11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to buying and repairing of the horsesheds and make appropriation for the same.

12. To see if the Town will buy new pipe for the Town Hall stoves, and make appropriation for the same.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

This year there was a circulation of 4,003 books and magazines, an increase of 503. Book collections were loaned to the schools where the teachers encouraged the reading of good books with noteworthy results. In observation of book week, both schools shared, before invited guests, in exhibitions, instruction and entertainment on Friday at the library. Eighty new books were bought, 21 given by friends, 28 added from 1934 state aid fund, and 29 from 1935 fund; total 159.

Last year the townspeople voted to raise \$25.00 for books, making a total of \$75.00. This year they vote again to make this annually. The regular \$50.00 buys the magazines, current fiction, mostly second handed, and a few children's books. From the state aid fund comes children's books and books on the high school reading lists. This \$25.00 makes it possible to buy some good permanent books and replace or rebind some of the worn out ones, for all of which there is still plenty of need.

The library was open 50 Saturday afternoons and closed two, while the hall was papered and painted. New curtains and draperies are to be added in the spring. The repairing of the hall and the Library sign cost \$47.00, which was paid for by Mrs. Susan Bancroft. This completes the renovation of the library and it seems proper at this time to publicly acknowledge our appreciation to Mrs. Bancroft, who made most of this work possible. It might be well also to bear in mind that it was our benefactor's expectation when electricity was installed that the library would be open at least one evening a week. This was tried at the time without success, but it is my belief that it could now be opened through the warmer months with success and I recommend that we plan for it in the near future, maybe 1937.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hebron:

During the school year ending June 30, 1935, we registered a total of 22 boys and 21 girls in our schools. Average membership was 41, and the per cent of attendance was 95.6. Forty-one were promoted and two failed of promotion. We graduated eight from our eighth grades; three from the Village, five from East Hebron, all but one of whom entered high school in Bristol or Plymouth. The schools joined in a graduation program of unusual excellence held in the auditorium of the church at Hebron Village.

The year was a successful one. Competent teachers, citizens, and members of the school board united in educational effort. The Public Library was exceedingly helpful. The school-rooms were made attractive and homelike centers of effective training in fundamentals, and of enriched experience through illustrative and creative activities. Again are we grateful to Mrs.

McLane, for continuing the prize speaking. Its value to our pupils is more than ever evident.

After several years of excellent teaching and of close identification with the community Miss Madeleine Creamer left us to accept a responsible position in Claremont. Her place has been taken by Miss Esma Ford of Laconia, a graduate of Keene Normal School. Since Miss Ford specialized in music she was particularly fitted to take over that subject in which Miss Creamer, too, had special interest. She has organized her school, is certainly achieving progress, and is entering into the life of the community. Fortunately Mrs. Cote continues her thorough work at East Hebron.

This year for the first time Mrs. Lovett is giving full time to school nursing in a district of which Hebron is a part. Her activities include physical examination and follow-up for remedy of defects, class-room visits, home calls, and inspection and precaution against contagious diseases and other infections. She is readily responsive to requests for assistance as need arises. Her services are very valuable in safeguarding the health of the children. I earnestly recommend that sufficient funds be appropriated to pay our share of the expense of her work.

I am pleased to commend the wise policy of the school board in providing liberally for textbooks and equipment. The renovations at East Hebron are much appreciated. It is gratifying that similar repairs are planned for Hebron Village.

This year seven boys and six girls are enrolled at East Hebron, and ten boys and thirteen girls at the Village. This total of 36 has decreased by removals to 32 on February 1, 1936. Three are attending for the first time. Two pupils at Hebron Village are our only eighth graders.

My work as superintendent has increased in pleasure and satisfaction through my better acquaintance with parents and children, through the eager interest and understanding cooperation of pupils and teachers, and through the continued sympathetic consideration of a school board ever alert to the welfare of the schools. My purpose is to be of the greatest possible help in promoting the educational growth of our young people.

In presenting this my third annual report I desire to express my thanks to the members of the school board for their unfailing kindness.
