TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1935

TOWN OF HAMPTON
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the town of Hampton, in the county of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, moth department, health department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day,

parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.

Article 5. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 6. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class 11 road known as Mill Road, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$2,720.

Article 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing land from the Town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent or taxes, or both.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to approve the following ordinance: Athletic games and athletic sports may be played on Sunday in accordance with Chapter 155, Laws of 1931, provided such games and sports are conducted at such places and times as are approved by the Selectmen.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to regulate the digging of clams within the town limits, to make reasonable rules and regulations restricting the sale and consumption thereof, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue permits in accordance with such regulations.

Article 11. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to purchase land for cemetery purposes and raise and appropriate money for same.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 163 of the Public Laws of 1926 or any amendment thereto relating to licensing the sale of milk and cream.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2000. to resurface and oil the streets from North Shore Hotel to Taybury Arms Hotel.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500. for building and widening of bridges on the Landing Road.

Article 15. To see what action the town will take on the following items:

A. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the completion of the Water Hole on the Towle Road for fire purposes.

B. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for Fire Plug Pipe to be installed at the Water Hole on the Exeter Road opposite Hall's.

C. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for Fire Plug Pipe to be installed at Car Barn Pond.

D. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for Maintenance of the Fire Alarm.

E. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for Repairs and Equipment.

F. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$3000 for a new Ladder Truck for the Town Fire Station and raise \$1500 for first payment in 1935 and raise \$1500 plus interest in 1936.

G. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for a fire alarm box at the Landing.

H. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for a fire alarm box at or near Frank E. James' residence

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to use a part of the Highway Department funds to oil the roads in Surfside Park, and instruct the Selectmen to investigate the matter of the continuance of Viking Street beyond the present dead end, in Surfside Park.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to fence in the storage tank at the disposal plant.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount of 3% on all taxes on real estate paid prior to August 1, 1935.

Article 19. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred dollars to re-imburse Alfred and Grace M. Rosser for moving house to improve corner on Park Avenue.

Article 20. To see what action the town will take on the following items:

A. AUTHORITY TO ENTER PREMISES. The Chief of the Fire Department or any member of the fire department designated by him as an inspector may, at all reasonable hours, enter any building or premises for the purpose of making any inspection.

B. Whenever any such officer or member shall find in any building or upon any premises or other place, combustible or explosive matter or dangerous accumulation of rubbish or unnecessary accumulation of waste paper, boxes, shavings, or any highly flammable materials, and so situated as to endanger property, or shall

find obstructions to or on fire escapes, stairs, passageways, doors or windows, liable to interfere with the operation of the fire department, or egress of the occupants, in case of fire, he shall order the same to be removed or remedied.

C. Chimneys shall extend at least three feet above the highest point at which they come in contact with a roof of the building and at least two feet higher than any ridge within ten feet of such chimney. They shall be properly capped.

D. SMOKE PIPES. Smoke pipes shall enter the side of chimneys through a fire clay or metal thimble or flue-ring of masonry. No smoke pipe shall pass through a floor, nor through a roof unless such roof is of fire-proof construction or of semi-fireproof construction.

E. FIREWORKS. A permit from the Chief of Fire Department is required for the sale and storage of fireworks. Definition. The term "fireworks" as used in this article refers to firecrackers, rockets, torpedoes, roman candles, toy pistols, toy cannons, detonating canes, blank cartridges and other devices designated and intended for pyrotechnic display.

F. BONFIRES. No person shall burn or cause to be burned any trash, lumber, leaves, straw or any other combustible material in any street, alley, or vacant lot, without a permit from the Chief of the Fire Department, when such burning shall be done in screened metallic receptacles approved by him and under such proper safeguards as he may direct.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Item F. Motion: To adopt this item and have inserted "When feasible."

Was Voted.

Article 21. Resolution to Mr. Tuck of Paris was read by Harry D. Munsey.

Motion: To adopt resolution.

Was Voted.

Resolution: That the selectmen be instructed to send to the Hon. Edward Tuck of Paris, France expressing the deep appreciation of the Town of Hampton, N. H. for his municipal gift resulting in the development of the Park and athletic field commonly known as "Tuck Park."

