge, for which no appropriation was made. The bridge, it seemed impracticable to repair, was rebuilt. The abutments were taken down to solid foundation and then relaid in cement, using heavy stones. The top was reinforced concrete, using railroad rails and heavy woven wire for the reinforcement. The bridge being four feet wider caused an extra lot of grading.

Town Hall:

The excess expenditure of \$147.72 was made in repairing the slate roofs of the Town Hall and Library.

South Road:

The unfinished part of this road being in bad shape, due to unseasonable weather conditions and with only \$70 left of the appropriation, the selectmen were able, with the help of the road agents in getting four trucks and some shovelers to work at half-price, two thirds of the gravel was given and twelve men gave their time, to get the job done for \$87.79, making an overdraft of only \$17.16.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Hampton Falls:

By vote of the School District Meeting of 1931 the East School has been remodelled into a two-room building, lighted and heated according to the best modern practice and conveniently arranged as to entrance and coat room. Two trained teachers are now employed by the district, each instructing three grades. The excessive teacher-load has in this way been abolished.

We expect, and are now receiving better work on the part of the pupils as a result of the improved physical plant.

Our children are now brought to school in a comfortable automobile, taught by two Normal School graduates, housed in a healthy and modern building and returned to their homes in the same vehicle. More and more the health of our children is being guarded by public and school officials. The school board of Hampton Falls is fulfilling its obligations in this regard by employing a trained nurse for your schools. We were very fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Dolbec, who has done such satisfactory work in several near-by towns. The worth of her services to the school children is far in excess of the cost entailed. She visits the schools regularly every two weeks to ascertain the physical condition of all pupils, to see that the health condition of the school room are suitable and to make what home visits are necessary. She is on call at all times of school emergencies. Mrs. Dolbec has always secured the co-operation of townspeople in her work and I am sure Hampton Falls is no exception.

The Stanford Achievement Tests have been administered in your schools this year. These consist of ten different tests in the fundamental subjects. The tests show your school to be doing standard work. Especially good is the arithmetic standing. In order that our work in literature may be still further improved, I am asking you to consider the advisability of appropriating fifty dollars in the present budget for school

library books. With this money, spent in carefully selected books, an improvement will be easily secured.

The children in our schools are not as good readers as they should be. This is true of the nation as a whole. One of the reasons for this has been found to be a rather weak method of presentation of this subject in the first grade, where the reading habits are established. "Word calling" is not understanding reading. To correct this weakness an improved method of introduction has been established. By this method children meet unified ideas before they come into contact with separate words. I wish to recommend that this method be introduced into Hampton Falls next year. A meeting of all primary teachers of the Union was held in Hampton on February 15, 1932. At this meeting, this approved method was carefully explained and illustrated; with this introduction Miss Whiting will be prepared for the work of the course. I hope the parents of next year's first grade pupils will watch carefully the progress of their children in this work.

A visitor to the school cannot be otherwise than pleased with the improved morale of the school. Control has been strengthened, but more important than this, a spirit of co-operation and mutual helpfulness between teacher and pupil is in evidence. It is such a morale that accomplishes results. I wish to congratulate the school board and teachers upon this achievement.

For your support and advice I wish to thank you. For the co-operation of the teachers and the friendship of the boys and girls I now express my appreciation.
