TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Wells Memorial School in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at three of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Eighty Five Dollars (\$280.00) as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to be placed in a sinking fund for the replacement of road equipment under provision of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943 Chapter 160 as amended.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) to have a street light installed at the bridge near the Herbert Young residence at Lake Skatutahkee.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to widen and improve the upper end of Halpin Hill.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the dedication of the Sunset Beach. This money to be used with funds already donated for this purpose.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$175.00) to cover its share of Memorial Day Services with the Coutts-Croteau Legion Post of Marlboro, N. H.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$175.00) to be used for the purchase of a Walkie Talkie radio for the Forest Fire Department.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the limited zoning ordinance relating to Silver Lake and Lake Skatutahkee as proposed by the committee authorized by the voters of said Town of Harrisville at the annual meeting held March 11th, 1958.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new Hough Payloader complete with bucket and hydraulic wing at a price not to exceed Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$16,500.00) including the present Town owned payloader. The amount to be raised as follows: Thirty Five Hundred Dollars to be taken from the sinking fund, Three Thousand Dollars to be raised in 1959 and the balance at the rate of Twenty Five Hundred Dollars per year for four years thereafter.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3.000.00) to be used for a complete overhaul of the present Town owned payloader.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept a tract of land from Ralph Bemis for the sum of one dollar. This land to be used for a fire station.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of constructing a new fire station. This being a contract price for the building less cement floor and chimney and to be constructed on land mentioned in Article 14 above.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to be used to move the present fire station in Chesham to land mentioned in Article 14 above.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) received from Mrs. Frank S. Wright for the care of the Frank S. Wright cemetery lot.
- 18. To hear reports of Agents, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH 11, 1958

The day was a beautiful spring like day. Moderator Ralph B. Bemis called the meeting to order at 1:12 P. M. Ballot Clerks appointed by the Moderator, John Priest and Virginia Bates, Assistants in marking Jennie Main and Rita Rathburn. Warrant read by the Moderator and the polls opened for voting by the Australian Ballot.

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Police Officers: Leo P. Dion, qualified; Frank M. Bates, Jr., Sterling Chamberlain. Trustees of Trust Funds for 3 years, Guy W. Thayer. Fire Wards, John J. Colony, Jr., Leo P. Dion, and Ralph J. Clark, qualified; Leonder St. Peter, Robert A. Walker, Justin B. Chamberlain and Wm. F. Bemis.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Harold W. Pope and Wm. P. House, qualified.

Fence Viewers: Harold W. Pope and Ralph B. Bemis.

Overseer of Poor, motion made and seconded to leave this in the hands of the Selectmen. So voted.

Harrisville Beach Committee: Harold W. Pope, Dr. George Stewart, Mrs. John J. Colony Jr., qualified, Arthur Wikman, qualified, John T. Marnell, qualified.

Chesham Beach Committee: John Oja, Wm. K. Hope, Roy Williams, all qualified.

Library Trustee for 3 years: Mary Thayer, qualified.

Memorial Day Committee: Francis Parker, Ernest Chamberlain, John T. Marnell, all qualified.

Voted to take up Art. 3 before Art. 2.

- Art. 3. To determine and appoint the salaries of Town Officers and fix the compensation of any other agent of the town. Motion made and seconded to increase the election officers' salaries to \$10.00 per meeting and to set the selectmen's salaries at \$300.00 each per year. Voted to accept and so declared.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Voted to accept as printed except to increase the amount for Town Officers salaries to \$2,100 and Election and Registration expenses to \$225 and so declared.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$325 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital. Voted to accept as printed and so declared.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000) to continue widening and improving the MacVeagh Road. Moved and seconded not to spend any more money on the MacVeagh Road until inspected by the Selectmen. Motion to lay the Article on the table was

lost by a standing vote 16 for and 27 against. Motion to accept as printed passed and was so declared.