Motion: By John A. Janvrin. I hereby move that the Town adopt the following resolutions, and that the Town Clerk send a copy of the same to Mr. Everett, Highway Commissioner for the State of New Hampshire

Resolved: That it is the opinion of this Town meeting that a highway should be constructed from the Tide Mill Road, so called, in Hampton, across the marsh to Glade Path and from Glade Path along the present sewer pipe

line to the Hampton River Toll Bridge, because

1. A new traffic artery leading to Hampton Bridge is badly needed.

2. It would provide a direct route over the Hampton River Toll Bridge.

3. It would open up a large section of territory for building both permanent and summer residences and thereby increase the taxable property which would benefit both the Town of Hampton and the State of New Hampshire.

Motion: To have record of this meeting published in next Town Report.

The Town Adopted The Following Ordinances Relating To The Digging Of Clams

Section 1. The selectmen shall have the power to determine what section of the clam flats shall be opened for digging and what section shall be closed and may from time to time open or close such sections as they shall determine.

Section 2. On such closed areas they shall cause to be erected a notice to that effect and no person shall dig any clams in any such closed area.

Section 3. Any person before digging clams shall be required to obtain from the selectmen a permit.

Section 4. No person shall take, carry away, buy or sell any clams measuring less than two inches in length from one extremity to the other from the flats or creeks situate within the boundaries of the Town of Hampton, and more than ten such clams less than two inches in length shall constitute a violation of this regulation.

Section 5. No person shall at any one day, take, carry away, more than two bushels of clams from the flats or creeks within the boundaries of the Town of Hampton.

Section 6. No permit shall be issued except to a resident or a non-resident property tax payer of the Town of Hampton.

Section 7. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars.

This ordinance shall take effect upon its adoption.

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1936

TOWN OF HAMPTON

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday the Tenth day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, moth department, health department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Justice of the Municipal Court to appoint a Clerk for the

same and also provide reasonable compensation for both the Justice and the Clerk.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing land from the Town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent or taxes, or both.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote a discount of 3% on current year's taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1936.

Article 9. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to buy land for a gravel pit.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to finish the construction of the main sewer pipe line to White Island and to borrow a sum not exceeding \$30,000, and to issue and sell in connection therewith notes or bonds of the Town of Hampton in the principal sum of \$30,000 in accordance with Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire as amended, payable in equal annual installments of \$5,000 each, the first installment to be payable one year from date of issue, the time and place of payment, rate of interest, and all other matters in connection therewith to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, if they deem it advisable, to make an application to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works for a grant to aid in the construction of the main sewer pipe line, and to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper or advisable, in connection therewith, and

to accept in the behalf of the Town of Hampton any and all offers in connection therewith.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in co-operation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$500.00.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.) for a Flag pole at Young's Corner to replace the old one blown down, requested by Mrs. Emma Young.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote for an extension of the Whiteway lights beginning at the Town Hall, Delancey's Corner, Young's Corner and Elmwood Farm, requested by Mrs. Emma Young.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in conjunction and co-operation with the Trustees of the Tuck Memorial and Historical Association, to administer the Tuck Memorial Park and Historical Association and the Tuck Athletic Field as one project; the house to be used as a residence for the caretaker as part of his salary, and the balance of the expense to be taken from the appropriations for Parks and Playgrounds and to raise and appropriate, if necessary, such additional sums for the expense of the above project.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote the entrance fee to the sewer from \$50.00 to \$10.00 to enter, and \$10.00 a year until the total sum of \$50.00 has been paid.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

All of the physical examination of the school pupils of the Centre School and the Hampton Academy were completed during September and October by our school physician, Dr. A. M. Fernald.

Last spring the dental clinic under Dr. Hanrahan showed considerable increase over that of the year previous. Each year more and more children are realizing the advantage of preserving their teeth.

During the last week of school in June we were especially fortunate in being able to have the audiometer come to us from the State Board of Education. We used this machine to give a scientific hearing test of the children of the Centre Schools and Academy. This was very advantageous in determining the actual hearing loss in pupils with defective hearing.

In June we held our annual Child Health Conference with which we combined a pre-school Toxoid clinic. This was put on under the supervision of Katherine O'Riely for the N. H. State Department Infancy, Maternity, and Child Hygiene. Many immunizations against diphtheria were given besides a physical examination to all of the children that attended. A more detailed report of this conference will be found elsewhere.

Since my last report I have taken patients to the Tuberculosis and Underweight Clinic in Portsmouth, which is held under Dr. Kerr. I am pleased to say that we have not found any active cases among those I have taken to the clinic. I have also made numerous trips to Manchester to take pupils to the Mental Hygiene Clinic which is sponsored by the State Board of Health.

This year I have taken advantage of a Boston University Extension Course on Modern Health Habits which I hope may be of mutual benefit to myself as well as to those I serve.

