LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE JACKSON PUBLIC LIBRARY:

I present herewith my report of the work done by the Library and a statement of its condition for the year ending Feb. 1, 1928.

The Library has been open 118 days. From July 1, to to October 1, the hours were from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. daily; and for the remaining months from 2 to 4 p. m. every Thursday. In this time the total number of books given out were 3,002; a monthly average of 250 volumes and a weekly average of 58 volumes.

There have been added to the Library by gifts 34 volumes and by purchase, 23 volumes, making the total number of volumes in the Library 3,810. In addition to these we have on file the following magazines: National Geographic, Nature Magazine, World's Work, Dearborn Independent, Good Housekeeping, Saturday Evening Post, Literary Digest, Pictorial Review, American, Youth's Companion, Needle Craft, Etude and John Martin.

We gratefully acknowledge gifts of books and money from friends and especially for the following donations: From Mr. George McCarthy, \$10.00; Mrs. J. B. Jones \$10.00; Mrs. A. H. Atherton, \$5.00; James Amster, 25 volumes; Mrs. F. H. Shapleigh, 8 volumes.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF JACKSON:

The teachers whom we had employed several years with great satisfaction resigned last summer. Our new teachers, however, have worked enthusiastically and industriously and our schools have continued to be well taught.

Because of the increase in property valuation the town is no longer eligible for state aid. The careful estimate made by the school board of each year's probable expenditure should be appropriated in the district meeting. Deficits and deficiency appropriations are undesirable and can usually be avoided.

Owing to removals the Dundee School now has only five pupils. Some of them will complete the eighth grade this year. As the situation may change before next September, it is unadvisable now to plan otherwise than for the continuation of this school.

The medical inspection when made will disclose the fact that we have in school some unvaccinated children with no excuse from a physician. The law is very explicit that these shall be excluded from school and a recent court decision sustains the law. NO child should be admitted next September who has not been vaccinated or does not possess a physician's excuse.

In behalf of the school board and of the citizens, I wish to express to Mr. Samuel Hazelton our appreciation of his labor and good will in mounting the flag staff on the village school.