- Art. 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.) to cover expenses of Halloween party for the children of the Town. A motion to lay this article on the table passed and was so declared.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will purchase from Richard Upton a right of way twenty (20) feet in width extending southwesterly from the Old Harrisville Road to Russell Reservoir and to pay for the same from funds received by the Town from the sale of lots on Russell Reservoir. A motion to pay Richard Upton Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) passed and was so declared.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town may use monies received from the sale of lots on Russell Reservoir to construct a road over the twenty (20) foot right of way to be purchased from Richard Upton. Motion made to construct a road over the right of way purchased under Art. 7, but if the three purchasers of lots will so state in a written agreement that they will accept the right of way in lieu of the road, then defer building the road at this time. Passed and so declared.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town may use monies received from the sale of lots on Russell Reservoir to extend the existing Town road from Lot 4 on Russell Reservoir to Lot 17. Motion to accept as printed; passed and was so declared.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town shall refund to the purchasers the monies received by the Town from the sale in 1957 of the Lots on Russell Reservoir. Motion made not to refund any of the money received as Art. 9 was passed and Mr. Bemis speaking in behalf of himself. Mr. MacVeagh and Mr. Starr have accepted the right of way in lieu of the road at this time. Motion passed and so declared.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500) to be placed in a sinking fund for the replacement of road equipment under the provision of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943, Chapter 160 as amended. Motion to accept as printed passed and so declared.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to have a street light installed at Mud Pond in front of the John W. St. Peter house. A motion to lay this article on the table passed and was so declared.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue to have the highway department plow private driveways. Motion to see if the Town will discontinue to have the highway department plow private driveways except for the clergy, people over 70 and public places. Motion lost and so declared.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise Five Hundred Sixty-one dollars and seventy-one cents (\$561.71) if the State will contribute Three Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-four

dollars and Seventy-two cents (\$3,744.72) for TRA. Motion to accept as printed passed and so declared.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding Eighty-six Hundred Dollars (\$8600.) for the purpose of completing improvements to the Eastview Road approximately one mile, such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 83, Laws of 1951 as amended by Chapter 31 Laws of 1953 and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds and notes as shall be to the best interest of the Town. Motion to accept as printed passed and so declared. A motion to recess at 5:24 P. M. until 6:30 P. M. for supper passed.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to have the Highway Department move the Stone Water Trough at Bennett's Four Corners to the spring at Childs' Bog (By Petition). Motion made that the Selectmen be authorized to contact all interested parties involved. Then if no objections are voiced, proceed to move the trough, if they have the legal right to do so and not before. Motion passed and so declared.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to restore Four Hundred dollars (\$400.) to the Harrisville Beach Committee Funds held in trust by the Trustees of the Town by vote of Town Meeting. The request being made because the Beach Committee voted to expend only Fifteen Hundred dollars (\$1500.) for road improvements, but were charged with and paid Nineteen Hundred dollars (\$1900.) A motion to put \$400. back into the Harrisville Beach Committee Funds. Passed and was so declared.

Art. 18. To hear reports of Agents, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. A motion to accept the reports as printed passed and was so declared.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes. A motion to give this authority, passed and was so declared.

Art. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

A motion to instruct the Selectmen to dispose of the remaining seven lots on Russell Reservoir as they see fit, either by auction or by private sale. Passed and was so declared.

A motion to authorize the Selectmen to investigate Blue Cross or group insurance for the Town employees and report at next Town Meeting; passed and was so declared.

A motion to leave the opening of Town Meeting next year in the hands of the Selectmen as to time and place; passed and was so declared. A motion to see if the Town will vote to approve the appointment by the Selectmen of a Zoning Commission of five (5) members, which commission shall make recommendations regarding zoning districts and appropriate regulations and shall hold a public hearing thereon prior to a final report of said commission as provided by Chapter 51, Section 55 of the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire. Passed and was so declared.

A motion to have a committee of four plus the Selectmen to go over the Street lighting situation; passed and was so declared.