National Child Health Day was celebrated on May 1st by having an outdoor parade of all the pupils of Hampton. The school band led the colorful procession which represented the special activities in the school. The pupils also carried health slogans and posters of various kinds.

I was on duty at the beach for the annual Children's Day last July.

There have been many inquiries in regard to the Cod Liver Oil which has been provided through Federal Funds. For the benefit of those who have been interested in obtaining it I regret that we do not have any more. It was a great help while it lasted and I know it was much appreciated by those who used it.

During the year we have had several outbreaks of communicable diseases which have played havoc with our attendance at school. The diseases which we have been unfortunate enough to have include chicken pox, whooping cough, German measles, measles and mumps.

There has not been any work this last year for either the John Hancock Life Insurance Co. or the Metropolitan Insurance Co., therefore no fees were collected from this source. The few district fees that I received will be noted elsewhere in this book.

In January I had charge of the Parents and Teachers Health Night. There was a short entertainment by some of the pupils which was followed by an address from Mrs. Mary Davis from the State Board of Health in Concord.

Another year has closed and I wish to thank not only the town officials, School Board, and faculty but every citizen of Hampton for the splendid cooperation and understanding that has been given me. That I may serve your desires more fully I solicit your suggestions and criticisms that we may work out a more united service for the benefit of every one concerned.

LIBRARY REPORT

TRUSTEES' REPORT

Approximately ten thousand books are printed in the English language each year. It is self-evident, therefore, that only a small number of these books can be purchased by a library the size of our own. Nor is it necessary. The great majority of books published are of little interest and are soon forgotten. Our appropriation permits us to purchase only about four hundred volumes, but we try to make these the most outstanding and representative. That we succeed fairly well is evidenced by the fact that of the ten best sellers listed for 1935, nine are on the shelves of our library.

The trustees have paid considerable attention in the past three years to strengthening the reference department of the library. They believe that the object of a public library is not alone to furnish reading for recreation, but to provide a considerable number of books that will add to the reader's fund of knowledge. The reference library is well supplied with these books. During the year we have added The International Library of Music, in fourteen volumes, and the new Columbia Encyclopedia, pronounced the best single-volume encyclopedia in existence. We are glad to report that a large and increasing use is made of the reference library by the pupils in our schools.

Owing to the fact that we have been confronted with no special expenditures this year, the trustees have been enabled to open the library one additional afternoon and evening each week during the winter months. The experiment has been a success. There seems to be no other place in town where the evenings can be passed so

pleasantly and profitably as in our warm and well-lighted reading room, and we are glad that so many have availed themselves of the privilege. Besides books of reference the reading room is well supplied with the most representative papers and magazines.

The library has been remembered by friends in the year that is past. The Hampton Garden Club has brightened the reading room with contributions of flowers. Mr. Wheaton J. Lane has contributed a fine steel engraving of the Venus of Milo. And our dear friend, Miss Ida M. Lane, whose modesty never permitted her many good deeds to be known while she was with us, remembered the library in her will with a legacy of \$500. For all these acts of friendliness and thoughtfulness, the trustees are deeply grateful.

In the selection of books the trustees are not unmindful of their moral responsibility to the community. It is apparent to all that the high moral standards of the past have been lowered and that practices are permitted that would not have been tolerated a generation ago. Books are published and widely circulated with a frankness of details that shock even the sophisticated. While we realize the fact that we are not purchasing volumes for a Sunday school library, and must tolerate books that contain offensive passages, yet we are careful to add no book whose trend is distinctively evil, and we try to select books that are wholesome and to discard those which are corrupting and debasing. We return many books that, after careful reading, seem out of line with our ideals. Our purpose is to make the Hampton Public Library one of the most helpful influences in the community.

Although some librarians report a decrease in circulation due to the knitting fad, I am happy to report an increase of 1,620 in book circulation and 558 in magazine circulation over last year.

During the months of December and January the Library has been open three days a week. This has been of great advantage to many, especially to pupils in the schools, and has helped to relieve somewhat the congestion on Wednesday afternoons. It is my hope that it can be continued throughout the year.

Several books have been rebound, among them the 4-volume set of New Hampshire Genealogy, the 10-volume set of Civil War Books and the Revised Register of the

Soldiers and Sailors of New Hampshire in the War of the Rebellion.

Book Week in November was observed by the display of the poster "Reading for Fun", and an exhibition of new juvenile books. Reading lists, entitled, Reading for Pleasure, were distributed.