A motion to have the Selectmen choose the committee named in the preceding motion; passed and was so declared.

A motion to charge Ten dollars (\$10.) for plowing driveways, except for the Clergy, people over 70 and Public Buildings. Passed and was so declared.

A motion to give the Highway Workers a standing vote of thanks for their work clearing the roads of snow; passed and was so declared.

A motion to give the Selectmen a rising vote of thanks for their work under difficulties; passed and was so declared.

A motion that the Clerk send the greetings of the meeting to J. Edward Mattila and wish him a speedy recovery; passed and was so delcared.

A motion to give John Marnell a vote of thanks for his work at the Beach; passed and was so declared.

A motion to close the polls at 7:30 P. M.; passed and was so declared.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended Dec. 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,531.86, plus a revenue surplus of \$414.55, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,946.41.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended Dec. 31, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification and accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of Dec. 31, 1958, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of Dec. 31, 1958, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$67.98, from \$15,563.39 to \$15,631.37 during the year 1958, as shown herewith:

Reconciliation of Treasurer's Balance:

The Treasurer should reconcile the Cash Book balance with the bank balance each month when the cancelled checks and bank statement are returned by the bank.

Town Treasurer's Surety Bond:

The surety bond of the Town Treasurer should be increased from \$8,000.00 to \$10,000.00, in order that the amount of the bond may be commensurate with the amount of funds over which the Treasurer has custody.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Harrisville for their assistance during the course of the audit.

- 6. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into high school tuition contracts with Keene High School at the rate of \$455.61 per pupil for the school year 1959-60, with Marlboro High School at the rate of \$375 per pupil and with other approved high schools.

- 7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800) for the services of an architect in preparing plans and specifications for classroom construction or alteration.

Article 3. Mr. Parker moved that reports of school district officers be accepted as written in the report. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 4. It was moved that the school board choose auditors at a later date, and so voted.

Article 7. (Helping Teacher) Mr. Parker moved to take up Article 7 before Article 5. Vote in the affirmative. Mr. Bowlby was asked to speak and clarify this subject and did so. Mr. R. Bemis moved to accept this article and vote was in the affirmative.

Article 5. Mr. Bowlby was asked to speak on teachers salaries and did so. Mr. William Bemis moved that the school district raise and appropriate \$47,901.00 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. The vote was in the affirmative.

Article 6. Mr. W. Thayer made the motion to accept this article which read: to see if the district will vote to hereafter use a check-list for the election of its officers, beginning with the 1959 annual district meeting, and will adopt as its school check-list the town check-list, as provided in RSA 197:12a as amended. It was so voted.

Article 8. Mr. Rathburn made the motion that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to extend the playground area and enlarge the ballfield. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. Mr. Bergeron moved that this article be laid on the table and so voted.

At 9:05 a recess was declared by the Moderator and the polls closed. 49 votes were cast.

The following were declared elected: Casper Bemis, Jr., Moderator; Patricia Phillips, Clerk; Virginia Bates, Treasurer; William Bemis, School Board Member, 3 years.

The results were announced and the meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

Two of the major problems faced by school districts are:—the constant "turn-over" in the teaching staff, and secondly, the growth of the school population. Harrisville has been fortunate in being able to retain all of its staff members for the past two years and its classroom teachers for over five years. This represents a very worth-while saving in education and funds. The Wells Memorial School has a fully certified, well-trained and very capable staff of teachers which the district should make every effort to retain.

During the past ten years there has been a small but steady growth in school population. In 1950 some 62 pupils were enrolled in the local school and by 1960 the census indicates that the enrollment will be 90 pupils. While this may not seem many in numbers alone, it does represent a 45% increase in elementary school population and exceeds the planned capacity of the building. A complicating factor is the fact that these pupils must be divided among three teachers so that no teacher has an excessive number of grades or pupils. By 1960 no such equitable division is possible and some teacher is faced with at least three grades and over 42 pupils. Any pupil in such a class is being denied an opportunity for a sound elementary education.

The census figures indicate that this increased school population will continue with us, so that a permanent solution to the problem becomes necessary. Only two permanent solutions seem possible. One of these is to send pupils to neighboring junior high schools; the other is to build an additional classroom.

While no one likes to face increased taxes, Harrisville has the financial ability to support an excellent educational program and is not a "poor" community. Among the 230 school districts in New Hampshire, Harrisville is 24th in taxable wealth per pupil with \$31,000 of taxable property per pupil compared to a state median of \$17,000. These figures indicate ample "ability to pay for education" and Harrisville has always shown a "willingness to pay" for the type of education America's children must have to safeguard themselves and the future of this country. In the coming annual meeting, the school district must face the second problem, that of pupil population growth.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

January 7, 1959—Harrisville, N. H.

TO THE CITIZENS OF HARRISVILLE:

Again I have the pleasure of informing the citizens of Harrisville about Wells Memorial School and the problems that face it.

We opened in September with an enrollment of 79, distributed in the following areas:

Mr. Wyman's room—20—grades 6, 7 Mrs. Sabin's room—28—grades 4, 5 Mrs. Libby's room—31—grades 1, 2, 3

Since then we have lost several pupils but have enrolled new ones so that the enrollment remains about constant. Both Mrs. Libby's and Mrs. Sabin's rooms have been overcrowded. When overcrowding such as we are experiencing at present exists it is difficult to get results that are satisfactory to parents, pupils, and teachers. Teacher load must be lessened if our educational results are to be up to those we strive for.

This year we have been fortunate in having two cadet teachers assigned here from Keene Teachers' College. Miss Janet Brown has been with us eighteen weeks, and Mr. John Wondolowski has been working with us for nine weeks. During the last nine weeks of the year Mr. Gordon Bean will be working in Mr. Wyman's room. These cadets have proven invaluable in their services and aid to Wells Memorial School. We have also had Mr. Herbert Werden as an aide from the local Teachers' College working in the fields of language, arts, science, and social studies.

The teachers have had the pleasure of attending two local union-wide workshops in art and music. These have been held after school hours at Wells Memorial School and Chesterfield Center School. These workshops assist teachers in keeping abreast with new methods and ideas.

The instructional program at Wells Memorial School remains superior. Few small schools offer such variety in subjects constantly widening your children's experiences.

Our annual Christmas operetta was cancelled this year because of illness among faculty members. If all goes well we may present an operetta in the Spring.

Under the able direction of Mrs. Harold Walker a booth at Cheshire Fair was set up for Wells Memorial School. This booth was superior and won prize money. Public relations such as these are important to your school and town.

This year under the supervision of our new Helping Teacher, Mr. Damon Russell, our science program is being extended in the union. New equipment, demonstrations, and a new pro-

gram in science has added to the interest in this area. We have a new mobile science unit at Wells Memorial, and now all science materials are available quickly in all rooms.

The children of grades 4 to 8 had the wonderful experience of a week of outdoor education at Camp Union in Greenfield, New Hampshire. This project was made possible by generous contributions both personal and organizational. Mrs. John Colony, Jr. sincerely deserves much credit for making this possible for the children of Harrisville. She collected a great deal of money and put much time and energy in making this treat a reality.

As principal, I am sometimes disturbed when parents fail to bring school problems concerning their children to me for help and guidance. The proper procedure, when a school problem develops, is for the parent to seek help from the teacher or principal. If we fail to help, the problem might then be taken to the school superintendent or school board. Failure to follow this pattern prevents me from giving prompt attention to the difficulty.

We are always ready to arrange for conferences with parents. We sincerely enjoy having parents visit our classes and discuss school problems with us. I urge all parents to bring any school business to me first, so that I may have an opportunity to act on the situation before hearing about it through local gossip.

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.