To the members of the Garden Club, who added to the attractiveness of the Library by supplying flowers for the tables in the reading room, go sincere thanks and appreciation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton :

I herewith submit to you my annual report as superintendent of your schools. It will summarize in general the outstanding achievements and activities of the schools of Hampton during the year from July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1935—the last completed school year. In addition some mention will be made of activities during the first half of the current year. The arrangement of last year whereby the school report was included in the Town Report met with favor. We are therefore following the same procedure this year. Incorporated herein will be the recommendations of the Headmaster of the High School, the Principal of the Centre School, the Supervisor of Music and the School Nurse. Copies of these reports are on file in the office of the school board.

A noted educator has said, "We spent the past fifty years in carefully grading our children, we shall spend the next fifty years in as carefully ungrading them." This grouping was done as an economy measure—economy in financing and economy in organization. But it is highly erroneous to believe that there are but eight different groups of children in our schools. In fact, as scientists tell us there are no two plants alike so there are no two children just alike. We shall probably have to continue the nomenclature of grades and classes but the modern teacher considers each child as an individual apart from his classification.

Each child has his own personality, his own problems, his own joys and sorrows. To the modern teacher your child is not a certain card kept in a certain file, with cer-

tain mathematical figures representing a definite number of problems solved to a certain percentage of completion, toward a certain definite objective called 100%. Teaching is not an exact science. We have advanced far from the day when definite rules were made equally applicable to all children. To be sure, that is the easiest way—but it is at the same time the most unjust. The modern teacher is a sympathetic friend of her pupils. The teacher studies her pupils' emotional, cultural, social and mental reactions and conforms her procedure in the school to the fine gradations she sees in the children. One child requires encouragement, another sympathy, a third commands, another the opportunity for leadership, another training as a good follower and so on. It is the duty and the pleasure of the teacher to accommodate her method of procedure to each of the forty or more children that come daily in contact with her.

Hampton has paid too little attention to the physical health of its children. During the past year we have supported football, baseball and basketball teams in the Junior and Senior High Schools. These have been successful and of benefit to those participating. There should be, however, a definite program of physical activities engaged in by all pupils. There should be daily corrective exercises for those in need of them.

Hampton lacks a gymnasium. The school district, as soon as money is available, should furnish a suitably equipped building for this work. Such a building need not be expensive but value received in terms of the health and development of our children would be more than commensurate with the cost. Our baseball, football and basketball teams are good for those taking part in these activities but the weakness in our present system is that only the physically strong and the athletically inclined

are attracted to the teams. We need athletics of such a large variety that all pupils can and will participate and benefit accordingly.

I recommend that a definite health program be introduced into the schools of Hampton—one which will offer a connected and uniform progress from grade to grade. We are doing much in this direction but it now follows a more or less disintegrated pattern, with considerable needless repetition. Such a program as suggested would abolish plateaus of non-learning in this important work, as they have been abolished in the more formalized subjects.

During the past few years definite progress has been made in our work in music by the introduction of accredited courses in Music Appreciation. This work has been introduced into the junior and senior high schools. It is the recommendation of Mrs. Coombs, our music supervisor, that this should be carried down into the grades. The results of this work would be worthwhile and I believe, can and should be introduced as soon as possible. Mrs. Coombs has instilled into our pupils above the sixth grade a love of good music that will be of value to them throughout their lives. I see no reason why the lower grades should not also have the benefits of music appreciation work.

The school band is, this year, under the direction of Mrs. Coombs, who is doing an acceptable piece of work under several handicaps. A lack of interest on the part of the pupils seems to have developed. As in all school problems, we must depend upon the parents for help in this matter. It is impossible that a small school should always have outstanding musical organizations but, with the right stimulus, interest should always be keen and active.

Last year we sent to the All-State Orchestra at

Laconia, a large representation. Hampton sent the only oboe, and there was only one other Bassoon. All our pupils deserve credit for the manner in which they took part in that event. Several pupils attended the New England Festival Concert at Lowell, Massachusetts, last May. It consisted of a joint Concert by Orchestra and Chorus. Pupils from Hampton entered the Orchestra. This year, in March, at Springfield, Massachusetts, the New England Concert will consist of Orchestra, Band and Chorus numbers. Hampton will be represented by six players, in the Orchestra, three players in the Band, and five singers in the Chorus.

HAMPTON ACADEMY AND HIGH SCHOOL

Hampton Academy has taken at least two definite steps to advance its value to the pupils enrolled.

The school now has a SubMaster whose special interest is the supervision of athletics for our boys. He is particularly well prepared for this work. The results of his endeavors are shown by the increased interest on the part of the boys in striving for clean, well-earned victories in their various contests. A school with a healthy attitude toward athletics is, by so much, a better school.

The public school has often been criticized as an ultra-conservative institution. It has been said that its programs reflect the thinking of the past rather than of the present. As an attempt to keep our thinking in the present we have introduced into the high school program a course in Sociology. As developed, this is strictly a course dealing with modern social conditions and with modern thinking. It gives the pupil an opportunity to look about him and study, in an elementary way, the problems of the complex social organization as he sees it from day to day. We believe it is a valuable addition to

the school program. It has received, in 1935, favorable comment from citizens and school authorities.

Following modern educational thought the Academy has established the policy of double standard of graduation. This in no way means a lowering of standards but rather a raising of them. The school is now insisting that each pupil use all of his ability rather than simply acquire a certain mathematical average. Honest and earnest endeavor and an achievement proportional to the pupil's ability is now the price of graduation. Occasionally a pupil will fulfill these requirements who might not be able to do the work of the college as now organized. Such a pupil will be graduated but he will clearly understand his lack of aptitude for the work of a standard college. This change is strictly in accord with the recommendations, not only of our own State Department of Education but with most educators.

A school is often judged, justly or unjustly, by the progress of its graduates as they enter other schools. Graduates of Hampton Academy are now attending Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Burdett College, in Lynn; Chamberlain School, Boston; Virginia Military Institute and University of New Hampshire. One of these students has been constantly on the Deans list at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. At the Burdett College Hampton pupils have won highest standing in Typewriting and Rapid Calculation. The work of our graduates at Chamberlain, Virginia Military Institute and New Hampshire University is outstanding. Hampton Academy is to be congratulated upon the thoroughness of its training.

THE CENTRE SCHOOL

At the Centre School there is the same staff of teachers that has done such consistently good work during the past

three years. In the Junior High School there has been some variation in the subjects taught by certain teachers. We are therefore including the names of the teachers with their subjects, as part of this report.

Mrs. Esther B. Coombs: Music in all grades; Chorus; Glee Club; Music Appreciation; Orchestra; Band.

The uniform increase in enrollment, evident through the past years continues. The fall enrollment of 1934 was 258 while this fall the pupils number 267. This gradual increase in numbers points toward the time when Hampton must engage an additional teacher in the grades.

It has long seemed to us that the subject of Algebra is a strictly college preparatory study and that for the

pupil who will not later attend college this work is of little value. We have, for this reason, presented a course in general mathematics for the non-college group but have also kept Algebra in the curriculum for any pupil desiring it. General Mathematics offers to the ninth grade pupils further training in Arithmetic and its applications.

The ability to sit around a common table with those of varying opinions and discuss calmly and diagnose accurately a subject of importance to all, must be cultivated in the citizens of tomorrow. We are attempting to train our pupils in this ability by adopting a form of procedure called the panel recitation. In this method a common subject for discussion and examination is assigned to the group. Around the common table each pupil presents his opinion of the subject under discussion, giving his reasons therefore. After all individual opinions are heard, the group, as a whole, weighs the worth of each argument and attempts in this way to arrive at the thoughtful conclusion of the entire group. Thus the pupils learn how to present their own opinions and how a group of personal views becomes public opinion. The results are two-fold—a respect for the importance of matured private beliefs and also a willingness to recognize the opinion of others and to respect the final opinion of the group. I believe this is valuable training for the future citizenship.

Figures compiled by the State Board of Education give us the Current Costs of Education in Hampton for the year 1934-1935, the last completed school year. The per pupil cost for the Hampton Elementary schools was \$102.25. This is the total cost and includes payment of debt and interest as well as the net per pupil cost. The Junior High per pupil cost is \$108.93 or a net cost of

\$99.80 when debt and interest charges are deducted. When it is realized that the average high school cost is \$99.45 it is evident that Hampton education is costing very near the average of the state.

When cost is stated on a valuation basis, that is cost per \$1000. of valuation, Hampton is unusually fortunate. Of the 238 towns in the state maintaining schools, Hampton stands eighth from the lowest in its school costs.

As a school board you have been always helpful to me in the duties of my office, and watchful for the welfare of our pupils. I wish to express my appreciation for this. The schools of Hampton should be, and I believe are, a source of pride to the citizens of the town. With your continued guidance we shall maintain our place in the forefront of New Hampshire schools.
